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Effort to rehab stadium underway

GO FUND ME: Account set up as part of effort aimed at alumni, community

FORT MADISON – The community has come together to put up a new press box at Richmond Stadium overlooking Youel Field. There's also a new scoreboard courtesy of Connection Bank, Lee County Bank, Pilot Grove Savings Bank and Mohrfeld Electric.

New goal posts were put in, and Head Coach Derek Doherty is building a new-look Bloodhound football team that made the playoffs in 2020.

Now Fort Madison Football, Inc. wants to spruce up the stadium, but they need help from the community and former Bloodhounds.

Tara Johnson, a board member with the organization that provides funding and support for programs that enhance Fort Madison's football program, said the stadium just isn't in a condition that's reflective of the resurgence of the Fort Madison's athletic programs.

Fort Madison Football, Inc. is looking for support for an stadium improvement project at Richmond Stadium, home



of the Fort Madison Bloodhounds. A Go Fund Me page has been set up and the link is included in the article.

The organization isn't associated with the school district in any way, but helps prop up facility and equipment needs through it's fundraising arm. The group's annual golf outing

IVANHOE SHOOTING FMPD seeks warrants for arrest



FORT MADISON – Little new information was released Tuesday regarding the shooting that took place at Ivanhoe Park Monday evening in Fort Madison.

Police officials said Tuesday the name of the victim is being withheld out of privacy to the 31-year-old man who was shot in the leg at about 6:50 p.m. Monday night.

The shooting took place while Doherty Baseball Academy was holding drills at the park's baseball diamond. Several adults with the program administered first aid until help arrived at the scene. The assailants are reported to have fled the

HTC girls tie last year's win mark in first game

WEST POINT – Holy Trinity Catholic has already tied it's season win tally from last year.

The Crusaders looked crisp in a 8-3 win over Mediapolis Monday night at South Park to open the year at 1-0. They finished last year 1-10 and 0-6 in the Southeast Iowa Superconference.

"The girls have impressed me. They're basically the same girls out there, but a year more mature and I would have been surprised if we weren't a little better this year," said head coach Loren Menke.

"How much better remains to be seen."

The Crusaders got down early trailing 1-0 going into the bottom of the 1st. But Brooke Mueller doubled in a run and came around to score on a dropped third strike throw out. Mary Hellige, who got the win for the Crusaders, drew a walk and would also come around to score to open a 3-1 lead that Holy Trinity wouldn't relinquish.

The Lady Bulldogs went three-up, three-down in the top of the 2nd on back-to-back groundouts to first baseman Rachel Menke and a ground out to second baseman Laura Mehmert.

Mehmert would get off to a solid start of the season with 2-run double to right center in the bottom of the third to score Hellige and Kayla Box and give the Crusaders a 5-2 lead.

Mehmert also recorded four outs in the game, including two sharp line drives she snared on a step.

"She played a great game defensively, but that hit drove in two runs and that was a huge hit at that point in the game. She gave us a bit of breathing room and when you haven't been winning if you can get some breathing room that helps a lot," Menke said.

Hellige would give up a single in the top of the 4th but a come-backer to the mound and fly out to Anna Sobczak in right field would end the threat.

Holy Trinity wouldn't score in the fourth despite a lead-off single. Mueller looked to keep things going with what appeared to be a two-out grounder to third. The throw pulled Mediapolis' 1st baseman off the bag, and Mueller was initially called safe. But the call was overturned by the home plate umpire who said Mediapolis reestablished at the base to retire the side.

Hellige would strike out the side in the top of the 5th,


but HTC would also go scoreless in the bottom half of the frame.

Hellige would again give up a single with two outs and then worked a groundout to short to end the top of the 6th.

A single by Mueller, who went 2 for 4 with 2 runs and an RBI, loaded the bases with two out in the bottom of the sixth. A wild pitch plated a run. A walk and another wild pitch would give the Crusaders three unearned insurance runs in the bottom half of the sixth for an 8-2 lead.

Hellige would get the first two hitters out in the top of the 7th, but then give up a single and a walk and then another long single to sophomore Hannah Russell before Jayde Eberhardt slapped a ball down the first base line where Rachel Menke gobbled it up for the final out.

Mueller and Kayla Box led the way with two hits each. Box had a double and two RBI, Mueller had a double and an RBI. Haile Cain, Sobczak, Mehmert and Teegan Snaadt all had hits for HTC.

Summer's bounty awaits from the Empty Nest garden

I'm gonna "Give peas a chance" this year (Green Arrow), although rabbits eat them right off, but leave the lettuce (Butter Crunch and Baby Romaine) alone. Strange.

What's lettuce without radishes?—Cherry Bell.

We've had good luck with Blue Lake bush beans in the past, so I planted two long rows of green beans. (We may need help.) Cousin Rick from Arizona comes to our house each summer just to eat green beans and sweetcorn. I personally love beans-and-bacon, along with sliced tomatoes, cucumbers and onions, sweetcorn, and wilted lettuce. I could turn into a vegetarian in the summer, although grilled burgers or steaks go good with garden veggies.

Along with the Peaches and Cream sweetcorn, and a good distance away so as to prevent cross pollination, I threw in what I call Indian Corn, although the politically correct term is Decorative Corn. Within the rows of Indian Corn went three hills of Connecticut Field "punkins"-the jack-o-lantern size. (I don't like having to get the forklift to move monster "punkins.") What's fall decoration without orange "punkins" and colorful Indian Corn?

I may have messed up and planted the cucumbers (Green Dragon Burpless) too close to the "punkins." Last year the "punkins" and cucumbers cross pollinated and created a strange gourd that was next to worthless, although sort of attractive for fall decoration.

"Our Iowa" Magazine has a competition to see who can grow the tallest sunflowers from their heirloom seeds—Russian Mammoth, 12" or taller, heads as big as dinner plates. Ginnie bit, so along the north edge of the garden will be sunflowers. We may have to erect a scarecrow to keep the birds away.

That rounds out the garden for '21, a hefty undertaking that always gets the better of us, trying to keep up with weeds and harvesting. But then I overdo most everything. I did major battle with chipmunks last year. They like to dig up seed and stuff their cheeks. Hopefully, I've erad-

While I was working in the garden, I noticed our McIntosh Apple tree, loaded again with blooms and tiny apples. Amazing. Rabbits literally stripped the bark off the tree trunk and high up into the branches. But the tree rebounded, seemingly unfazed. Nature never fails to amaze me.

While working in the garden I cut some tender young rhubarb stalks for Ginnie. She tried out a new recipe on me: rhubarb-pudding crisp. Man-o-man, with vanilla "i-scream"-melt in your mouth. Does Ginnie spoil me? Yup.

I may have made a major blunder last fall. Thinking we had Purple Martins swooping our yard for insects, I spent a lot of money with the Amish and bought a rather expensive Martin House and erected it (another story). We waited and waited impatiently this spring for the Martins to return and take up housekeeping in their new "hotel." It was also a lot of work keeping the sparrows and grackles from nesting in it. Finally the big day arrived when we saw our first "Purple Martins." However, they nested in one of our sheds, building a nest of mud and sticks, instead of using the fancy Martin House. Come to find out we have Barn Swallows instead of Purple Martins. Dang it!

But the finches have returned in full regalia, both the Gold Finches (Iowa's State Bird) and the reddish House Finches. They like to hang upside down from the perches on our window feeders (so cute). So we'll make do with the birds we have. I dunno what will become of the Martin House.

Due to a recent skirmish with skin cancer on the top of my head, I was real careful to keep a hat on while working in the garden. I used to laugh at "old people" who kept themselves covered when out in the sun. Now I are one. My, my, how things change as we age, I mean, mature.

I spent \$33 on seed and plants for the garden this year. Not bad. As I was working in the garden, a pick-up truck pulled in the driveway. said.

serving this because we were supposed to be here," Chris said.

Amanda said the two started praying about the move and then a pastor friend let them know the bishop, Culp, was getting ready to retire and the timing was perfect.

The two went to work first putting together a nursery to encourage younger families to attend and have Sunday school.

"We represent the youth in our organization in this district of Iowa. There is all sorts of stuff that we do and we believe if you put positive things into children's minds when they are young and speak life into them, they have a better chance of staying focused and doing good things in life," Amanda

"We had people who believed in us and if hadn't been for them ... "

The two both are recovered from addictions and speak that truth to members of the congregation, which can number anywhere from 20 to 35 depending on the week.

"About a month ago I was standing with a couple people and it was their first time in church. And I said to them the first time I was in church I had drugs in my pocket. I was a drug addict. And they were like, 'Can you say that in here" and I said "Yeah, because it's honest," Chris said.

Amanda said they welcome anyone who is looking for a conversation about God and his role

in their life. Amanda is just 33 and Chris is 30, so being able to relate to younger families is part of the rebranding of the church underway.

They have also been working diligently on the physical aspect of pastoring as well as the social aspect.

The two have freshened up the church with new ceilings and lights, classrooms in the basement with a brand new kitchen and improved lighting. A keyboard and drum set sit on both sides of the podium in front of the pews.

The church also sits adjacent to several lots that have been donated to the church and Chris said they are currently getting an engineering survey done to see what the exact boundaries of the property are, to plan for addi-

"It just looks bad and it's not a good representation of our town," she said. "Even the kids not playing shouldn't have to sit in stands that are in that bad of shape, nor should the community."
