State may revoke Donnellson day care licenses

DONNELLSON - Two day care facilities in Donnellson are facing the possible revocation of their state license as a result of complaints filed by state officials

Raisin' Em On Up and Raisin' Em Up Learning Center located in Donnellson were at the center of 15 complaints filed after visits in April from Iowa Department of Human Services representatives.

Raisin' Em On Up, located at 100 N. Main Street according to the reports, had five complaints filed on Thursday following several unannounced visits by DHS consultants in April. The reports indicated that facility director Sarah Tweedy, who oversees operations at both facilities, had transported more than seven children in center transportation on multiple occasions.

State regulations require a second person be in any facility vehicle with seven or more children. The report was filed by DHS Consultant Jill Seibert on June 11 and the complaint was logged on June 13.

On another unannounced visit on April 26, Siebert found alleged evidence after interviewing staff that two children had been left unattended on the center bus for an undetermined amount of time on separate occasions. A complaint was filed with DHS on April 25. Another similar complaint was filed on April 16.

Tweedy, who didn't return several phone requests for comment Monday, indicated in a report on May 31, 2019 that in one of the incidents a child had leaned over and wasn't observed in the van, but she was in the van the whole time and she brought the child back to the facility.

The two other complaints filed by DHS on that facility indicated failure to use curriculum and Tweedy allowing staff to take her required training courses for her.

Monday fire takes FM home

FORT MADISON - An afternoon fire in the 1400 block of Avenue D has left a Fort Madison family without a home.

The fire broke out at about 1:50 p.m. at 1427 Avenue D. The home is owned by Jodie and Seabrook Hay and is 119 years old.

According to Jay Blanchard, a captain with the Fort Madison Fire Department, no cause has been determined yet. Blanchard said the department has a general area where the fire started but nothing specific.

No one was home at the time of the fire, and neighbors reported the incident via 911. Blanchard said he believes the house will be a total loss.

A dog was in the home in a downstairs room, but firefighters were able to rescue the animal. It was taken to a local veterinarian for treatment of smoke inhalation, according to neigh bors at the scene.

Firefighters were on scene for about six hours. No mutual aid was needed. Fort Madison Police, Lee County Sheriff and Lee County EMS all assisted at the scene.

Storm brewing at FM school district

Spring storms have wreaked havoc on communities up and down the river this year, but we think a different kind of storm has been brewing in Fort Madison - and the first crack of lightning hit earlier this week.

Pen City Current reported on an email that showed Fort Madison Superintendent Dr. Erin Slater is unhappy with the playing time Fort Madison athletes are getting in shared programs with Holy Trinity Catholic, specifically, the baseball program.

Another crack of lightning came on Saturday, when a video surfaced showing Slater's husband, Scott, confronting Fort Madison High School basketball coach Ryan Wilson at a camp in Quincy, Ill.

Apparently, it's not the first time Scott has been observed being verbally aggressive at Fort Madison High School events. Dr. Tim Wondra, FMCSD school board president, confirmed last week that Scott was suspended for one game by Slater, for behavior at a baseball game earlier this season that was in violation of team rules.

Scott Slater was also reprimanded by an official for

Slaters say Pen City Current editorial was ill-informed

Letter indicates Superintendent won't extend contract

Response from the **Slater Family:**

The Slaters were extremely disappointed in your ill-informed opinion piece. Has the Superintendent not earned any respect for her hard work and contributions to the community?

The Superintendent did not affect any varsity playing time for her son. As a junior in 2018-2019, Max was at or near the bottom of minutes played for the varsity basketball team. Check the game records. Max has never played nor pitched one inning for varsity baseball. Check the game records.

Dr. Slater strongly disagrees with the school board on the issue of team sport sharing agreements, especially with HTC. Team athletics such as baseball, softball, and such are the only sports where varsity playing time is at the sole discretion of the coach. Other sports such as track, tennis, and such allow for individual competition to determine varsity spots. Dr. Slater believes only if FMHS does not have the participation numbers or facilities should sharing agreements for team sports be used. Dr. Slater believes that these athletic opportunities should go to Fort Madison public school student-athletes. Every time an HTC player takes the field, they are taking away opportunities from FMHS student-athletes, most of which don't have the financial means to attend a private school.

Dr. Slater did nothing wrong. The Superintendent simply advocated for the FMCSD families she was hired to serve and represent.

As to baseball, you have completely misled your readers. Check the game records. In actual innings

played, based upon 8 players (pitching excluded) in the field, HTC players have accounted for an estimated 30-35% of the playing time. Apparently all that matters are wins, not how and at what cost those results are attained.

The Superintendent has been frustrated with the culture and past performance of the FMHS athletic department and tried to make positive changes but has had little support. Dr. Slater even had to weather an attempted "coup" by Ryan Wilson last year when he tried to rally other FMHS coaches into "striking" over perceived slights. Ryan Wilson holds a strong grudge against Dr. Slater.

Our open enrollment request has nothing to do with sports. What a childish and immature conclusion to reach. Since we arrived from Chicago, Max has suffered persistent harassment at the hands of his fellow students because of his mother's job. And since the beginning of March the situation has gotten much worse.

Our son Max is held accountable by classmates for decisions made by the teachers, administrators, Superintendent, and school board. A record of the harassment that

has occurred since March 2019 was presented as part of our open enrollment application. We fear for Max's safety and well-being. Along with the misguided parents on social media, you have only made this situation worse for our son.

Shame on you for preaching to us about how to properly raise our children. You know nothing of our family. All you do is criticize and think the worst of a dedicated public school educator. Max Slater will not attend Fort Madison High School in the fall. One of Fort Madison's top students will not graduate from FMHS.

Dr. Slater will not sign another contract extension. Dr. Slater's current contract will be her last with FMCSD. It was an extremely poor decision to so quickly turn on Dr. Slater. All you have done, along with the lack of support for Dr. Slater and her family, is vilify a positive force in the community and help drive an exceptional Superintendent from Fort Madison.

Slater's comments need school board attention

behavior at a basketball game last year between Holy Trinity Catholic and Fort Madison High School played at HTC's gym.

The sound from Saturday's video is barely audible, but it's clear Scott Slater says to Wilson 'you're vindictive'. No one will dispute that there are two sides to every story. At the same time, no one will dispute that conduct is unbecoming, at the very least. With the alleged track record, action needs taken.

The school board needs to also take a hard look at Slater's comments in her email to the board. Slater has a son who plays on the baseball team and hasn't seen a lot of varsity action. He also played in a bench role on the varsity basketball team, again with limited playing time.

Another rumble came Friday when Pen City Current confirmed the Slaters have applied to open enroll their son at West Burlington for his senior year, so the frustration they are experiencing with Fort Madison sports programs may end this year.

But the mission statement of the Fort Madison School District is "to ensure all students learn the academic and life skills necessary for personal success and responsible living".

We're just a little lost on how open enrolling your son doesn't abandon that mission statement even though, unfortunate as all this is, it may be the best choice for the family. It is the superintendent's ultimate authority, at the direction of the board, to drive that mission statement. How can one possibly advocate for a district, but send your child into another?

But in Slater's email she indicates the "heavy

presence" of students from Holy Trinity on the baseball team, is taking playing time away from Fort Madison High School players. She also confirmed in a text to Pen City Current that no guidelines exist in the shared agreements, and the email was for "implementation clarification".

Slater also indicated in the email to the board that she disagrees with the philosophy that consideration shouldn't be given to where the players go to school. She said she advocates for Fort Madison High School programs and not community programs.

"Our students don't have the choice to attend a private school...a private school this district continues to programmatically support over and over without return. Our students entrust us to provide opportunities for them," Slater wrote.

That statement escapes us considering families do have the option of enrolling their students in private schools. That choice is there, as is a choice to open-enroll. And, even more to the point, the families that send their students to HTC certainly pay taxes that help finance the schools. In less financial terms, it's also a return for the district when students on the tennis, track, or wrestling teams represent FMHS as Bloodhounds at state tournaments and meets.

But because there are no guidelines, then the agreement is simply to allow HTC student athletes to play on FMHS sports teams without parameters. So, at least grammatically, the implementation is solely the board approving the agreement. If there are no guidelines, then there is no other implementation. Playing time, as it should be, is determined by the

coach

There are five HTC students on the team of 30 players. It's hard to make the case of a "heavy presence". However there are three of nine regular starters on the team that play from HTC. We have to assume, because we pay a head coach to build a program, the coach knows what's best for their programs

But the bigger issue is the meddling in the programs. How are we going to be able to attract, (and maybe with the storm winds blowing), keep good coaches in our program when we experience heavy-handed behavior at the top. It's not a stretch to assume that maybe we've already lost personnel because of this.

Again, there are two sides to every story and everyone knows the pull of wanting the best for our children and making sure they have a fair shake in the world. After all, when you peel all this back, it's that base emotion that's in place, and that has to be respected. But we all have to give value to the proper chain of command and making sure that cognizant filter is in place... and remember the power of a cooler head. And letting our children fail is sometimes just as valuable as watching them succeed. (Just a bit tougher as we'd all agree).

Slater is scheduled to have an evaluation on Wednesday, prior to the board's regular meeting. We can only hope that the questions and issues pointed out here are given proper consideration.

And in a small bit of irony, the Bloodhound baseball team beat one of the best pitchers in the state Saturday night in another come-from-behind win over Burlington Notre Dame. The Hounds are now 8-7 on the year. But that's kinda – Beside the



State reports allege violations at Raisin 'Em Up facilities

COMPLAINTS - Continued from Page 1

All five complaints recommended a license revocation. The center was still open and operating when contacted Monday afternoon. The administrative process for handling revocations lies with DHS.

At the Raisin' Em Up Learning Center, 607 S. Park Street in Donnellson, 10 complaints were filed against the facility on Thursday. All the complaints recommended license revocation.

The complaints listed were varied, including staff sleeping while children were under their supervision, duplicating medications, unlawful transportation, failure to use curriculum, leaving children on buses unattended, and improper ratios of supervisors to children.

In a report dated June 12, as a result of investigations from an April 17th visit, Siebert listed the following alleged text messages between staff at the Raisin' Em Up Learning Center: (State staff removes the names in favor of initials in the texts to protect identities)

"Staff members indicated they were directed to send children under 2 years old (1:4 staff to child

ratio) into the next room and pretend like they were two years old. They indicated ratio did not change to 1:4 ratio as it should

"On 12/18/17 Laura M messages Sarah T., K just showed up so we will need 2 in babyroom...technically we are over but if we claim R and G three we are good will boot M and J in babyroom."

"On 3/2/2018 Laura M. messages Sarah T., "Okay....if Jill comes I am calling B 18 months? Are u leaving him out the rest of the day?" Sarah responds, "Well yeah I would definitely do that....he is j and j is j;) is he dressed today? How many of your 10 are 3?" Laura M. responds, "6 threes 4 twos."

"On 5/29/18 Laura M. messages Sarah T., "We are pulling over L correct? If state comes do u want me to try to lie and say B

All the visits and interviews with staff were conducted between April 16 and April 25th. Although all the recommendations of the 15 complaints were for license revocation, none of the complaints filed resulted in a serious injury or death of a child.

However, a death of an infant did occur at one of the facilities earlier this year and that is an open and ongoing investigation. Charges could be pending in that case.

Lee County Attorney Ross Braden couldn't comment on the case because it is currently active.
