FIRES: FMFD tackles second structure fire in city in under 24 hours

FORT MADISON – Fort Madison firefighters have had a busy stretch as a second home was heavily damaged by fire Thursday morning.

Firefighters were called to 3431 Avenue O shortly after 9 a.m. for a fire that had broken out near a furnace in a crawl space of the home.

The building was an unoccupied rental unit owned by James and Connie Brown who live next door to the west.

Fire Chief Joey Herren said the origin of the fire was a furnace in the crawl space, which caused smoke to get throughout most of the structure.

"We had smoke leaking out of every orifice of that house," Herren said "That makes you worry about what's going on."

Lee County.

Bowker was elected to the City Council in 2019 and said she wants to continue to serve the people of Fort Madison, and Lee County, at the state level.

Bowker, a Democrat, said she had been approached by the Lee County Democrats earlier to run for the seat, but had some personal things to get buttoned down before making the decision.

"I'm proud to announce my campaign for House District 100," Bowker said.

"In 1995, I made the move to Fort Madison as a single mom with my two year old son in tow. Those first years were a challenge as I tried to provide the best home I could without any support system. However, as my son grew, life became a little easier. I made contacts, volunteered in the community, and found a routine to life that made earlier hardships distant memories. Now I want to serve that community in the State House and fight for working parents like me."

She said the politics of the GOP on the national, state, and local levels just don't work for Iowans.

"When we scaled back the rights of

Firefighters had the blaze under control quickly, however, and were on the scene until about 12:30 p.m. Lee County EMS Ambulance and Fort Madison Police were on the scene to assist. Herren put out an all-shift call for the fire.

He put the damage at about \$40,000 and said he didn't know if the structure would be considered a total loss.

"The fire burnt the floor joists and some rafters in the roof, but sometimes it's just a toss up as to whether they can fix them or not," he said.

According to Lee County Treasurer records, the home is valued at \$62,000.

It is the second home in two days that's been severely damaged. Firefighters worked on a structure fire in the 1600 block of Avenue L on Wednesday afternoon. That home was considered a total loss and was uninsured.





Adversity rears head in fourth quarter of win over Trojans

Everybody's gunnin' for you."

It was the Miles Dear and Dayton Davis show for most of the night. The two combined for all of Fort Madison's points in the first half with the exception of a Reiburn Turnbull bucket that capped a 15-3 run toward the end of the first half. Dear and Davis combined for 27 first-half points with Dear scoring 10 in the first quarter and Davis heating up in the second with 11.

The Hounds jumped out to a 12-8 first quarter lead on Dear's 3-ball with 4:04 left in the first quarter. Fairfield would come back to tie the game at 14 on a Max Wheaton put-back in the paint. A 3-ball from Turnbull at the buzzer popped up off the back of the iron and didn't fall.

J.J. Lane scored to open the second for the Trojans and, after Matt Hopper's 3-pointer from the right baseline came up short, Lane answered with a three from the top of the key to give Fairfield a 5-point lead.

Dear and Davis keyed a momentum swing and carried Fort Madison to an 11-0 run through the second for a 25-19 lead. Tate Allen stopped the shift with a 3-pointer to cut the lead to three before Davis and Turnbull scored back-to-back to make it a 7-point game before Lane converted a couple freethrows and Hunter Cecchini scored on a floater in the lane to make it 29-26 game at the half.

Dear opened the third with five straight points and then Fort Madison would miss its next six shots from the field. Fortunately for the Hounds, a couple turnovers and 2-of-7 shooting from Fairfield kept the lead at about five.

Davis shot a chilly 55% from the freethrow line. Fairfield picked up on the trend and went into a special Hack-A-Dayton scheme and sent the senior to the freethrow line 14 times in the final 10 minutes where he went 4-of-11 giving Fairfield several chances to get back in the game.

The ploy worked and the Trojans cut the lead to just one at 41-40 when Sam Wheaton scored, got fouled in the paint, and converted the 3-point play.

A pivotal exchange for the Bloodhounds came when Turnbull spun around Wheaton on a Davis errant freethrow and gobbled up the rebound for a putback to give Fort Madison a 3-point lead.

Tate Johnson would get a steal in the Trojans' next possession, race to the Hounds' end, and miss a layup, but Turnbull again scraped off the shot and scored to put Fort Madison up by five.

Fairfield would cut the lead to just one three times in the final 2:45 seconds. Lane pulled up from three and got bumped by Davis on the errant shot. Lane would convert two of the three freebies to leave Fort Madison up by one at 53-52 with :46 left.

Dear would take the throw in after a Fairfield time out and slice into the lane for a scoop shot drawing a foul off Ryan Higgins. Dear would complete the three-point play for a 56-52 lead.

Tate Allen would score at the other end after a Fairfield timeout with :14 left. Dear would be quickly fouled on the inbound with :15 seconds to play. He missed the first end of the one-and-one but converted the bonus for a 57-54 lead.

Fairfield called another time out to set the halfcourt and got two decent looks at a 3 to tie, but Lane's final shot at the buzzer came up short of the rim.

Wilson said Davis and Dear were the leaders the team needed again, but Turnbull's timely buckets were also a key to preserving the win.

"This is what leaders do. They step up and make some plays and knock down some free-throws. We could've knocked down a few more to make things a little easier," Wilson said.

"These guys have worked their butts off all the way back to fourth grade in these kinds of environments and these kinds of situations. Miles just stepped up at the end and made some freethrows and got the game for us."

Davis said the idea of losing the perfect season was in his head.

"I felt like it was possible that we could lose at the end of the game, but I was also thinking positive like we were going to pull it through. Last year's buzzer beater loss was going through my head and then I thought overtime could happen, but I had to stay positive and get through the game," Davis said.

"But I didn't play very good. The freethrow line killed me,"

Dear said he likes to play in the crazy environments like Fairfield in big games.

"I personally like that environment. I think it elevates my game. I would rather have a crowd that's loud rather than everyone just sitting there," Dear said.

He said in clutch times, his time on the court has him prepared for big games.

"We have confidence in those times. I know the work I've put in and I know in the clutch I'm built for that."

Davis said down the stretch he was trying to get inside to the basket and push Wheaton, who was playing with four fouls for the final four minutes.

"We just wanted to back him down and put pressure on him. When he got the fourth foul he got off me a bit and I was able to do some more things," the senior said.

Davis finished with 26 points on the night, including a 10-for-18 night at the freethrow line. Dear finished with 23, and Turnbull had eight.

The Hounds host Notre Dame at 5:30 p.m. Saturday and then travel to Burlington for a showdown with the Grayhounds at Johannsen Gym on Monday night in a weather-related makeup. Burlington is 5-1 in the Southeast and 10-6 overall. After Burlington, the Hounds travel to Washington in what is shaping up to a be a clash of the No. 1 and 2 teams in 3A. The Demons are 13-2 on the year with losses to Ottumwa and Fort Madison.

Lady Hounds avenge loss to Trojans

FAIRFIELD – It took Fort Madison's girls basketball team 36 minutes to score just 34 points Thursday night. The fortunate side of that story for the Hounds is that Fairfield only scored 28 points in the same time period.

The two squads ran into a 25-25 tie at the end of regulation in Fairfield, but Fort Madison was able to pull away in an extra 4-minute OT period for the upset over the hosts.

A strong defensive effort from both teams kept the scoring down and a combined three offensive rebounds in the first half was the story in a 17-15 Fort Madison lead at halftime.

Senior Malarie Ross had nine points at the half and junior Camille Kruse had four.

In the second half, Fort Madison shot just 1-12, but Ross went to the freethrow line 18 times and converted 13 to finish the night 17-22 with 22 points.

The fact that the Lady Hounds only managed one field goal in the final 2 1/2 quarters didn't seem to phase Head Coach Tony

He said he's not sure if he would've believed his team would have come away with the win on the road, while only converting one shot from the floor in the second half – a runner in the lane from Aija Jenkins in overtime to give Fort Madison a 26-25 advantage.

Fairfield went to a spread man-to-man defense in the final four minutes and chased Ross and Camille Kruse all over the perimeter. But the two were able to protect the ball and move the offense around enough to

draw fouls and get to the line.

Sargent said he was expecting the tight man scheme.

"They played man-to-man on us last time we played them," Sargent said of the Hounds' 46-38 loss to the Trojans in Fort Madison.

He said the Lady Hounds kind of got in their own way in the spread offense.

"There's times when (Ross) has got it and we've got girls cutting in the lane and plugging it up too much instead of staying out wide and giving it room," Sargent said.

"But I'm proud of the kids because they gutted it out. Sometimes you play ugly and win and sometimes you play pretty and lose. This was an ugly one."

Ross made two freethrows with 1:57 left in the game to tie things up at 25 after trailing since early in the third period. However, Ross would miss two freethrows with :14 left in the game to potentially win it.

She said the misses bothered her going into overtime.

"For a second it did, but I knew I had to snap back into it or else we weren't going to get the game," Ross said. "Just think positive – next shot, next shot."

She said the tenacious defense is what kept the Hounds from scoring, but she knew if the Hounds could play solid defense on the Trojans' side there was a chance to win.

"Basketball is a two-way game. If you said we're going to make one field goal in the second half, but then say we're going to play knockdown defense, I'd tell you we have a chance to win," she said.

Ross' 17-22 night at the freethrow line will help pad her already top spot in freethrows in the state. She also leads in freethrow attempts.

public workers in Iowa, that had a huge impact on workers. We need to raise the wages of teachers and take better care of them. We need to have the backs of our prison workers and law enforcement officers. And I'm sorry, but a \$1,000 bonus just isn't enough," Bowker said.

Bowker is the Executive Officer at Iowa State Penitentiary in Fort Madison and is also a very visible volunteer working to beautify Fort Madison, serving on the Fort Madison Housing Authority, and helping craft the Fort Madison Marina project. She also serves on the Historic ISP Non-Profit Executive Board.

Bowker grew up in rural Wisconsin in a working class family before relocating to Fort Madison to find new opportunities in order to provide her son with the best future possible. She said she recognized the value of education and decided to go back to school, taking college classes at night as well as online, while working full-time.

During that time, Bowker also was heavily involved in her son's activities to include coaching and refereeing soccer. She has worked in the community for a local financial institution and now works for the Iowa State Penitentiary as the Executive Officer.

"I know what it's like to work hard to support your family," added Bowker. "And so do the families in House District 100. They deserve to have someone who's going to work just as hard for them in the State House, putting aside divisive politics and working to deliver on the issues that matter most to them— issues like making quality healthcare more affordable, funding our public schools, and fighting to raise the minimum wage to make sure workers get paid what they deserve."

She has two sons and spends her free time reading, running, and riding her bike enjoying the outdoor beauty of Lee County.

The filing period for the 2022 general election is March 7 to March 25 with a primary election set for June 7. The general election will take place on Nov. 1, 2022.
