ROTARY: Ambassador stops on campaign swing to talk China, candidates

FORT MADISON – Former Iowa Governor and U.S. Ambassador to China Terry Branstad flew into Fort Madison Tuesday for a quick campaign stop.

Branstad spent just over three years in China and said it was the longest time he'd ever been away from Iowa.

"First of all, I'm gonna say I'm delighted to be back in Iowa," Branstad said with a chuckle.

He said it was challenging time to be ambassador to China. China is the biggest economic competitor to the United States

and Branstad said President Donald Trump has been successful at creating a more level playing field with the second largest economy in the world.

He said one of the biggest issues was getting fairness and reciprocity in trade and Trump did things the U.S. hasn't been successful at in the past three decades.

"That was a long, hard battle. President Trump had the courage to do something that past presidents haven't done in last 20 to 30 years and that's insist that we be treated fairly and have a trade agreement to open opportunities for America in terms of

The vacancies were created by the resignation of Tyler Miller in the 3rd Ward and the death of Bob Morawitz on Sept. 30 in Ward 2.

The move sets the stage for the city to publish on Nov. 2, an intent to

Supervisors OK shooting range north of FM

FORT MADISON – County officials gave a nod of support Tuesday morning to plan to open a shooting range north of Fort Madison

The shooting range is planned to be located at 2958 County Road 103 about five minutes north of the city west of the airport.

Supervisors said they all received emails in support of the proposal submitted by Jim Seitz, of Seitz Firearms LLC.

The facility will be built on Seitz' property, according to a letter to Lee County Attorney Ross Braden in September.

Seitz is looking to sell firearms from his residence and construct a 140-yard range

from shooting positions to a 12-foot tall earthen berm south down range that is 12 feet wide at its base. A 12-foot by 24-foot wooden structure with a tin roof is also planned at the shooting position.

Seitz indicated there is an additional 40 to 50 acres of timber behind the berm, all within his property boundaries.

Seitz said he anticipates the range being open from 5 p.m. to dusk Monday through Friday and from 9 a.m. to dusk on the weekends.

Board Chairman Ron Fedler said the county received a stack of emails in support of the shooting range, and he had one phone call opposing it.

The measure passed unanimously.

In other action, the board passed a resolution, 5-0, to authorize the county to enter into a loan agreement with Zion Bank Corp. of Salt Lake City for \$1.075 million on bonds for installation of a new digital camera system for Lee County Jail and repairs needed at other county facilities.

Supervisor Gary Folluo also reminded citizens that coronavirus case counts in Lee County are on the rise again and people need to be vigilant about wearing masks and taking recommended precautions such as frequent hand washing, sanitizing and social distancing.

"Nobody wants government intervention, but nobody wasn't people sick and dying either. Pay attention to what your doing and let's get through this as best we can," Folluo said.

Fedler said he lost a friend last week to the virus, and although he didn't support fining people for not adhering to recommendations, he agreed that people should be wearing

"It's proven that masks help. I'm not saying there 100%, but I would like everybody in the city, county, state and federally to please wear a mask and think about the people around you," he said.

Bailey announces retirement from coaching after loss

FORT MADISON - It was a close match.

But you win close matches by getting long scoring runs, and Fort Madison's volleyball team couldn't do that in Tuesday's 25-20, 25-20, 25-22 loss to Mount Pleasant in a Class 4A Region 8 quarterfinal at Fort Madison High School.

The Bloodhounds (11-18) only had two runs of four or more points as the Panthers (15-16) steadily held on to each game.

"We just couldn't put together two points, three points, when we needed them," Fort Madison coach Kent Bailey said. "We would serve a ball out. We

would hit an easy ball out. We couldn't get into sync."

Fort Madison had leads in the first two games, and just when it looked like the Panthers were in control in the third game, had a seven-point run that tied the game at 18. Reyna Lampe had three kills in that run, part of her eight-kill night.

But Mount Pleasant was able to close out the win and advance to Thursday's semifinal against Burlington High School in Burlington.

"Give Mount Pleasant credit," Bailey said "They made us work. They dug out balls, made us take an extra swing. Give them credit. They did the job.

"They found holes in our defense. But the bigger thing was they dug up everything we hit. That made our hitters have to try to get more, and we couldn't do it."



The Bloodhounds had a chance to set an early tone in the first game. They tied the game at 20, but Mount Pleasant scored the final five points.

They also made a late run in the second game, getting to within 23-20 before the Panthers closed out the match with back-to-back points.

"This was a great group of young ladies," Bailey said. "I came to the gym every day enjoying coaching them. They've worked hard. It's been one of those years when you never knew what to expect. But we made it to the end, and they appreciate that."

Lauren Bailey was 16-16 serving with two aces and

23 assists, while Kendall Beebe was 10 of 10 serving. Nadia Boeding had 19 digs on the night to go with Bailey's 17 and Madison Pirri's 15. Alana Simpson and Reyna Lampe led the Lady Hounds at the net with eight kills each.

Bailey also announced that he was stepping down as the Bloodhounds head coach after the game.

"I announced to the players afterward that I was retiring with the seniors. I've been coaching at some level for 31 years and I'm looking forward to some other opportunities," he said.


The Lee Count Health Department has approved the event – and hopefully people will put on their best manners and masks if possible - and social distance thru food and treat lines – there will be plenty for all!





Mayor commits to open candidate interviews



fill the positions by appointment. At that point, residents have 14 days to file a petition to force a special election, or 14 days after an appointment is made.

Jerry Hamelton, one of the candidates seeking the 2nd Ward seat, said it is his intention to file the petition to put the seats in front of voters.

> Mayor Matt Mohrfeld put the item on the agenda for the council to discuss and act upon the options.

He said putting a special election on a ballot wouldn't happen until Dec. 15, possibly Dec. 8 at the earli-



"Running with a five-person council is irresponsible to the voters who elected us," she said.

Bowker said the council could possibly find itself in a position where they don't have a quorum and may not be able to go about the business of the city.

Mark Lair initially said he thought the council should support the election because there are five people showing interest

in the two seats. "That means to me that we should allow the people to make the decision. I know it's costly and

we won't have people right away, but in the long run we'd be better off," Lair said. However after the discussion, Lair changed his mind and voted to not move forward with the

Councilman Chad Cangas said he was appointed and there were five or six people running for

"I'm of the opinion if appointing is what we were planning on doing - they have a means with a petition, why don't we wait and see if they actually go through with it," he said.

Mohrfeld has said at the Oct. 6 meeting he would like to accept letters of intent until Nov. 10 and then make an appointment on Nov. 17.

But Mohrfeld confirmed Tuesday that no closed session interviews will be conducted with candidates and moreover, no closed sessions for interviews will be put on the agenda.

To be considered on a ballot, all candidates will need to collect and turn in petitions with the required number of signatures to be placed on the ballot. However, appointments are simply a majority vote of the council.

Tom Schulz, who's also running for the 2nd Ward, said ward residents deserve representation

"As a council you're responsible for seeing the residents of this community are represented," Schulz said.

"We could potentially be looking at two wards that are unrepresented for several months, and potentially be looking at City Council meetings that don't take place because we can't seat a quo-

Donna Amandus, who's petitioning to run for 3rd Ward said transparency is important in today's political climate.

"I know the city's in trouble and we have a lot of challenges ahead of us very soon, but on that note, transparency would be the best way to go and let the people decide," she said.

In other action, the council:

- voted 5-0 to reappoint Charles Bock to the City's Board of Adjustment and Appeals
- voted 4-1 to approve two change orders for work being done on the Hwy. 61 project in the amount of \$89,951, and on the parking lot project behind City Hall in the amount of \$17,591. A change order on the Amtrak Depot project was pulled from agenda.

Branstad touts administrations success with China trade

exports of agriculture products.

He said China has made record purchases of corn, soybeans, pork, beef and chicken, and it's made a difference in prices U.S. farmers get.

He said there has also been progress in protecting intellectual property rights, and China opening their market to American companies in the financial services industry.

Fentanyl was also an issue tackled in negotiations with the Chinese during Branstad's term. He said Trump asked Chinese President Xi Jinping to make fentanyl a controlled substance, which he did in May 2019. Branstad said that helped stem the flow of that drug to the U.S.

Branstad also made pitches for Trump, Sen. Joni Ernst, and Mariannette Miller-Meeks candidate for U.S. Representative (Iowa-2nd District) and Iowa legislature candidates.

"We cannot afford to have the Democratic platform of the Green New Deal, socialism, and huge tax increases, which would stifle the economic growth our country is experiencing," said the 73-year-old Leland, Iowa native.

Branstad produced a COVID-19 economic impact flyer put together by the Council of State Governments, a non-partisan organization that put together a flyer on the COVID-19 fiscal impact to states.

He said Iowa was ranked as one of two states with low risk and high resiliency along with Utah. However, Iowa continues to be labeled a coronavirus hotspot by the White House.

He also said he was proud of the work Reynolds has done leading the state through the pandemic.
