And now flooding...?

WATCHING REPORTS: Flood forecasters eyeing changing weather patterns

FORT MADISON – As emergency and health officials continue to battle the spread of coronavirus, an eye has been turned to the Mississippi and its potential to flood this spring.

Steve Cirinna, the Lee County Emergency Management Services coordinator told Pen City Current Wednesday that he's been putting out some warnings about flooding so preparations are not forgotten with all attention on the spread of the coronavirus.

"I've already been pushing out there, 'Hey, don't forget that this is looming out there,'" he said.

"The weather service and the Army Corp are indicating that we have a 25% to 50% higher chance than normal for major flooding again this year. And they're generally pretty good about predicting how high we'll go."

He said current models predict Burlington to peak

about 19.5 feet by April 20, but those could change based on changing weather patterns.

Forecasters use information including water already in the system, snow melt and weather patterns to determine flood levels and issue watches and warnings.

"They don't have a clue

what it's going to do because we don't know what kind of rain were going to see. Those numbers are based on information they have now."

According to the National Weather Service out of the Quad Cities, pretty much the entire area south of the Quad Cities along the Mississippi is predicted to have minor to

major flooding.

Cirinna said the numbers have increased with the latest projections.

"We're getting pretty good at knowing what to do and when to start. There are certain trigger points that each community has for certain

Area seniors hold hope for spring season

LEE COUNTY – With a spring high school sport season still under a delay until at least April 13, some seniors are hoping to get some sort of season in before leaving school.

Both the boys' Iowa High School Athletic Association and the girls' Iowa Girls High School Athletic Union suspended all sports through the state's April 12 school closures, which puts tennis, soccer, golf and track on hold.

Some seniors like Holy Trinity Catholic's Maille Sheerin, who was gearing up for another season as a defender on the Crusader girls soccer team, said she's hearing the season may be cancelled. She said that would be heart-breaking since it's her final year.

"I've heard quite a few people say we're not going to have spring sports," Sheerin said Wednesday.

"Those are just rumors and nothing's been sent but honestly, that would really suck."

Sheerin's father, Michael is the head coach of the girls' team, which makes it twice as difficult as she can't even workout with her dad, while other athletes can get coaching and training with parents.

"Not having my dad coach me my

levels of protection," he said.

"They say when the river gets to a certain point or is predicted to get to a certain point were going to start putting up flood walls around the waste water treatment plant."

The other problem Cirinna is concerned about with flooding this year is the recommendations for self-distancing due to the coronavirus.

He said volunteers who would sandbag if the need arises are typically closer than six feet. One person would fill the bag about 3/4 of the way and set it behind them, where another volunteer comes to tie it up and put it on a pallet.

"Those people are working close together and sweating, even if it's cold outside, and I've been running the

question up the ranks asking if we are going to be able to get a large number of volunteers if self-distancing is still in place," Cirinna said. "That will be very difficult."

The flood stage in Fort Madison is set on elevation and not the typical water depth. Fort Madison's flood stage is slightly over 528 feet, according to www.rivergages.com. The current water level is 528.97 an increase of .15 feet over the past 24 hours.

Burlington's flood stage is 15 feet and was recorded at 16.87 feet at 9 a.m. Wednesday morning, which is considered moderate flooding on that riverfront. Burlington is expected to crest initially at 17 feet on Thursday night before receding slightly. Major flooding there is 18 feet or higher.

Facility Entrances -updated

We are limiting the access points into the facility. This initiative will help minimize the number of people on the FMCH campus and aid in the screening process for COVID-19. We will screen all people entering the facility for COVID-19; they will then be given a sticker to indicate clearance.

Visitor Restrictions – updated

We want to protect our patients, employees and community from potential exposure to COVID-19, therefore, we have implemented stricter visitation guidelines throughout the organization. No visitors under the age of 18 will be allowed unless they are the parent of a minor. All visitors to the FMCH campus will be screened.

No Visitors will be allowed on our Medical/Surgical or Special Care Units (unless end-of-life).

Patients under the age of 18 may have one parent or guardian visit.

FMCH Birthplace patients- only the mother's designated support person is allowed- must be the same identified person for the duration of the stay.

One person can accompany patients with an appointment in the FMCH Clinics, laboratory or radiology areas.

Seniors open to summer play as option to cancelling season

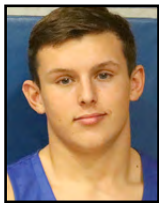

senior year would be really hard," Sheerin said. "I was part of the school musical and that got cancelled and losing that and soccer would be tough."

Sheerin said she would be happy just getting a start at any point in the season and get some games in, as she understands the seriousness of the spread of the coronavirus.

Fort Madison's Matt Hellige, who has qualified for the Iowa High School Track and Field Championships in distance runs the past two years, is continuing his regular workouts while training with his dad. He finished 12th in the 1600 meter run in 2019.

"You can't workout with your team and that's really the only hindrance right now. Aside from that, I've been doing my normal workouts."

But Hellige said he's pretty upset with the state of the season because he was looking forward to improving his time and possibly medaling at the state meet. That meet is still on the unified schedule to begin Thursday, May 14.

"That, and improving your skills is what sports are all about," he said. "I'd be really disappointed. Not only is this my last chance to qualify, but last sport for me in qualify in in high school with cross country done."

Hellige will run track and cross country at Mt. Mercy College in Cedar Rapids upon graduation. He said it's been business as usual as far as keeping up with workouts.

Fellow senior Quentin Schneider, who took 7th at last years state meet in the 400 hurdles said track is his favorite season and he hopes the season can start at some point.

"Honestly, I'd like to see it start after this four-weeks is up. I don't really want to go back to school, but I'd like to put the season back and run," Schneider said.

"I saw a petition on Facebook where they were asking to have the spring sports rolled in with the summer sports and I wouldn't mind that, but I'd rather just start in April."

Schneider said he's been working on his endurance

during the suspension after straining a quad in an indoor meet in Cedar Falls before the virus hit Iowa.

He said losing that final year as a senior would be hurt.

"It would hurt because it's my last year," he said. "I was looking forward to track which is one of my favorite sports because it's only me for the most part. So if I messed up it I only have myself to blame."

Schneider said he's planning on running sprints and the 400 hurdles at Iowa Central Community College in Fort Dodge next year.

Dalton Westercamp, a senior at Central Lee said he'd like to get a season in, but said going to deep into the summer could hurt is workouts for football. Westercamp signed to run track and play football at Coe College next year.

"Honestly I haven't thought about it too much. I mean I want to do it and I guess I'm alright with half a season or something like that, but I don't want it to go to deep in the summer as I have to start getting ready for football," he said.

Westercamp said the disappointment comes with missing the camaraderie of the season with his friends and teammates.

"Its really disappointing to be honest. This has slowed everything down for everybody. "Track is about pushing your friends and teammates to the limit and pushing times," he said.

"Either way, I'm going to move past it. It hasn't been really emotional for me. I signed for track and football and I need to keep working for that. This track season was work for college, but I should still be on par with others because we're all in the same boat."

Sam Pothitakis, the senior goalkeeper for the Crusaders, said the year was looking to be an exciting one because numbers were up.

Pothitakis has one of her best years as junior last year and was hoping to build on that her senior year.

The Crusaders got in a few open gyms before the season was suspended, but Pothitakis said she hopes a full season resumes even if it runs into the summer.

"I'd definitely rather play into the summer since it's

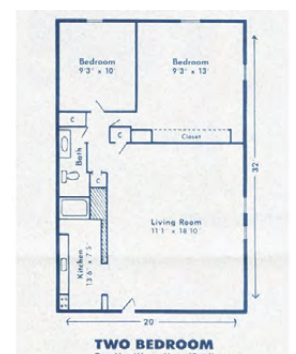
