State prepping for vaccine

COVID: IDPH asks counties to review mass vaccination protocols

BY CHUCK VANDENBERG PCC EDITOR

LEE COUNTY – Lee County health officials are reviewing mass vaccination protocols and agreements, as part of a request from state health officials

On Wednesday Lee County Health Department Administrator Michele Ross wrote that the state is indicating a vaccine could be ready, in limited doses, by late fall 2020.

Ross, responding to an email from the Pen City Current, included a FAQ from the Iowa Department of Public Health that indicated the IDPH anticipates the vaccine will be first available in late fall of this year.

Ross wrote that Lee County Health Department is continuing to stay informed of the changing environment of the state's battle with the novel coronavirus, and COVID-19 including reviewing local strategies.

"LCHD continues to participate in scheduled state webinars, and the state has asked all local public health departments to begin preparing on a local level based on vaccination planning assumptions," she wrote.

"This planning will include local public health reviewing and updating their mass vaccination or Points

I don't have COVID, but I am sick of it

The coronavirus has hit me. No I haven't tested positive, but the assault of data on my brain has left me sleepy, nauseous, and irritable. Like we needed something else to irritate me.

But it does. It irritates me that we can't count on the numbers out of the state, and I believe that's intentional.

A bit pessimistic – maybe. Conspiracy theorist...? Ok.

But spend some time reviewing <u>coronavirus.iowa.gov</u> for a while. And do it with this in mind. The state wants to show as positive a picture as possible, even when and if the numbers aren't positive.

We review the state's daily positive reporting for Lee County each day. We also get a 3:30 report from the Lee County Health Department each day. Because they are reported at different times, they don't match. LCHD reports positive cases from 3:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.

The state reports an ongoing number and then adjusts as they clean up data. So those numbers are never going to match making it difficult to see what is really happening day to day. And that's frustrating In late August, the LCHD decided to just use the state's Total Case count as of 3:30 p.m. for its daily report. If you take a look at a twoweek snap-shot of the LCHD numbers vs. IDPH numbers they're pretty close, but not the same. Area schools are seeing different

Man sought after stealing, crashing sheriff's cruiser

LEE COUNTY – An 18-year old man is being sought by local law enforcement after crashing a Hancock County sheriff's cruise and fleeing on foot in Keokuk.

Hancock County Sheriff, Scott Bentzinger reported that on Wednesday at about 11 p.m. a deputy stopped a car driven by Ethan Walte, near Broadway and 8th Street in Hamilton, Illinois.

Walte was arrested on a felony warrant from Iowa for Violation of Probation for Burglary.

According to Bentzinger Walte was handcuffed behind his back and placed inside the deputy's patrol vehicle. While the deputy was securing Walte's vehicle, Walte was able to get his handcuffed hands in front of his body and climb through the security partition in the patrol vehicle.

Walte then allegedly fled the scene driving the deputy's patrol vehicle. The deputy attempted to get Walte out of the driver's seat as he sped off but the deputy





THE CODE OF ORDI-NANCES OF THE CITY OF FORT MADISON, IOWA, CONCERNING **RESIDENCY REQUIRE-**MENTS

Whereas, there is a continuing need to attract quality personnel to work for city government in Fort Madison; and

Whereas, the current residency requirements are too restrictive to meet the hiring needs of the City;

SECTION 1. The City Council of the City of Fort Madison hereby amends Title 1, Administration, Chapter 13, Employees; Benefits, Regulations and Residence Requirements; Section 3, Residence Requirements of the Municipal Code of Fort Madison, as follows:

1-13-3: RESIDENCE **REQUIREMENTS:**

City employees must be residents of the state of lowa at the time employment with the city begins and shall remain lowa residents during employment.

City employees must reside within the number of air miles of the city limits as specified by the written policies of their department heads, as approved by the city manager, but not to exceed twenty (20) air miles of the city limits. Banged up Hawks looking for first win at Mid-Prairie Friday

DONNELLSON - With Head Coach Chuck Banks still sidelined, and senior quarterback Dylan Stuecker hobbled with a deep bone bruise, the Central Lee Hawks will have their work cut out for them Friday at Mid-Prairie.

Throw in some forecast wet stuff and things could get even worse, but Banks said you never know what can happen in the mud.

The Hawks (0-2) are coming off a 40-21 loss at Van Buren last week and lost a nail-biter in the week 1 home opener to Pekin.

But the offense has been productive and Washington state transplant Jaedon Betker has made a name for himself on both sides of the line.

Betker has 130 yards on 30 carries and a TD this year from the running back spot, but the senior has also gobbled up 25 tackles, 18 solo, two for losses and a sack in just two games. The 25 tackles is tops in the state in Class 2A.

Banks said Betker may need some help against Mid Prairie on Friday. The Hawks run a three-back, double tight end set to free up ground yards.

"We're gonna put in a

different defensive scheme that may suit us a little better against their run," Banks said Thursday.

"The 5-2 we started with doesn't look, with our personnel, like it's beneficial for us. We'll move some kids into different sports and see how we go. We're in the right spots, we're just not tackling as well as we should be."

Banks said Friday will be a bend-don't break night for his Hawks' defense against a big front from Mid-Prairie.

"I sound like a broken record, but you have to be bend-don't-break on defense and limit turnovers. We're coming into this game setting our sights on getting better, but it's gonna be another slugfest."

One of the other bright spots for the Hawks has been the play of first year wideout Kade Myhre. The senior has four receiving touchdowns, tied for second in the state in Class 2A, and 158 yards through the air.

"Kade is just a breath of fresh air. He comes and works hard every day. He's a leader both on and off the field," Banks said. "Having that positivity and showing that kind of leadership stepping in year one – we just have a lot of kids that have been playing looking up to him."

Myhre is averaging a

whopping 26.3 yards per catch including an 87-yard catch and score from Mason Schau on Friday. Schau stepped in for Stuecker who suffered an injury on a play in the second half. Stuecker was 13-26 for 79 yards and a score before leaving.

Banks said he will probably hold Stuecker out Friday to allow him to heal up for Davis County next week.

Mid-Prairie comes into the contest 0-1 after losing to Sigourney-Keota last week.

Quarterback Vinnie Bowlin, a senior, threw for 238 yards and a touchdown, but was picked off a couple times. Senior Kayden Reinier had a productive day out of the backfield with two scores on 134 yards, averaging 6.1 yards per carry.

Senior Keegan Gingerich has 116 yards and a touchdown. The longest coming on a 61-yard hookup with Bowlin in the fourth quarter of the 27-21 loss at Mid-Prairie.

Banks said rain is in the forecast, but the Hawks will stick to what's working for them.

"You still run your routes, and your receivers still have to catch the ball. A lot of people would say that negates your plan, but I've seen spread teams get into the mud and have some success," Banks said.

Instead, Fort Madison started its season against one of the best teams in the state, and with two ranked teams looming this weekend in the Linn-Mar Invitational and a match against No. 1 (Class 1A) Holy Trinity set for next Monday, well, welcome to the 2020 season.

"That's what I told the team, 'Hey, at least we got to play," Fort Madison coach Kent Bailey said. "It's been different, with everything that's happened. We really wanted to play tonight."

The Bloodhounds had early leads in the first and third games, but the game before Fort Madison closed to within 12-8. Another four-point run gave the Tigers control again.

The Bloodhounds, trying to stay alive, led 5-4 in the third game, but the Tigers would score nine of the next points. Fort Madison will play No. 9 (Class 2A) Sumner-Fredericksburg, No. 6 (Class 5A) Pleasant Valley and Center Point-Urbana in Saturday's Linn-Mar Invitational.

"We're getting tested right off the bat," Bailey said.

But at least the season has started.

numbers with Central Lee High School reverting to a hybrid model last week for two weeks because of spike in positive cases there. All while the 14-day positivity rate continues to drop in the Lee County

Maybe using that rate as the benchmark for state education officials is a bad idea. Maybe they should rely on local school reporting to determine what needs are there.

Dr. Erin Slater and Dr. Andy Crozier know what's going on in their respective districts. Crozier didn't use state numbers to make the decision to go to hybrid learning last week, he used internal data to make that decision.

That's good. We have to look to leadership for guidance, but it's comforting to see that at the end of the day, locally we're doing what's best for our kids.



State planning for fall release of vaccine

of Dispensing (POD) plans as well as closed POD plans (agreements in place with health care organizations who could dispense vaccines once state or federal assets are received). We will be looking at our vaccine storage and handling capacities, temperature monitoring protocols and devices, ancillary supply needs, and updating our mass vaccinations or POD plans."

"In summary, we have been asked to begin preliminary local planning with our health care partners for when COVID-19 vaccines are available and ready to administer."

According to the FAQ, IDPH officials indicated that early results from the first COVID-19 vaccine tests in people show it worked as intended with no serious side effects.

Initially, supply issues may limit doses to certain priority groups such as health care workers, residents of long-term care centers and assisted living, and those who work in industries where social distancing is difficult.

The supply is expected to expand substantially in 2021 to the point where eventually anyone who wants the vaccine can receive it.

The state is also anticipating that the vaccine will be offered at no cost, although providers may charge a small fee to individuals or health insurance companies for administering the vaccine.

Vaccines contain the sames germs that cause disease, but in a weakened or dead state so they don't make you sick, according to the IDPH.

But even after being vaccinated the state is encouraging individuals to continue to wear a mask because of the time required for the vaccine to affect a body to produce antibodies. In some cases, COVID-19 may require two doses to provide the best protection.
