WISEMAN OUT: Junior suffers heartbreaker after leading 7th-ranked at 138

DES MOINES – A heartbreaking first-round loss, and a first-ever win, highlighted Bloodhound action on the first day of the Iowa State Wrestling Tournament.

Fort Madison senior Owen Kruse notched his first win in Des Moines ever when he shut out Marion's Wes Logan 7-0 in first round consolation action. Kruse qualified for the state tournament last year but dropped his first two matches to two place winners.


In the opening round Kruse was in trouble quick with Waukee's Thurman Christensen (18-4). After some quick collar and hand fighting, Christensen was able to slip around Kruse and pull him down by the waist for a takedown 26 seconds in. Christensen would work that to a 3-point near fall.

With Kruse fighting to get out of the hold and even rolling a flip, Christensen just held on for the ride and rolled it back to another 3-point near fall. He would get yet another before the end of the first period for an 11-0 lead.

Five seconds into the second period, Christensen, ranked No. 8 in the state, would get another roll around

FMCH to open indoor walking path

FORT MADISON – Fort Madison Community Hospital (FMCH) is opening the indoor walking track to public use effective Monday, February 22, 2021. The indoor walking track was closed to protect community members in March of 2020 at the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The indoor walking track, located in the FMCH Outpatient Rehabilitation Center, will be open for public use Monday – Friday, 7:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m. The number of walkers will be limited and is by appointment only. Appointments can be made by calling 319-376-2198 Monday-Friday between the hours of 7 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

Appointments will be scheduled as received, and can be made on a weekly basis, starting on Friday for the following week. All walking times will be limited to 45 minutes with appointments made on an hourly basis.

As part of the re-opening of the indoor walking track, COVID-19 restrictions will apply. All walkers need to enter through the Outpatient Rehabilitation Services Center and be screened for COVID-19. Masks are required and social distancing will be enforced.

Walkers are discouraged from loitering in the facility either before or after their designated walking time and they must stay on the walking track. Walkers are also asked to avoid parking in patient parking spots next to the Rehab building.

"We feel it is very important to the health of our community to open the indoor walking track. It has been a cold, long winter already and we hope this will motivate our community members to be able to get out and move. If COVID-19 infections continue their downward trend in our area we can move towards opening up access to our facility even further. For now, we encourage everyone to practice the proven prevention measures of mask wearing, social distancing and good hand hygiene," expressed Angie Budnik, Community Relations Director.

The outdoor walking path around the pond at FMCH is also maintained for outdoor use.



Ice is safe for most Iowa lakes, ponds

DES MOINES - The following is the latest weekly fishing report from the Iowa Department of Natural Resources. Ice is in good shape at most southeast Iowa lakes and ponds, but caution and safety is always recommended.

Big Hollow Lake

Ice is in good shape. Black Crappie - Fair: Best bite is early morning and after about 4 pm when the sun starts to set. Bluegill - Fair: Try fishing closer to the bottom.

Lake Belva Deer

Little angler activity out on the lake; should change with the warmer forecast. Black Crappie - Fair: Evening bite is best; crappies will follow small fish up from the bottom as it gets dark. Bluegill - Fair: Morning bite is best, before 10 am.

Lake Darling

Recent below zero weather kept most anglers off the lake. Warm weather in the forecast should change that soon. Black Crappie – Slow: Bite gets better after 4 pm; try a couple feet off the bottom over the deeper brush piles and rock piles. Bluegill - Slow: Bite is more consistent than the crappie bite for more hours of the day. Try just off the bottom around the big cedar trees and rock piles.

Lost Grove Lake

Ice remains in good condition; may get a little sloppy by middle of next week. Black Crappie - Slow: Bite is in the late ice stage; best later in the afternoon into the night. Concentrate on the habitat in 12-14 feet of water or in 16-18 feet farther down the lake. Bluegill - Fair: Best bite is early morning or late afternoon; try down about 14-16 feet in the flooded timber. Be prepared to move to find a hot spot.

For more information on the above lakes, call the Lake Darling Fisheries Office at 319-694-2430.

Diamond Lake

Bluegill - Fair: Try in deeper brush; many fish are 6- to 8-inches. Black Crappie - Fair: Most fish are 7- to 9-inches; try in the dam and basin area.

Lake Macbride

Bluegill - Good: Try over rock piles or brush piles in 10-20 feet of water. Most fish are less than 7-inches. Black Crappie - Fair: Use jigs or minnows around brush, stumps or rock near deeper water. Walleye - Slow: Some walleye catches were reported over the last week. Try over rock near drop-offs or deeper water.

Pleasant Creek Lake

Bluegill - Fair: Try around brush in coves. Most fish are smaller, but some are up to 7- to 8-inches. Black Crappie - Slow: Catch crappie up to 12-inches with minnows fished in deeper brush and rock. Yellow Perch - Fair: Try in deeper water; keep moving until you find fish. Sorting is needed.

Kruse needs win Saturday morning to get spot on podium

Kruse's hips to pull him to the mat and would leverage a 2-point near fall for the 15-0 technical fall.

"He's a pretty good kid. He's solid. It sucks to lose no matter what, but he's a good kid so that's good for him," Kruse said about his opponent.

About 45 minutes later, Kruse was on the mat again, this time against Logan who is 30-12 on the year and came out of District 7.

The two battled scoreless with less than 15 seconds left in the first period. Kruse was close to a two-point takedown halfway through the period when he got Logan to the mat on the outer circle, but the hold was broken and ruled outside the circle.

Logan then drew a stalling warning before Kruse was able to work a takedown just at the end of the period for a 2-0 lead.

Kruse started on the bottom in the second period and took about 1:15 to shake loose of Logan's grasp for an escape. After getting free Kruse shot for Logan's legs and was able to work a takedown just 20 seconds later for a 5-point lead going into the final period.

Kruse then worked a reversal quickly on the restart for a 7-0 lead. There were hints of a cradle in the works, but Kruse couldn't lock it up and rode Logan out for the win.

He will now advance to the second round consolation. A win there would guarantee the senior a spot on the podium. The Hound will have to face either Taber Dominguez, a Lewis Central senior who's 38-13 on the year, or 6th-ranked Nick Walters (28-1), a senior out of Sioux City North.

Dominguez and Kruse are both unranked in the latest release from The Predicament.

"It feels great to get a win. Obviously I still have one more to go and that's a big one for sure," Kruse said. "It was good to get that win out of the way and I'm pretty happy about that."

The senior said the magnitude of the upcoming tests aren't lost on him.

You gotta make it count because if you don't the career's over," he said.

At 138 lbs, Fort Madison's Gavin Wiseman had a tough draw getting No. 7 Dylan Whitt (12-2) out

of Cedar Falls and then No. 4 Jackson Helmkamp (23-4) in consolation. Helmkamp lost to unranked Drake Carter in Sudden Victory in the first round of the day.

Wiseman escaped an early takedown from Whitt for a 2-1 lead at the end of one. The junior would get a takedown in the second period then had Whitt's arms pinned back and pushed the junior around the circle trying to get him to turn over.

Whitt would eventually give into the pressure but would get his knees back on the mat and escape a pin, giving Wiseman a 2-point near fall and a 3-2 lead

Wiseman would score an escape starting down for the 3rd and then shoot for a leg, but Whitt would come down on top and finagle a 2-point call at 1:10 that he would work into a pin 40 seconds later sending Wiseman to the consolation bracket.

There Helmkamp would score a quick takedown 16 seconds into the match. Wiseman wouldn't be able to find a way out and Helmkamp would get the pin with :22 left in the first period.

Wiseman finished the year 26-14 and just missed qualifying as a freshman and a sophomore.






SCC students help build Burlington home

WEST BURLINGTON - Southeastern Community College (SCC) and Southeast Iowa Regional Planning Commission (SEIRPC) partnered to construct a home in Burlington.

SCC construction students gained valuable experience by working on major components of the home: framing, roofing, insulating, siding, windows, sheetrock and other similar items. Sub contracts, fund management, and other development tasks were subcontracted out.

SCC Construction Technology instructor Doug Riley appreciates the opportunity students had to apply their learning.

"Students got a lot out of experience out of the project," he said. "Their contribution will live on for years as a family makes it their new home."

A family of three purchased the house earlier this year and are set to move in next month.

The house features 1,400 square feet, 3 bedrooms, 2 baths, 2 car garage, an open floor plan and a finish-ready basement.

The City of Burlington provided the land. It had demolished the previous dilapidated home, giving SEIRPC's development arm, Southeast Iowa Housing, Inc., the opportunity to purchase it. Housing, Inc. focuses on building homes in southeast Iowa in partnership with cities on demolition lots to add value and strengthen existing neighborhoods.

A number of local businesses and contractors provided materials and services for the project, including Standard of Beaverdale, Jerns Heating and Air, Pro Plumbing, Hay Brothers Construction, Bessine Electric, Burke Interiors, Stew's Lawn Care, Pearson Seamless Gutters, Southeast Iowa Garage Door and Chalupa Concrete.

The house was built with financing and a development grant from Great River Housing Trust Fund, which makes investments into affordable housing in southeast Iowa.
