FMCSD shuffles principals

EVERYBODY'S SHUFFLIN': District makes moves to prepare for 2023 new facilities

BY CHUCK VANDENBERG PCC EDITOR

FORT MADISON – Fort Madison schools will look a little different in the fall from an administrative perspective.

Fort Madison Community School District Superintendent Dr. Erin Slater said Wednesday that plans are set to move all principals within the district, with the exception of Fort Madison High School Principal Greg Smith, into different roles to start the 2021-22 school year.

The moves are a precursor to the 2023 relocation of all district education to the Fort Madison Middle School



campus on Bluff Road, and the Fort Madison High School.

The district voted earlier this year to move PreK to 6th grade to the campus on Bluff Road, while 7th through 12th grade will be housed at the Fort Madison High School campus.

"In order to foster the best collaboration

for staff, students, and community to transition into these upgraded centers, we want to ensure that each administrator has experience with each grade level and families that

DECLARATION Gov. issues disaster order for VB, Davis counties

Proclamation opens up state assistance to those recovering from severe weather incidents

DES MOINES – Gov. Kim Reynolds issued a disaster proclamation today for Davis and Van Buren counties in response to severe weather beginning June 24 and continuing.

The governor's proclamation allows state resources to be utilized to respond to and recover from the effects of this severe weather and activates the Iowa Individual Assistance Grant Program for qualifying residents, along with the Disaster Case Management Program, for Davis and Van Buren counties.

The Iowa Individual Assistance Grant Program provides grants of up to \$5,000 for households with incomes up to 200 percent of the federal poverty level for a family of three. Grants are available for home or car repairs, replacement of clothing or food, and temporary housing expenses. Original receipts are required for those seeking reimbursement for actual expenses related to storm recovery. The grant application and instructions are available on the Iowa Department of Human Services website at https://dhs.iowa. gov/disaster-assistance-programs. Potential applicants have 45 days from the date of the proclamation to submit a claim.

Residents of counties impacted by the recent severe weather are asked to report damage to help local and state officials better understand the damage sustained. Damage to property, roads, utilities and other storm-related information may be reported. This information will be collected by the Iowa Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management and shared with local emergency management agencies. Damage may be reported at <u>www.homelandsecurity.iowa.gov</u>.

FM girls take two from Keokuk at home No 4. Lady Falcons

FORT MADISON – It took just nine innings, but the Fort Madison girls took two games off Keokuk Wednesday night 9-3 and 7-4.

The first game was a two-inning completion of a suspended game on June 7 when the Lady Hounds led 5-1 going into the fifth before the rain ended things in Keokuk.

The Hounds were supposed to play another doubleheader Wednesday with Keokuk, but those two were canceled and the makeup completion of the first game and the entire second game were played instead at Fort Madison.

Neeley Rehm got the win in the first game finishing up the final two innings allowing two runs, but Fort Madison tacked on two each in the bottom of the fifth and sixth to give the sophomore some breathing room.

Freshmen Lexi Whaley and Lauren Helmick led the Hounds in the win each slamming home runs. Whaley was 3-of-3 with a run scored and an RBI. Helmick went 2-for-2 with two runs scored and 2 RBI.

Emily Steffensmeier, Rehm, Logan Johnson and Kendall Beebe each had hits for Fort Madison (9-14, 5-7).

Rehm went all seven innings giving up three runs all earned on five hits and struck out eight.

In the nightcap, the two teams traded leads with Fort Madison jumping out to a 1-0 lead when Emily Steffensmeier tripled to right field and came around to score on a wild pitch.

Keokuk would put up two in the top of the third on a couple of fielding errors by the Hounds.

Fort Madison would retake the lead in the bottom when Elle Ruble and Rehm would execute steals at home. Keokuk would score two runs in the top of the fourth off Helmick, but that would be all the freshman would give up as Fort Madison put up a run in the fifth and then put the game away with three more in the bottom of the sixth for a 7-4 lead.

Steffensmeier would get a one-out single in the final frame followed by a walk to Allyson Helmick. Rehm would go down swinging on three pitches for the second out. Both base runners would advance on a wild pitch and then Logan Johnson would single scoring Steffensmeier. Whaley then ripped a double off the fence in right center to score two.

Erika Kruse then laced what looked like a true gapper to left, but Keokuk's Issabelle Evans broke on the liner and

will be functioning as a collaborative group in 2023," Slater wrote in an email to Pen City Current.

"We are a district focused on instructional leadership and collaboration."

She said that Christina Schelich, who has been the associate principal at Fort Madison Middle School will move to Lincoln Elementary as Principal. Former Fort Madison Middle School Principal Todd Dirth will move over to Richardson Elementary as the principal.

Tracy King will be the co-principal at the middle school for grades 4-6. She was the former principal at Lincoln. Patrick Lamb will be the co-principal at Fort Madison Middle School for grades 7 and 8, moving over from his associate principal spot at Fort Madison High School.

Adrian McKay, the former principal at Richardson Elementary will now be the co-principal at Fort Madison High School overseeing 9th and 10th grades, while Greg Smith will stay at the high school as co-principal overseeing 11th and 12 grades.

"Each of our administrators have leadership styles that match the role of instructional leader for the FMCSD. These shifts will allow for all of our buildings and teams to grow and learn together as we continue to do what's best for kids as we transition to our upgraded facilities."

Slater said facility preparation and planning has begun with teacher input groups working with the architect and construction management team.

"Community input will take place in early fall of 2021 regarding design," Slater wrote.

The Fort Madison school board voted in May to contract with DLR Group out of Des Moines for architectural services on the \$25 million Phase 1 of the facilities upgrade at a cost of \$1.56 million. The board also voted to award Carl A. Nelson Co. the contract for construction management for the project at \$666,000.
