TOURNEY: Larson, Lozano, and Kruse will compete at Wells-Fargo on Thursday

BETTENDORF - Fort Madison's Will Larson has battled influenza since Thursday and took the mat at the Class 3A district wrestling tournament in Bettendorf Saturday exhausted.

But after three matches that went the distance, Larson seemed to always find a little left in the tank and advanced, along with Diego Lozano and Owen Kruse, to the Iowa State Wrestling Tournament starting Thursday at Wells Fargo Arena in

Wrestling at 138 lbs, Larson went 3-4 on the day. He advanced with an 11-4 decison over Burlington's River Belger, who had beaten Larson two times this year, and then lost in the semis to eventual champion Grifen Molle of West Burlington-Notre Dame-Danville 12-0.

The loss to Molle sent Larson into the wrestleback bracket where he faced Bettendorf's Kohler Ruggles. The junior Bloodhound trailed 4-2 at the end of two periods and couldn't seem to get anything going in the third until about 10 seconds left, when Larson dug deep again and slipped around Ruggles pulling him to the mat right into a near fall for 3 points with :03 left on the clock to eek out the 5-3 win.

That set up the 2nd place match with Muscatine's Carson Harder, who lost in the title match to Molle. Larson and Molle went a full three periods and then into overtime in a gutcheck of a match where neither wrestler scored a point.

In double overtime, Larson won the final flip of the start coin and chose the top. Harder just needed an escape in the 30-second extended

Supervisors to hold hearing on tax rates

Proposed combined levy not above state's new 2% soft cap

LEE COUNTY - Lee County supervisors will vote to approve the first step in the 2020-21 budgeting process Tuesday.

At the regular Board of Supervisor's meeting, a public hearing will be held to take any questions on the proposed maximum increases in funds received from property tax dollars in the fiscal year 2020-21.

County Budget Director Cindy Renstrom has proposed property taxes for rural county services at \$2,042,566, which is 2% increase of the previous year. She's also proposing a decrease in the amount requested for general county services of .94% to a total of \$10,645,921.

The estimated tax rate for general services for 2020-21 is projected to at \$6.797/\$1,000 assessed valuation and \$2.415/\$1,000 for rural services.

If the county had requested the same amount of funding from the 2019-20 budget year, due to increased valuations, the rates would have dropped to \$6.854/\$1,000 for general and \$2.368/\$1,000 for rural services.

A 2019 state law put a soft cap on the local governmental property taxes at 2% and anything over that requires a separate public hearing and a supermajority vote of the board.

Renstrom is basing her numbers of a budgeted county taxable valuation for general services at \$1.57 billion, and taxable valuation for rural services at \$845.7 million.

The board will also consider:

- plans and setting a bid letting date for the removal of flood debris on 280th Avenue/Bridgeport Road over the Skunk
- approval of a CEO liability agreement with Iowa Region 16 Local Workforce Development Area

If you receive a call like this:

Holy Trinity girls advance

FORT MADISON – Thursday nights Region 4 win over New London was the first time the Holy Trinity Crusaders were all together in a week.

Head Coach Tony Johnson's squad knocked off New London 52-44 in the opening round of Region 4 Class 1A girls basketball at Shottenkirk Gymnasium.

"Today was the first day I've seen all 13 of 'em in about a week," Johnson said.

"Had six a practice Tuesday, no practice last night due to weather and illness."

Johnson said he had a fear that with all the illnesses combined with then facing a conference team for the third time could prove problematic for the Lady Crusaders.

"I thought they fought through it. We shortened up the bench in the second half, but I think everyone that played contributed in some way tonight.

The game was tight in the first half with HTC holding just a one-point first quarter lead at 10-9. Senior Ashlyn Haas, who led all scorers on the night with 20 points, had six in the first period for the Crusaders.

Holy Trinity was able to contain the Tigers' senior Layney Loyd in the first quarter keeping her without a bucket. But Loyd would finish with 18 points, including six straight in the second period.

Johnson said he wanted to force Loyd to go left inside, but didn't do a good job of that in the second half.

"We knew she was most of their offense so we wanted to make her go left and keep her off the boards," Johnson said.

Loyd would hit two free throws after

getting fouled HTC's Kassi Randolph going to the hoop to cut the Crusaders' lead to 20-15. Holy Trinity would miss three straight in a stretch of six, before the Tiger's Kara Krieger hit a 3-ball to cut it to two points with 2:02 left in the half.

Freshman Brooke Mueller and Claire Pothitakis would each make one of two from the free throw line down the stretch to give the Crusaders a 22-18 halftime lead.

Holy Trinity would push the lead to eight at 33-25 with less than two minutes to go in the third period on a bucket by Randolph from the left baseline.

Krieger would counter with another of her four 3-pointers on the night to trim the lead back to give, but HTC junior Bailey Hellweg would answer from the right wing for a 36-28 lead.

Holy Trinity would have leads as large as nine points in the final period, but New London would make a run in the last minute with a little 6-2 run highlighted by 3-ball from Tiger fresh-

man Emma Nye from the left wing to make it a 47-44 game.

The Crusaders would hold the Tigers scoreless the rest of the way, while going 5-of-6 from the free throw line to put the game away.

"It seemed we got some big shots tonight when we needed them to stop some runs they had."

Behind Haas, Randolph had 10 and Avery Hopper, who got into foul trouble in the first quarter and sat most of the first half, finished with seven. Raquel Schneider, Claire Pothitakis, Maria Rauenbuehler, Hellweg and Mueller all had three points.

Krieger had 14 behind Loyd's 18 to pace the Tigers.

The Crusaders will now face Lone Tree on Tuesday in Lone Tree at 7 p.m. The Lions downed Hillcrest Academy 59-16 in that opening round game.

Burlington Notre Dame and Winfield Mt. Union each won their opening round games and will face off at Father Minnett Gym in Burlington on Tuesday at 7 p.m.



Lady Hounds complete sweep of Grayhounds

Kruse, Walker combine for 35 in OT thriller at Hound Dome

FORT MADISON – The Fort Madison Lady Hounds basketball team wrapped up their regular season with an exciting 49-42 overtime win over Burlington at home.

The Hounds' roller coaster regular season came to a close with a sweep of the Burlington Grayhounds. Fort Madison knocked off the visitors by 18 three weeks ago.

Freshman Camille Kruse and senior Brandy Walker got the inside/outside game going and combined for 35 points in the win.

Fort Madison erased a 24-16 Burlington lead in the first half and came out of the locker room outscoring the Grayhounds 18-7 to take a 34-31 lead into the final period.

Burlington would retake the lead with four minutes left in the game at 37-36. The frenzied final minutes saw only two points from each team with Burlington holding a 39-38 lead.

The Hounds would convert on a bucket and a foul in a 3-point play in the final seconds to get to the tie at 41 after Burlington converted a bucket.

In the extended session, Fort Madison would jump out to a quick start with two buckets and then reeled off five straight free throws, all while holding Burlington to just one point for the win.

Kruse finished with 18, Walker had 17, Nadia Boeding added seven points, while Molly Knipe added four all in the critical fourth period. Anna Kester had three to round out the Bloodhound scoring.

On Thursday, the Hounds rolled over Albia at home 68-25. Anna Kester led Fort Madison, who held a 29-6 halftime lead, with 12 points. Three other players scored in double figures with Walker at 11, and Nadia Boeding and Camille Kruse each with 10. Isabella Boeding had seven, Kylee Cashman and McKenna Cashman both had six, while Dalyn Wondra chipped in with four.

Fort Madison finished the regular season a much improved 9-13 winning four of their last five heading into district regionals next week The Hounds travel to Mt. Pleasant on Wednesday night to open Region 5 action against the Panthers.



period, but couldn't shake Larson off giving the Hound the 1-0 sudden victory and a ticket to the state tournament.

Larson said he just kept trying to work on his ties and stay on offense.

"I knew he was tough on top, and I knew I was tough, too. At the end, I knew I could hold him down for 30 seconds so I just told myself, 'Why not," Larson said.

"I've had influenza since Wednesday, but I guess I got it out tonight."

Head Coach Ryan Smith said Larson's day was phenomenal considering his illness this week.

"It's just a matter of gutting things out and finding a way to win when things are stacked against you. It's a great testament to Will's will power," said Head Coach Ryan Smith.

Owen Kruse is the second Kruse to make it to the state

tournament. His brother Elton made it last year at 126 lbs as a senior.

Kruse recorded a pin over Clinton freshman Luke Jennings in the first period and advanced to the semifinals, but lost to eventual champion Austin Kegley of Cedar Rapids Prairie in :42. Kruse then scored a 17-8 major decision of Pleasant Valley's Jackson Miller which vaulted him into the 2nd place match.

Junior Owen Kruse qualified for the state tournament next week after taking second place at the district meet Saturday in Bettendorf. Above Kruse gets the upper hand on Clinton's Luke Jennings in the opening match at 120 lbs.

Bettendorf's Elijah Mendoza lost to Kegley in the finals and, since he and Kruse hadn't tangled yet on Saturday, the wrestleback was on.

Mendoza scored a takedown in front of the Fort Madison coaches, but Kruse wiggled his way through the hold and flipped Mendoza, who'd gotten out of position, over to the mat on a reversal and stuck the pin 59 seconds into the match to punch his ticket to Wells-Fargo.

"It means a lot to me and with all the hard work. It feels good. It's good to go as a junior. My brother went as a senior so I'm happy about this," Kruse said.

He said he utilized a move that Smith has been working on with the team in the past few weeks to roll Mendoza over in the final match.

Senior Danen Settles, who's qualified for state the last two years, has been hobbled by an MCL tear in his right knee, captured a 3rd place at 285 lbs. Nathan Steffensmeier (160) and Mason Schau (152) also finished 3rd on the day.

Schau lost in his bid for second place in the wrestleback with a 2nd-round pin to Bettendorf's Damian Peterson. Steffensmeier won with a last second 6-5 win to try and advance to the 2nd place match, but he had lost previously to Muscatines's Cedric Cordero so Cordero got the runner up qualifier spot.

"I'm really proud of being a part of two conference championships. I wrestle because my last name's Steffensmeier. I don't know if I lived up to that or not, but I gave it everything," Steffensmeier said.

Settles earned the 3rd place medal with a pin over Cedar Rapids Prairie's Jordan Jacobus. The two battled to a 1-1 tie through two, but Settles was able to escape from the down position and then throw Jacobus to the mat for a pin with :36 left in the match for the win.

Settles wouldn't get a shot to wrestle back for second because Muscatine's Togeh Deseh lost in the finals to Bettendorf's Grifin Liddle by pin. Deseh downed Settles 3-2 in a semifinals match mired by a bit of controversy as Deseh was credited with a takedown at the outer circle. The call was contested by Smith but to no avail.

Settles recorded a couple escapes, one in the first and one in the second to tie it up, but Deseh would get an escape in the third off a restart and Settles couldn't manage a point in the final 30 seconds to send him to the third place match.

"It's not the way I wanted to finish my career here. I wasn't much as a freshman, but I owe a lot to Coach Smith for getting me as far as I did," Settles said.

The senior, known as "Cowboy" to the Fort Madison faithful, said he hopes the MCL tear he suffered at the Fairfield Invitational heals up and he can play sports in college at some point.

"I cried a few tears for him in the locker room after that. He's just the poster child for this program. He's worked so hard and has so much fun," Smith said.

Smith said he couldn't question the effort the Hounds gave overall on the day.

"That was our message, you're gonna have to find ways to overcome it. Nathan came darn close and Mason came close. You just can't fault the effort," he said.

"We're a solid team, but sometimes a solid kid doesn't get through because there are so many good kids here and being solid might not be good enough."
