DONNELSON MAN DROWNS

HOLIDAY TRAGEDY: Search divers locate body after recreational accident

SANDUSKY - The 4th of July holiday turned tragic for a Donnellman and his family as rescue crews discovered the the man's body in the Mississippi River near Sandusky early Saturday evening.

According to a release from Lee County Sheriff Stacy Weber, Lee County Sheriff's Office was called to assist with locating a missing person named Devyn Michael Broeker, age 24, of Donnellson, Iowa.

Broeker was last seen by witnesses as he was riding seated on a pull behind flotation device on the Mississippi River

near the Sandusky sand bar in an area near the 3400 block River Road. Witnesses called in the report to LeeComm at 5:45 p.m.

Deputies of the Lee County Sheriff's Office Dive Team were summoned to the area after State Department of Natural Resources officers located a suspected body using side scanning sonar.

With the assistance of the Fort Madison Fire & Rescue, Keokuk Fire & Rescue, and the Keokuk Volunteer Emergency Corps; a search resulted in the discovery and recovery of

Wever man killed in DM accident

DES MOINES - An early Saturday morning vehicle crash in Des Moines has taken the life of a Wever man.

Lee County officials confirmed Saturday that one of four people killed in the fiery collision southwest of the Des Moines airport was from Wever.

Des Moines Police, as of Monday at noon had not released the names of the victims pending notification of family, but asked Lee County Sheriff's office to help contact the man's family.

According to a release from the Des Moines Police, at approximately 2:25 a.m., Des Moines Police Department patrol officers and Des Moines Fire Department rescue personnel responded to investigate a report of a single-vehicle crash in the 4200 block of George Flag Parkway.

The crashed vehicle, with multiple occupants, had caught on fire. A Des Moines Police Department police officer was the first on the scene and was able to rescue one person from the vehicle. Four other occupants were killed in the crash.

Those killed in the crash are the 22-year-old driver, a 22-year-old passenger, 23-year-old passenger, and a 24-year-old passenger. All are male.

The passenger rescued from the vehicle is a 22-year-old female. She remains hospitalized in serious condition.

According to the release, preliminary examination of evidence at the scene indicates that the 2013 Volkswagen Golf was being driven westbound on George Flag Parkway when it left the roadway to the north. The vehicle returned to the roadway, crossing the eastbound lanes and then leaving the roadway to the south. It stopped as it struck a tree. The vehicle then caught fire. Excessive speed and failure to maintain control appear to be significant contributing factors to the crash.

Additional information will be shared as it becomes available to release

The Des Moines Police Department Traffic Unit is investigating this crash.

Victor farmer turned sculptor is lesson in adaptation

With commodity and livestock prices being what they are, many farmers are looking at alternative crops as a possible solution for soft markets. Hemp, aronia berries, and different cover crops are being experimented with. One farm family, Randy Schnebbe and his wife AJ (Amy Jo), south of Victor, turned to art. Most farmers are jacks-of-all-trades (and masters of none). They know how to weld, and make

things with their hands using what they have. Most farms also have junk iron scattered around, and even a rock pile or two,

What if?

For the Schnebbs, on their 300 acre family farm, it was "get big or get out." He had to do something "to support my farming habit." The Schnebbs were operating a business, Amish Creations in Victor, selling indoor and outdoor Amish furniture. Along with the outdoor furni-

Farmer's sculptures are now part of others' legacies

ture, they added a line of Mexican yard art. But a lot of the yard art was cheaply made, and Randy would have to re-weld or repair it. He told AJ, "You know, I can do better than this."

"Go ahead," she said. "Do something, even if it's wrong."

At one of the outdoor shows they attended, Randy and AJ met a man from Oklahoma who made yard art. He showed Randy a few tricks of the trade. Randy and AJ were off and running.

One of their first purchases was a plasma cutter and table for \$21,000. It was a huge investment, but compared to a tractor or combine—small potatoes. They also licensed their business, RS Welding Studio, with the University of Iowa, Iowa State, Drake, UNI, and Kansas State University (where AJ graduated), so they can legally make the universities' logos, emblems and nick-knacks.

The rest is history. They never dreamed their business could do so well. Randy is the artist, AJ is the detail person and business head. They're a great team. On any given weekend they are off separately in a truck pulling a trailer to lawn and garden shows in Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois and Nebraska. Their biggest market is the Farmers Market in downtown Des Moines, which is the second largest Farmers Market in the country. Their iron art is all over the United States and the world. Check out their website at www.rsweldingstudio.com.

Some of their main products are critters made with rocks and iron, like rock ants, and rock caterpillars. Seasonally, people go nuts for winter ball ornaments that they can decorate themselves at the point of purchase. During Randy and AJ's first year of making the winter ball ornaments they sold 700 and thought they had pretty well saturated the market. However, the second year it was 1,800, and the third year 2,900. They have three people working part time, and crews that go with them to shows.

That's the small art. For the big sculptures, Randy is in his element. He

built a seven foot tall, very detailed, corn plant out of rebar for Congressman Rod Blum. Blum is no longer in office but he left the metal corn plant for his successor. One day Randy was watching television and saw a senator giving a speech in front of the corn plant. Sweet! He was Iowa proud!

The employees of Metal Craft in Mayville, Wisconsin commissioned Randy to build a huge metal Legacy Tree as a gift to the owner of the company. It took Randy nine months to fabricate, but the employees and owner loved it. On each leaf is a word the employees used to describe the owner--"kind" "friendly" "Godly" etc. The Legacy Tree is Randy's proudest accomplishment.

He also made a 10 foot tall cross out of rebar for a church in Williamsburg. It is so stunning, Randy wants to make another one for his own grave marker when he passes away (which won't be for quite awhile).

RS Welding Studio is located a mile north of I-80 at exit 205. You can't miss it. There's a huge spider in the front yard made from a boulder for the body and, of course, rebar for the legs. When we spotted the spider, we did a u-turn and that's how Ginnie and I met Randy and AJ Schnebke.

Central Lee boys blow out Louisa-Muscatine

LETTS - The Central Lee baseball team made easy work of a pre-4th of July holiday matchup with Louisa-Muscatine on Friday night on the road.

Adam Boeck and TJ Stutes each had three hits in the win. Stutes went 3-for-5 with a double, 3 RBI and two runs scored to lead the Hawks. Boeck was 3-for-3 with a double, RBI and a run scored for Central Lee.

Alex Sandoval, Luke Simmons, Kody Sapp and Jadon Hawk also had hits for the Hawks.

Stutes went four innings in the win without giving up a run. He surrendered three hits and a walk while fanning six. Hawk pitched an inning in relief giving up one run on one hit while striking out three and walking one. Kade Myhre also threw an inning striking out one.

With Central Lee up 7-1 after five innings, the Hawks went to work at the plate to double their runs in the top of the sixth and force a 10-run rule. Central Lee would retire L-M in order after in an infield error put a runner on in the bottom of the sixth.

Dylan Stueker opened the top of the sixth with a walk. After a Hawk strikeout, Simmons and Boeck drew back-to-back walks, but Taylor Eschman, cour-



tesy running for Simmons got caught stealing second for the second out. Evan Pohren then got plunked to load the bases with one out and Boeck and Stueker at second and third.

Sandoval singled on a bloop single near short scoring Boeck to make it 9-1. Pohren would come around to score on a passed ball and Sandoval would move up on a wild pitch before Jonny Snider drew a walk to load the bases again.

Sandoval and Snider would execute a double steal scoring Sandoval and the Stutes would line a two-run double to left scoring Snider and Myhre for 13-1 lead.

Kody Sapp would then keep the hits coming with an RBI single. Hawk would single and another walk would

load the bases again still with two outs, but a fly out in foul territory would end the scoring.

Simmons would start the scoring in the first for Centra Lee with an RBI single to right. Eschman would score on an error at second by L-M.

Louisa-Muscatine would get its only run in the bottom of the first with an RIB single, but that's all the offense the Falcons would muster.

The Haws would plate three more in the top of the second. Stutes, Stueker and Hawk would all record RBIs in the inning. Boeck and Simmons would have RBIs in the fourth to make it a 7-1 game.

Central Lee takes on Cardinal finish the regular season with three homes games this week. On Monday they take on Cardinal, followed by a key Superconference matchup with Notre Dame at home Tuesday and then a wrap on Wednesday against Keokuk.

Class 2A District 10 action kicks off on July 14 when the Hawks, who got a first round bye on July 11, take on the winner of West Burlington and Van Buren in Central Lee at 7 p.m. The winner of that contest will face the bottom bracket winner out of L-M, Danville and Mediapolis (bye) for the district title and the right to go to substate against the winner of District 9.

Lady Hawks run into trouble with L-M Sanders sisters

Central Lee falls to 5-9 as Falcon pitchers hold Hawks to just four hits in 10-1 loss

DONNELLSON - The Lady Hawks managed just four hits off junior L-M's Kylee Sanders in 10-1 loss Friday night at home.

Sanders, and sister Hailey Sanders combined for a four-hit, seven-strikeout performance as Central Lee falls to 5-9 on the year. Louisa-Muscatine improves to 13-1 on

the season.

Halo Arrowood, Zoe Eschman, Meghan Hopp and Shanna Buford had the hits for Central Lee. Hope had the RBI when she drove in Daly Brisby, who had worked a two-out walk and advanced on a passed ball, with a double to right in the bottom half of one.

L-M started the game with two doubles and a single to take a 2-0

lead. Another one-out double by Beth Butler would score another run. A couple errors and a passed ball left the Lady Hawks looking up at a 6-0 lead after one.

The Falcon's Hailey Sanders would hit a one-out home run to left field off Central Lee's Sophie Turner to make it an 8-1 lead in the top of the fourth, but Turner would get two of the next three hitters to keep the Lady Hawks in it.

With the bases loaded in the top of the 7th and one out, McKenzie Kissell would ground into a fielder's choice scoring two. Kissell would get

caught stealing third for the third out.

But Central Lee would go down in order in the bottom of the seventh with Hailey Sanders on in relief for the 10-1 win.

The Lady Hawks host Cardinal (8-3) on Monday, then have a doubleheader with Keokuk on Tuesday before wrapping the regular season on Friday with a doubleheader at home against Fort Madison.

They tangle with West Burlington (8-2) in the Region 8 quarterfinals on July 15 beginning at 7 p.m. in West Burlington.

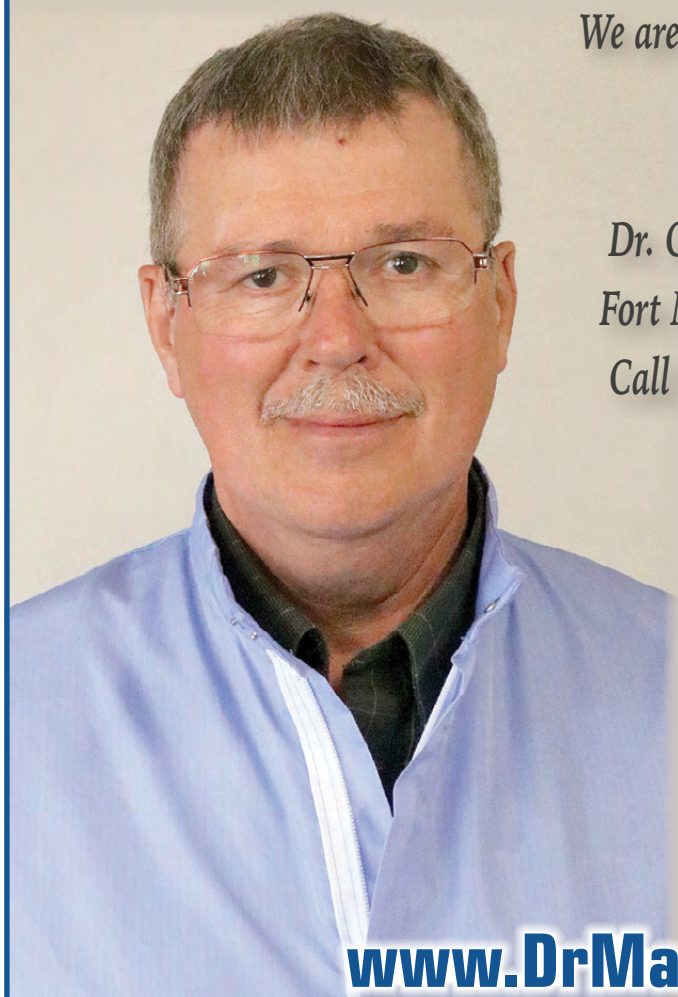

HTC girls 10-runned in five innings with Highland

RIVERSIDE - Anna Sobczak, Brooke Mueller and Jenna DiPrima all had hits for Holy Trinity in a 10-0 loss to Highland on Thursday night in Superconference, non-division match up.

Mary Hellige (1-8) went 4 2/3 innings giving up 12 hits and 10 runs, six earned on four strikeouts and no walks in the loss.

Kinze Hora hit a 2-1 pitch into right field to score two in the top of the fifth inning to invoke the 10-run rule with two outs.

Highland scored in every inning but the second, when Hellige gave a hit, followed by an infield error to put two on with no outs, but she got the next three hitters out to retire the side.

Sobczak would swipe second and Mary Hellige would reach on an error at first to put runners at the corners, but Hellige would get caught stealing second to end the inning.

Mueller would single hard to center to open the top of the fourth. Kayla Box would wear a pitch with one out and Haile Cain would work a walk to load the bases, but Batcheller would get the next two on swinging Ks to end the threat.

Iowa jobless claims jump 8,300 last week

DES MOINES - The number of initial claims in Iowa, filed between Sunday, June 21, and Saturday, June 27, was 8,300. There were 7,617 initial claims by individuals who work and live in Iowa, and 683 claims by individuals who work in Iowa and live in another state. The number of continuing weekly unemployment claims for June 21-27 was 143,488. The U.S. Department of Labor provided updates to last week's number of initial and continuing claims made between June 14-20, which amounts to 8,208 initial claims and 152,781 continuing claims. Iowa Workforce Development relies upon the weekly data released by the U.S. Department of Labor to report its numbers and as such, adopts the revisions to the previously published data.

Unemployment insurance benefit payments totaled \$34,453,854.94 for the week of June 21-27. The following industries had the most claims:

- Manufacturing (2,172)
- Industry Not Available - Self-employed, Independent Contractors, etc. (1,247)
- Health Care & Social Assistance (610)
- Accommodation & Food Services (501)
- Retail Trade (501)

A total of \$88,059,600 in Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation (FPUC) benefits was paid during the week of June 21-27, 2020. Since April 4, 2020, a total of \$1,143,712,800 in FPUC benefits has been paid.

A total of \$4,964,177.64 was paid in Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA) benefits during the week of June 21-27, 2020.

A total of \$3,628,157.42 in benefits has been paid in Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation (PEUC) benefits for the week of June 21-27, 2020. Since May 27, 2020, a total of \$21,870,640.39 in PEUC benefits have been paid.

Autopsy scheduled for Saturday drowning victim

Broeker's body. The body was transported to the dock nearby where the Lee County EMS Director and Medical Investigator Bill Young assisted with the investigation.

Broeker was transported to the Keokuk Area Hospital Morgue where he will stay until transported to Ankeny for an autopsy to be performed by the Iowa State Medical Examiner's Office at a later date.

Iowa code requires all drowning victims be subject to an autopsy to determine the cause of death.

The cause of death is pending. No foul play is suspected at this time.

"The Lee County Sheriff's Office wishes to thank the Agencies that assisted in this search and recovery of Mr. Broeker. A special thank you to DNR Officers Ben Schlader,

Paul Kay, Fire Fighters JW Guy and James Burton of the Keokuk Fire Department, Chief Dan Tillman and all the volunteers of the Keokuk Emergency Corps who assisted. The Henry County Sheriff Rich McNamee was also involved by delivering the death notification to family members in Henry County," Weber wrote in the release.

"I would like to publicly thank Jail Administrator John Canida for his assistance and use of his own boat to take Divers Sgt. Clint Wray, Sgt. Matt Van Berkum and myself

to the scene wherein Mr. Broeker was recovered in less than five minutes, assuring the family didn't have to suffer through an extended period of time of uncertainty about their loved one being lost. The cooperative efforts of all involved are simply extraordinary and appreciated.

"Finally, we also would like to offer our sincerest condolences to the family and friends of Mr. Broeker and want them all to know that he was treated with the utmost dignity by all those involved with his recovery."

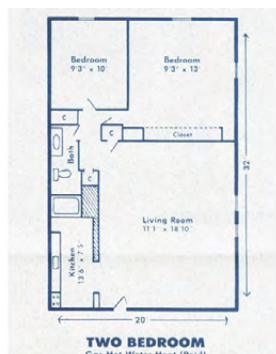
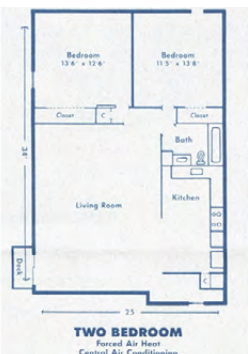
