FM Food Pantry sees uptick

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED: The numbers of clients has almost doubled since January

FORT MADISON – A perfect storm of sorts has the Fort Madison Food Pantry busier than they've been in a long time.

According to board member Lyn Cramer, the food pantry customer flow is up close to 100% since the beginning of the year.

"In January, the numbers we were seeing on average was about 20 clients per day. This month so far we have seen an average of 37, so we've almost doubled. As the month goes on, I believe we'll see that grown even greater," Cramer said.

In May she said the pantry was seeing about 31 a day.

Cramer, the former director of the pantry, said the community has been very generous with donations and funding, but she said the greatest need right now is numbers.

"The community has been so good with funding and donations, we're pretty good on that, but we sure could

use some volunteers."

She said shifts are usually two to three hours at the pantry, or even spending an hour or so a week to help pick up food to deliver to the pantry. Also help is needed unloading trucks because of the increased demand.

"We could use a little muscle," she

Cramer said those interested could

call out to the pantry and they can coordinate volunteer hours from there. The number is 319-372-8071.

She said Iowa Food Bank has been very helpful as numbers climb, but certain things like venison are becoming more and more difficult to get because even the Food Bank is having trouble.

ARPA group recommends county give **\$275K to IT**

County hoping for deed to Meller property to move forward with LCHD project

FORT MADISON - The panel convened to allocate funds from the county's more than \$6.5 million in federal America Rescue Plan Act funding is recommending the county spend \$275,000 on county Information Technology upgrades.

The panel, which to date has authorized just over 30% of the county's allocation to a broadband expansion project in the county, made the recommendation after hearing from a county

IT tech team that the county is operating with outdated tech.

"To me, this is a high priority," said panel chairman Garry Seyb, Jr. "We're operating with some computers that are more than 20 years old. We've had three IT directors in the past three or four years and we're seriously outdated."

Budget Director Cindy Renstrom said there was some money in the IT department budget, but some of that is being used for salaries for the two full-time and one part-time staff. County IT director Kevin Harter said the department needed about \$275,000 to bring the department closer to contemporary status.

The panel had been holding on to the remaining funding, about \$4.3 million, as Lee County Grant Writer Chuck Vandenberg and county officials look for funding

WEST BURLINGTON: Victim airlifted to UIHC with wound to the face

Police searching for suspect in Tuesday shooting

WEST BURLINGTON - On June 14, 2022, at approximately 4:44 p.m., the West Burlington Police Department received reports of shots being fired at the West Burlington Municipal Pool, located at 602 West Burlington Avenue. Upon arrival, law officers found Devontae Richardson, 28, bleeding from a single gunshot wound to the face. Richardson was transported to the Southeast Iowa Regional Medical Center. Eventually, Richardson was airlifted to the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics where he currently remains in stable condition. No other injuries were reported related to the shoot-

Witnesses observed a vehicle flee the scene, which has been located by law enforcement and subsequently seized. Interviews continue to be conducted by the West Burlington Police Department, Des Moines County Sheriff's Office and agents from the Iowa Division of Criminal Investigation.

Law enforcement believes this is an isolated incident and that there is no threat to the general public.

West Burlington city officials released a statement on the incident Wednesday evening.

"The West Burlington swimming pool staff acted quickly and were able to direct all guests inside the facility to safety. No injuries were reported from guests inside the pool or from our staff," the release indicated.

City officials said the pool will reopen on Friday, June 17 at 11:30 with increased police patrol around the pool area. The city also provided contact information for counselors to help with any young individuals who may have witnessed the event



Lady Hawks win fourth straight in big fashion

SOFTBALL: Central Lee girls have outscored last four teams 48-3

DONNELLSON – The Central Lee girls' softball team is showing a little muscle of late.

The Lady Hawks took out Holy Trinity Catholic 13-1 in four innings Tuesday night in Donnellson to move to 11-4 on the year and 6-1 in the SEI Superconference South just a half game behind West Burlington, currently ranked No. 4 in Class 3A.

But the Hawks have been flexing some offense and solid defense in the past four games.

Central Lee has outscored their opponents 48-3 over the past four games and, in that time span, have seen Kenna Sandoval, fresh out of eighth grade, hit .615 with seven RBIs.

Sandoval is playing 1st base for the first time this year and Head Coach Tiffany Woodruff said Sandoval is filling her role on the team.

"She has a great role. She's always played third base through travel ball and I just liked her at first base because she has the build for it," Woodruff said. "This is her first year there and she's comfortable and the kids are confident in her scoops and all that."

Senior Meghan Hopp has also been on fire, hitting .500 with four RBIs. Hopp got the win Tuesday night going four innings and holding the Crusaders to six hits and one earned run while fanning three and walking one.

Mary Hellige suffered the loss for Holy Trinity. HTC coach Loren Menke said the Crusaders have to play better defense against teams that put the ball in play. The Crusaders only had one error, but several hard-hit balls got past defenders in the infield and the outfield.

"Central Lee has a heck of a hitting team. But if

they hit at us, we gotta make the plays and we haven't been making the plays very well. Last night we didn't make plays very well, either," Menke said.

The Crusaders lost a rare doubleheader to Cardinal Monday night, 11-1 and 16-0.

The Hawks opened the scoring early with four runs each in the bottom of the first and second innings.

Alix Congdon led off with a triple right field past Kylie Fortune and was driven in by Hopp's ground out to short. Sandoval then singled and was brought in when Shanna Buford laced one about 250 feet onto the gravel driveway behind the fence in left center for a 3-0 lead.

Marie Young singled in the next at bat and came around to score on Bella Steffensmeier's double to left. The Crusaders would get the next two hitters to retire the side.

Kayla Box would single for HTC with one out but would get stranded at 2nd after a ground out and a strikeout. Congdon and Hopp would get things





Central Lee posted four more runs in the bottom of the 4th to invoke the 12-run rule



County receives second \$3.25 million tranch of ARPA funding

to build a new county health building and EMS Ambulance bay.

Seyb, along with State Sen. Jeff Reichman, Lee County Economic Development Director Dennis Fraise, and Vandenberg went to Des Moines to talk to Iowa Gov. Kim Reynolds' staff about possible funding streams to get the health department built.

Vandenberg said finding grants for building construction has proved difficult with little state ARPA funds being allocated for vertical infrastructure.

The Governor did just release a non-profit Innovation Fund that has \$20 million allocated to state non-profit groups for construction. The application process for that fund begins June 27, but governments aren't allowed to apply for funding assistance.

The Lee County Health Department has a non-profit arm called Friends of Lee County Health Department, but Vandenberg said he's looking into the possibility of that funding stream, but awards from that fund will be very competitive.

"They're offering grants of up to \$3 million. Not all of them will be that much, but it will be very competitive."

The county is waiting on a deed for property being donated from the Glen Meller family where the Iowan Motel used to sit. Meller has already demolished the structure and is waiting for a party interested in the iron from the building to haul it away. There's also some foundation rock on the property that is yet to be removed.


Vandenberg said the deed is being reviewed by Meller's attorney to prepare it for transfer to the county. He said he hopes the county has the deed before the end of the month.

Vandenberg also said he has received requests for payments on county grant awards for KPLAY in Keokuk and SIREPA for the broadband project. KPLAY has already been awarded \$15,000 and SIREPA is looking for a first payment on that project of \$704,000.

"That's kind of unusual because we used to get a lot of that from the food bank and we don't have that anymore. But that should change as the season progresses."

Fruit and produce usually come from local grocery stores, but that isn't as plentiful as it has been because the groceries are having trouble, she said. But everyone is helping where they can.

She said inventories on site are still fairly strong, so anyone needing help with food insecurity should come out to the pantry at 3421 Avenue L.

As inflation continues to rise forcing prices up, Cramer said she thinks clients using the pantry will continue to increase and now it's becoming an issue of needing people to help with the increased demand.

At the beginning of June, the Food Pantry added some hours and is now staying open until 5 p.m. on Wednesdays.

"The maiden adventure of our extended hours happened last week and was met with great enthusiasm," she said.

"Each client walking through the Pantry's doors related how happy they were with the new hours and how, without that extension, they would not have been able to be there. They greatly needed help and now the Pantry was there for

The Pantry board had been wanting to extend hours, but the pandemic hit, putting any expansion of hours on hold.

The Pantry's new hours are Mondays and Fridays, 9 a.m. to noon and 1 p.m to 3 p.m.; Wednesdays, 9 a.m. to noon and 1 to 5 p.m. As before, the only thing clients need to bring is a photo ID and proof of address.
