#### County may get anhydrous pipeline

6-inch pipe would loop from fertilizer plant around FM



LEE COUNTY - A Texas company is looking to build a 14-mile pipeline in Lee County to allow the Iowa Fertilizer Co. access to a larger anhydrous ammonia network.

Lee County Supervisors were informed last week of a public information meeting that is set to take place at Small Grand Things, in West Point on Tuesday Oct. 5, at 6 p.m.

The pipeline would be built in a corridor north of the Hwy. 61 bypass and would run west through the county and then south from about Chalk Ridge Road west of Fort Madison to the BNSF railroad tracks near the Mississippi River.

Lee County Engineer Ben Hull said the pipeline would be a 6-inch pipeline that would loop around Fort Madison coming out of the fertilizer plant. According to information provided to



the board, the pipeline will have a maximum allowable operating pressure of 1,480 pounds per square inch.

He said he's had conversations with NuStar Pipeline Operat-

#### City, school district revamp SRO agreement

FORT MADISON - An agreement between the city and Fort Madison School District was amended Tuesday night to redefine the roll of the district's School Resource Officer.

The city and the school district en-

tered into a 3-year agreement in 2019 to provide a full-time experienced officer on school property during all student contact days. That agreement provided an equal sharing of wages and benefits between the city and the school district.

According to a letter from Police Chief Mark Rohloff and City Manager David Varley to the Fort Madison City Council, up until now staffing shortages have resulted in the department not being "able to adequately fulfill this role".

Rohloff said the mayor tasked him with finding additional resources from the district to help support the position.

"Once that funding benchmark was

#### Quick Visit Center planned for city's west side

FORT MADISON - A rezoning request was approved for a Quick Visit Urgent Care facility in Fort Madison at Tuesday's abbreviated City Council meeting.

The rezoning request, which was already approved by the city's planning and zoning board, would change the zoning designation for 1501 39th Street, which is just north east of The Madison. That facility will also be undergoing an expansion that could start as early as this month.

The zoning change will also change the adjoining alley between 38th and 39th Street and 1729 39th Street from R4 Sin-

was subdued. We were all just barely stepping out into the world with restrictions firmly in place. We were eager to get back to our lives, but hesitant for the other shoe to drop. So when the show was over, the usual cast party was postponed.

It may not sound like that big a deal for a few people to sit around and chat and laugh over a slice of pizza or a crockpot of chili, but strangely, it is. We tease each other one last time about stepping onstage wearing only one false eyelash or a Wisconsin accent taking a sudden detour south of Atlanta at the end of Act Two. We relax and wonder what we were so nervous about on opening night.

After "Leaving Iowa" was such a success even by pre-Covid standards, our board of directors made plans to get back into the swing of things for the fall. But we weren't sure we could do it. We had a cast of 17 for the May show, and a great audience turnout. But was it a fluke? We were the only local live theater open at the time. Did we just get lucky?

We contemplated how to get more people involved. Which quickly begs the question, why does anybody join a small town community theater anyway? It's certainly not preparation for a career in show business. We're not starry-eyed dreamers who imagine some talent scout is going to pluck us out of obscurity and into fame and fortune. Every community theater I've volunteered for or was a regular patron of from California to Florida has been the same. Real people with real jobs who spend some of their free time away from their families to entertain perfect strangers.

It's an odd phenomenon. What

prompts that nice, helpful woman behind the cosmetics counter to don a tie-dyed t-shirt and transform into a hippie at a roadside fruit stand? For what reason does a metallurgical engineer practice for weeks just to seem perfectly convincing as a wife murderer? Why would an electrician who moonlights as a musician consent to memorize hundreds of lines – most of which are just half a conversation with a six foot tall, invisible white rabbit? Why would a sane person do that?

And especially after the Covid lockdowns, a lot of people's priorities changed. Those of us at Old Fort Players know we aren't saving lives or saving souls or even saving stray dogs from a life on the street. We're just trying to save our sanity with a rather unusual hobby. Instead of playing bingo or euchre, fishing or cruising on a motorcycle, our idea of stress-relieving fun is to step into the footlights and risk forgetting our lines, missing a cue and tripping over furniture. Why?

Why is there a massive walleye mounted on our family room wall? So that every now and then when my father was still alive he could look up and say, "I did that." And that's not something just anybody can say.

So why do theatre people do whatever it is we do? Because when we take our cue and remember our lines, someone laughs. Another gasps. And when the curtain closes, people applaud.

It's magic.

And we can say, "I did that."

And then there is a second, more enigmatic breed of theater people. They are those who seem to find joy behind the curtains the rest of us keep stepping in front of.

Why does a city employee who gets called in at the last minute to drive a snow plow so we can get to work in the morning, drag himself into the theatre after his shift to build a set for a show he's not even in? And the mom who's driven her child to every rehearsal, why does she volunteer to sell concessions for all six performances, when she'd much rather just sit and enjoy the show? And the person who pays the bills, tracks down grant money, checks the voicemail, vacuums, scrubs the toilets, rallies the volunteers, sends thank you notes to our donors and pretty much everything you knew somebody must do? Who is she?

And what about the third kind of theater people? They don't work behind the curtain, they've never looked behind the curtain. But the curtain wouldn't need to be there if they weren't. They are the loyal faces we look for in the audience. They've never felt the need to get applause for themselves, only to give it. They come to every show. They buy popcorn and raffle tickets and laugh in all the right places. They smile and say 'Great job' and shake your hand on the way out of the theater. Why? Because for a couple of hours they got to watch their dog groomer and their grandson's school teacher dress up as nuns who run an illegal winery to raise money for orphans. And not just anybody can say that either.

These are all the people we want to thank. Please join us in expressing your gratitude for all our theater people no matter on which side of the curtain you might find them. See you at the theater on September 26th. We plan to cut the ribbon at 6pm.

# Medical clinic could be open in FM by February

gle Family to B4 Highway Business District. The rezoning is for the third parcel south of Avenue L. The first two parcels are already zoned B4 and the Quick Care medical facility will be constructed on all three parcels.

Mark White, a partner in the development and construction firm working with Quick Visit centers said he's hoping to get construction started on the facility yet this year.

"As long as I can secure subcontractors we're gonna try and start it as soon as possible. I think we have to go through a final reading at City Council in October. We would love to have it open by the end of the year, but honestly if we can get the outside construction done by winter then we could be open by January or February," White said

The company is an offshoot from a brand called Fast Pace Urgent Care out of Tennessee. White said the family that started that company created the new Quick Visit markets in Iowa and Texas.

The company already has locations in Mt. Pleasant and Newton. They are close to opening a site in Grinnell and are working with Osceola officials for a location in that city as well.

White said the company usually targets communities with a population base of 10,000, but said Iowa is a bit different because the county population demographics are a lot less dense so they are looking at populations up to 15,000 in Iowa.

The facilities accept all major insurance, Medicare and Medicaid, as well as having what White calls a "very cost effective model for self-pay individuals.


The footprint of the building is a 3,000 square feet with five exam rooms, a procedure room and an x-ray room. White said two of the rooms have an exterior access and negative air pressure to accommodate COVID situations.

The staffing will be locally hired, but White said due to the presence in Mt. Pleasant there may be staff sharing with the Fort Madison facility.

Nurse practitioners will staff the facilities with physician oversight of cases.

"They will do some primary care, but I can't speak to the whole operations," White said. "The people behind this are a group of investors and doctors that have already done this. We built them all over Kentucky, Tennessee and Mississippi and they've identified these new markets."

Fort Madison jumped out to 12-3 lead in the first set on three straight errors at the net by the Trojans behind senior Anna Lynk's 4-8 hitting.

Fairfield would only get within six points of the Hounds in the first set at 23-17, but two back-to back points by Lynk at 23-18 would give Fort Madison just their fourth set win in 17 sets played to date.

The Hounds lost the momentum early in the second set getting down by four at 6-2. They battled back to within 1 at 8-7 when Trojan sophomore Maya Lane's attack went wide. Fairfield would regroup and stretch the lead to eight at 22-14.

Fort Madison then cut it back to three on a four-point run with Eve Ruble serving, all on Fairfield return errors. Another Lynk kill cut the lead to 20-23, but a kill and an error would allow the Trojans to tie things up a 1 set apiece

The third set was a highlighted by 10 ties and five lead changes, but the Hounds would get hung up out of an 18-18 tie, and Fairfield would take the next seven points with Hannah Bergren serving. Bergren would record an ace in the run, and the Hounds would rack up four errors to surrender

"I think it was just a little bit of we came out with so much energy. They were so ready to play," Knustrom said.

"We had a great crowd and a great student section and great support from the community. They were hyped up, now the challenge is maintaining that into games two and three."

Fort Madison got down early again in the fourth set by as much as four at 8-4, but battled back to tie things up at 10

Knustrom said even from a week ago, she can see some of the drilling and practicing taking hold in the games.

"We have grown so much even just from our last match at Keokuk. I see them doing a lot of good things and I can tell the things we're working on in practice are improving," she

The Hounds were swept by the Chiefs on Aug. 31 in the conference opener at Keokuk.

"There are some minor details we have to work out like reading their hitters a little better and making some mid game adjustments. But as a whole I'm super proud of the way they played," Knustrom said.

"I feel like we gave up the third game and the fourth game we could have come back down 15-20. I thought they fought back and that's part of what were trying to build is that mindset that we're not going to give up."

Lynk finished the match going 18 of 23 hitting with eight kills and a block. Alaina Simpson was 12 of 17 hitting with eight kills. She also had 16 digs. Pirri had 21 digs to lead Fort Madison defensively. Molly Knipe had 17 and went 9 of 10 serving with one ace. Aija Jenkins was 8-of-10 serving with one ace.

The Hounds don't yet possess that big swinger at the net, but Knustrom was quick to add, the Hounds do other things well and they just have to learn where the spots are.

"We just talk about trying to be smart in what we do. In practice we talk about moving the ball around and using all the hitters as much as we can," she said.

"Our setter Molly has only been setting for about a month. And yeah, I'd like to get our middles more involved at some point. That will be huge, but for now we have to be smart. You don't have to hit it hard, just hit where they're not."

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

met, he was agreeable to allowing us to backfill that position at a net zero addition to the budget," Rohloff told the council.

The new agreement will have the dis-

trict helping cover officer support costs, and changes the cost-sharing to a pro-rata system based on actual hours worked.

"It looks like a good investment all around," Rohloff said. "It helps

us insure the position will be filled because obviously if we don't have boots on the ground at the school, so to speak, we don't get the funding. So that's our incentive."

He said the department plans on committing an officer already on staff to fill that position, and then he would backfill that position at either an entry level or lateral position.

"The city is also taking the position of offering incentives to new hires because we found we are paying money for schooling or offering cash for lateral positions," Rohloff said.

"The labor pool is very small and it is very competitive."

Mayor Matt Mohrfeld complimented Rohloff on negotiating the amended deal with the school district.

"You've opened up a channel of communication for an equitable financial agreement. Everything you were charged with you've done, and done a great job," Mohrfeld said.

In an unrelated issue, Mohrfeld informed the council that he has been diagnosed with prostate cancer and will be undergoing a procedure in the next few weeks to have the prostate removed.

In other action, the council:

- approved the remainding of base material bids for the Riverview Marina Dredging project, a precursor to the new marina project in the amount of \$629,000.
- approved a \$23,000 change order to the GRHS-FMCH Community Health Foundation P.O.R.T trail project from the high school to Rodeo Park.

ing Partnership L.P. out of San Antonia, Texas about permitting. Hull said conversations such as that are normal in county operations, but said most of the time they don't come to fruition.

"I understand we were copied on a packet that was sent out to affected land owners, so it would seem to me that pending authorization from the Iowa Utility Board, this pipeline (company) may be going down the road to acquire easements for their pipeline," Hull said.

Hull said he also received a inquiry from NuStar as to who the county would be using as their inspector on the project.

The county hired Chippewa Resources when Dakota Access built their pipeline through Lee County to serve as the county's inspector during the construction process to make sure landowners were taken care of as the installation progressed and finalized.

"As you may recall from the Dakota Access pipeline that the board of supervisors has a responsibility to inspect the pipeline construction from the perspective of the private landowners. Not the construction of the pipeline itself but make sure that the ground is restored the way it should be," Hull said.

Hull said the county's secondary roads funds are not to be spent on private property, so he said it would make sense to hire a consultant that reports directly to the county if this project moves forward as well.

"My believe is this is a relatively certain project," Hull said.

Supervisor Ron Fedler said he spoke with Hull before the meeting and said he was satisfied with Chippewa's performance and would recommend the county do something like that again to protect landowners.

The county's cost for hiring resources was reimbursed to them by firms associated with the pipeline construction.

"They have to get right of ways from landowners and they usually are compensated for that. They still own the property, the pipeline would just have access to it," Fedler said

The county also got an agreement exhibit outlining compensation for crop loss and other property damages.

A representative of the Iowa Utilities Board will be at the public information meeting. Following the meeting representatives with JCG Land Services, Inc. will begin contacting county land owners of property where easements would need to be secured.

From 30 days to two years after the Oct. 5 meeting, NuStar may file a petition for a pipeline permit with the IUB for permission to build the pipeline, and if necessary, will request the right of eminent domain, or condemnation.
