TASK FORCE Reynolds sets sights on state's child care crisis

DES MOINES - At her weekly update of all things COVID-19, Iowa Gov. Kim Reynolds took aim at the shortage of child care in the state.

Reynolds formed, by executive order, a Governor's Child Care Task Force to be headed up by Sukup Mfg. general counsel Emily Schmitt.

The 18-member task force is charged with coming up with recommendations in the next 100 days to

address the shortage. Schmitt said her goal will be to reduce the state's

shortage of child care slots by 50% in the next five years.



a child care desert and in rural Iowa that stat goes up to 35%. One of my goals with this task force is to take an expansive view of the crisis,"

Schmitt said. "Iowa has the highest rate in the country of both parents working, but we face child care shortages in every corner of the state."

She said data shows the state is 350,000 child care slots short of what is needed.

Child Care was one of the top recommendations from the Governor's Economic Recovery Advisory Board assembled last year to look at the state's

Miller finishes 11th in the 400-meter run

CEDAR FALLS – The Fort Madison Bloodhounds Track & Field team opened its 2021 season at the Dickinson Relays in Cedar Falls Tuesday.


The Relays at UNI are the only indoor competition the Hounds will compete in this year as all other normally scheduled indoor runs have been cancelled due to COVID-19.

Twenty Hounds made the trip for the Relays with only a week of practice, and set six personal best times.

The best finish of the day came from Austin Miller who took 11th in the 400-meter dash with a time of 54.66, a personal best for the junior who qualified last fall for the State Cross Country meet finishing 35th overall. Garrett Hannum finished 27th with a time of 55.94, in a field of 77.

The Bloodhounds 4×200 team of Brock Califf, Tate Johnson, Joey Dodson and Jacob McGowan finished 13th with a time of 1:38.14.

The 4×400 team, in the last race of the day, composed of Califf, Andrew Schaefer, Landes Williams, and Garrett Hannum motored to a 17th-place finish with a time of 3:48.64.

In the shot put, Ethan Deacon finished 20th with a toss of 43-9, which is a personal best for him. Cuyrin Ross also had a personal best with a throw of 35-9 good enough for 50th in a field of 79.

Jacob McGowan jumped 19-1.5 placing 23rd in the long jump and Kane Williams jumped 17-8 placing 47th. There were 68 competitors and both of those marks were personal bests.

Mikey DiPrima competed in the high jump and cleared 5-6 placing 31st.

The 4×800 team of Austin Miller, Nick Fullenkamp, Hayden Wolfe, and Chay Smith posted a team time of 9:52.61 placing 31st. Macaden Rhoer ran the 60 hurdles and posted a time of 10.33. Calem Maclearn and Seth Mendez each sprinted in the 60-meter dash finishing at 8.01 and 8.22 respectively.

Gavin Wiseman and Mikey DiPrima both sprinted in the 200 meters. Wiseman posted a personal best in a time of 25.21 placing 41st, while DiPrima placed 38th with a time of 25.09 just ahead of Wiseman.

Nick Fullenkamp, running his second 800 of the day, posted a time of 2:31.14 and Macaden Rhoer posted a time of 2:27.81. They placed 65th and 57th respectively.

"We're pretty happy with the way our guys competed today," said co-Coach Chad Hannum.

"We're excited for the outdoor season. Hopefully mother nature provides us with some great track meet weather."

The Hounds open the outdoor season in two weeks at Washington.

"I don't have any comment on that. We'll continue to work through the process and see where it ends up," she said.

Numbers down but students happy to show projects

With spread of the coronavirus at the lowest levels since the outbreak began, Schiller said the students wanted to try and do something in person.

Twenty students came up with 16 projects ranging from investigating Saturn's rings to neutralizing e.coli, to whether a motorcycle is quicker with a clutch or automatic shifting.

HTC junior Jack Blint worked on altering the genetic makeup of E.coli in a lab setting by adding DNA strands. He said the project was just to fine tune his lab technique as he wanted to do something more serious next year.

"I plan to do something bigger next year and more serious and wanted to get my lab technique down. Some applications could be to alter bacteria for other purposes like creating a super cleaner or something along those lines," he said.

Blint said introducing genes to the E.coli was a little intimidating, but said he ran the project about five times to get the technique down.

"The first two times were failures and we couldn't get anything to work. (Schiller) was there mentoring me, but a lot of this was on my own, too. This is actually the fifth one. The fourth one was iffy on results, but this one went well and was the one we decided to do the project on."

Blint said ultimately he would like to see if he can take a bacteria and kill it on something it should typically survive on.

Schiller said getting the projects up and going was difficult with the COVID pandemic.

"This has been the most trying year. I'm an old guy and I didn't get my vaccine until the Feb. 18, the first one, and I was very nervous about coming in." Schiller said.

"But I get it. The kids don't want to do a virtual science fair, period. I think the thing that bothers me the most with them is there's no incentive to share your project and excitement with a judge virtually."

Max Kruse and Corby Moeller took to the road to try and sort out which dirt bike was safer for children wanting to ride for the first time.

"We really were trying to see which dirt bike was faster, the ones with a clutch or without. It turns out that it really doesn't matter. It's just what the driver is most used to," Kruse said.

Kruse admitted that the result is also determined by how good the driver is moving

g through the gears on the bike.

He said some bikes are tougher to shift and the bike he used for his part of the experiment had a tougher shifting procedure.

"I used a bike I'm not used to so I kind of messed up on that one," Kruse said.

Schiller said it was more difficult this year with just the 16 projects, than it was last year where 60 students had 45 projects. Most of the work was done with zoom before Schiller was vaccinated.

"For a while I was zooming with the kids and then felt more comfortable after getting my first vaccine."

But with the assistance of several teachers and the principal, tables were spaced out, student judges came in with masks and a clipboard, and the show was on.
