Reynolds makes COVID stop in FM

FORT MADISON - Iowa Governor Kim Reynolds climbed up on the back of a flatbed Iowa National Guard trailer Tuesday in Fort Madison and helped unload medical supplies.

Reynolds was in town as part of a swing through southeast Iowa assessing efforts and commending leaders on the work to combat COVID-19 over the past 15 weeks.

She followed Iowa National Guard servicemen and servicewomen, who have been a large part of the fight against the COVID disease, including delivering personal protective equipment across the state.

"This is my opportunity to not only highlight what (the Iowa National Guard) is doing, but to help deliver some of the PPE and to thank the local emergency managers, local public health officials, and all of the first responders instrumental in helping address COVID-19," Reynolds said.

"It's been one big team across the state working collaboratively to address the virus, and in Iowa were doing better every single day. So we're very optimistic about the future."

County to sell land for Hwy. 61 ramp project

LEE COUNTY - A slip ramp the Iowa Department of Transportation is building to allow easier access to Hwy. 61 for Siemens wind blades, will require purchasing some

land from the county.

The property is part of the Lee County Conservation District's Trumpeter Marsh habitat across the conservation center at Heron Bend. A public hearing on the matter has been set for July 7, at the next regular Lee County Board of Supervisor's meeting.

LCCD Director Nathan Unsworth said the project has been in the works for a while and he's had numerous conversations with

Levy election idea dropped by county

LEE COUNTY – County officials are leaning toward not putting an emergency services levy in front of tax payers this year to pay for a county-run ambulance service.

Lee County Auditor Denise Fraise told supervisors during a workshop following Tuesday's regular meeting that an election wasn't mandatory.

Fraise said she spoke with officials at the Iowa Department of Management who informed her the county could just pay for the service out of the county's general fund.

What that amounts to is instead of holding a \$10,000 special election, or adding the question to the November general election, the county could literally just buy the service and take it over.

The move would likely require the county to go past the 2% revenue growth soft cap put in place by the state in 2019, by surpassing the \$3.50/\$1,000 maximum allowable general fund tax levy.

To surpass the 2% soft cap on revenue increases, supervisors would need at least 4 of 5 votes in favor of increasing revenues during the next budgeting cycle.

The county has appropriated \$900,000 of county funds in the upcoming fiscal year budget to subsidize the operations of Lee County EMS Ambulance, Inc., the county's only ambulance service.

The county agreed to increase the subsidy earlier this month as part of a 12-month extension of the ambulance services contract with the county.

Lee County EMS Director Bill Young told the county in May they need to look at other options after this year. One of those options was having the county buy out the service and run it as a public ambulance service.

"You would be running into the 2% cap next year and that will have to be approved



for the DOT to acquire .79 acres at the Trumpeter Marsh area that we own. It was donated by local conservation groups to the board," he said.

The Lee County Conservation Board discussed the item last week and has recommended that the sale be considered.

"They see this as a public safety issue for the county, as we have wind blades pulling onto the highway and blocking traffic," Unsworth said.

"Obviously this was a tough call for the board and they don't like to be put in those situations, but they did recommend it."

The DOT is offering \$5,300 for the acreage and another \$2,800 for a fence that will need to be relocated to help protect the swans that are being reintroduced to the state.

Supervisor Matt Pflug said the DOT would have the right at some point to just take the

Supervisor Matt Pflug said the DOT would have the right at some point to just take the land if they need it.

County Engineer Ben Hull said that was a possibility.

"The DOT certainly can take the land, but they do have a process they have to follow and environmental reviews are a part of it. They do those reviews to assess the impact to conservation ground they are taking," he said.

"They don't just get to take that without justifying it. They feel the need to do that for public safety, and I would say they are justified here."

Unsworth said there were concerns shared from the public as well as Pheasants Forever.

"The price is fair and it allows us to move the fence to keep the swans on the property as part of the reintroduction," he said.

Supervisor Rich Harlow said the ramp was a good idea.

"I go by there regularly and it's definitely as safety hazard. I've seen road rage there at those times," he said.

Fedler said it was tough decision for the board.

"They had to balance conservation with safety and it was a very good decision in order to make sure this is safer for people traveling 61," Fedler said.

Unsworth said the funds will be used to address the fencing issue right away and then the rest will go into the conservation trust fund for additional projects around the county.

The slip ramp will be a southbound turning lane on the west side to allow room for Siemens-Games wind blade haulers to have easier access to the highway from the facility, without blocking oncoming southbound traffic.

Local law enforcement to join in July 4th sobriety campaign

LEE COUNTY - The last few months have brought incredible challenges for our communities. As our nation begins to reopen, many Americans will be eager to celebrate the Fourth of July with family and friends. The Fort Madison Police Department, along with the National Highway Traffic Safety

Administration (NHTSA) and the Governor's Traffic Safety Bureau (GTSB) want to remind drivers to not let the celebration turn dangerous by driving impaired.

Nationally, during the 2018 July 4th holiday period (the most recent statistics available) 193 people died in motor vehicle crashes and 78 of these fatalities occurred in an alcohol-impaired crash. On the fourth of July in 2018, one person lost their life in Iowa due to an alcohol related crash. On July 4, 2019, Iowa experienced 112 crashes which involved 2 fatalities and 9 serious injuries. These fatalities and injuries are certainly nothing to celebrate.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety
Administration 71 percent of those who died in alcohol related crashes were in

vehicles involving a driver with a Blood Alcohol Content (BAC) of .15 or higher, almost two times the legal limit of .08. Law enforcement agencies across Iowa will be participating in the national Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign from July 3 to July 7, 2020.

In an effort to combat impaired driving, officers will be exhibiting zero tolerance for impaired drivers.

Impaired driving is not only dangerous but illegal, and it puts everyone on the road in jeopardy. There is also a finan cial aspect of driving impaired. An OWi arrest can cost up to \$10,000. You could lose your license, your car, and your job. Before you set out to celebrate this holiday weekend, make a plan - have a designated driver, call an Uber, or other rideshare service.

County will need soft cap override in next budget

by four of the five of you," Fraise said Tuesday. "If you want to do a special election the second week in September, I need to know now. I'm just looking for your opinions here."

Board Chairman Ron Fedler said since the county is already appropriating money to offset the shortages of the service, the county should just account for that in the general fund, and take over operations.

"We're already taking money out of that fund for ambulance service. It would be, I would think, the best way to do it to take over the service."

A bill that passed the state House of Representatives prior to the adjournment last week, would have given counties authority to assess a tax for ambulance service as an essential service defined by the state, but that bill was not called for a vote in the Senate prior to the session ending.

State Rep. Jeff Kurtz (D-Fort Madison) and State Sen. Rich Taylor (D-Mt. Pleasant) both thought the legislature was going to pass the bill.

"All the Senate democrats were asking where it was," Taylor said.

"I didn't hear it called for a vote and I just kept thinking it would be called. Then all the Senate Democrats were asking where it was at and what's going on. The next thing I know we're adjourned."

Senate President Charles Schneider (R-W. Des Moines) said he had no role in pulling the bill and deferred comment to Jake Chapman and Jack Whitver. Chapman is the chairman of the Senate Ways and Means Committee where the bill would have come out of, and Whitver is the Senate Majority Leader who would have had the final say on the billing coming to a full floor vote.

Neither Chapman nor Whitver returned calls or messages on Tuesday.

"I thought it was done deal," Kurtz said Friday. "I actually let some people know in Lee County that I thought it was done. I honestly don't know what happened. You'll have to talk to the Senate about that."

Taylor said he believes another bill will be introduced next year and if either the House or the Senate gets flipped to Democrat control, the bill will get passed.

County Budget Director Cindy Renstrom said there

Supervisor Matt Pflug said an election would be rolling the dice.

"You're not sure how taxpayers would react to that. The disappointing piece is that the people in Des Moines don't consider this an essential service."

Fedler said the county had to move in a direction that is best for all county residents.

"Just like any other decision, people agree with us and people disagree with us. I try to do what I feel is best for the entire county and that's all we can do," Fedler said.

Supervisor Gary Folluo said he still believed the coun-

ty voters should have a say in the direction the county takes.

Fraise said county staff, including herself, will be meeting with Young Wednesday to get a closer look at the company's financials, to start getting some figures together on what it will cost the county to run the service.

In other action, the board:

- approved 5-0 to enter an agreement to for watershed protection on Valley Road west of Keokuk near the Des Moines River. The county will pay the \$400,000 cost of the rehabilitation but will be reimbursed close to 80% from USDA dollars.
- approved sending letters of support to Southeast Iowa Regional Planning Commission and Southeastern Community College regarding a joint educational center in Lee County.

HTC girls give New London a run for 8 innings

WEST POINT – The Holy Trinity Catholic varsity softball team is getting closer and closer to their first win.

After falling to Danville 13-12 Thursday night, the Crusaders (0-4) lost a heartbreaker to New London at home Tuesday night 5-4 in eight innings.

Freshman Mary Hellige held the Tigers (4-2, 3-0) scoreless through four innings, but ran into a bit of trouble in the top of the fifth. After getting Clair Jones to pop out behind the plate and Sofie Reighard to fly out in the infield for two outs, Elly Manning lined a single to center and then advanced to second on an error on the play.

HTC Head Coach Loren Menke intentionally passed all-state senior Layney Lloyd and then senior Kara Krieger ripped a two-run triple to left center. Ashlyn McSorley followed up with a single to score Krieger. Hellige would get Mariah Hartrick to strike out to end the inning two hitters later.

Neither team would score in the sixth inning, but New London would put up an insurance run in the top of the seventh, when Lloyd pushed a triple passed Jenna DiPrima in right field and came around to score on Krieger's squeeze bunt.

The Crusaders would get out of the inning when McSorley would pop out to first with Krieger running on the pitch and Rachel Menke was able to double her off at first.

HTC responded in the bottom of the seventh to send it into extra innings.

DiPrima led things off with a single that went off the glove of pitcher Elly Manning and dribbled into left field. After Raquel Schneider popped out to first, Anna Sobczak took a pitch off her foot moving DiPrima to second. Brooke Mueller would then send a drive into center that wasn't deep enough to advance any runners.

With two outs, Haile Cain singled just past McSorley at shortstop moving everyone up a base. Mary Hellige worked an 0-2 count for a walk to score DiPrima and then Kayla Box got down 0-2 and worked a 13 pitch at-bat for another walk to score Sobczak. Laura Mehmert would line out to second to end the inning with the bases loaded to force an eighth inning.

Menke said it was at-bats like Hellige's and Box's in the seventh inning with the game on the line that shows the girls are gaining confidence.

"Those were quality at bats. When you see them up there having an at-bat like that, it makes you feel really good. That's tough to do for freshmen in that situation," he said.

"And we're not striking out a lot. We're getting quality at bats and tonight we played a lot better defense than we have. You start putting those together and good things can happen."

Hartrick led off with a single to right and moved to second on a throwing error on the play. Sophie Malott moved her to third on a ground out to short. Hellige would get Jones to fan for the second out, and then Sophie Reighard hit a line drive right at Hellige that went off her glove and trickled over second base to score Hartrick. Manning would ground out to Box at third to end in the inning.

DiPrima reached in the bottom of the eighth with a one-out single to right-center, but was forced at second on a rare fielder's choice from right field off Raquel Schneider's bat. Sobczak would ground out to short to end the game.

Hellige again went the distance for Holy Trinity throwing 109 pitches and getting four strike outs against three walks. She gave up 10 hits and five runs in the loss.

"Mary is learning to pitch at the varsity level," Menke said.

"She's seen nothing but junior high and jayvee batters. She knows she's not going to blow it by them, but she's learning how to pitch against varsity batters and it's making a big difference."

Elly Manning picked up the win for the Lady Tigers coming in in the bottom of the third and scattering three hits, while fanning three and walking three.

The Crusaders chased started Sophie Malott after two with New London down 2-0.

Schneider and DiPrima led the Crusaders at the plate with two hits each. Schneider had a double and single and an RBI. Mehmert, Mueller and Cain had the other hits for Holy Trinity.

The Crusaders take on powerhouse Louisa-Muscatine at home Wednesday with a junior varsity/varsity set starting at 5:30 p.m.

Reynolds says Iowans need to be personally responsible

Reynolds, along with Lt. Gov. Adam Gregg, visited the Great River Health Test Clinic in West Burlington before heading to the Old Fort Diner for lunch, and then to Fort Madison City Hall.

She said the most recent data shows that Iowa has flattened the curve, moved through recovery, and is now in an economic growth phase.

"Our original goal was to flatten the curve, to protect vulnerable Iowans and manage our health care resources so we would flatten the curve and not overwhelm our healthcare system. And we have done that," she

Current data shows 166 Iowans hospitalized with the disease and a positivity test rate of 10% with a 5.6% rate on Monday, but she said testing is at record levels since the virus showed up in Iowa. Lee County currently has seen 44 positive tests and two deaths from the new

"We have significantly increased our testing ability with Test Iowa and now anybody who wants to get a test can test," she said.

The Test Iowa website at www.testiowa.com is still actively assessing Iowans and recommending testing locations by appointment.

But the governor said the state is also being proactive in watching for any spikes in numbers and will react aggressively to those clusters.

"Because of the testing we can monitor that and manage it, but people have to be personally responsible," she said.

"It's the same thing with the mask - it's not a mandate. But if you don't feel comfortable going out in public and you can't social distance, we would recommend a face covering. But that's a personal choice."

The state's role is also to educate Iowa communities, she said, as to where hot spots are occurring even down to a zipcode, so people can make the best decisions for themselves.

"You're starting to see more people gather and we're going to watch that closely and see what that looks like as we move forward," she said. "As we do see an uptick

in virus activity, we can proactively let the community know so, again, then they can figure out what they need to do to address it."

Michele Ross, Lee County Health Department administrator said she spoke with the governor about contact tracing. While a large part of the state is using the National Guard personnel to conduct investigations, Ross said LCHD is still using their own staff to monitor positive cases in Lee County.

"We talked about contact tracing and what kind of team I had in place and how that's going," Ross said. "And I talked about how great Lee County worked together to do mitigation, and how our businesses reopening did it correctly."

Reynolds said those kinds of stories are what gives her confidence to continue moving ahead with economic recovery.

"I'm really seeing some positive things take place across Iowa and that's why we can continue in a very safe and responsible manner to open back up and get our economy going and get Iowans' lives back to some normalcy."

Locking down the state has been hard on Iowans, Reynolds said, and that has to be taken into consideration as decisions are being made to open things back

She said people being afraid to go to the hospital, not


getting needed treatments, in addition to abuse and neglect, are all apart of being locked down.

"Child abuse numbers are down because we haven't had eyes on our kids," she said. "It's just been a perfect storm for some really bad things to happen. So you have to take that into consideration as we try get things back to normal."

PPE is still being delivered as the supply chain continues to open up. Reynolds said the goal is to regionally have 90 days worth of gloves, face shields, masks, and gowns on hand in the event the state would see an uptick in virus cases.

"We starting to see a lot of items we procured coming back in and we're seeing the supply chain open up. I think, with gowns, we're watching that and probably are still not where we want to be, but everything else were putting a 90-day stockpile in place."

The entourage moved from Fort Madison to Fairfield and Keota with stops scheduled in both communities on Tuesday.
