Barley Hops hoping for good timing

FORT MADISON -Timing is everything. And for the annual Fort Madison Barley Hops event the timing could be perfect.

With balmy weather predicted in the evening and some rain projected for the morning and the BNSF Rail Company finishing up their work on the crossings during the day on Friday, it could all wind up being the perfect chance to get down on the Mississippi Riverfront and taste some of the best microbrews around, while listening to good local music and tasting topnotch local fares.

The event hosted by Fort Madison Partners is sponsored this year by Atlas Steak & Smokehouse with the music being sponsored by Griffin Muffler & Brake Center.

day and Thursday setting up. A chore made no less easy by the closure of most of the rail line crossovers on the east end of town.

Gobble said he's hoping timing is on his side as he stepped over rail ties and around barricades on his

riverfront where the event will be held.

"Well I'm working with the government affairs office (of BNSF) and (Mayor) Brad (Randolph) has been calling as well and what we're being told is that they should be done somewhere between way to the west end of the 2 and 4 p.m. tomorrow,"



Gobble said of the rail company's closure of the street crossings through 23rd Street.

"There's no guarantee of that because they said there may be some rain, but from what I've seen the rain is supposed to be in the morning, and I don't know what time these guys get started."

In the event that the crossings aren't open, attendees may have to cross over the walk bridge just west of the North Lee County Historical Society building, but all signs point to the riverfront being open by the kick off of the event.

Gobble said pre-sale of the signature Barley Hops glasses are in pace with last year's sales but those that haven't had a chance to get the glasses

State says students must have meningococcal shots

FORT MADISON – The Iowa Department of Public Health, Bureau of Immunization, has completed the administrative rules process to require meningococcal (A,C,W,Y) vaccine for students enrolling in 7th and 12th grades. The administrative rule change became effective January 11, 2017, and will be implemented at the beginning of the upcoming 2017-2018 school year.

The change requires a one-time dose of meningococcal (A,C,W,Y) vaccine received on or after 10 years of age for children in grades 7 and above, if born after September 15, 2014; and 2 doses of the vaccine for children in grade 12, if born after September 15, 1999; or

1 dose if received when the child was 16 years of age of older.

Meningococcal disease is a very serious, life-threatening disease. It is caused by bacteria that can infect the blood, brain and spinal cord. The bacteria are spread through upper respiratory droplets, such as saliva. Approx-See **VACCINE**, page 6

imately 10-15% of people with meningococcal disease die even with appropriate treatment. Of those who recover, up to 20% suffer from serious after-effects, such as permanent hearing loss, limb loss, or brain damage. Meningococcal vaccines are very safe and effective at preventing meningococcal disease. The meningococcal vaccine is 85-100% effective at preventing infection from the sub-types of meningococcus found in the vaccine.

The Lee County Health Department is partnering with local secondary schools to inform parents of this new requirement for vaccines prior to the start of the 2017-2018 school year.

All students who meet the guidelines listed above will be required show proof of the required number of doses of the Meningococcal (A,C,W,Y) BEFORE entering school in the fall. Parents may receive a notice about this new requirement from their child's school and should read the notice carefully. Some students may have already received this vaccine. If you feel your child has already received the vaccine, please contact your child's health care provider to determine if your child's record reflects vaccination that meets the new requirement. Questions about this new requirement may also be directed to the nurse at the child's school or the immunization staff at Lee County Health Department at 319-372-5225. emailed to <u>auditor@leecounty.org</u>. However, the original request document must be received by the Auditor's Office. If mailed, it must be postmarked by Friday, June 23, 2017. The original request can also be hand delivered to the Auditor's Office no later than 8 p.m. on the day of the election in order for the ballot to be counted.

Voted ballots may be returned by mail, but must be postmarked no later than Monday, June 26th and received by Monday, July 3, 2017. Prepaid postage is affixed to all ballot return envelopes. The voter's ballot may be hand delivered to the County Auditor's Office before 8 p.m., June 27, 2017, by the voter or any person the voter designates.
