Tripp named next ISP warden

CHANGES: Department of Corrections announces three warden position changes

FORT MADISON - Current Iowa State Penitentiary deputy warden Chris Tripp has been named the new warden at the Fort Madison facility.

The announcement was part of a larger release from the board of the state Department of Corrections naming two other wardens with the department.

The Iowa Board of Corrections voted Friday to also name Shawn Howard as the Warden of the Newton Correctional Facility (NCF) and Marcy Stroud as the Warden of the Mount Pleasant Correctional Facility (MPCF).

Tripp has served as the Deputy Warden of the ISP since 2017, and has been serving as the interim Warden since April

of this year. He started his career in Iowa Corrections at the ISP in 1990. Over the course of his career, he has held multiple positions including Correctional Officer, Correctional Supervisor, Food Service Coordinator, and Food Services Director.

Howard, who will serve as Warden of the NCF, is the current Deputy Warden of the Clarinda Correctional Facility (CCF), where he has served in this position since August of 2019. Howard has had over 29 years of experience in the field of corrections. He has held such positions as Juvenile Court School Liaison Officer and Probation and Parole Officer in the 5th Judicial District Department of Correctional Ser-

Derecho **scarecrow** does its job

Part of our garden this year is doing spectacularly, part of it isn't. The peaches-and-cream sweetcorn, Indian corn, "punkins" and tomatoes are doing great, with the tomatoes looking to be the best we've ever had. The bush beans, peas, and cucumbers are not doing so well, with the peas practically non-existent.

This is the polar opposite of last year when we had so many beans we were overwhelmed, and the tomatoes and corn were struggling. I've never had any success with peas in our garden so their lack of production doesn't surprise me. But how can the green beans be so great one year and not the next; and the corn and tomatoes do so well when they were an embarrassment last year? It's a mystery to me. It may be working, and it may also be keeping the deer away from our little Garden of Eden. I also think it brings luck.

One day when I was mowing, a lady stopped on the road and was mouthing some words. I shut the mower down and took off my noise suppressors. She hollered, "I like your scarecrow!" I tried to explain that it was Derecho, after the big wind, but I don't think she understood. Which was okay, I just appreciate someone liking my artwork, even if they think it's a scarecrow.

one of the first things I did was run out and see how the garden fared during our ten-day absence. We had cousins visit us from Arizona. One night we were sitting around our little camp fire in the back yard, enjoying the evening, watching the Martins and Sparrows vie for living quarters. I heard the whistle of a Bob White quail off in the distance. I imitated the two-note trill, which is quite easy. It answered back. We kept this up for a while. Pretty soon Mr. Bob White appeared in the driveway, and then skedaddled once it saw our camp fire.

Then another Bob White sounded in the distance. I called it in also. Ginnie, the city girl, was flabbergasted, having never seen game birds acting in such a manner. I explained that the quail were probably males and thought my Bob White imitation was another male in their territory and they were going to run it off

There will be no running us off the Empty Nest Farm. We are blessed and here to stay.



Reynolds asks for \$222M in city aid

DES MOINES – Governor Kim Reynolds has requested \$222 million in pandemic relief from the American Rescue Package of 2021 (ARPA) that will allow 930 city governments to access federal funding starting today. The Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund will provide \$19.53 billion nationally to support tens of thousands of non-entitlement units of local government (NEUs), which are local governments typically serving a population under 50,000.

\$111 million in Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Funds will be available this fiscal year and an additional \$111 million will be in the next fiscal year. Cities have 30 days to submit paperwork to the Iowa Department of Management to receive these federal funds. Cities will also have complete jurisdiction over how this money is spent following compliance with federal guidance and parameters.
