Sewer rate hikes on agenda

30%: Rates to jump 10% for each of the next three years starting in July

FORT MADISON – Sewer rates in the city may be on the rise.

At Tuesday's Fort Madison City Council meeting an amendment to city sewer rates will be considered on a first reading that will increase rates 10% starting in July. The move increases basic service rates to \$28.61 per bill and the volume charge to \$6.61 per 1,000 gallons of water used.

The rates would apply to both monitored and non-monitored customers.

The council is proposing to increase rates additionally 10% the following July and 10% in July of 2024. A 3% increase would be instituted in July of 2025 taking the basic service charge from the current \$26.01 to \$35.66 over the four-year period.

The volume charge would increase from \$6.01 per 1,000 gallons to \$8.24 per 1,000 gallons.

It was a windy Saturday morning and, as we walked the hilly road through Chautauqua park, following the same path Nohema walked

Our lives are our own prizes

Life is the prize.

Sometimes we ask ourselves, unfortunate as it may seem, why we struggle through this ride, especially when we get punched in the stomach throughout life.

Little Lucy Saltzgaver of Fort Madison died in March from pulmonary hypertension. The same silent killer that took our 20-year-old daughter two years ago.

They asked Pen City Current to help publish a fundraiser trivia night on May 21st at the Eagle's Club in Fort Madison. I'm usually asleep less than 10 minutes after I finish up our e-edition every night so I don't really read through everything knowing the wife has things well in hand after I finish laying out the editorial stuff.

When she brought this to my attention, she couldn't do it without crying. It's tough to see in those moments where life is the prize.

But it is. God works in funny ways. But I don't believe God is to thank for being able to catch a football better than anyone else. He just created life and life took over from that point.

I don't believe God took my child from her mother and me because he needed a warrior for an angel. That's what he got for sure – but I believe he grieves her death and our loss as a circumstance of His creation.

I believe He grieves the loss of little Lucy. We do.

Most people don't know what PH is. But in a nutshell, blood doesn't flow efficiently between the heart and lungs causing the heart to stress and eventually fail. There are new medications and treatments and people are living 30 even 40 years with the disease, if there are no other mitigating factors like Down's Syndrome in Lucy's case, or Type 1 diabetes and congential asplenia, in Kelsey's case.

WAYLAND – With Fort Madison's sprinters at the Drake Relays Friday, the Bloodhounds went to the Ekstrand Relays on Thursday in WACO a bit shorthanded, but came away with second place.

Macayden Rhoer swept the individual hurdle events taking first in the 110 hurdles with a time of 16.24. He also won the 400 hurdles with a time of 1:00.61. Rhoer ran the first leg of the Hounds' shuttle hurdle relay that took 3rd with a 1:10.74.

Fort Madison's boys also got firsts from Adam Sobczak, Nik Fullenkamp, Caleb Bolander, and Mikey DiPrima in the 4×200 relay with a 1:37.36. Each of the first place finishes earned 10 points for Fort Madison. Caden Barnes took first in the shot put with a hurl of 48-1.75. Dayton Lamar took 1st in the high jump with a 5-10.

Fort Madison's 4×200 relay team of Adam Sobczak, Nik Fullenkamp, Caleb Bolander, and Mikey DiPrima raced to a first-place finish with a 1:37.36.

Central Lee's Tommy Eschman took first place in the long jump with a leap of 20-6. Eschman finished 2nd in the 110 hurdles and the 100 meter dash.

The Bloodhounds finished with 112 points, good enough for second overall to Fairfield's 166 points. Central Lee finished sixth overall in the A Division.

Fort Madison got second place finishes from John Cottrell in the 1600 meter run and the Distance Medley featuring Brody Cashman, Dayton Lamar, Dane Butler, and Cottrell. DiPrima was second in the long jump at 10-6.

In the girls run, Aija Jenkins was part of three- first place

finishes for the Lady Hounds. She jumped 4-10 for the high jump title, opened the FM Shuttle hurdle relay along with Raquel Schneider, Chloe Sokolik, and Hailey Kemper, who won with a 1:13.86. Fort Madison's Lexi Whaley won the shot put at 33-11.

The girls race team results were not readily available.

In Des Moines on Saturday the 4×100 relay team of Tate Settles, Julian Dear, Hayden Segoviano, and Tate Johnson finished 33rd out of 96 teams with a 44.09. Johnson ran a 10.16 on the final split, the 8th fastest time of the day.

Discuss options for Concessions at the Swimming Pool for the 2022 pool season

Council discussed options for providing concessions during the 2022 swimming pool season. Staff presented two

options for the 2022 pool season, which included contracting with a food truck or using a vending service. Council agreed that they wanted to provide a hot food option and asked City Administrator Mandsager to draw up a contract to work with a mobile food truck to provide concession services during the 2022 pool season.

At the last meeting, a representative from COBO International, located along Division Street, asked Council to consider postponing the final reading of the Ordinance until they could budget for the expansion of their parking lot. City Administrator Mandsager had not heard back from COBO regarding the time frame for their proposed expansion. Council agreed that they wanted to work with local businesses and agreed to table the final reading until the May 4, 2022 meeting.

son, Lees, and Young Consider the first reading of an Ordinance amending City Code Section 90.11 to include the installation of tracer wire on newly constructed or reconstructed water service lines Public Works Director Mike Brissey explained to Council that having tracer wire on water and sewer lines will make it easier to locate services in the future and is a requirement of the International Building Code. Council considered the first reading of an Ordi-

nance amending Section 90.11 of the City Code to include paragraph 90.11 (3) which reads as follows: "3. All newly constructed or reconstructed water service lines and mains shall have a tracer wire installed to locate the line. The tracer wire shall be a minimum size of 10 gauge, insulated, single-conductor copper wire, and run parallel with the pipe from the curb box to the meter setting. The tracer wire shall have a termination point above ground in an access box next to the curb box with a minimum of 2 feet of slack wire. The tracer wire access box is manufactured explicitly for this purpose and shall be purchased from the city."

Moved by Young, seconded by Johnson, to approve the first reading of an Ordinance amending City Code Section 90.11 to include the installation of tracer wire on newly constructed or reconstructed water service lines. Motion carried by the following votes:

All newly constructed and reconstructed sewer lateral pipes and mains shall have a tracer wire installed for the purpose of locating the line. The tracer wire must be a minimum of 10 gauge, insulated, single-conductor copper wire and installed adjacent to and over the full piping length. The tracer wire must have an above-ground access box purchased from the city and placed at the cleanout, between the building drain and the sewer main. The Public Works Director or authorized city representative shall

determine the tracer wire termination."

- 1. Open valves at the curb or meter that have been turned off by the Public Works Director or authorized City personnel;
- Break, pick or damage cutoff locks;
- By-pass water meter(s) in any way;
- 4. Use unmetered water from hydrants by anyone other than authorized City personnel;
- 5. Use sprinkler system water service for any purpose other than fire protection;
- 6. Remove, disable, or adjust water meters and water meter registers;
- 7. Connect to or intentionally damage water lines, valves, or other appurtenances to steal or damage utility equipment;
- 8. Move the meter or extend service without the permission of the Public Works Director;
- 9. Intentionally deface, destruct, or vandalize utility property or intentionally block or obstruct the use of utility equipment.

Any person or entity performing any of the

foregoing actions shall pay the City's costs of investigation, attorney's fees, repairs for any resulting damage and/or replacing any removed item(s) and be responsible for other liabilities resulting or arising from such tampering and/or theft. Any person or entity found responsible for the declared actions shall be in violation of the Code of Ordinances to which the standard penalties under Section 1.14 of the Code shall apply, and a citation may therefore be issued. In any case, where it cannot be determined who was being supplied, the property owner may be held responsible for the tampering or theft of

almost daily, we couldn't help but think of the educator we did not know. Love and peace to you, too, Nohema.

Henbit is back—perhaps in honor of Nohema also. Its pink or lavender color is beginning to dot the no-till farm land throughout Iowa and the Midwest. Henbit is an invasive weed that springs up quite rapidly this time of year and is a major source of irritation to farmers, not to mention it's a nutrient-and-moisture robber. Henbit is quite pretty and can be confused with a cover crop. A non-native plant, it gets its name because it was originally brought to the United States for chicken fodder. Now it has a stranglehold on spring planting. Artists like to paint and photograph fields of henbit, farmers like to eradicate it. On the plus side, the entire henbit plant, from stem to flower, is edible, and can be used in

I took it home, but we had henbit on our evening salad. It's rather chewy and has a somewhat earthy taste with a slight minty smell. It's okay. No worse than parsley. One man's weed is another man's garden salad.

For all of you out there battling weight control, here's my best tip of the day. After struggling for years to reach what I consider to be my optimal desired weight of 180 lbs, and reaching it, now the fight becomes one of maintaining it, i.e., not going under or over 180 lbs, which can be tricky. I'm an aerobic exercise fanatic (or nut). Ginnie and I have our own dedicated exercise room, with two treadmills and one elliptical machine, that we use daily. I have discovered, after buckets of sweat, that 150 calories burned on the elliptical machine equates to one pound of weight loss. I always weigh myself before and after exercising. Monitored customers would see the same percentage increases in volume charges from \$1.91 per 1,000 gallons currently to \$2.10 in July, \$2.31 in July of 2023, \$2.54 in July of 2024 and \$2.62 in July of 2025. Monitored customers are billed for a minimum of 30,000 gallons of water per month.

Past due fees will be subject to a 10% late fee.

The ordinance to amend the rates is being presented to the council on a first reading. Ordinances typically require three readings, but the third reading can be suspended if approved by the council.

Also on the agenda is the sale of 2833 Avenue J to 2x4s for Hope for \$1. The organization is planning to build a set of mini homes in the area for at-risk veterans.

The council will also be voting on a cost-share agreement with the Iowa Department of Natural Resources to develop a fueling station and launching docks at the Fort Madison Marina, currently under construction.

The cost-share grant award from the DNR is not to exceed \$52,468 as a reimbursement and represents 75% of the actual cost of the improvements at the marina.

The council also has a resolution to consider that sets fees for the vacant building registration ordinance that's on its third and final reading for approval.

The fees would set a minimum \$10 annual fee for registering vacant buildings with the city. The fee is \$10 for buildings starting at 576 square feet. The fee increases incrementally after that for single family residences larger than 1,000 square feet at \$25 to

\$250/year for 20+ family residential units.

There are also fees for commercial/mixed use buildings of \$25 for up to 2,000 square feet, to \$250 for 20,000+ square feet. The rates on residential and commercial buildings double in the third year of the program and double again in the fourth year. Penalties for failure to register vacant properties with the city range from \$100/month to \$1,000 per month for large commercial buildings over 20,000 square feet.

The council amended the ordinance on the last reading two weeks ago to exempt property owners that show utilities active and insurance equal to the cost of demolition. The owners are exempted from the annual fees associated with the ordinance, but are not exempt from registering the property.
