REBRAND: Fun City Resort Hotel supplants former Pzazz Hotel Burlington

BURLINGTON – A \$3 million rehabilitation of the former Pzazz Hotel Burlington was unveiled Tuesday afternoon with the Greater Burlington Partnership and Great River Entertainment officials on hand.

Gary Hoyer, CEO of Great River Entertainment, cut the ribbon on the new digs at a reception that was broadcast live on the Greater Burlington Partnership Facebook page with employees, community representatives, and GRE administrators celebrating the Grand re-opening.

"We took the former pzazz hotel and tore it to the core," Hoyer said.

"Right down to the studs, and we even replaced some of those - all new electrical, plumbing, flooring, furniture. You name it."

The refurbished hotel features 97 rooms, which reflects a reduction of 48 rooms from the previous footprint. Rooms vary from traditional double queen rooms to elaborate family suites complete with bunk beds and kitchen amenities.

Hoyer said there is still space to add on an additional 36

Linn-Mar wants \$604,000 for records request

The past couple of years have been challenging for Iowa's 327 public school districts.

Parents have become very engaged with their schools — and enraged, too, at times. This has revolved around masks and vaccines, what is being taught or not taught, the content of library books, and an assortment of other concerns.

But in some communities, school leaders have greatly misjudged the angst of parents, grandparents and other taxpayers.

Look at the aggressive campaigns for school board seats and the ouster of some incumbent board members. Remember the heated school board meetings around Iowa punctuated with shouting, threats and arguments. Take note of the sudden decisions by a handful of administrators and teachers to retire immediately or seek jobs elsewhere.

The experience last week of Jacob Hall, a prominent blogger from Sioux Center, suggests that some school officials are failing to recognize their culpability in the crossroads Iowa schools now face.

Don't be surprised if Hall's experience with the Linn-Mar School District becomes the motivation for lawmakers to make an important, and needed, change in the public records law when the Iowa Legislature convenes in January.

Lawmakers should act — because the Linn-Mar district's response to Hall's request for records is outrageous. And he is not the first Iowan to be chased away from obtaining government records by breath-taking costs quoted by government officials who completely miss the intent of the Legislature when it wrote the public records law. Here is what is afoot in the Linn-Mar district:

HTC girls handle chaos of Danville system in win

Bendlage goes for 30 as Crusaders outlast Bears' wild scheme

FORT MADISON – Tony Johnson saw on video what was coming, and he tried to get his Holy Trinity girls basketball team to emulate it in practice preparing for Tuesday's game against Danville.

Johnson tried to simulate the Bears' swarming defense by putting more than five girls out on the court, just to try to recreate the undisciplined havoc that was coming.

But it's hard to recreate something that seemed to have no design to it, and for 20 minutes in the game

the Crusaders were caught up in all of the scurrying. Once they settled down though, they put on a show.

Holy Trinity won, 80-63, scoring 40 points in a nine-minute stretch of the second half as the chaos proved to be too much for the team creating it.

"We got down, got back up," Johnson said. "Nobody panicked. And won by whatever it was. That's the biggest takeaway from this game.

"I told the team the No. 1 thing from tonight was you got down, and you showed me a lot, for being as young as you are."

Danville's plan of a constant five-in-five-out rotation was exhausting and often confusing to the Crusaders (5-2), who let a 10-point second-quarter lead get away. They trailed 36-35 at halftime and then 46-39 in the third quarter before the Bears (2-4) started breaking down.

"When you're playing against chaos, sometimes

you get chaotic," Johnson said. "And that's what happened to us."

But the Crusaders would settle in as Danville imploded. They went on an 18-1 run, and Natalie Randolph's buzzer-beating 3-pointer gave them a 60-50 lead at the end of the third quarter.

The points kept adding up in the fourth quarter. And when Mary Kate Bendlage scored inside with five minutes to play, Holy Trinity was on a 33-7 run.

"That kind of offense is really hard to get," Johnson said. "But we got so many layups by not panicking."

Bendlage had 21 of her game-high 30 points in the second half. Brooke Mueller had 19 points, and Randolph finished with nine.

"There was no rhythm to this game, no half-court offense," Johnson said. "We stayed disciplined. I told them during one timeout, "They want to be chaotic, we want to be in control.' And when we stayed in control, we made layups."

Nikes quick start subdues CL girls | Hawks can't hang with BND

BURLINGTON – If you could go magically pull the first quarter out of the mix, the Central Lee Lady Hawks played with the Class 1A 7th-ranked Nikes Tuesday night.

But you can't do that, and you can't force confidence, something that Central Lee Head Coach Jay Baldwin said was sorely needed as the Hawks fell 65-42 in a girls' Southeast Iowa Superconference matchup at Notre Dame.

The Nikes looked every bit a top-10 team in the state when they started on fire, racing to a 22-4 first-quarter lead as Central Lee couldn't get a ball to drop.

Notre Dame shot 50% from the field during the first quarter run, a stark contrast to Central Lee's 11% hitting on just one of nine attempts.

But Central Lee would keep things somewhat incheck during the next two periods, getting outpaced 12-15 in the second period and 10 to 18 in the third to trail 55-26. Without the huge first quarter disparity, it's a 10 to 12 point game.

BURLINGTON – Head Coach Kritter Hayes had his team playing pretty good basketball for a quarter Tuesday night, and then the inexperience of the Central Lee Hawks showed up.

The last three quarters were more of what the young squad has encountered all year as Notre Dame downed Central Lee 75-42 in Southeast Iowa Superconference South boys basketball action.

A 3-ball from sophomore Corbin Pohren from the left wing cut the lead to two at 18-16 at the end of the first quarter. Pohren led Central Lee with 12 points on the night.

"I think Corbin comes off the bench and gives us a steady presence. He's got a little bit of experience although it's limited, but he's got a toughness to him that our other guys need to find," Hayes said. Notre Dame would then go on a 16-0 run to take a 34-16 lead before freshman Brayden Wyrick broke the drought with a couple of freethrows when

he was fouled rebounding a Pohren miss. It was one of a very few offensive rebounds on the night for Central Lee.

Dante Merschman connected on a 3-pointer before the half, but Notre Dame put up five more for a 39-21 lead at the break.

The Hawks' shooting went cold in the third period as the Nikes raced to a 61-26 lead at the end of three, holding Central Lee to just two buckets and a freethrow in the period to put the game all but out of reach.

Hayes said the squad has been decent off the tip, but loses confidence fast after seeing a few mistakes.

"We hang in there at the beginning and make a few mistakes and our confidence level drops significantly. It can't drop to those levels. You have to be able to face a little adversity and they're not used to facing adversity. They're learning that, but they're not there yet," Hayes said. The Hawks have three seniors in the starting rotation in Alex Sandoval, Bryce Finney, and Maddox Doty, but only Sandoval, and Pohren

coming off the bench, had any real floor time coming into this year.

"Our depth is needing to come along faster than I would have wanted. We need time to develop that depth and we're gonna start doing things," he said.

"We just don't have any experience. It's hard for them to face pressure and know how to handle it and not just get sped up. We go to fast and commit turnovers. I bet we had 20 turnovers today and, in reality, that can translate into 40 or 50 points."

Central Lee did have nine players get in the scoring led by Pohren. Cory Jones had eight on the night, followed by Wyrick's six. Ryan Wilbert had five, Finney, Sandoval, and Merschman all had three points for the Hawks. Aden Ross and Chase Johnson rounded out the scoring with a point each.

Wyrick and Sandoval each had four rebounds to lead Central Lee. Pohren had two blocks on the night.

Section 2. The City Council of the City of Fort Madison does hereby amend Title 10 "Zoning", Chapter 18 "Signs", Section 3 "Permitted Signs: Mayor Residential District", of the Fort Madison Municipal Code by adding a new Clerk Subsection J as follows:

J. Home Occupation and Cottage Business Signs: Every permitted home occupation and cottage business will be allowed to have one sign, which must meet the following standards:

Legislature needs to cap records fees

Hall owns and edits the Iowa Standard. The online publication caters to conservative readers with its news coverage and commentary on public affairs and politics.

Using the public records law, Hall asked for emails and text messages exchanged by Linn-Mar administrators, teachers and other employees about a "Transgender Week" observance at Linn-Mar High School in Marion.

The public records law makes such communications available to anyone who asks, although certain confidential information is protected from disclosure, such as details about specific students.

The law speaks of the importance of free and open examination of records. The statute allows — but does not require — government officials to charge reasonable fees for retrieving and copying documents and for reviewing them for confidential information that needs to be blacked out.

You can imagine Hall's surprise when the Linn-Mar communications coordinator informed him he would have to pay \$504 to receive the records he sought.

The official explained it would take two hours of a computer technology employee's time to retrieve the emails and text messages and an hour and a half for an attorney to examine those communications for confidential details.

The IT worker's time would be charged to Hall at the rate of \$57 per hour — meaning the worker makes \$118,000 annually. The attorney's time would be charged at \$260 per hour.

At \$500, the Linn-Mar records would be out of reach financially for most people in Iowa. But Hall and the Iowa Standard were willing to pay the cost, and he asked the communications official how to make the payment. He also asked how many pages of emails and text messages he would receive.

Hall was not expecting what he heard next:

"In reviewing the information that I provided to you, the amount quoted is the rate to access each employee record," the official wrote. "The total amount for staff time to retrieve the records and attorney time to review/redact confidential information for the entire district would come to approximately \$604,000."

Read that again; it's not a typo. \$604,000.

The costs Linn-Mar quoted to Hall mean, in effect, it would take 2,400 hours to retrieve the emails and text messages containing the keywords "Trans Week." That is 60 weeks of full-time work by the school's information technology employee. And it would require 45 weeks of a \$260-an-hour attorney working full-time looking for confidential information in those emails and text messages.

The Iowa Freedom of Information Council, the nonprofit organization I lead, believes the cost for records is one of the biggest obstacles standing between the public and the records they seek from state and local governments.

It is obvious the Linn-Mar district does not want to share its internal communications about "Trans Week" — potentially a source of criticism from Iowans at a time when there already is intense scrutiny of public schools.

It is immaterial whether Jacob Hall's publication is liberal, conservative or somewhere in between. It is immaterial whether school officials or students or anyone else thinks his request was unimportant. It doesn't matter what motive the Iowa Standard has for writing about Transgender Week and the discord that occurred at the school.

The Legislature needs to make it a priority to place a cap on the amount government can charge for its records. \$600,000 does not meet most people's definition of reasonable.

rooms if demand dictates further expansion, but he said they wanted to do a complete remodel.

Leaitenne Robinson, the general manager of the Resort Hotel, said some of the family suites provide the ultimate of fun for Fun City.

All hot tubs have been removed from the rooms and replaced with tub/showers for the family suites.

Hoyer said the property needed a refresh so they decided to do a comprehensive overhaul as a proposed "Courts" project continues.

"It needed a refresh and rather than putting lipstick on it, we decided to grind it down to the core and do it right," Hoyer said. "We're committed to this community and this region. We want to bring more tourism and more sports tourism and just more people to visit our community," Hoyer said.

The Courts project is a plan to bring another indoor facility with basketball courts to the Fun City property. Hoyer said there could be an announcement on that project as soon as next month.

"We should be to a point of making an official decision followed by an announcement on that in January.
