HEALTH NEWS FMCH puts on restrictions at Birthplace

FORT MADISON – Fort Madison Community Hospital is closely monitoring the progression of influenza in the community. The Iowa Department of Public Health has declared the influenza virus as widespread for Southeast Iowa. Therefore, the decision has been made to implement visitation restrictions in the FMCH Birthplace and postpartum suites.

Birthplace visitors are limited to Coach or significant other,

immediate grandparents who do not display any flu like symptoms, and siblings that are 72 hours symptom free, to include: no fever, cough, diarrhea, vomiting, rash, or persistent runny nose

This restriction will last until the time that the threat of increased exposure has passed.

The staff of the Birthplace understands having a new baby

FCC's rural broadband effort a good next step

We've been keeping a close eye on what is happening with rural broadband service in Lee County.

We started reporting on it close to a year ago, when state legislators and economic development officials began barking that current Lee County maps were inaccurate and what is called "census block data" wasn't providing a clear picture of the real service levels in our rural areas.

On Friday, the FCC firmed up a commitment to put \$20.4 billion, into a Rural Digital Opportunity fund to help address some of the issues facing poor broadband service in rural parts of America.

Our look into rural broadband has revealed a couple basic points. Number 1, the current mapping system based on what's called a Form 477, does not paint a clear picture of rural Internet service in America, specifically the tri-state area and Lee County. No. 2, we're all going to pay to fund rural broadband improvements.

And we should. It's an economic development must, like natural gas, rail access, river access and other things that make this area an attractive location for business and industry looking for new locations. The 477 form is based on information provided by Internet Service Providers that indicates a minimum level of service (minimum meaning a minimal level of download/upload speeds) in any particular polygonal census block. But the punch there typically lies in the fact that one building, say a school, could

have minimum-service, or better, and the ISPs report that "census block" which obviously includes more than just the school, has a certain level of service. But the home 1/4 mile down the road from the school may have reduced service or no service at all.

Under pressure from legislators, service providers and the public, the Federal Communication Commission created the Digital Opportunity Data Collection on Aug. 1 to help formulate a more accurate, or "granular" look at rural broadband access. The new rule from the FCC also creates a public input model to verify accuracy. The FCC said during commission hearings that Form 477 would still remain in use for now.

According to the FCC report of Aug. 1, the commission will limit the new data collection obligations to fixed broadband providers at present, and seek comment on how best to incorporate mobile wireless coverage data into the Digital Opportunity Data Collection.

A second notice from the FCC in that report focuses on the data collection from satellite broadband services, as well as providing an avenue for specific homes and business that do not have broadband service at some level.

The commission in August directed the following groups, the Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC), under the oversight of the Commission's Office of Economics and Analytics (OEA), the Wireline Competition Bureau (WCB), Wireless Telecommunications Bureau (WTB), and the International Bureau (IB) to develop a new portal to accept broadband coverage maps, called polygons from fixed providers, as well as public feedback on the accuracy of these broadband maps.

The public feedback, it seems, is going to be collected through a system called "crowdsourcing".

The irony seems to be that 'crowdsourcing" is usu-



ally done via the Internet. So that would mean rural homeowners would have to go somewhere else to access Internet service to alert the collection service as to their poor level of service.

Guess it's back to restaurants and libraries for free wife access, but it may be worth doing. According to the report, the FCC has a consumer complaints division, and they are directing USAC to come up with a tracking method for inaccurate data.

The news is good. We've had conversations with ISP providers, economic development officials and legislators and all have said this won't be a quick fix. But because conversations are taking place, a bright light is being shined on the issue. Throughout history, that's how progress has been made.

Providers say they can't make sense of investing millions in fiber optic cable to connect every home in every county in their service areas. When you think of what the average homeowner pays for Internet service at their homes, and what it would cost to physically run rural cabling to catch homes that are sometimes miles apart, they have a point.

So they turn to the government to help subsidize the connections. Without the government's help the market will determine when and if rural customers get better service. And that's a bleak picture to be sure. Getting your hands on a piece of the \$20.4 billion will be left to the providers in what's called a "reverse auction" where providers can show where they can best provide additional service for the least amount of money. A timeline hasn't been set on when that money can or will be disbursed.

But it's big news for rural Iowans. Something's being done. We hear stories of parents having to take their children into places like McDonald's to do homework because almost all is done through laptops even at the youngest grade levels. Poor internet speeds, or no service at all, handicaps those students and families.

That's sad because we live in country where everyone has access to utilities in their homes. The Internet is essentially a utility and it won't be long before it's a legal utility that has to be provided to every citizen.

Governmental agencies, schools, emergency responders.... everyone is using the Internet and those that don't have access are at a disadvantage.

A lot of the information coming out of the FCC is still being argued amongst commission members, but they're arguing as the walk down the road and not digging their heals in.

It's still going to take some time to connect all of America, it just gets more attention here in the rural areas, where people already feel left behind. The fact the wheels are turning, means energy toward that connection is being generated.

Speaking of the Internet at some point being classified as a consumer utility like gas and electric, newspapers of record need to be wary of that change because it's doubtful governmental agencies will be required to pay for legal ads when everyone can access them online. Newspapers make hundreds of thousands of dollars off legal advertising...and they're already bleeding ad revenue. But that's Beside the Point.

Junior scores 35 of Lady Hawks'46

FORT MADISON - Holy Trinity had no answer for Central Lee's Mya Merschman on Friday night.

The junior scored 35 of the Lady Hawks 46 points as Central Lee downed Holy Trinity 46-25 Friday night at Central Lee.

When Merschman hit 31 points an announcement was made that she had eclipsed 1,000 points in her three years playing for the Lady Hawks. A celebration is set for halftime of Tuesday's game against New London.

"I knew I was close but I didn't know if I was going to get it tonight or not," Merschman said. "But I really wanted to get there."

The Central Lee girls school record is 1,589 points, which seems quite a ways away, but

possible for her.

Merschman said it's something she's shooting for.

She's average of about 26 points per outing with a season and half left, barring any setbacks she could get close.

Most of Merschman's points came inside the lane as Holy Trinity couldn't move with her regular two-step cross in the lane. She was 16-28 from the field and went 3-of-4 at the free throw line.

But she said her team-

mates are making things blocks.

"The passes were really good tonight so that allowed me get me the points. My teammates have always helped me out a lot."

Holy Trinity got behind early in the first quarter 6-0 before sophomore Kassi Randolph got the Crusaders on the board with a bucket underneath. It would be one of the few times HTC would score in the lane as Central Lee

packed the defense at the

So HTC head coach Tony Johnson moved to a perimeter game, but the lid was on for sure as the Crusaders shot just 3 of 11 in the first quarter. A 3-ball by Ashlyn Haas at the buzzer cut the lead to 8-10, with Merschman scoring all Central Lee's points.

The Lady Hawks wouldn't get a bucket from any other player until the 4:25 mark of the second period

Central Lee would then go cold out of the halftime break missing their first seven shots from the field before Daly Brisby put in a 3-pointer with 3:38 left in the third. Holy Trinity would only manage a free throw during the stretch, and found themselves in a hole they couldn't recover from down 27-13.

Junior Bailey Hellweg would bang in a couple 3-pointers down the stretch but HTC would only get as close as 12 the rest of the way.

Head Coach Tony Johnson said it wasn't a matter of not getting open looks, but the Lady Crusaders couldn't find the range. And with Central Lee forcing HTC to shoot from outside by keeping the post clogged

shoot more so I wasn't going to rein them back.

"If it's not inside you have to be able to make them from outside, but if they're playing a packline defense, your not going to get anything inside."

Hellweg led the Crusaders with six points on the night, followed by Randolph with five, Pothitakis four, Haas three and Brooke Mueller added a bucket.

Still not too late for flu shot

is an enjoyable and rewarding time that everyone wants to share in but the safety and health of both the mother and infant are our top priorities. FMCH team members are following the CDC's guidelines, as well as the FMCH infection control procedures to help protect our patients, employees and hospital visitors.

In addition, we ask that all visitors to FMCH help us limit the spread of the influenza virus by adhering to the following recommendation:

If you are experiencing any of the symptoms of the flu including: fever, cough, sore throat, diarrhea, vomiting, body aches, runny or stuffy nose we ask that you refrain from visiting both inpatient and outpatient surgery areas of the hospital.

People who have influenza can be contagious beginning one day before symptoms develop and up to five to seven days after becoming sick. Some people, especially young children and people with weakened immune systems, might be able to infect others for an even longer time.

Most importantly, the hospital is working to educate the community about ways to prevent the spread of influenza and other viruses. These measures can help prevent spreading the illness:

Wash your hands frequently with soap and water; if soap and water are not available use an alcohol based hand sanitizer.

Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze and throw the tissue in the trash after you use it and then sanitize your hands; or cough and sneeze into your elbow if a tissue is not available.

Avoid close contact with sick people. Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth, as germs spread this way.

If you get sick with influenza, stay home from work or school and limit close contact with others to help prevent the spread of flu.

If you are sick, stay home for at least 24 hours after your fever is gone.

And remember it is not too late to get a flu shot!

Fort Madison Community Hospital is concerned about the health of the community and want to do their part to protect everyone from the spread of flu viruses during this time of heightened awareness.

better off—Spell Check is a game changer.

When I asked Ginnie if she had some thank you notes I could use, her eyes lit up. Of course she had thank you notes, boxes of them! That's what women do. I soon had a box of thank you notes sitting on my desk ready for me to reveal my inner most thoughts. Ugh. It was the first of December. Note one: my hand shook so badly, I threw the first two attempts away. Should I print so people can read my writing, or use cursive? It's called "cursive" for a reason—I curse while performing it.

I won't tell you who I wrote my first thank you note to. All I'll reveal is that I wrote out (scribbled) what I should have said to the person anyway. I was sweating in the armpits and it was a cooling relief to walk out to the mailbox in the December breeze to post it. The second thank you note was a little easier.

One immediate reward of the daily thank you notes is that Ginnie and I now know if the mail has arrived. Our mail box is at the end of our driveway, and it's a little bit of a chore walking out to get the mail, especially in inclement weather. If it's not there, it's a wasted trip, and we got wet for nothing. We've been trying to figure out a way to determine if the mail has arrived. Mohrfeld helps lead BHS to dual win Thursday

BURLINGTON – The Grayhound swim team won 7 of 11 varsity events on Thursday enroute to a 114-45 win over Davenport West at the BHS pool.

Burlington finished one and two in the 200yard medley with Colby Geiger, Jordan Watznauer, Jacob Mohrfeld and Nathan Parks taking first with a time of 1:55.51, just .73 seconds in front of their teammates.

Nathan Parks won the 100 backstroke in 1:18.77 followed by the Grayhounds' Will Neises 1:21.96 and Neil Macomber 1:23.48.

The Hounds won the final varsity event, the 400-year freestyle relay with Cade Hillyer, Venvertloh, Parks and Welman anchoring in a time of 3:54.41. Watznauer, Matthew Smith, Rece Reiman and Macomber took 2nd at 4:09.54.
