SIMULATION: Seniors help piece together video of 2020 graduation ceremoney

FORT MADISON – It's going to take three full days, but Fort Madison High School is actually holding 136 individual graduation ceremonies over the next three days.

With plans still up in the air regarding a regular graduation ceremony, school officials went with a video graduation where each senior crosses the stage with family in attendance, as photos are taken and school staff made a video segment of each student crossing the stage.

Seniors are scheduled in 10 minutes increments all day Monday through Wednesday. Senior speakers and administration presentations are also being recorded and will be included in the video presentation.

Senior Kenya Davis-Robinson brought five family and friends with her and said she was happy the school made the effort to create some kind of ceremony in the uncertainty of future plans.

"I feel like it's better than no ceremony at all," she said. "This is pretty great considering everything that's going on in the world."

Davis-Robinson is planning on attending Southeastern Community College in a computer science program.

\$58,000 in virus relief

LEE COUNTY - Congressman Dave Loebsack today announced that Lee County has been awarded a grant through the Department of Justice's (DOJ) FY20 Coronavirus Emergency Supplemental Funding Program. She is survived by three daughters, Lillian Wilson, Krista Mason and Amara Potter, a son, Ivan Wilson, her father, Jeff Hogberg of







related to the distribution of resources to the most impacted areas), and addressing the medical needs of inmates in state, local, and tribal prisons, jails, and detention centers.

"It is clear that many local and state governments are struggling to balance their budgets in the wake of the financial toll being placed on them by the COVID-19 pandemic. I have been working to ensure these communities have the support they need to be able to fund healthcare workers, teachers, police officers, firefighters and other vital workers," Loebsack said. "I am pleased that Department of Justice has moved to get these funds to Lee County to help them respond to this pandemic."

Her father Terry Robinson said despite the pandemic causing closures and cancellation's, the video will be something his daughter will have to remember her senior year.

"I kinda think this is wonderful. They're going to remember this for the rest of their lives and they'll have something else positive to remember it by," he said.

"Here we can take pictures up close and everyone that needs to be here is here as far as her family."

High School Principal Greg Smith said the school is trying to hang on to everything it can for the seniors, but social distancing just isn't something educators are prepared for.

"Everything is just so upside down right now. "This is not what educators want to do, we're people people and social distancing is foreign to us," he said.

"But it's the best we can do right now. From what we've seen this morning families are showing up dressed up, and they're cheering. So that's something."

Smith said he doesn't believe anyone thinks it's the best way to do things and school officials are still hoping a regular graduation ceremony can happen at the end of the month.

"We'd love to have that ceremony and we're hoping at the end of June we can do that. But there are quite a few schools around us that are starting to cancel everything," Smith said. "But we're gonna hang on as long as we can."

The graduation parade that took place Friday was a big success, Smith said, and he hopes to make that an annual event.

Shea Dinwiddie, a senior who was filmed Monday afternoon, said the parade was fun, but a bit chilly.

"It was cold sitting up in the back of that Mustang, but it was fun,"

Dinwiddie said he would have preferred the traditional graduation ceremony so he could celebrate with all his classmates and friends.

"I guess we all would wish that everyone could be here including our friends, but at least we were able to bring our family, and the people that are most important could watch us," he said.

"I don't think if everything is normal that we need all this other stuff, but it's nice recognition"

Dinwiddie, is planning on attending Iowa State University in the fall and majoring in aerospace engineering.

The video is scheduled to be released on June 27, which is still the date planned for the regular graduation ceremony pending approval of Centers for Disease Control and Iowa Department of Public Health guidance.





No fine print in Constitution for lawlessness

I don't get it. The right of the people "peaceably to assemble and petition their government for a redress of grievances" is part of our national fabric. I think it's important enough that I print it on our page each week. Nowhere is there fine print that includes rioting, looting, arson. But that's what consumed our television screens last weekend.


I was in Iowa City for something quite different on Saturday, but there were two simultaneous events taking place within a couple miles of each other – an irony to me.

Those familiar with Iowa City and the University of Iowa campus know the Pentacrest is essentially the gathering spot for rallies. Peaceful rallies. When I was a student is was the time when Iranians took Americans hostage in Tehran.

There were almost daily rallies on the Pentacrest. Peaceful ones.

And Saturday there was a peaceful rally on the lawn in front of the historic old capitol building, conducted in the wake of the senseless killing of George Floyd in Minneapolis just days earlier.

Authorities cordoned off the first block of Clinton Street in front of the Pentacrest, anticipating a good-sized crowd. And that's what they got. Organizers Lujayn Hamad, 18, and Rameen Hamad, 20, said they



We drove by as my daughter, Hannah, and I took my son, Connor, to the other side of the Iowa River where we dropped him off at the Iowa National Guard Armory so he could begin his assignment as a member of the guard's Ironman Battalion.

Hundreds of family members were there to say goodbye to our citizen soldiers as they prepare to leave for the Middle East for more than a year.

The send-off was more of a drop-off.

After the drop off, we assembled along a street near the Iowa recreation facilities to wave goodbye as two buses filled with guard members followed an escort led by more than 200 motorcycles, police and state patrol vehicles, and fire trucks from the area.

We left afterward to head out of town, which took us past the Pentacrest. By then, the streets were reopened, and you couldn't tell there was a large crowd there just an hour prior conducting a rally.

I came back to Guthrie Center while my daughter headed back to her apartment in Milwaukee.

I no sooner got in the door when my phone buzzed. It was her. Protests in downtown Milwaukee near her apartment were taking place. The city had

imposed a curfew. The governor had summoned Wisconsin National Guard troops to keep order.

Her boyfriend's parents live north of Milwaukee in Saukville. They called her and encouraged her to spend the night there, which she did.

Citizen soldiers from Iowa, including my son, will train and eventually leave for foreign soil to, among other things, protect the right to "peaceably assemble and petition our government for a redress of grievances" on our soil.

The founding fathers thought it so important that this be a government of the people – not tyrants or dictators – that they put the power of governing to the people. And it was of utmost importance to them that the guiding document started with select freedoms upon which Congress can do nothing about.

There are five freedoms in the First Amendment, but for me those five aren't the most important words of the amendment. To me, the most important words are the first five – "Congress shall make no law. . ."

There's no ambiguity in those five words. Translated: Don't even think about it Congress.

If you want to effect change, you don't do it by setting fires and stealing bigscreen televisions and destroying and defacing private property. Lawlessness won't impart change for the better. It's not what the founders intended to protect when they crafted that magnificent document.

What we're seeing isn't what the First Amendment intended.

What we're seeing isn't why young men and women sign up and serve.





New visitor guidance at FMCH facilities

FMCH - Continued from Page 1

the facility

•Each patient may only

•Visitors may not leave

and return in the same day
•Permitted visitors must

•Permitted visitors must stay in the patient's room during their visit or a designated visitor area, such as the surgical waiting room.

For visitors of inpatients, visiting hours are from 12 p.m. to 5 p.m. with the following restrictions.

•One visitor per patient, per day, during visiting hours only

•Visitors must remain in patient's room

•Actively dying patients, patients who are at the endof-life where death is imminent may have two visitors and one Clergy member.

•No visitation for patients who are in the COVID-19 Unit or patients considered under investigation for COVID-19. Support will be provided via telephone or video visits.

•No visitation for patients in isolation precautions.

•For inpatient overnight surgeries, one visitor per patient, per day. During surgery, visitor must remain in Ambulatory Surgery patient room. Visitors may visit patient in their inpatient room during visiting hours only.

Visiting hours do not apply to the following areas:

•Obstetric inpatients may have one dedicated partner or birth support person to accompany them.

•Patients 17 years old and younger may have one parent or guardian. This person must remain with the patient for the entire visit.

•Emergency Department patients may have one visitor, who must remain in the patient's room for entire visit (may not come and go). The Emergency Department may allow additional visitors based on clinical patient situation.

•Same Day Surgery patients may have one visitor, who must remain in the patient's room for entire visit.

•Outpatient Area (Annex / Cancer Care) patients are not allowed visitors unless one of the exceptions below is met.

•FMCH Clinic patients, adult patients requiring caregiver, or child 17 and under can have one visitor/ guardian who must remain in patient's room entire visit.

•Women's Center patients may bring one visitor for ultrasound appointment only.

•Radiology, one visitor allowed for obstetrical ultrasounds.

Exceptions that require approval for visitation outside of visiting hours by the Provider and Administration include:

•Patients with disruptive behavior, where a family member is key to their care, may have one visitor overnight.

•Patients who have altered mental status or developmental delays (where caregiver provides safety) may have one visitor overnight.

•Any other special circumstances approved by Unit Director, Administration and Provider.


