More details released in Wednesday ice rescue

WHY ON SLOUGH: Officials think man may have been gotten disoriented in mishap

FORT MADISON – More details were released this morning following a daring rescue of a man who had been partially submerged in a slough in southwest Fort Madison.

According to a press release issued this morning, the man, who has not been identified at this point, had been in the water for approximately an hour before he was able to make verbal contact with someone on the shore, and had been yelling for help. Fire Chief Joey Herren said the man may have been experiencing some mental issues and got disoriented in the dark. Fort Madison Police Chief Mark Rohloff concurred saying family may have been concerned about his where-

abouts.

The vehicle was approximately 600 feet from any viable rescue location, in the middle of the slough, and firefighters had to use GPS location to find the safest place to launch a rescue operation.

After traveling down a railroad access road south of 33rd Street about a mile, firefighters Justin Cain and Alex Meierotto donned water gear and began walking with a sled and a rope secured at the shore, toward the vehicle. About 100 feet from the vehicle, the ice broke, but Cain continued toward the vehicle in the water, while Meierotto staged at the point of the break. Cain found one person conscious in the back seat of the truck and was able to get a harness around him and extract him. While transferring the man to the ice sled, the victim slipped under the water and Cain entered the water to pull him back up onto the sled. Meierotto moved through the water to assist at that point and the two were able to get the man on the sled and pushed him to safety, while firefighters on shore pulled from their side.

ILLINOIS NEWS Pontoosuc man arrested for firing gun in DC street

DALLAS CITY – Hancock County Sheriff, Scott Bentzinger, reports the arrest of Shawn L. DeHaven, age 49 of Pontoosuc, Illinois, for Unlawful Possession of a Firearm by a Felon and Aggravated Discharge of a Firearm.

On Monday at about 12:30 a.m., a call was received at the Hancock County Sheriff's Office reporting a man with a gun in the middle of the street near the Circle K in Dallas City. Law enforcement arrived on scene and observed the man, Shawn DeHaven, allegedly holding the handgun and firing it while standing in the street. DeHaven and a female, Tammy Gittings, then entered Gittings residence.

A short time later, DeHaven and Gittings exited the residence and DeHaven was taken into custody without incident.

A search warrant was executed at the Gittings residence and the firearm was recovered. DeHaven is lodged in the Hancock County Jail awaiting his first appearance in court.

According to Bentzinger, DeHaven was just been released from jail on Monday, after pleading guilty to Aggravated Fleeing or Attempting to Elude a Police Officer and after posting bond on an Iowa warrant.

DeHaven had been in jail on charges of fleeing or attempting to elude a police officer, possession of methamphetamine and driving while license revoked since September 13. DeHaven currently has outstanding Iowa warrants.

PAA guidelines that information may not be made available at this time. He was taken to the Fort Madison Community Hospital by way of Lee County EMS. Fort Madison Police, Lee County Sheriff's deputies also assisted with the rescue.

State jobless rate back on the rise

DES MOINES - The number of initial unemployment claims in Iowa, filed between Sunday, Jan. 31, and Saturday, Feb. 6, was 6,173, an increase of 395 from last week's adjusted numbers. There were 5,594 initial claims by individuals who work and live in Iowa, and 579 claims by individuals who work in Iowa and live in another state. The number of continuing weekly unemployment claims was 48,701, an increase of 2,898 from the previous week. November through February are typically the months IWD sees the most unemployment claims, driven by increased claims in construction, agriculture, landscaping and manufacturing due to seasonal layoffs. For the week ending Feb. 6, 2021, nearly 67.5% of claimants indicated their claims were not COVID-19 related, which is an increase from 63.5% the previous week.

The U.S. Department of Labor adjusted last week's initial claim number to 5,778 (a decrease of 160) and continuing claims to 45,803 (a decrease of 905 for a total decrease of 1,065 overall). Iowa Workforce Development relies upon the weekly data released by the U.S. Department of Labor to report its numbers and as such, adopts the revisions to the previously published data.

Holy Trinity stayed within striking distance of No. 9 Winfield-Mount Union all night before the Lady Wolves took a 53-42 win in a 1A regional first-round game.

Winfield-Mount Union (17-0) will play Calamus-Wheatland on Tuesday night in the quarterfinals.

Holy Trinity finished with a 5-17 record, but the building blocks to the Crusaders' future played key roles in the final game.

Freshman Natalie Randolph led the Crusaders with 13 points. Sophomore Brooke Mueller had 12. Freshman Mary Kate Bendlage had eight points.

Four of the five players who started this game will be back next season. The Crusaders lose seniors Bailey Hellweg, Maria Rauenbuehler and Ali Robu.

"I'm so excited about the future," Johnson said. "I love the seniors this year, I hate to always see seniors go. But you look out on the floor and you've got two or three sophomores out there, and three freshmen."

The Crusaders never let the Lady Wolves get away. They trailed 10-7 at the end of the first quarter and 26-21 at halftime, the last points coming when Hellweg's desperation 3-pointer as the clock was winding down was ruled good because of goaltending when a W-MU player pulled on the net. Winfield-Mount Union had a 15-4 run to start the third quarter, but the Crusaders closed the quarter with an 8-2 run.

"The effort was there on both ends of the court," Johnson said. "We just missed a few rebounds here and there, and that was the difference in the game, in my opinion.

"We were in the game the whole night. But, offensively, it was a struggle all year. We would have spurts where the offense ran great, and there were spurts when we couldn't get out of our own way.

It wasn't for a lack of effort."

Farrah Nelson led Winfield-Mount Union with 14 points. Kyndal Townsley had 12.

The Crusaders won back-to-back games twice this season, but also had losing streaks of eight and seven games.

"There were some games where we took it, some games where we were right in there with some pretty good teams," Johnson said. "But we've just got to find a balance. We've got to play the same for a whole game. We would just go on scoring droughts. We'll go 3-4 minutes without getting a basket. We'll play great defense, hold them to one shot, and then can't do anything on the other end."

The key will be if the Crusaders can work during the summer, something they couldn't do last summer because of COVID-19 restrictions.

"I told the girls, if we put some work in this summer, we'll be way better," Johnson said. "We'll take a huge leap.

"The young ones really came a long way this year. The underclassmen, we've got something. We'll get there."
