Hounds come up short vs. No. 11 Mepo

FORT MADISON – Fort Madison Head Coach Tony Sargent didn't take long to answer how many times his Lady Hounds haven't been in a ball game this year.

The Bloodhounds took on Class 2A No. 11 Mediapolis at home Saturday and after a soft first half came storming back, but an upset bid fell a couple buckets short as Mediapolis left town with a 53-46 win.

"We were never really in it at Ottumwa. We were down about 23-11 at the half and then they blew us out.," Sargent said after Saturday's loss.

"Outside of that one, there really hasn't been too many."

The 15-1 Lady Bulldogs opened up a quick 10-point lead on the Hounds and after three straight turnovers in the

The Hounds rolled Keokuk 66-12 and downed Illini West 72-9.

Fort Madison recorded 11 pins on the night and took advantage of 12 forfeits on the night in the sweep. Carthage only fielded seven wrestlers and Keokuk had five open spots.

Will Larson and Mason Schau were the only Hound

wrestlers to take the mat in both meets.

Larson, wrestling at 138 lbs., defeated Keokuk's Levi Boudewyn in a 9-5 decision and pinned Carthage's Brayden McGinity just about a minute into the third

Schau recorded a pin over Keokuk's Dakota Haage in the first period at 152 lbs. at 1:17 in the first period, but then lost a 6-2 decision to Carthage's Lance Belshaw to go 1 an 1 on the day.

Nathan Steffensmeier, Levi Lowney, Danen Settles, Emmett Kruse, Owen Kruse, Gavin Wiseman and Aidan Pennock all recorded pins on the night.

UNEMPLOYMENT

December report shows Iowa jobless rate up a tick

DES MOINES – Iowa's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased slightly to 2.7 percent in December. The state's jobless rate was 2.4 percent one year ago. The U.S. unemployment rate remained at 3.5 percent in December.

"Given the holidays and weather in

December, it was not surprising to see a slight increase in the unemployment rate. Still, Iowa's workforce grew by 4,400 jobs in December and has grown by 64,900 since the previous December," said Director Beth Townsend, Iowa Workforce Development.

"We continue to have more jobs than

people to fill them and programs like Future Ready Iowa will help Iowans get the training they need for high-demand occupations and employers to find the talent pipeline they continue to need."

County made right move with LCEDG

 $B_{\text{udgeting's tough business.}}$

This is our fourth year digesting city and county budgets to turn around and tell our readership what is happening with their tax dollars.

It's one of those things that you put your reading glasses on for and prop yourself up in bed and read through at night when you can't sleep. There are a lot of things that fit that habit at the Pen City Current fun house.

As most know, we have a daughter with some pretty serious medical conditions that take us away frequently. It happened again at the beginning of this week and we were stuck in Iowa City for about three days working with doctors.

But all is well...almost. Another side effect is that sometimes we miss coverage because...well, family first.

One thing we missed was the Lee County Supervisors meeting on Tuesday.

The Lee County Economic Development Group was in the house with an army of board members because there was talk of taking \$71,000 out of the county's current \$200,000 annual contribution to the group's budget.

That's more than 30%. The supervisors wanted to use the money to add to its contributions to Lee County Emergency Medical Service to make that county budgetary contribution an even \$500,000.

With our daughter's medical condition's we've called Lee County EMS and we know how important that service is. But the biggest impact to that group isn't going to be the county finding \$71,000 somewhere else, which they will.

first period forced Sargent to call a quick time out to settle his team.

Out of the 30 second timeout, freshman Camille Kruse hit a 3-ball and Anna Kester scored again after a defensive stop to cut the lead to 7-12. Mepo would go on a 6-0 run to end the first, however, up 18-7.

The teams played even ball to halftime with both scoring 12 in the second quarter. A driving basket by Mollie Knipe from the left side cut the Bulldog lead to four at 18-14, but that's as close as Fort Madison would get on the night.

"I told them if they beat us by 50 I'm resigning tomorrow because it ain't gonna happen. It's changed. That's over. It's done."

Sargent said the girls are just learning how to be competitive again this year and some of the success is coming from rebuilding confidence.

Down by five and forcing the Bulldogs into a turnover with about two minutes left, Sargent called time out to set up the offense, but out of the break the girls didn't execute the plan.

"We were gonna have a certain offensive set and they didn't run what we set up, but that's gonna happen sometimes," he said.

"These kids are still not used to winning and they're gonna do that kind of stuff. But these girls deserve a lot of credit. They fight hard and I'm proud of them.

"I'm not the greatest coach in the world, but I try to teach kids to have confidence in themselves and I think we're starting to see some of that now."

Kruse led Fort Madison with 14 points, followed by Boeding who had 12, her second straight game in double figures. Walker had nine points, while Kylee Cashman and Knipe each chipped in with four. Kester and Dalyn Wondra both scored a bucket to round out the Fort Madison scoring.

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

County should always fund LCEDG

It's going to be the state changing the way it reimburses Lee County EMS Director Bill Young's company for Medicaid patient services. You can go back to our story on that issue at this link: https://www.pencitycurrent.com/2020/01/07/lee-county-ems-asks-county-for-18-funding-increase/

The state doesn't classify ambulance services as Essential Services, which would change the reimbursement formula. Many counties in the state are struggling with the financial health of those private/public partnerships.

But sludging up the LCEDG's budget isn't an answer either. Three of the five supervisors agreed to that. One was missing and Gary Folluo said that county contribution needs to be further reduced. Folluo said the group's fundraising campaigns are successful enough to allow the county to back off.

We disagree. There has to be a public/private partnership in the LCEDG portfolio. It's our understanding that potential investors look for that on a checklist of the "good stuff".

The discussion came on the heels of an announcement from ConAgra that they are going to invest \$30 million in the Fort Madison plant and add 91 jobs at a time when we already have more jobs than people who want to fill them.

Why would ConAgra do that? Because they like the partnerships they see and momentum they see. We don't know this for fact, but one would also think they see value in the programming LCEDG is doing with area students to get them interested in staying right here to go to work – in good paying jobs.

Lee County already produces a quarter of a billion dollars in manufacturing payroll annually. That's a lot of return on the investment LCEDG makes to hold hands with current business and industry.

A lot of good things are happening with that group and the principles involved have already pared expenses in payroll when Joe Steil was removed and the position wasn't backfilled. There are things we hear whispers of, but won't report on because it's just the right thing to do. Just as I'm positive there are other things in the works that we don't know about.

There are things working at that state level that could take the sting out of the county's budget, including possibly paying for all mental health services out of the state's general fund. That's another huge nut to crack, but it gives a little room to breathe for supervisors going forward.

Prioritizing is tough business for elected officials and the county's right up against the state-mandated 2% soft cap. But these two groups need the funding. So does the sheriff, the health department, the roads, the libraries, the conservation department, and everyone else keeping our county viable and growing.

The majority of the board saw fit to keep the LCEDG budget as is for now. It's the right move. And if the state does do things to ease the pain a little, even though they're not known for playing nice with local government budgets, that contribution should stay in place.

Hopefully, bills will be brought to the legislature to change ambulance service to an "Essential Service" so Bill and the fine team in place there can stay viable. And Folluo is right when he says the state should get involved in providing ambulances like they do sheriff's vehicles. That's huge purchasing power

that could save these vital service budgets.

Oh, and I braved the winter to go to Middletown Thursday to cover a Trade Expo at the Armory. Neat stuff there.

Union reps were there

talking about the state needing to incentivize contractors to use companies with apprentice workers. If it helps attract people to those fields that's great, but we can't forget about the nonunion companies like Mohrfeld Electric, Seither and Cherry, Huffman Welding & Mfg, and many others, that help fund our local non-profits, volunteer hours and resources, partner with our local schools, and work closely with our local governments to keep costs down on projects that ultimately keep dollars local ... but that's Beside the Point.

Manufacturing sees deepest jobs cuts

The number of unemployed Iowans increased to 47,200 in December from 46,200 in November. The current estimate is 6,800 higher than the year ago level of 40,400.

The total number of working Iowans increased to 1,716,100 in December. This figure was 4,400 higher than November and 64,900 higher than one year ago.

Iowa's total nonfarm employment trended down in December and shed 3,100 jobs. This is the second consecutive month that firms trimmed payrolls following a loss of 2,300 jobs in November. Goods producing sectors were lifted by unusual hiring in the construction sector, but private services declined again this month. Government lost 900 jobs in December but remains up 2,000 jobs versus one year ago.

Manufacturing posted the largest loss in December (-1,400) and has now pared jobs in six consecutive months following a recent high in June. Durable goods factories have been most affected with 1,900 jobs shed over the past three months. Professional and business services were down in December (-1,200) due primarily to cutbacks in professional, scientific, and technical services. This decline follows a drop of 900 jobs last month. Truck transportation looked especially weak in December and transportation, warehousing, and utilities combined shed 1,400 jobs. On the other hand, construction posted an unusual increase in activity to end the year (+1,500). Most of these gains were in specialty trade contractors. Despite losses in October and November construction has generally been positive through much of the year.

- Flatten empty boxes for better storage & volume reduction
- Place all recyclables loose in bins
- Don't recycle wrapping paper
- Properly dispose of all electronics and household hazardous waste



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
