Grassley defends vote

TOWN HALL: 40-year senator gets peppered from both sides during hour meeting

FORT MADISON – The emotion of the political climate was on full display Wednesday morning as U.S. Sen. Charles Grassley took shots from the left and right at Fort Madison City Hall.

Grassley (R-Iowa) held a town meeting as part of a southeast Iowa swing talking with constituents about hot button issues facing

The 40-year senator opened his conversation about his support for the \$1 trillion infrastructure bill that passed through the U.S. Senate earlier this month.

He said he opposed the \$3.5 trillion budget that passed the House, that has been tied to the infrastructure bill.

"That money sets up a whole new bunch of programs that go one day to day and year after year. Whereas you build a highway that's good for 40 years before you tear it up and lay it down again," Grassley said.

He said Iowa is worst in the country in bridge rating and that's the reason he voted for the \$1.2 trillion for infrastructure.

President Donald Trump had submitted a \$2 trillion infrastructure bill that didn't gain any traction in the legislation, but Grassley said during that process he heard from Iowans who said rural Iowa

Hinterland Dairy brings home State Fair ribbons

DONNELLSON - Hinterland Dairy recently was awarded both a first-place blue and a second-place red ribbon on two of the products they entered in the Iowa State Fairy Dairy Products Contest.

In the Cultured Dairy Products

category, Hinterland Dairy Quark was awarded first place, competing against other products such as cream cheese and yogurts. In the Cow Milk Cheese category, Hinterland's aged alpine cheddar cheese named The Brooks Place was awarded second place.

This is the first year Hinterland Dairy has entered products in the competition, as cheese production began in July 2019 on the farm and the Iowa State Fair was cancelled in 2020 due to

FORT MADISON - Nomination petitions and candidate affidavits are available at the Fort Madison City Clerk's Office, 811 Avenue E, Fort Madison. Offices open for the November 2, 2021 election are:

Mayor: 2-Year term 2nd Ward Council: 4-year term 4th Ward Council: 4-year Term At-Large Council: 4-year term

The earliest date to file a Nomination Petition and Candidate Affidavit wasAugust 23, 2021. The last day to file papers will be Thursday, September 16, 2021 in the City Clerk's office which will be open until 5 p.m. in order to accept petitions.

A candidate must be 18 years of age when his or her Nomination Petition is filed. Candidates must live within the City of Fort Madison. Persons signing the petition must live in the City of Fort Madison.

To be on the Ballot, candidates for 2nd and 4th Ward would need 10 signatures. Mayoral candidates would need 30 and At Large candidates would need 29 signatures. It is recommended that Candidates obtain more than the required number of signatures on their Petitions. This will guard against possible unacceptable signatures causing the Petitions to be invalid.

Auditor removes drop boxes

LEE COUNTY - Due to new legislation which puts impossible constraints on the use of drop boxes, Lee County Auditor Denise Fraise has made the decision to remove election drop boxes. Election law now states that ballots must be in the Auditor's Office by 8:00 p.m. on Election Day. If you are unable to walk your ballot into the Courthouse or Administration Building or have a family member bring your ballot in, call the Auditor's office at 319-526-8592 or 319-372-3705 and someone can come to your car.

You can also mail your ballot, postage paid, in the envelope provided. Make sure you mail your ballot immediately as it must be received by 8:00 p.m. on Election Day, in order for it to count.

Fraise said voters should not use any other dropbox that is on county properties.

DAVID B. **CASTRODALE**

The Reverend Doctor David B. Castrodale, age 88, passed peacefully into the arms of

his Savior on Wednesday, August 18, 2021. David was born in Burlington, IA to Elmer and Florence Castrodale, who predeceased



him, as well as brothers John, Paul and James. He is survived by his devoted wife Patricia, his sister Mary, brother-in-law William (Linda) Kortum, three daughters: Joy Hebner (Rick), Joan Denniston (Patrick) and Deborah Bastien (Dan), grandchildren: Rick and Tracy Hebner, Amber Chambers, Christopher Yaple, great-grandchildren: Bryan Barringer, Dekota and Caryssa Hebner, Jaide, Derek and Corbin Curtis, Rose Douglas, Aaliyah Pattynama, as well as many nieces, nephews, church family and special friends.

David was a graduate of Macalester College, Dubuque Seminary and received his Doctorate in Theology from San Francisco Theological Seminary. He gave his first sermon in 1950, was ordained in 1957 and continued what he considered his "great privilege to be a Presbyterian pastor" for the next 62 years. His pastorates included most recently serving at Alexandria Presbyterian Church (MO), in addition to those in Missouri, Michigan, Illinois and Iowa, whose congregations included 200 to 2,000 members, the shepherding of four successful major building programs, significant increases in per capita giving and endowment funds, as well as implementing a TV ministry.

David was Moderator of Presbytery three times, Moderator of Synod, served on the Broadcast and Film Commission, the Evangelism Committee, judicial commissions, served as counselor for the Major Mission Fund, fundraiser of the North Central Wee Kirk Conference and on the Board of the North Central Conference.

He received many special honors, most recently being recognized as Pastor Emeritus

by Missouri Union Presbytery, as well as the prestigious ESTARL International Award for Excellence in Ministry, two National preaching awards, a special commendation from Missouri Union Presbytery, and was the National radio preacher for one term, (not surprising given his life-long love of radio broadcasting and his Doctoral thesis/book, "Communicating the Gospel," an analysis of radio and television ministries.) One of his first accomplishments was beginning a Christian radio station in Sitka Alaska.


David felt that, "God has opened new doors of service," after his first cancer diagnosis and throat surgery, through keynotes and speaking engagements across the country for the International Association of Laryngectomees, and by becoming an instructor in alaryngeal speech, training and counselling numerous surgeons and other laryngecto-

Holy Trinity girls start season looking up at SEISC

SEI Superconference loaded with three top 10 teams in the state; Crusaders start year at No. 9 Classs 1A

FORT MADISON - Holy Trinity's roster only seems to be dotted with inexperience.



So many of the names that played a big role in the Crusaders' 26win season last year are back, even if they haven't been around the program that long.

"We're a little young

this year," coach Melissa Freesmeier said. "But we're not, really. If you look at their ages, they're young. But a lot of those kids had action on the varsity court last year."

That, Freesmeier said, has made a big difference in the preseason, as the Crusaders look to start a new state tournament streak after their 10year run was snapped last year in the regional semifinals by eventual Class

1A state champion Notre Dame.

'They've done a great job of being focused when they walk in the door," Freesmeier said. They have goals, they have expectations.

They've done their part. They've waited a long time (to get back).

"(Last year's finish) was disappointing, I know, for the kids. It stung a lot. I know it was frustrating, but that's the way the ball bounces sometimes. Those are the cards you're dealt. I think it's a good lesson learned. We had an opportunity to not to have lost that match (to Notre Dame). But I think it will drive them to do better this year."

Senior Kassi Randolph is the leading returning hitter with 210 kills, but she also led the team with 380 assists last season. She and her vounger sister, Natalie, will handle the setting duties this season, while also working as hitters in the Crusaders' offense.

"My 'Randolph Squared' setting kids are doing a great job of learning our offense," Freesmeier said. "And of course they're great hitters."

Freesmeier said Kassi Randolph has matured through her career.

"I think she has been a leader, on and off the court, the way she pres-



ents herself," she said. "She was a very good hitter last year, and she's always been a great setter. But her game has elevated this year.

"Sophomore Mary Kate Bendlage is coming off a 99-kill season.

"MK has grown a lot over the summer, over the club season," Freesmeier said. "As a sophomore, she is

a leader on the court. She's always fired up, she's always supporting her teammates. And she can get that big kill, make the other side wonder, 'Where did that come from?"

Junior Kayla Box was a key reserve as a middle hitter last season. Box had 19 kills and 11 blocks.

"Kayla is big in the middle," Freesmeier said. "She's great at blocking at the net. I'm looking forward to watching her grow, because she's gotten really strong this year."

Sophomore Reagan Holvoet joins Box as a middle hitter. Outside hitter Brooke Mueller, who had 162 kills,

is out until early September with a broken thumb.

"She's got so many shots," Freesmeier said of Mueller. "She sees the court so well. She's just smart."

Senior Anna Sobczak moves into the vacant libero spot.

"I think she's going to be very solid there," Freesmeier said. The Crusaders were No. 9 in Class 1A in the IGHSAU preseason poll. Three other SEI Superconference South Division teams are also in the rankings — Notre Dame is No. 1 and New London is No. 3 in Class 1A, while West Burlington is No. 8 in Class 3A.

"I think we have to play relaxed, just play our game," Freesmeier said on what the Crusaders need to do against the difficult schedule ahead.

"Don't put unneeded pressure on ourselves. These kids can play. Just trust what they've been taught."



Grassley says Jan. 6 inquiry not needed

needs improved transportation.

He said President Biden wants to couple the \$1 trillion and \$3.5 trillion so he can have popularity of getting new bridges and getting all the other infrastructure included, some with heavy disagreement, including \$65 billion across the country to expand high speed Internet access.

Fort Madison business and property owner Doug Abolt highlighted that disagreement with the bill in his comments to Grasslev.

Abolt said he's been regularly voting for Grassley but is upset with the senior senator from Iowa in supporting the infrastructure bill as well as his support for federal regulations around the COVID pandemic.

"We're angry. We're angry about the shape of our nation. We're angry with what you're doing to our grandchildren with all this money. We want you to cut spending. The infrastructure will take care of itself. We don't want anything to do with global warming until the rest of the world takes care of their stuff and that's a nice way to put it."

Abolt also said if the Internet is going to expand it should be on the back of private investment.

"If somebody wants to work on our Internet it should be private people working on private things. And that's what makes this country great. Not the government giving us stuff that's our money anyways," he said.


"We're tired of pandering to the left and what they're trying to do to destroy this country."

A member of the audience told Abolt he wasn't speaking for the whole room, to which Abolt said he wasn't trying to.

One question focused on why Grassley didn't vote for an investigation into the Jan. 6 raid on the U.S. Capitol.

"Because the Senate rules committee, a second committee – the homeland security committee was going to issue reports in





June so why duplicate it. They had all sorts of recommendations that I hope will be carried out," Grassley said.

He was pushed about how Republicans held commissions on Benghazi, "and everything under the sun" but seemed reluctant to do what they did on everything else in regards to the raid on the Capitol.

Other issues addressed were the difference in stance Grassley took when voting to approve Supreme Court justices quickly in the final months under President Trump, but dragges his feet in appointments under the Obama Administration, with one member of the audience saying Grassley was flip-flopping.

Grassley said things are "done differently" when the party controlling the Senate is the same party in the White House as opposed to different parties.

Several comments focused on the 2020 election and the theories that machines and the Internet were used to change votes.

"After hearing everything today, I think the only way to get credibility in elections is to go back to paper ballots," he said to applause.

On immigration, Grassley said he visited the border three months ago. he said a border patrol told him they were asked to brief the the president's team before he was sworn in.

"They said just leave things as they are or you're going to have a crisis. The first day he stopped building the fence and invited people into the country so we have an open border basically," Grassley said.

He said the Supreme Court took action yesterday to allow border patrols to keep immigrants outside the country on the Mexican side of the river and process them in an orderly manner for refugee status.

"That's the Supreme Court stepping in saying what he did when he took office on Jan. 20, he didn't have authority to do that"


