County, Mellers talk lowan property

LCHD FACILITY: County looks at property for future Lee County Health Dept.

FORT MADISON - Discussions of a new Lee County Health Department have focused on the former Iowan Motor Lodge property in Fort Madison.

County officials have been in talks with the property's owner, Circle M Inc., since November and a tentative agreement between the two entities has been reached. Circle M is owned by Glen Meller, who also owns Meller Excavating and Asphalt, Inc.

Lee County American Rescue Plan Act Administrator Chuck Vandenberg said details of the agreement will be released at a later date, but the county is moving forward with getting the property inspected.

Plans for the new health department also include providing space for the Lee County Ambulance EMS's Fort Madison location.

When those plans were included, proper-

Amandus, Schulz to seek Larkin's supervisor seat

LEE COUNTY - Two sitting Fort Madison City Council members will be vying for the Lee County Supervisor spot that will be open in 2023.

Last week current Supervisor Rick Larkin announced 2022 would be his last year on the board putting the seat in the 2022 election cycle.

Donna Amandus, currently serving the 3rd Ward on the Fort Madison Council, and Tom Schulz, the 2nd Ward coun-

cilman, will both pursue the seat.

Schulz will come at the seat from the

Republican side, while Amandus, will be running on the Democrat ticket.

Amandus said she enjoys serving the people of Fort Madison and has been interested in a run for supervisor. She's also run in past elections for Fort Madison Mayor, and had a 2012 run for state

"I'm really enjoying working for the people of Fort Madison. Honestly, I thought Rick Larkin would run for one more term. I was surprised that he said he was done after this year," Amandus said Monday.

"I think I have a knack for public service and I enjoy it. My hope is to continue serving the people, just in a larger capacity as a supervisor."

Amandus' seat on the council isn't up

Bloodhound boys rocket to No. 2 in Class 3A hoops

FORT MADISON – Almost out of the blue, your Fort Madison Bloodhounds are the second best basketball team in Class 3A in the state.

The Bloodhounds were ranked No. 2 in the state in the Associated Press Iowa High School Basketball Poll on Monday, after being ranked 9th at year's end.

That's happened just a couple times in the past 30 years depending on what polls you look at, but Head Coach Ryan Wilson is quick to say the success is a reflection of the culture being built at Fort Madison High School.

Wilson has a playing rotation that includes eight seniors led by Dayton

Davis and Miles Dear. Seniors Reiburn Turnbull, Tate Johnson, and Landon Johnson are also in the starting rotation, while fellow classmates Phillip Goldie, Leighton Rockhold, and Matt Hopper come off the bench with leadership and scoring ability.

PANDEMIC

Virus activity on the rise in **Lee County**

LEE COUNTY – The positivity rate for COVID-19, including the Omicron variant and other strains, is now again over 10% for all reported tests in Lee County.

Lee County Health Department Administrator Michele Ross told the Lee County Board Monday morning that the positivity rate was surging and the county is currently at 11.4% on the 14day reporting cycle and 14.6% on the

7-day reporting cycle.

Ross said those numbers are local numbers reported and the Iowa Department of Public Health dashboard hasn't been updated with those figures.

"The highest reporting age range right now is 18-29 year olds that are testing at 25% of all tests positive in the last 7 days," Ross said. "So we still encourage anyone eligible to start primary series for vaccination or even get boosters, to do so. This Omicron is very contagious. It's producing common cold like symptoms so its hard to tell if you have COVID or other viruses with the flu and common cold seasons. Get tested if you have any symptoms, a lot of people are reporting asympomatic when they are positive.

Ross said the reported rates only reflect those that are being reported through labs or medical provider offices so it's very likely that our test rate is much higher for all the people that are testing at home.

She said vaccination rates are still moving slightly but work still needs to be done.

"Our 12+ age group is 53.5 fully vaccinated. 18+ 56% and overall population in Lee County is 46.4%. So still, our best protection against all the variants is to get fully vaccinated and then,



steals with 39 and 3rd in rebounds with 105. He's in the top 20 in scoring at 17.9 points per game, while Dear checks in at 14.6 including a 21-point outing against Central Lee on Saturday.

Davis had 29 in that game including a

15-second stretch where he scored six points off steals pestering the Hawks in the front of the Hound press. He's a vacuum on the offensive glass with 50 rebounds in nine games, which is tops in 2A, 3A,

Wilson said Davis and Dear have taken on leadership roles on the court from a very young age.

"Those two guys, specifically, have led quite a few years in their time in basketball. They've been leaders in one way, shape, or form. They put a lot of work in during the offseason from 5 a.m. shooting in the fall or AAU to gain more experience," Wilson said.

"It means a lot to them to be successful and have success on the floor. They want it and want it bad. They both would give up points and assists if the team is

winning."

But Wilson, who's been leading the Hounds for past seven years, said he's seen the effect this senior class of athletes has had on Bloodhound athletic programs in

"You can go all the way back to their earlier years and see the success that class has brought to the athletic program at Fort Madison," he said.

"A few of our seniors went to state in track. Look what some did on the baseball field, in wrestling, what they've done on the football field. You take all those experiences, and those high levels of success and they just brought that to the hardwood this year," he said.

"There are a group of kids that are so darn competitive - they hate to lose and will do anything they can not to lose."

Wilson's quick to admit the lofty ranking, which included one vote as the top team in Class 3A, puts a bigger target on the Hounds' backs, can be a distraction, but the recognition is nice.

"I think it's a little of both, to be honest with you. It's nice to get some recognition across the state for what we've been doing and the kids' hard work this season," he



"But they

need to stay level-headed and humble because, at

the end of

the day, the rankings don't mean much if we don't win conference or make a run at the state tournament."

The Hounds are playing with a little different mojo this year and it's coming across on the floor with balanced scoring, increasing assists, and steal stats that are born out of comprehensive play. That camaraderie has blossomed during the Hounds' undefeated run.

"I think if you asked me that question in November, I would have said I was concerned about our mission and mindset," Wilson said. "But we had a good senior meeting to talk about things and get everyone on the same page. Now they're doing what's best for the team.

"There's days when Miles and I talk about assists and he wants those to be high because that improves our chance on the court. Sometimes he might force and pass here and there, but he has great vision and sees the floor very well."

Dear has 40 assists on the year.

But Wilson said any of the seniors are capable of leading at any given time against any team.

"They're all capable of going out and leading on a given night. Phillip's been more active rebounding and scoring, Johnson has been in double-digit scoring."

The Hounds' success this year is getting contagious and students and fans are making more trips to away games and having an impact in games.

Wilson said he hopes the undefeated season so far, the lead in the conference, and the rankings continue to bring fans out to games.

One of the bigger games will be Friday when the Hounds go to 4A Burlington with the No. 2 ranking fresh on everyone's

"We need a big crowd in Burlington and, if we can get even half the student section there that we get at home, our boys will feed off that," Wilson said. "There's no doubt our boys will show up and be ready to go, but anything we can do to enhance that on Friday will be great.

The Grayhounds are just 7-5 on the year, but are 4-1 in the Southeast Conference and play against bigger 4A schools including Iowa City High and Iowa City West. Burlington has won their last five games.





when eligible, get boosted."

She said booster guidance has changed with both Moderna and Pfizer recommending boosters at five months after their second dose. Boosters are now also being recommended for 12 and older with the Pfizer vaccine.

The county holds Wednesday vaccination clinics at the Lee County Health Department building at John Bennett Center in Fort Madison from noon to 4 p.m. Health officials are also scheduling some pop-up clinics in other parts of the county including at the Montrose and West Point libraries on Jan. 18th.

They are also taking requests from businesses and industries that need help getting staff vaccinated and boosted.

"We really want to push wearing those masks in public settings. It's very contagious out there. We need to get this under control again," Ross said.

In an unrelated issue, supervisors approved changing the Lee County EMS Ambulance billing from the Burlington Fire Department to Physicians Claims Company with a 90-day written notice.

Lee County EMS Ambulance Director Dennis Cosby said the department has had trouble getting billing to Medicare and Medicaid in the current system and switching to the new company will make everything streamlined and electronic.

"Everything will be submitted electronically, which I think will streamline our process a whole lot," Cosby said.

"We didn't realize how much of a hurdle it would be getting things back and forth in the way we were where somebody has to run stuff there twice a week."

Cosby said the agreement will be the exact same agreement the county currently has which pays the service 6% of billables.

ARPA panel moves four projects forward

ty previously considered for a new health department facility in Montrose near the sheriff's office didn't meet response time criteria for the ambulance to respond to calls on the county's northeast side.

At that point, county officials began looking for a place closer to Fort Madison and the vacant property came into focus. Vandenberg said the steel that is currently on the lot will be inspected to see if could be viable for usage within the construction of the new facility.

"The Mellers had agreed to go in and clean that up, but have since agreed to let the county have it inspected to see if it can be used. I just want to point out how proactive the Meller family, especially Glen Meller, has been in this process. They certainly have the county's best interests at heart," Vandenberg said.

Supervisor Garry Seyb said the agreement goes a long way in helping bring the possibility of a new health department closer to reality.

"I think it's a great thing for everyone and I want to personally thank everyone involved for moving this forward," he said.

The health department commissioned a design for a new facility in 2016 with a \$2.6 million price tag that was to be built on property the county already owned in Montrose.

The ARPA committee also moved four projects, including three county maintenance projects that would digitize records in the County Recorder, Auditor and Engineer's offices, to the Board of Supervisors for approval of funding. Digitizing the records will allow them to be viewed online which will reduce the need to do those searches in person at county offices. In

the event of future pandemics or an extension of the current pandemic requiring closure of facilities, the public could still access records and the departments could be functional via the Internet.

A \$24,000 maintenance project for installing enhanced filters throughout county buildings is also included, as is project to replace a grease trap that has undergone heavy use due to the increased meals being prepared and delivered to county seniors during the pandemic. The county projects total just under \$340,000 combined.


The other project was \$15,000 in last-in funding for improvements at the KPLAY playground in Keokuk. The board agreed to meet again on Feb. 7 to discuss further projects.

The board also took a first look at an agreement that will be executed with recipients of funding awards from the county. The agreement outlines compliance issues and reporting requirements that are required by the U.S. Dept. of the Treasury. The county is responsible for tracking and reporting on compliance issues on a quarterly basis and the agreement outlines those requirements.

Vandenberg also said the Treasury issued final rules on the ARPA funds late last week and included in those rules is a Written Justification form that is now required for any capital facility improvement expense in excess of \$1 million.

The Lee County Health Department would fall under that new requirement, but Vandenberg said details on that form haven't been fleshed out yet by the Iowa State Association of Counties, or the National Association of Counties.

He said he didn't see the new requirement being prohibitive in the new construction, but the report does require counties to outline how the project would compare to two other alternatives to new construction such as leasing options.

I.S.P. officer released from hospital

DOC won't release details on injuries due to medical privacy

FORT MADISON – According to an Iowa Department of Corrections official, the officer assaulted by an inmate Friday evening at Iowa State Penitentiary in Fort Madison has been released from the hospital.

Iowa D.O.C. Communications Director Nick Crawford wrote in an email that family had notified the state the officer had been released.

"Due to medical privacy, additional details regarding the officer's condition will not be provided," Crawford wrote.

"The investigation into the incident is ongoing. Once the investigation is complete, the department's findings will be submitted to the Lee County Attorney."

On Saturday the D.O.C. confirmed that an inmate approached the officer at his post and then began assaulting the officer. Nearby staff were alerted and responded to restrain the inmate. As a result of the incident, the facility was been placed on modified restricted movement. Crawford didn't provide details on the status of movement as of Tuesday.

The officer was transported by a department vehicle to Southeast Iowa Regional Medical Center's Fort Madison campus and after further evaluation was taken to the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics for examination and observation.

The inmate was found to have not suffered any injuries.
