Virus hitting city, county budgets

ECONOMIC PRESSURE: County could lose \$100K in gas tax over three months

FORT MADISON - City and county officials are going back to the drawing board as the fiscal year comes to an end facing deflated revenue numbers.

Fort Madison City Manager David Varley said he knows the city's going to take a big hit, but he can't get his arms around just how big it will be.

"It's gonna hit us hard, and there are some big unknowns out there," he said. "I can't put a number on it and define it."

There are several economic factors in play as the state's

reaction to the coronavirus has forced the closure of many small businesses, including restaurants and bars. Some businesses are still open as essential, like hardware stores and convenience stores, but spending is clearly down as people stay at home to avoid the virus that is sweeping the nation.

Varley said the federal and state agencies aren't providing much direction or assistance to municipalities and local governments.

"I haven't received anything from the state other than they're telling people they don't have to worry about pay-

CORONAVIRUS UPDATE

Reynolds hints at more school virus mitigation

JOHNSTON – Despite continuing to push a statewide shelter-in-place to the side, Iowa Governor Kim Reynolds hinted Wednesday that additional mitigation efforts could be coming as early as Thursday.

During her daily Facebook press conference on Wednesday, Reynolds responded to a question from a pool reporter about school closures saying more action could be coming soon, with Iowa's peak infection rate projected for the middle of April.

Reynolds said newly appointed Dept. of Education Director Dr. Ann Lebo has put a task force together to make recommendations to the state on the

"We started our day working on this and I know that Director Lebo has put task force together to really identify what this looks like," Reynolds said.

"I had indicated earlier this week, this is Wednesday, by tomorrow we'll be issuing an additional declaration to address what you're talking about."

She said with the state not reaching the peaks, which is two or three weeks out, health officials are still looking at metrics for making determinations.

Reynolds said state officials are also considering metrics that will indicate when the state might be able to open the economy back in some areas of the state based on data and metrics in use.

Reynolds was pressed on what metrics that state is using to make those determinations to "dial up or dial back" mitigation efforts.

"The percentage of population greater than 65, the percentage of identified cases requiring hospitalization, we're looking at the rate per 100,000 impact-

Great River Health-Keokuk adds restrictions

KEOKUK – Great River Health-Keokuk has made changes in its ongoing effort to prevent or reduce transmission of COVID-19 (coronavirus) in the community.

Patients who have symptoms of the disease – cough, difficulty breathing or fever – will be seen by a health care provider in a designated area of the clinic. Everyone, including staff, is screened before entering the building. Patients with symptoms will be given a mask.

Clinic patients may not be accompanied by a visitor except:

Patients under 18 may have one visitor who is a parent or guardian. Patients requiring special as-

sistance may have one visitor or guardian.

Urgent Care's temporary hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, and 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. Primary care services are available by appointment from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

It is recommended that people with respiratory symptoms or fever call Great River Health's 24-hour call center before coming to the clinic. The telephone numbers are 800-871-3313, toll-free, or 319-768-1009. The call center is staffed by registered nurses who can answer questions about re-

spiratory symptoms and potential exposure to the illness.

People with symptoms that are tolerable are encouraged to remain at home and self-quarantine for at least seven days or until they are fever-free without medication and have no symptoms for three days.

"Our top priority is protecting our patients and employees, and providing accurate information to our community," said Matt Wenzel, president and CEO, Great River Health.

Virus prediction models are outdated for Iowa

ed in the past 14 days, looking at longterm care outbreaks," she said.

"Those are some of the metrics, but there are other assumptions in there as well."

Some current national prediction models have Iowa predicted to hit a peak of 45 deaths per day on April 16, but those models do not include mitigation efforts already in place, including the closure of all schools and the closure of non-essential businesses.

Reynolds said those efforts should reduce the peak numbers in those projection models.

The governor continued to ask residents to stay home as much as possible, only got out for necessary trips and, if engaging in outdoor activities, maintain social distancing.

"Stay at home. That's the best way to avoid being exposed and to expose others. Essential errands only, as little as possible, for groceries, medical... limited and one at a time. Enjoy outdoor activities but be responsible and work from home if you can."

As of Tuesday afternoon, there were 549 total positive cases of COVID-19 in the state with 52 new cases in the past 24 hours. Two additional deaths were reported out of Washington and Polk counties, both adults over the age of 81.

The Iowa State Hygienic Lab has reported 7853 tests for a positive rate of 6.99%. Of those tested positive 99 have been hospitalized, or 18%, 63 are currently in hospitals around the state.

County to suffer \$100k hit in gas tax revenue

ing tax bills or water bills, and that's only information that is negative or harmful to us," Varley said.

"I haven't received anything as far as direction as the size of hit we're gonna take."

Varley said he's pouring through revenue categories of the budget and trying to adjust where the city will land at the end of the fiscal year on June 30.

Lee County Supervisor Ron Fedler said Tuesday that he was informed late yesterday that the county will take a \$100,000 projected hit on gas consumption tax for a three-month period.

Fedler said due to that information, the county will put off building an addition to the maintenance shop in West Point.

The addition was budgeted at \$180,000 so that gives the county an extra \$80,000 cushion this year in case other revenues fall short.

Lee County Budget Director Cindy Renstrom said the biggest hit for the county will probably come from sales tax decreases, but she can't put a figure on it. Because the state formula for dispersing the revenues is convoluted, it's hard to predict.

She said online sales probably won't make up the difference because online companies aren't even mandated yet to make those payments, so that revenue stream is difficult to gauge as well.

"Not knowing how state calculates it, I wouldn't be able to put a dollar figure on it," Renstrom said. "We're still getting property taxes in, but I think probably the biggest thing will be the sales tax."

She said that not only are people traveling less, but the price of gas has gone down dramatically, which is adding to the tax payment reduction.

Fedler said he didn't want to cut any road services or other maintenance projects making the construction the first thing to get cut.

"I've been trying for eight years to get that addition put on so we can keep our equipment in better condition," Fedler said.

"We're sitting good as far as keeping our roads maintained and we are doing this to make sure we have priorities right. We can live without another building for now, but can't sacrifice our roads."

He said when things get back to normal, the county will have to adjust its budget accordingly.

"When the money starts flowing again hopefully it won't be that bad, but if it is we'll handle it one step at a time"

Varley said he doesn't see the city making up what they are losing when businesses are able to open back up again. He also said he thinks people will use the relief checks to pay rent or mortgage or credit card bills and not as much in the way of consumer spending.

"It's a guessing game. I can't take the numbers we

had projected and leave the same. We know that's not going to happen," Varley said.

"It will have an impact, but how much?" And it's going to carry over into the next fiscal year even if things do get back to normal fairly soon."

He said he has concern that some businesses may not get back open.

"I hope all of them can get back on their feet. Let's face it, some small businesses can only go a couple weeks being closed or having low sales like this."

He said the City Council will be facing some very difficult choices, with all options again on the table.

"This will make life very difficult for us and force Council to make some difficult choices and make cuts. Depending on how long this lasts we could be back to looking at everything."
