# Next 61 phase OK'd at \$8M

**HR GREEN:** Engineer takes another shot for bids being higher than estimate

FORT MADISON – Despite bids that came in at least 26% over engineering estimates, the city is moving forward with the next phase of Hwy. 61 rehabilitation from 10th to 18th Streets.

At Tuesday's Fort Madison City Council meeting, the council voted 6-0 to accept a bid from Jones Contracting of West Point, the firm that has anchored the project to this point, for just under \$8 million to reconstruct Hwy. 61 in the next segment.

Bids were opened on the project on Feb. 15 with Jones having the lowest bid. A second bid from Hawkeye Contracting came in at \$9.3 million.

Mayor Matt Mohrfeld and City Councilman Tom Schulz pushed against the inconsistency of HR Green's estimates.

HR Green has been in Mohrfeld's sights for the past three years. In 2019, HR Green missed on a project that was set to restore curbs and sidewalks in four blocks of

# Property owner threatens suit over rental fines

FORT MADISON - A resident with six local rental houses and two other properties listed within the city said Tuesday he's considering legal action against the city for a non-compliance issue on one of his properties.

Darrell Davolt, told the council at Tuesday's regular meeting that the city is ignoring him and refusing to put him on the agenda over a non-compliance fine on his property at 2102 Avenue B.

FORT MADISON – City Councilman Donna Amandus wants a new flag to represent the city's new focus on growth.

Amandus unveiled the contest Tuesday night at Fort Madison's regular City Council meeting. To spur interest, Amandus said the winning flag will receive a

A committee was formed that includes City Councilman Kevin Rink, LCEDG Administrative Assistant Carmen Salazar, the Pen City Current, and the Daily Democrat.

The new flags would need to have a design that works both horizontally and vertically so they can be flown or hung on the new poles that are lining the new Hwy. 61 work through Fort Madison.

The city's current slogan is Always Moving, but Amandus said people are taking liberties with it on social media and adding words to the hashtag that are detrimental to the city's forward motion.

"This new design should capture what makes our city unique as a community and will serve as an illustration, or trademark if you will, of what our city represents," Amandus said.

She said people who live or go to school within the city of Fort Madison will be able to submit their individual designs. A contest form will go up on the city website at <a href="https://www.fortmadison-ia.com/">https://www.fortmadison-ia.com/</a> in the next few days and will be shared with the school systems.

# Task Force nabs three area residents

KEOKUK - The Lee County Narcotics Task Force reports the arrest of a man and woman on Felony and misdemeanor charges.

David Londrie, 59, of Keokuk, Iowa and April Settles, 40 of Carthage, Illinois were both arrested in the 400 block of California Ave. in Keokuk, Iowa on Feb. 26, 2022.

Londrie was arrested for Conspiracy Possession with Intent to Deliver more than 5 grams of methamphetamine 2nd or Subsequent Offense within 1,000 feet of a public park a Class B Felony; Possession of a Controlled substance 2nd offense an Aggravated Misdemeanor and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia a Simple Misdemeanor.

Settles was arrested on several warrants and in addition; Possession with Intent to deliver more than 5g of methamphetamine within 1,000 feet of a public park a Class B Felony; Drug Tax Stamp Violation a Class D Felony; Possession of a Controlled Substance-marijuana a Serious Misdemeanor, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia a Simple Misdemeanor, Interference with Official Acts and Providing False Identification.

The arrest of both Londrie and Settles stems from the Keokuk Police Department responding to a report of a suspicious vehicle. As contact was made they discovered a large quantity of drugs in both Londrie and Settles possession and contacted the Lee County Narcotics Task Force to assist with furthering the investigation.





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

City Hall at 811 Avenue E.

The entries will be logged anonymously and then all the admissions will be judged by the five-person committee and be cut down to the top five submissions. Those five submissions will then be listed in a poll at <a href="https://www.pencitycurrent.com">www.pencitycurrent.com</a> and <a href="https://www.dailydem.com">www.dailydem.com</a> for a public vote. The top three vote getters will then be forwarded to the City Council to select the winner on May 17.

Amandus said the committee is looking for businesses, organizations, and individuals to help sponsor the contest and they are looking for donations for that.

"We're excited to see what our local talent has to offer with their submissions and we thank the city staff for helping get the program up and running."

She said the new slogan should also reflect the city's new efforts at growth.

"That will coincide with this. We are rebranding our city, and we think that a slogan should match what our forward-looking motion is," Amandus said.

# Lee County K9 donates \$1,000 to city program

downtown Fort Madison on Avenue G. HR Green estimated \$1.5 million for the work, and the one bid that came in was \$3.4 million.

Mohrfeld also took HR Green to task over poor performance of the PORT Trail along Avenue B, saying the design was poorly assembled.

Most recently, the city took HR Green to task for asking to move a part-time inspector that was to be used on multiple projects, to a full-time inspector for the upcoming 10th to 18th Streets' project. One of the other projects that was supposed to happen simultaneously was pulled by the city, but the city was reluctant to allow HR Green to move the inspector to full time on the Hwy. 61 project because the agreement with the engineer indicated inspections could be done part-time.

The move added \$105,000 to the project.

Project Manager Thomas Jantscher said the costs were based on estimates from the 6th to 10th Streets' work and were put together in October.

"When we put this estimate together, we based it mostly on the 6th to 10th Streets' projects and compared the bid costs," Jantscher said. "What we're hearing is that material costs are just very high right now, and it's also a reflection of the the way things have been over the past year."

City Public Works Director Mark Bousselot, said 10th to 18th is going to cost \$995,000 per block. The phase the city just completed from 6th to 10th was \$857,000 per block and 2nd to 6th Street was \$700,000 per block.

Bousselot said if the city were to reject the bid, he would want to see something substantially changed to justify rebidding the project.

"I don't know what we could do to this project," he said. "And I'm afraid if we wait two to three months, the cost is going to go back up again."

Schulz said he is unhappy with the lack of accuracy of the bonds based on information that is front of them.

"Maybe somebody should have said somewhere, 'Hey, we put this number together last October. This isn't last October."

Councilman Andrews asked Schulz, who runs an HVAC company in Fort Madison, when he called a vendor on a new furnace, how long that cost is good for. Schulz said until he picks it up.

Schulz said he wasn't saying the cost was out of line, but that the city is basing decisions on bad engineering estimates.

In other action, the council:

- heard from Lee County K9 Association who donated \$1,000 to the city's new K9 program that will be in place in about three weeks.
- appointed Carmen Salazar to the city's Planning and Zoning Commission.
- approved an ordinance permitting Tiny Houses to be built within the city under certain conditions. The move paves the way for 2x4s for Hope to begin construction in the spring. The homes are aimed at veterans.

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
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

# Governor signs historic tax bill setting flat rate at 3.9%

DES MOINES -- Today Gov. Kim Reynolds signed the state's most historic tax reform bill into law at LBS, an Employee Stock Ownership Plan business, where she first touted the plan just a month ago.

The bipartisan bill, which passed in both the House and Senate last week, lowers the individual income tax rate for all Iowans to a flat and fair 3.9% rate by 2026, eliminates income tax on all retirement income starting in 2023, and overhauls Iowa's corporate tax system.

"When I took office, Iowa had the sixth highest individual income tax rate in the nation at 8.98%. I believed Iowans deserved better," said Gov. Reynolds. "Since then, I've worked with the Legislature across multiple sessions to make transformative changes to our tax code, let Iowans keep more of their hardearned money, and make our state more competitive. With this bill, Iowa is now

the fourth lowest for individual income tax rate in the nation. There's never been a better time in Iowa for bold, sustainable tax reform. This bill rewards work, takes care of our farmers, and supports our retirees, all while protecting key state priorities. Iowans will reinvest these dollars in our economy, communities will prosper, and families will rest a little easier. Once again, we're putting our faith in Iowans, and they won't let us down."

Beginning in Tax Year 2023, the tax liability for nearly 295,000 Iowa taxpayers will be eliminated under the retirement provision of this new tax law and 98% of Iowa taxpayers with \$10,000 or more of taxable income will see a decrease in tax liability by Tax Year 2026.

For farmers, age 55 or older who have farmed at least 10 years and are retired, this bill allows an option to eliminate the tax on cash rent or crop share agreements for all years the income is earned.



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# Mayor says city ordinance is backed by city attorney

Davolt said the rental ordinance is illegal.

"It's illegal. You didn't read it into the minutes. My lawyer is an officer of the court. Do you think he's going to lie to me," Davolt said.

"My next step is, if we don't get this resolved, my lawyer's gonna come on board and we'll sue you for court costs and attorney fees."

Davolt approached the council last month as well about the issue and said he asked to be placed on the agenda, but that hasn't taken place. "This is not going away. I'm not going away. You're gonna have to put me on the

agenda, you're gonna have to address the situation."

Mohrfeld said he's obtained a legal opinion from Patrick O'Connell with citations on the legality of the city's action.

"I can only take our professional's opinion for that," Mohrfeld said.

"And you have the next step if you like."

Davolt said he wanted to see the city attorney's opinion on the ordinance. City Councilman Kevin Rink asked Davolt to provide his attorney's opinion to the city as
