Reynolds stands by moves

U of IOWA REPORT: Experts say reducing prevention measures likely to bring about second wave of coronavirus

JOHNSTON - Iowa Gov. Kim Reynolds, in a short press conference on Wednesday, defended her action to relax some restrictions in 78% of the state despite climbing case counts and a report from the University of Iowa saying the move could cause a second wave of coronavirus infection.

At Wednesday's daily press conference, reporters pushed Reynolds on the report that was received early last week from University officials. The report was an initial finding as part of a contracted service between the University and the Iowa Department of Public Health for an Iowa-specific COVID-19 model.

According to a report in the Des Moines Register, the initial report said without continuing mitigation, a "second wave of infections is likely".

Reynolds said the state is moving forward and with Test Iowa and other measures, including sending strike teams to where "widespread virus activity" is on going, the state will be able to be more targeted with efforts to contain the virus.

"I didn't just rip the bandage off or flip the light switch," Reynolds said Wednes-

day.

"I think we've moved forward in a reasonable manner to start Iowa up, which I think we can do."

Reynolds said she appreciated the work the University is doing in

model, but it isn't complete yet. She also said the University partnered with the IDPH and recommended restarting elective surgeries

coming up with the Iowa

"It makes sense to start loosening up in places that have seen little to no activity. It's not sustainable for us to continue to lock the state down. We need to start to open it up in a responsible manner in areas we feel

we've seen a stabilization and a downward trend," Reynolds said.

"We'll monitor, which we can, and see how the state responds to lifting some of the mitigating efforts and start to move forward."

Reynolds pointed out that 96% of all positive cases in the state in the last 24hour reporting period ending Tuesday at 10 a.m. were in the 22 counties that are still restricted. However those are the areas of the state where most testing is being done.

Reynolds said 467 new positives were confirmed Tuesday for 6,843 total positive cases in the state. There were 12 additional deaths in that reporting cycle bringing the

CENTRAL LEE CLHS hires Banks as new head coach

DONNELLSON - A familiar face will be donning a cap a whistle this year for the Central Lee football program.


Chuck Banks has accepted the position as head football coach following the departure of Nick Ehret after three years.

Banks has been with the program for about seven years after putting in 10 years under head coach Jim Knott at Centerville. Banks' first five years with Central Lee were under storied head coach Randy Hoffman when the Hawk's compiled a 25-23 mark. Banks first year with Hoffman in 2012 was an 0-9 season, but just three years later the Hawks made the state playoffs and then went again in 2016.

Banks said he's learned a lot about coaching philosophy from Hoffman and Knott.

"Hoffman, he's kinda the end of an era when you look at old school coaching. He was tough but he still loved his kids. He was about building relationships, as was Knott in Centerville. Both of them were about building relationships and being there for the kids even beyond the field," Banks said.

The Hawks went just 2-7 last fall after going winless in 2018. Banks said he has no preconceived notions about the team and the 2-16 record over the past two years didn't intimidate him at all. "There was no coercion here whatsoever," the Centerville native said. "I didn't need to be pushed into this job. I had always had a inkling I would get back into football. It's something I loved."

a year off. He said he watched his daughter as a cheerleader in 2019 and lost some weight and is now ready to get back into the game.

The Hawks will complete in Class 1A, District 7 in 2020. The Hawks were 2-4 against teams in that district last year, with wins over Eddyville/Blakesburg/Fremont and Davis County to end the year.

Banks said he's looking forward to the schedule this year, a schedule he thinks could be very balanced with Pekin opening the year.

"They'll be well-coached and run a power game and push the ball," Banks said. "But we get Van Buren again this year and when you think back to the old days they were kind of a rival. That's awesome and it's good to have them back."

He said Cardinal will be a wild card with some really good athletes, but Mid Prairie and Williamsburg always comes with a strong team.

Although this will be Banks' first year as football

Banks also has a coaching podcast with Fort Madison head coach Derek Doherty and said he considers Doherty a close personal friend who's building a strong program at Fort Madison.

"I can only hope that I'm heading down that path. I coach with high energy and intensity, and even the kid that may not have at the greatest skill level gets the same coaching from me as the best athlete."

Banks said despite losing 10 seniors from last fall's squad he said the staff and students are excited about the 2020 season and hope the coronavirus doesn't interfere with the fall program.

State officials have said information on the sum-



mer sports season won't be released until June 1.

"I think it very well could have an impact when you look at all the unknowns that are out there," Banks said. "I've reached out to some students and athletes and there is a growing concern of that unknown. But the sporting world and the world in general will be forever changed."

Aside from those unknowns, there are some things he's pretty certain about going into his first year.

"I think the skies the limit. I'm hearing from a lot of kids who are excited and the staff is excited," Banks said. "Now I'm not going mention what offense or defense we'll work at this point, but I have a lot of great ideas to shore us up."

He said the goal every year is to hit a winning season and then progress and go as far as you can.

"I'm totally optimistic about who we have. Johnny Schneider is a fast kid who was hurt last year and he'll be ready. Bryce Finney is another underclassman who could pay huge dividends along with a lot of other youngsters out there," he said.

Connor Moor is a senior lineman who Banks said could provide influence offensively.

"A lot of kids have the ability and if they buy into the system they will be just fine."

Balance is the key to his style of play, Banks said. But he said they will probably be a little more run heavy than pass.

"But what you see is what you get, and week in and week out you have to deal that."





Supplemental Learning Supplemental learning resources continue to be available online, and we're mailing out more than 300 packets to families each week. We strongly encourage all students to engage in these activities.

Please note that students must have an economic or health hardship that has limited their ability to finalize or redo any third-quarter assignments or exams. Mrs. Herdrich will be sending out more information about this to high school families soon. We will also post this information to our COVID-19 website. Student Items

We are busy collecting students' items and organizing them for you

to pick up later in May. We will release information soon on how we will move forward with this process. In the meantime, you may want to start organizing textbooks, library books, and other end-of-the-year items that need to be returned to school. We will likely pass out items and have you return items on the same day.

Meal Service

Meal service will continue through May 29. We are currently providing three meals on Sunday and two meals on Wednesday. Each meal contains breakfast and lunch. We prepare nearly 4,000 meals per week for our community. If you get a chance, please thank our nutrition staff and transportation staff for their tremendous efforts!

Internet Access

We have installed a Wi-Fi extender that allows students and parents to access high-speed internet in the high school parking lot. While we understand it is not a perfect solution, it may help a little during this time.

IDPH to start adding Test Iowa sites next week

statewide total to 148.

She said 2,428 Iowans who have tested positive have recovered from the illness.

On Monday, Lee County Health Department administrator Michele Ross said the Lee County is not stabilized and has an upward trend, two benchmarks, Reynolds said she used to determine which counties would receive relaxed restrictions. She also used the number of cases and hospitalization rates, which are very low in Lee County comparative to those still under heavier restrictions.

As of Tuesday morning reporting, Lee County had eight positive tests for the coronavirus and no deaths. But on Wednesday afternoon LCHD officials released a ninth adult who was confirmed to have COVID-19 in the county. Des Moines and Henry counties have a combined 49 confirmed cases and have two reported deaths. Reynolds also updated information from the Test Iowa site at <u>www.testiowa.com</u>. She said 442,000 Iowans have visited the site, but only 229,000 of those actually completed the assessment which means 48% are leaving the site before completing the assessment.

Reynolds said 65% of those completing the assessment are female and 39% are within the 45-64 age range. Until Wednesday one site for scheduled testing was set up in Des Moines at the Iowa Events Center, but on Wednesday another testing site was opened at Crossroads Mall in Waterloo.

Two additional testing sites are in the works for Woodbury and Scott County.

Reynolds order on Monday indicated churches were allowed to begin regular services again as long as preventative measures were included to maintain social distancing and protect church-goers. On Wednesday, Reynolds said she would continue to attend service online.

"It's not a mandate it's an option. That's a decision Iowans get to make and religious services will make across the state. I'll probably go online. I think our church has decided to stay online," she said.

Reynolds said she was going to be on a call with Vice President Mike Pence this afternoon to get into the specifics of President Donald Trump's order for the nation's meat processing facilities to remain open, despite soaring numbers of coronavirus infections at those facilities.

She said the state has has a good partnership with facilities in Iowa, and the Centers for Disease Control and OSHA have new guidelines that should help these facilities stay open and reduce the spread of the infection.

"Testing is a big component of that and we'll have to be aggressive with facilities in our approach and walking through new guidance to make sure they are, and they are, doing everything that can to protect their workforce," she said.
