Area lawmakers see benefits of SAVE up close

FORT MADISON - In a two-hour morning tour of two Fort Madison schools, two area lawmakers saw the impact of the state's 1-cent local option sales tax.

State Rep. Dave Heaton (R-Mt. Pleasant) and State Sen. Rich Taylor (D-Mt. Pleasant) spent close to two hours walking through the halls of Richardson Elementary School and Fort Madison Middle School in Fort Madison on Friday morning. The two then joined Rep. Jerry Kearns (D-Keokuk) for a leg-

Fort Madison Community School District Superintendent Erin Slater hosted the tour at Richardson with Principal Emily Settles and at the middle school with Principal Todd Dirth.

The tour at Richardson focused on the hurdles in place that hindered contemporary learning including handicap obstacles and moving classrooms around the school to accommodate students in wheel chairs, poor structural conditions, a total lack of space for collaborative learning, which is at the heart of most new school

Tour shows impact of state sales tax funding

'School infrastructure' means those activities for which a school district is authorized to contract indebtedness and issue general obligation bonds under Iowa Code section 296.1, except those activities related to a teacher's or superintendent's home or homes. These activities include the construction, reconstruction, repair, demolition work, purchasing, or remodeling of schoolhouses, stadiums, gyms, field houses, and bus garages, and the procurement of schoolhouse construction sites and making of site improvements and those activities for which revenues under Iowa Code section 298.3 or section 300.2 may be spent. Additionally, 'school infrastructure' includes the payment or retirement of outstanding bonds previously issued for school infrastruc-

ture purposes, and the payment or retirement of bonds issued under Iowa Code section 423E.5."

The current SAVE authorization law is set to expire in 2029 and proponents of the funding stream are hoping to extend it to 2049. Current bills would limit funding use to educational improvements and would place limits on how the funds could be used for athletic facilities and program spending. It would also incrementally increase the portion used for property tax reduction.

Slater wanted to show what SAVE dollars have done for Fort Madison schools, in a stark contrast to what kind of buildings the district is currently dealing with.

She told Taylor and Heaton there is community committee in the process of trying, for the third time, to get a referendum passed to get a new school built on the campus with the middle school. The middle school was constructed totally with moneys from the sales tax option and had zero impact on property tax dollars.

"We just wanted to show you what that tax did for this district and how important it is," Slater told the two prior to going into the middle school.

Inside, Dirth showed the group the advantages to the contemporary learning facility including athletic facilities, a new state-of-the-art HVAC system that new board member Tim Wondra said is cheaper to run with all the district's 4th through 8th grade students, than either the Denmark or former middle schools.

"I used to teach at Van

Buren in Keosauqua 55 years ago and the school I was in there was in better shape that the one I was in at Richardson," Heaton said.

"So it was pretty icky and I just hope that we can respond and help create a much better environment. Because then we went to the middle school and it's a fabulous facility. It's so important to reinforce that process and give every kid the opportunity to learn as best they can. It's a world of compete, compete, compete and those with the skills sets necessary to compete will have that advantage."

Slater said extending the funding stream is critical to the needed improvements in the district.

"Extending the SAVE dollars is hugely im-

portant for us because it would allow us to focus on the middle school and some of the upgrades and challenges, because the SAVE dollar extension would not generate enough money to build the elementary," she said.

"You'll see some of the challenges we have in the Richardson building have been completely taken care of in this building."

I opted for an electrified mesh fence, which would keep the hens in and predators out (hopefully).

Electric fences have come a long way from the single-strand electric wire and white porcelain insulators of days gone by. Now, the entire mesh is electrified,



except for the bottom strand, and is solar powered. Sexy! The wire mesh comes embedded with stakes, so you just string it up wherever you want, attach the energizer, and you have a portable enclosure that you can move at will.

You've got to really love chickens, or whatever you're penning up (sheep, goats, etc.), because this electric mesh is not cheap. If you look at the price of eggs in the supermarket, compared to what it costs to feed and house chickens, it's not worth it. But when you go out to the hen house in the morning and collect a basket of nice, brown, free-range eggs, and talk to the hens and they talk back to you, well there are just some things that are priceless. And giving away farm-fresh eggs to friends and family is a gift of love as well as nurture.

Our hens seemed to be affronted the first day we had them penned up. They eyed the wire mesh as if to say, "What's this? Why is this wire here?" One hen paced the fence looking for a place to get through. I saw her stick her head through the wire mesh, then pull it back real fast. That ended that. We feel better knowing that we're doing all we can to keep the chickens in and predators out. At least the four legged kind. Hawks have not been a problem as of yet. Knock on eggs.

For our bucket calf that we should be getting soon, I had a three-sided shelter erected, and am building a little corral with gates and posts. We may get two bucket calves, if a second one is available, because two calves do better than one. We will then butcher one and sell the other (that is, if Ginnie doesn't get too attached). In a year or so, there may be a package of hamburger or steaks to go along with that dozen eggs. Lord-o-mercy! Farm fresh eggs, and hand raised beef—it doesn't get any better'n that!

For the naysayers, what do we do when we want go away? We have Brody and Boden, our neighbor boys, take care of things. Life is good on the Empty Nest Farm. We're happy as pigs in mud! And that, my dear friends, is an old saying you can take to the bank.


