## HOUNDS PREVIEW River Kings next big test for No. 7 Bloodhounds

Hounds catch a Clinton squad playing their best football in several years

FORT MADISON – Fort Madison Head Coach Derek Doherty has been around Bloodhound football since he was about five years old. He never envisioned a time where he thought Fort Madison would be playing Clinton in district play. But the River Kings come to town Friday for the Hounds homecoming and despite their 1-4 record Clinton has, like all other teams Fort Madison has run into lately, shown steady improvement.

## SEX OFFENDERS Compliance check yields charges

One arrest made and deputies searching for another offender who cut off GPS monitor

LEE COUNTY – A regular compliance check of individuals registered as sex offenders in Lee County has resulted in deputies looking for an offender who has allegedly cut off his GPS monitor.

According to a release from the sheriff's office on Thursday, 69 checks were made in Lee County resulting in one arrest, and charges pending against two who were found to be out of compliance with registration status.

A fourth individual is being sought for cutting off the GPS monitor on Wednesday, while authorities were looking for him to conduct the compliance check.

"Regular compliance checks are done in Lee County to assure that the public is aware these individuals do reside in our county, but are being monitored by this department very rigorously," Weber wrote.

"Since being elected Sheriff, these checks have been completed near Halloween as children could possibly knock on these doors unknowingly. We take the monitoring and apprehension of these individuals very seriously.

"One such individual is wanted for cutting his GPS off just yesterday while he was being sought for his compliance check. Any information that lends to his arrest and conviction could result in a reward from Lee County Crimestoppers. The checks were conducted on Wednesday with the assistance of the Keokuk Police Department, Fort Madison Police Department, West Point/Donnellson Police Department, Montrose Police Department, and the Iowa State Division of Criminal Investigation.





hooked up with seven different receivers on the year, four of whom have scored touchdowns and two, Zach Connell and Addison Binnie have more than 300 yard a piece. Connell's averaging 31 yards a catch.

"Defensively, we've got to limit their big plays. We feel like we've got another great game plan, but can we execute it. That will be the question. It will be another big test and we've studied and we're ready."

Jensen, a big QB at 6'3" and about 200 lbs., also leads Clinton in rushing with 204 yards and a couple scores. Tavian Bailey is next at 130 yards on the year.

The Hounds have been celebrating Homecoming Week and despite the distractions of the week, Doherty said his squad understands the priorities that are in place.
