Trail cost keeps rising

REC TRAIL: FMCH Community Foundation trail facing more change orders

FORT MADISON – A proposed change to the work being done on the trail running up 15th Street to Rodeo Park will add about \$30,000 to the project if approved at Tuesday's City Council meeting.

The Fort Madison City Council will consider a change order to the Fort Madison Community Hospital Community Foundation Trail project, the fourth one to be considered on the work, at Tuesday's regular meeting.

The city entered into the contract with Jones Contracting Corp. of West Point for \$1,206,777. The current contract now stands at \$1,292,725 after three previous change orders.

The current change order will increase the driveway thickness to match the existing concrete at Bates Sanitation & Asphalt, WM Johnson Truck Line, and Gethsemane Cemetery. It will also include adding a subdrain to dry the

subbase, and replacement of sod at the cemetery.

The work at WM Johnson would be to insure a smooth transition for larger trucks into the facility. The previous planned level of concrete was too shallow.

The trail is part of the P.O.R.T. trail project, and according to a report from City Public Works Director Mark Bousselot, the P.O.R.T. commission has approved moving forward with the change order.

Some on the Fort Madison City Council have been vocalizing frustration with change orders that appear to have been forseeable in nature. Councilman Tom Schulz vented two weeks ago with another change order for the Amtrak passenger depot platform project, that he called "crappy work from a crappy engineering firm".

Klingner & Associates did the design engineering on the depot project, and several councilman and Fort Madison Mayor Matt Mohrfeld defended the firm saying they had made amends for some other issues earlier in the project.

HRGreen is the engineering firm for the trail project and submitted the change order on June 9.

In a related issue the council will also be considering an application to the Iowa Dept. of Transportation's Recreational Trails program for construction grant for phase IV of the P.O.R.T. trail for a 48th Street connector.

In other action, the council will be considering:

- a one-year contract renewal for SIEBUS services through the Southeast Iowa Regional Planning Commission at an annual cost of \$8,500 to the city. Fares under the renewed agreement are \$2.50 for a ride within the city, and \$5 for rides between cities that use the bus. Anyone can ride the bus between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday.
- agreements with Calhoun, Burns and Associates for replacement of bridges at 27th Street over Dry Creek and Avenue F over French Creek.

County ready to take over ambulance

Contract changed to end June 30 instead of original July 1 date

LEE COUNTY – Plans are currently on track with less than a month remaining before Lee County officially takes over its ambulance service.

At Monday's regular meeting of the Lee County Board of Supervisors, the board approved 4-0 an amendment to the current contract with Lee County EMS Ambulance Inc, to end on June 30th at 8 a.m.

Originally, the plans were to take over at midnight on the morning of July 1, 2021, but new Director Dennis Cosby and Director of Operations Jason Dinwiddie decided an extra day would be advantageous.

Supervisor Garry Seyb, who has been on the steering committee along with Supervisor Rick Larkin, said

thing are on track to transition the service seamlessly.

"I don't see any big issues," Seyb said.
"Ambulances, we're having a little bit of a time before we can receive those, but we're going to (loaners) from them if they can't deliver ours on time."

In December, the county purchased six new ambulances from North Central Ambulance Service, three transport-van type ambulances and three full-service ambulance rigs. They also acquired one ambulance from Lee County EMS in the purchase agreement.

Cosby said the county will be picking up some of those ambulances this week.

"We'll be picking up two, possibly three of them this week. If they can't deliver the third, they'll give us a third vehicle as a loaner until the third is finished being built," Cosby said.





Hounds rally in 4th to get sweep of Mt. Pleasant

FORT MADISON – Fort Madison's baseball doubleheader sweep of Mount Pleasant on Monday night looked big on the scoreboard.

But there were a lot of little things here and there in the 15-0, 14-4 rout of the Panthers.

The Bloodhounds (11-2 overall, 7-1 Southeast Conference) extended their winning streak to seven games and kept pace with Burlington at the top of the conference standings heading into Thursday's home doubleheader with the Grayhounds.

Fort Madison dominated the opener with a seven-run third inning and a seven-run fourth to back the one-hit outing of pitcher Matt Hopper. The Bloodhounds trailed 4-1 in the second game before they got six runs in the fourth inning and seven in the fifth.

Fort Madison's offense wore down the Panthers (2-11, 1-7). The Bloodhounds drew 12 walks in the first game, six in the second.

"We really put the pressure on," Fort Madison coach Ron Walker said. "When you're taking at-bats of seven, eight, nine pitches, that adds up."

Then the Hounds went to work with Emily Steffensmeier opening the bottom half with a single to center. She would swipe second and Neeley Rehm would reach when Mt. Pleasant pitcher Madison Helling would drop a pop up in the infield

Logan Johnson would pop out in foul territory and Lexi Whaley would load the bases taking a pitch off her front cleat. Allyson Helmick would get an RBI with a walk on five pitches. Then Lauryn Helmick drove a 2-2 pitch all the way to fence in the left center gap clearing the bases with a stand-up double and 4-0 lead.

Helmick would give up just one more hit and an infield error as the Lady Hounds clamped down on the struggling Panthers (0-17).

Fort Madison would put up a run in the second and three in the third with two outs. Elle Ruble would draw a walk on four pitches and Aija Jenkins would follow up with a single to left that would bring Ruble around to score after she stole second. Steffensmeier would move Jenkins up with a single to right and Rehm would bring them both in with a double to left.

The Hounds would finish the game in the bottom half of the fourth with a five-run inning highlighted by Lauryn Helmick's double to left scoring Lexi Whaley and Allyson Helmick.

Still with no outs and the bases loaded Steffensmeier would single to right scoring Ruble and Taylor Johnson to invoke the 12-run rule after four innings.

Head Coach Jared Rehm said Helmick had a strong outing.

"She had a good game tonight. She hit well, drove in five runs I think, so those were some big hits," he said.

Rehm said the Panthers are in a rebuilding phase of the program and the girls understood that part of the win.

"I thought overall against (Davenport) Central we played a better game. So I wouldn't say this is the best I've seen us play," he said. "The girls obviously like the wins and they keep perspective of where other teams are it. But it's always good to build wins when you can get them."

Steffensmeier was 4-for-4 with 2 RBI and three runs scored. Helmick and Jenkins both had two-hit games for the Hounds.

In the opener, Fort Madison shut the Panthers down early and had an 11-0 lead going into the fourth inning, but Mt. Pleasant put up four runs, all with two outs to extend the game an inning.

An error in right field started the slide and then Rehm gave up three walks in a row to score a run. Mt. Pleasant's Ella McNamee then hit an RBI single to left. Bethany Drury would follow with a 2 RBI single to center before Whaley would throw out Courtney Raub trying to take third.

The Hounds would put up three more runs in the bottom half of the fourth highlighted by RBI hits from Kylee Cashman and Allyson Helmick to seal the win.

Cashman went 3 for 4 with 3 runs scored and an RBI. Steffensmeier and Rehm each had 2 RBI.

Rehm went the distance scattering three hits and all four runs came unearned. She struck out four and walked four in earning the win.

Jared Rehm said the team is coming back into shape after some early conference losses.

"With the losses we got from Fairfield and Washington I think we're slowly coming back around," he said "We've got two days, tomorrow and Wednesday, now to prepare for BHS."

Fort Madison improves to 5-8 on the year with the wins and sits at 2-4 in the Southeast Conference. They host Burlington 7-5 (6-2) in a doubleheader Thursday starting at 5:30 p.m.



Narcotics task force arrests four

LEE COUNTY – The Lee County Narcotics Task Force reports the arrest of several Lee County residents in connection with illegal drug activity in the area.

Amanda Davis, 37, of Fort Madison, Iowa was arrested on May 27th, 2021 at her residence in Fort Madison. Davis is charged with Delivery of More than 5 grams of Methamphetamine 2nd or subsequent offense within 1,000 feet of a Recreation Center a Class B Felony; Delivery of less than 5 grams of Methamphetamine 2nd or subsequent offense within 1,000 feet of a Recreation Center a Class C Felony; Drug Tax Stamp Violation-Methamphetamine a Class D Felony; Drug Tax Stamp Violation- Marijuana a Class D Felony; Maintaining a Drug House an Aggravated Misdemeanor; Possession of a Controlled Substance- Marijuana 2nd or Subsequent Offense a Serious Misdemeanor, Possession of a Schedule II Controlled Substance- Oxycodone 2nd or Subsequent Offense a Serious Misdemeanor, and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia a Simple Misdemeanor.

The arrest of Davis stems from a search warrant that was conducted in connection to an ongoing investigation by the Lee County Narcotics Task Force regarding Davis selling controlled substances throughout the Lee County area.

Mary Penrose, 58, of Keokuk, Iowa was arrested on May 28th, 2021 at the Lee County Jail after being transported from Clark County, MO jail. Penrose was arrested for maintaining a Drug House, an Aggravated Misdemeanor; 3 counts of Unlawful Possession of Prescription Drugs, each a Serious Misdemeanor and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, a Simple Misdemeanor.

The arrest of Penrose stems from a search warrant that was conducted on her residence after responding to a report of a drug overdose that occurred inside her residence. Additional warrants have been issued for other individuals in connection with this investigation.

Eric Fortune Sr., 54, of Fort Madison, Iowa was arrested on June 1st, 2021 near Shopton Park in Fort Madison, Iowa. Fortune Sr. was arrested for Possession of Controlled Substance 2nd Offense- Methamphetamine, an Aggravated Misdemeanor; Possession of Controlled Substance 2nd Offense- Marijuana, an Aggravated Misdemeanor; 3 counts of Unlawful Possession of Prescription Drugs, each a Serious Misdemeanor, and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, a Simple Misdemeanor.

The arrest of Fortune stems from a search warrant that was conducted on his residence regarding a unrelated investigation.

Natasha McCarty, 34, of Keokuk, Iowa was arrested on June 6th, 2021 near Wal-Mart in Keokuk. McCarty was arrested for outstanding warrants for two counts of Delivery of a Controlled Substance- less than 5 grams of Methamphetamine, each a Class C Felony; and Theft 3rd Degree a Class D Felony.

The arrest of McCarty stems from an ongoing investigation conducted by the Lee County Narcotics Task Force where McCarty was selling methamphetamine throughout the Lee County area.

The Keokuk Police Department, Fort Madison Police Department, Department of Narcotics Enforcement, and the Lee County Attorney's Office, assisted the Lee County Narcotics Task Force in part or all of these investigations.

The defendants are presumed innocent until and unless proven guilty. The Lee County Narcotics Task Force is funded in part by the U.S. Department of Justice and the funds administered by the Iowa Governor's Office of Drug Control Policy.

The Bloodhounds kept the second game close after the Panthers scored all of their runs in the second inning.

Starting pitcher Reiburn Turnbull got a strikeout to end the second inning. Reliever Vasin Thurman got a strikeout with the bases loaded to end the third inning. A line-drive double play ended the fourth inning, and catcher Kane Williams threw out Jake Ensminger trying to steal second base after a leadoff walk in the fifth.

"The big part of that second game, and that's what we talked about out there, is that we're a good team, but we're not a good enough team to always overcome our own mistakes," Walker said. "We couldn't find the strike zone early, we didn't trust ourselves on a pitch-out call, we didn't compete well in the (batter's) box.

"After that, it was just big plays, and we started executing, started playing baseball."

Fort Madison took the lead in the fourth. The first six hitters in the inning came in to score, with Landes Williams' two-run single being the big hit of the inning.

Williams had a two-run double in the fifth, and then Vasin Thurman's RBI single ended the game on the 10-run rule.

Garrett Hannum drove in three runs in the first game. All of the runs in the fourth inning came without the benefit of a hit — the Bloodhounds had eight walks and had two batters hit by pitches.

Fort Madison plays a home doubleheader with Class 4A Davenport North on Wednesday before playing host to another 4A team in the Grayhounds.

"It's a big week," Walker said. "We finish with back-to-back doubleheaders with Class 4A teams, so this is a big week in our schedule, to see where we're at. When the rubber hits the pavement, we can't take anyone lightly."
