FORT MADISON

Pandemic free meal program ends at FMCSD June 30th

FORT MADISON - Fort Madison Community School District officials announced this week that the current Universal Free School Meals program is set to end June 30 and families need to prepare for eligibility guidelines for free and reduced meal programs.

Congress did not extend child nutrition waivers that have allowed schools to provide free meals for all students nationwide since March 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Therefore, local

school districts are preparing to transition back to area eligibility for summer meal programs and income eligibility for the School Breakfast Program (SBP) and National School Lunch Program (NSLP) next school year. Families will need to carry a positive balance in their child's school meal account when school begins this fall. Students that qualify for free or reduced price meals are encouraged to apply.

Under the current federal waivers that allow for free meals, more students are eating at school, especially breakfast. *In August 2021 to December

2021, an additional 2.68 million healthy breakfasts (+33.6%) and 619,463 (+2.2%) healthy lunches were provided to Iowa students, compared to the same time period in 2019. In 2019, the NSLP participation rate was 64% and SBP participation was 19.7%, ranking Iowa 49th in the country for breakfast participation. *Information is based on fall 2021, and school year 2018 -2019 school lunch and breakfast claims reported by the Iowa Department of

Reynolds puts \$25M into child care incentive

DES MOINES - Gov. Reynolds announced today a new Child Care Business Incentive Grant Program to encourage employers to offer child care as a benefit to their employees.

The Child Care Business Incentive Grant Program will provide a total of \$25 million to support child care projects across the state. \$20 million will be utilized to support local infrastructure investments to build or expand child care capacity, and \$5 million will be used to support arrangements between employers and child care facilities to expand and reserve child care slots. Potential projects could include the creation and development of an on-site child



Program incentivizes employer child care opportunities

care center or a partnership with an existing child care center to create new child care slots paid for by a local employer.

"I've heard from both parents and employers that child care is a barrier to work in our state," said Gov. Reynolds. "One of the top recommendations from my Child Care Task Force was to incentivize employer investment in child care. This program will do just that by encouraging employers to help deliver child care solutions to their employees, thereby bolstering opportunities for recruitment and retention of workers."

"Creating flexible options for child care at work not only helps families, but it also makes it easier for employers to recruit and retain the skilled workforce they need," said Beth Townsend, Director of Iowa Workforce Development. "It is vital to our economic growth that we provide parents with reliable and affordable child care options, especially those who are looking to reenter the workforce."

"Access to quality child care is critical to the success of working families," said Kelly Garcia, Director of Iowa's Department of Human Services. "This program underscores Iowa's commitment to working families by putting child care where it's convenient for parents, children, and employers."

In March 2021, Gov. Reynolds launched the Child Care Task Force to address the child care shortage in Iowa. While Iowa is a national leader in the share of households with all parents working, 23 percent of Iowans live in a "child care desert," and Iowa has lost 33 percent of its child care businesses over the past five years. It's estimated that Iowa's child care shortage costs the State's economy roughly \$935 million annually in lost tax revenue, worker absences, and employee turnover.

Gov. Reynolds has directed state agencies to implement many of the report's recommendations, investing more than \$500 million of state and federal funds to address the crisis. Investments include the Child Care Challenge Fund grants, which will help to create an estimated more than 9,000 new child care slots across the state, as well as the Child Care Stabilization Grants and Recruitment and Retention Bonuses for Child Care Workers.

Information on the Child Care Business Incentive Grant Program is now available here. The state will begin accepting applications on <u>Iowa-Grants.gov</u> starting on Friday, June 17th. Applications must be submitted by Monday, July 18th.

Federal ARPA funds are being allocated for this grant program.

Survey critical to child care studies in Lee County

Companies are asked to fill out just one survey per company.

Lee County recently received a \$10,000 grant as part of a \$15,000 rural child care market study conducted by First Children's Finance, as well as two (Blended Early Learning in Education Foundations (BELIEF) grants that were awarded to Keokuk and Fort Madison school districts to investigate early child care. The studies funded by the grants are being conducted in the same time frames and should provide critical data in mapping out how the county should move forward.

Kramer-Riesberg said the study is a joint effort between Children First, Empowering Families, and the school districts to better understand the challenges and develop a plan for quality, accessible child care.

"The more responses we get, the better data we will have, and the more informed decisions we can make moving forward," Kramer-Riesberg said.

"This issue impacts our families the most, and your voice is important. The community is listening and your input is needed right now to make changes happen. If you can, remind your friends, family, employers, and child care provider to fill out the survey, too."

She said the group is looking for both registered and non-registered child care providers. Anyone who regularly watches children for friends or family members who are at work should take the survey, Kramer-Riesberg said.

All responses will remain anonymous.

"We just want to get a good picture of who is providing care and the support that is needed to provide that care," she said.

Employers of any staffing range are also asked to fill out the surveys to gather necessary information to gauge the impact child care has on employers and the workforce.

She said results should be available in mid to late July and the group will share the market study results widely in the community.

"This is a major concern for families, businesses, and providers right now and we want them to access and use this information for the greater good of our communities," Kramer-Riesberg said.

"I hope that every parent/caregiver fills out the survey. Even if your kids aren't currently in child care – take the survey. Even if your parents watch your kids while you work – take the survey. We need a deep understanding of what the need is around child care. I understand that everyone's situation is different – there is not a one-size fits all approach to child care. So we want to see all types of situations represented through this survey. Analyzing responses from all three surveys will help us better plan for large-scale changes and investment into the child care system."

CDC report shows benefits of school meal programs

The standards for child nutrition meal programs reflect the recommendations from the 2020 - 2025 Dietary Guidelines for Americans, emphasizing the incorporation of whole grains, lean sources of protein, low-fat dairy products, fruits, and vegetables, and limiting saturated fat, sodium and calories.

According to the journal article in the National Library of Medicine titled, "The contribution of the USDA school breakfast and lunch program meals to student daily dietary intake" school breakfast and lunch accounts for up to 58% of a school child's daily energy intake.

The Center for Disease Control identifies that students who participate in school meal programs have better overall diet quality than nonparticipants, and eating school breakfast is associated with better attendance and better test scores. Time constraints and stigma are some of the reasons students go without eating. The stigma barrier was eliminated with the waivers that allowed for free meals for all students the past two years.

While this change is set to impact students this summer and next school year, the School Nutrition Association of Iowa (SNAI) has been working hard to develop a recommendation for legislators to continue the waivers and free meals for all students for school year 2022 – 2023.
