Bad R'app: Local precinct chair says reporting app worked for her

LEE COUNTY – The nation waited close to 21 hours to hear any results from Monday's first-in-the-nation presidential contest in Iowa.

A coding glitch and user-error in an app called IowaReporterApp, created by Shadow Inc, and a phone bank backlog, wreaked havoc on most Iowa caucus reporting and has a created a nationwide raised eyebrow as to Iowa's place at the front of race.

Iowa Democratic Party officials released 62% of the state's results at about 3:45 p.m. Central time Tuesday. The move has failed to produce a projected winner, but Iowa caucuses technically aren't about a winner, but how delegate equivalents will be divvied up.

Iowa Democratic Party officials were hoping to have the rest of the results posted on Tuesday, but didn't guarantee anything.

Officially, South Bend Mayor Pete Buttigieg is leading the state with more than a third yet to report. Buttigieg had 363 delegate equivalents to Vermont Sen. Bernie Sanders' 338. Massachusetts Sen. Elizabeth Warren had 246, while former Vice President Joe Biden currently sits at 210.

Minnesota Sen. Amy Klobuchar garnered 164, which would be considered a better showing than anticipated.

In Lee County, 15 of the 19 precinct results were reported in the 3:45 p.m. release. Of those precincts, with only 21% yet to report, Buttigieg had 560 votes. Biden was second in Lee County with 364, followed by Sanders with 350, and Warren with 126. Klobuchar had 84 and entrepreneur Andrew Yang finished with 56. It is unclear

at this point if the satellite voting is included in those tallies.

The top three in final alignment preferences in the county were Buttigieg with 306, Biden with 211, and Sanders with 194.

Lee County has 150 delegates to allocate to the county convention and 21 state delegate equivalents.

Several county precinct chairs struggled to get numbers into the state and some waited as long as two hours on hold to report numbers when the app either failed or encountered issues.

But Fort Madison Precinct 1 Chair Rebecca Bowker said the app worked great and she was done in a matter of minutes. Bowker's precinct results are part of the 62% released.

"I think the app is getting a bad rap," she wrote in a text to the Pen City Current.

Recorder presses for security fix

MONTROSE – Lee County Recorder Nancy Booten wants the county supervisors to do something about security in Fort Madison.

And she wants it now.

After Tuesday's regular Lee County Board of Supervisors meeting, Booten told supervisors that in addition to her department holding active attacker training last week, police chased two men from the building Monday.

She said her staff is understandably concerned about their safety.

"We've heard for years, 'let's do something about safety', 'what's a life worth'. Well they don't feel like they're worth anything. They really don't because nothing's been done," Booten said.

She said recently there were two customers that had made the staff nervous and warranted a call to law enforcement. After investigating footage it was determined the two had

Police chase two from North Lee County offices Monday

arrest records and were later arrested for theft the same evening they were in the North Lee County offices.

Booten said her department is first in the door and the height of the counter makes her staff and herself very susceptible to harm if something were to happen.

"You hear all the time it can't happen here... we heard it can't happen here, well it happened at (Scotts)," She said. "We want something done. We want a door and some teller windows."

She said she didn't think it was very expensive for the improvements, and anything that could cause a delay to someone who wants to do harm could save a life.

Booten said the south Lee County offices were given security upgrades but nothing has happened in North Lee County aside from some occassional deputy presence.

"The state doesn't give us a dime, but we're protecting them. Our staff doesn't feel like we're protecting us," she said.

"If I have to take it out of my budget, since we're talking about budgets... whatever. I just think we need to do something and we need to do it now."

Supervisor Gary Folluo said there should be a hallway at North Lee County similar to what Keokuk has.

"And you should be behind a wall of glass," Folluo said.

Supervisor Matt Pflug said Booten was making valid points.

"The state doesn't give us anything and, again, we kick this can around a lot. I know it all takes money but

it's a life," Pflug said. "We have to do something, you're exactly right."

Booten said she's just looking for an additional two feet of protection across the counter. Folluo said that should go the full length of all the counters in the building.

Booten said Fort Madison police came in Monday and the two gentleman were there again and got a license, but police warned them not to come in again unless they had business there.

"Apparently, they were searching for these guys, again for another charge, because they ran out the back door and the police ran after them," Booten said.

Supervisor Ron Fedler said maybe the two did the county a favor because now they can take action.

Lee County Conservation Director Nathan Unsworth said it's not just the county building.

"Every office has challenges, right?. We have people that get out of jail, walk down the highway and stop in our office. That's happened several times and motorists come in off the road to get help," Unsworth said.

"It's a problem. I don't know if you can do everything to stop it."

Booten said she understands that and is just looking for something to delay someone from doing harm.

"I think we're all guilty of talking about it and talking about it and not taking any action," Pflug said.

Board Chair Ron Fedler said it's time to take action and instructed Booten to work with county maintenance to see what the costs look like and bring it back to the board.

SCC's nursing grads outpace national exam standards

Crusaders erase 16-point deficit, come up short

FORT MADISON – Slow starts have been a problem at times for the Holy Trinity boys basketball team.

It was a big problem for the Crusaders in Tuesday's 49-42 loss to West Burlington.

Holy Trinity trailed 19-3 in the first quarter, and was behind by 16 points at the end of the third quarter, and still had a chance to tie the game in the closing seconds.

Jason Thurman, who had hit three 3-pointers to lead the fourth-quarter comeback, missed an open three from the right corner with 30 seconds left as the Crusaders trailed 45-42.

"It's kind of been the story of the season," Holy Trinity coach John Hellige said.

"If we can get out of the gate a little better there, it's maybe a different outcome."

The Crusaders outscored West Burlington 18-5 in the first seven minutes of the fourth quarter, getting to within 45-42 on a 3-pointer from Chandler Rung. But every time Holy Trinity had a chance to cut into the lead, the Falcons would get the ball right back.

"All those little possessions here, possessions there, they add up," Hellige said.

"These kids have a lot of fortitude. They have no quit."

Quentin Schneider had 11 points to lead Holy Trinity. Thurman had nine, and Vasin Thurman added seven. Holy Trinity had just three first-quarter points — a layup from Rung with 3:50 left, and a free throw from Vasin Thurman with 10 seconds left.

Holy Trinity had a 10-3 run to get within single digits before West Burlington scored the last four points in the final minute.

It was another climb the Crusaders have faced this season

"That was the challenge after the game," Hellige said. "What do we have to do before the game to be the aggressor, and not have to chase people for 3 ½ quarters?"

The Crusaders are 6-12 on the year and travel to Cardinal on Thursday night.







State still 28% short in precinct results

"I downloaded it prior to last night. The app itself was extremely friendly. However, there were some authentication steps that, if not followed, could have made it difficult for some users."

But Fort Madison Precinct 2 chair Bob Morawitz wasn't able to have his results received via the backup phone in system until approximately 11:30 p.m. The caucus ended at Lincoln Elementary at 8:30 p.m.

Lee County Chair
Mary Jo Riesberg was
the precinct chair in
Keokuk's Precinct 3 and
finally got her votes
entered at about 11:15
p.m. At 10:05 p.m.
Monday, Riesberg had
been on hold for over an
hour.

"I'd say the caucus itself was well-planned. The reporting system is the issue," she wrote in a text Monday night. She couldn't speak via phone due to being on hold with IDP officials. Riesberg said she

assumed the state ran some kind of a test, but users had varying degrees of difficulty downloading it.

"If we were successful with the download, there were problems signing in. So for the users, there wasn't the type of preview you usually have with a reporting app," she said.

"I know one person in Lee County used it with success. Maybe more, but I only know of one."

IDP officials released several statements throughout the day about the process and what the nation could expect.

"Today we informed campaigns that we will be releasing the majority of caucus results at 4 p.m. CST. Moving forward — just like we would have on caucus night — we will continue to release results as we are able to. We are also executing our plans and procedures to gather the paper documents and chasing any additional precincts to report results as we normally would on caucus night," wrote IDP Communications Director Mandy McClure Tuesday afternoon.

Troy Price, the IDP chairman, tried to explain some of the issues with a statement just after 8 a.m. Tuesday.

"We have every indication that our systems were secure and there was not a cyber security intrusion. In preparation for the caucuses, our systems were tested by independent cybersecurity consultants," Price wrote.

"As precinct caucus results started coming in, the IDP ran them through an accuracy and quality check. It became clear that there were inconsistencies with the reports. The underlying cause of these inconsistencies was not immediately clear, and required investigation, which took time

"As this investigation unfolded, IDP staff activated pre-planned backup measures and entered data manually. This took longer than expected.

"As part of our investigation, we determined with certainty that the underlying data collected via the app was sound. While the app was recording data accurately, it was reporting out only partial data. We have determined that this was due to a coding issue in the reporting system. This issue was identified and fixed. The application's reporting issue did not impact the ability of precinct chairs to report data accurately.

"While our plan is to release results as soon as possible today, our ultimate goal is to ensure that the integrity and accuracy of the process continues to be upheld."
