COLD SNAP: Former mayor Randolph offers building in town to house animals

FORT MADISON - Former Fort Madison mayor and Burlington businessman Brad Randolph is a man becoming a dog's best friend.

Randolph worked with the PAW Animal Shelter over the weekend to get more than 20 dogs moved into a former convenience store he owns in Fort Madison.

With temperatures hovering near 0 over the weekend and into Monday, PAW Director Sandy Brown started working with Randolph Saturday to see if the space could be used to keep the animals warm.

"We have 18 indoor/outdoor runs for the dogs at the shelter now," Brown said. "The rest are outdoor kennels and we have about 62 just outside kennels right now. So I'd been messaging back and forth and he offered to open that up for us."

Brown said Randolph even told her to turn the heat up. She said the only dogs currently outside at PAW were Huskies and they are outside enjoying the weather which they are acclimated to. Those animals she said have dog houses and fresh straw and "are lovin' life" right now.

VACCINES

State urging counties to get to 80% dose usage

LEE COUNTY - With Iowa lagging behind 46 other states in getting people vaccinated, a Lee County health official said the state is urging better performance.

During Monday's regular Lee County

Board of Supervisors meeting, Lee County Health Department administrator Michele Ross said state officials are telling counties to get 80% of their doses utilized if they want to continue current rates of allocations.

"Anyone that receives vaccines in the county will have to get 80% into someone's arms or our allocations may have to go to another county," Ross said.

"If the weather cooperates I don't see that as a problem, but with this weather it could present a few problems and I think the state will recognize that."

AMBULANCE SERVICE

EMS panel may add quality control

LEE COUNTY – The advisory group ushering in the county's new ambulance service is still considering a subcommittee to oversee patient care issues.

Jim Steffen, an EMS instructor at Southeastern Community College who chairs the Lee County EMS advisory board, said he doesn't believe a subcommittee to review patient care is necessary.

Steffen said current review panels required by the state and area hospitals are sufficient to handle any issues that arise out of patient care, and all issues ultimately land in the lap of the EMS Medical Director, currently Dr. David Wenger-Keller.

Fort Madison Fire Chief Joey Herren and Keokuk Fire Chief Gabe Rose have expressed concerns that current review protocols aren't sufficient, and have allowed past issues to slip through the cracks.

Herren said Monday that he would be willing to serve on the committee.

"Since we are starting a new service, both committees would be a positive," Herren said. "That way we do address the issues we've talked about. And I'm willing to serve on either one of them to make sure we address those."

Rose was more pointed.

"I'm fine with that. If they want disband the committee I'm fine with that, too," Rose said.

At the previous meeting of the advisory board last week, board member Dr. Phillip Caropreso, of Keokuk, said he disagreed with the idea that current quality review protocols were sufficient.

Steffen said he wanted to make sure Caropreso's concerns were fully addressed.

"If there is validity to having that subcommittee of this board, it would have to include the two hospitals and reps from the two fire departments," Steffen said.

"But I don't see the validity of the group at all if we can't get someone from the hospital on the board, and I don't see

LCHD to focus on Tier 1 group during cold snap

LCHD - Continued from Page 1

During the last two drive-thru clinics held Tuesday and Thursday, specifically for county residents 65 and over, the county distributed more than 500 doses.

Health officials continue to do second round dosing for those in Phase 1A who have received their first inoculation.

Ross said because of the severe drop in temperatures, the health department is planning to move

clinics indoors, but they won't be able to do as many vaccinations.

"This week due to temperatures predicted we won't be focusing on older adults because we don't want them out for safety reasons. So we'll be looking at Tier 1 priority groups and then get back to those folks next week hopefully," Ross said.

State officials have asked counties to split the doses as evenly as possible be-

tween the tiers in Phase 1b and the general population 65 and older.

Ross said over the next few weeks the county will be focusing on the 65 and older, teachers and education staff, and first respond-

"Once that is saturated, we'll move to Tier 2 while continuing with those 65 and older."

The county also has set up arrangements with six county pharmacies, and

area hospitals and clinics to begin vaccinations of those 65 and older as allocations increase. She said the hospitals are already doing some vaccinations.

'The state is also working with Hy-Vees across Iowa to get them vaccines.," Ross

"Those would be separate from our doses, so hopefully they will get vaccines as well to help with the 65 and over population."

Lee County residents 65 and older who haven't yet contacted the county about getting their vaccine should do so by calling 319-376-1077. LCHD is scheduling vaccinations off the list of calls received in the order they are received.

In other action at Tuesday's meeting, supervisors:

• approved setting a Feb. 22, 2021 public hearing to enter into a loan agreement to borrow \$3.2 million in general obligation bonds to combine existing jail and conservation debt with the current radio equipment financing to potentially save about \$100,000 over the life of the combined debt.

- approved a 2nd reading of an ordinance creating a nine-member Pioneer **Cemetery Commission** to give oversight to the county's pioneer cemeteries. Those are county cemeteries, according to Iowa law, that have not had more than 12 burials in the past 50 years. For passage, the ordinance requires one more approved reading.
- heard discussion on a possible services agreement with Des Moines County for snow removal services if workers are hit hard by the coronavirus and staffing is limited.
- tabled a discussion and possible offer to purchase property, equipment, and one ambulance from Lee County EMS due to negotiations not being complete.

KEOKUK - Lee County Health Department will be holding a Children's Immunization Clinic Thursday February 11, 2021 at **Trinity United Methodist** Church, 2330 Plank Road in Keokuk from 1:00 pm until 4:30pm. Please park on the south side of the building (the large parking lot) and enter in the door that states HANDI-CAPPED.

The clinic is open to children who have no insurance, are insured by Iowa Medicaid (MCO) or those who have private health insurance that does not cover the cost of vaccines. Written parental consent is required for minors to receive vaccinations when in the care of another adult. (Please visit our website for a consent form.)

Free lead testing is available for all children ages 6 months to 6 years who reside in Iowa.

New facility will be better suited for cold

A new \$6 million expanded PAW shelter is in the works and is currently in a fundraising stage.

Brown said that facility will be able to accommodate all the dogs with more than 70 indoor/outdoor runs planned. She said cold snaps like this one are not only hard on everyone.

"Saturday night the windchill was 20 below. That's hard on the staff, and the dogs. There's not enough straw in the world to keep them warm on those types of nights."

Dogs are also being fostered and more than 30 are out in warm homes right now.

"When we did this three years ago we had 62 dogs go out to foster homes."

Brown said some dogs are being held at other shelters to make sure every dog has a place to be warm.

She said she put out a request on Facebook Sunday morning for help moving the animals to Randolph's building. "We got so many responses and people volunteering that we didn't even have work for some of them to do," Brown said.

The dogs were moved into the location starting at 10 a.m Sunday and two hours later the animals were safe and warm. Each dog is kenneled with a blanket or a tarp and staff will be their daily to walk, feed and clean up the kennels.

The new facility is still a ways away.

"Six million is a huge elephant and last year because of COVID most of our fundraisers, except for the golf tournament were cancelled," Brown said.

"We're taking small bites right now, but the community has been amazing. This community has always been so supportive of PAW."

Randolph also donated the building before Christmas for PAW's annual Christmas store fundraiser.



anyone from the hospital on this call."

Steffen went on to repeat he didn't think a patient care quality subcommittee was necessary.

"I'll be blunt. I don't think this group is necessary, but I want to give Dr. Caropreso's opinion full view."

Lee County EMS Director Dennis Cosby said he agreed with Steffen, but he had no problem setting up and chairing the subcommittee if the hospitals were on board.

Cosby said he would reach out to the hospitals to gauge interest in sitting on the subcommittee.

Cosby said the hospitals have quarterly reviews of EMS services with a heavy panel of reps from the ERs, trauma teams and nursing staff that review patient care. He said the EMS staff will also do daily peer reviews. Cosby said those typically catch billing errors, but they do serve as a daily review.

Cosby also will review daily call sheets and trauma care reports.

Rick Larkin, who, along with Garry Seyb, Jr., represent the Lee County Board of Supervisors on the advisory group, asked if creating the subcommittee would render the advisory board obsolete.

Steffen said there are too many other patient care data points such as response times, the public needs to be kept aware of.

The debate ended without a decision pending Cosby making contact with the hospitals. The board will meet again in March.

In an unrelated issue, Steffen questioned the hiring of Lee County Emergency Management Agency Coordinator Jason Dinwiddie as the Lee County EMS Director of Operations in a dual role.

Steffen said he has no issues with Dinwiddie doing double duty, but was concerned that Dinwiddie wasn't a paramedic.

Cosby said he had that concern originally as well, but after conversations with Dinwiddie, he is comfortable in the decision.

Steffen said he would encourage the new service to put Dinwiddie in paramedic school at some point.

"There's enough value there to justify the cost of sending him at some point," he
