Platform comes in \$1.4M over budget

Amtrak Depot relocation in jeopardy with shortfall

FORTY MADISON - The city of Fort Madison took another punch in the gut on Tuesday when a construction bid for the railroad platform at the proposed new Amtrak Depot came in \$1.4 million over engineer estimates.

The bids were opened today at the Iowa Department of Transportation and the lowest bid was from Iowa Bridge and Culvert and came in at \$2.83 million, which according to City Manager David Varley is double what the city was budgeting.

"That's correct. It's double what we budgeted and finding another \$1.4 million is not gonna be easy," Varley.

Varley said engineering estimates from Klingner & Associates were at \$1.3 million, but he said he was figuring closer to \$1.4 million.

"I don't know. I thought this would come in a bit high. I mean you're working with the railroad and they have so many rules and regulations and insurance requirements," Varley said. "Working next to the tracks also means you can't work all the time when trains are going by. I realize how difficult it is to work with railroads. I think engineers would be able to see

this stuff, too."

The bid letting is up for discussion at tonight's City Council meeting. Varley said he just found out about the bid Tuesday afternoon and said it was a shocker.

This is the third major project in the past year that has come in substantially over engineering estimates. Two other projects, the Avenue G sidewalk and curb replacement that was planned with grant money from the waste water treatment rehab project came in way over estimates, as did the Old Highway 61 rehab that was supposed to start this fall.

Both of those estimates were from HR Green out of Cedar Rapids and were met with the furrowed

Supervisors approve new 28E with mental health region

FORT MADISON - A new agreement was approved Monday that will provide for additional voting members to the regional mental health board to help with new state laws providing for children's mental health services.

Gov. Kim Reynolds signed House File 690 into law in May creating a children's mental health system in the state. The new law, among other things, expanded regional and state boards that will now include children's behavioral health service oversight.

Southeast Iowa Link, is an eight-county regional board overseeing mental health services in southeast Iowa, headed up by Lee County's Ryanne Wood.

Wood told supervisors the new agreement will expand the current SEIL board.

"What we have done in the construction (of the amendment) is just address the issues related to the

new legislation," Wood said.

"With the new legislation we will be inheriting, we will be adding a provider of children's mental health services, a representative from the education system, and a parent of a child that uses children's behavior services or a representative of that family."

She said children crisis services were always a part of the regions' services, but now the board officially takes over administration of those programs and as Wood

Lady Hounds come together for win over MP

FMHS needs run in 2nd to set momentum in 3-1 conference win

FORT MADISON – Kent Bailey saw his Fort Madison High School volleyball team down one game, and behind by 11 points in the second. "I figured, 'Well, it's going to take five games to win," Bailey said. It took four. The Bloodhounds, playing at home for the first time this season, roared back to win the second game of Tuesday's match against Mount Pleasant, then took the next two in the 16-25, 25-23, 25-19, 25-20 victory.

"Thankfully, volleyball is a game of runs, and we made that run to come back," Bailey said.

Mount Pleasant took an early 5-1 lead in the second game and extended that margin to 18-7 after a kill from Avery Sutter.

But the Bloodhounds had an answer. Trailing 19-9, they scored six consecutive points, three on kills from Jillian Wiseman.

"I think we just started playing together," said Wiseman, who led the Bloodhounds with 21 kills. "And our passing was a lot better."

"We quit making errors, and stopped beating ourselves," Bailey said. "And they made a few mistakes too, which helped."

The Bloodhounds trailed 23-20, then scored the final five points of the game, with Kailyn Guzman and Reyna Lampe each having kills in that run.

Fort Madison dominated the third game, leading 22-14, before Mount Pleasant went on a 5-0 run. But the Bloodhounds closed out the game with the final three points, the last two coming on aces from Lauren Bailey.

Mount Pleasant built a 13-9 lead in the fourth game before the Bloodhounds scored eight of the next nine points.

Fort Madison finished the match by scoring the final four points. Wiseman had two kills in that stretch and Anna Lynk had one. Lynk's tip on match point fell to the court, and the Bloodhounds celebrated.

"It was a pretty big win for us," Wiseman said. "It was our first home match, and we wanted to play well."

Wiseman was dominating — she also had 18 digs and two blocks. But Lampe had 10

kills, Lynk had eight and Guzman had seven. "(Wiseman) obviously

does so much for us," Kent Bailey said. "But we had a lot of other contributions tonight."

Lauren Bailey had 44 assists and 11 digs. Nadia Boeding had 19 digs. Gracie Pumphrey had 14 digs and Madison Pirri had 12. Pumphrey had four aces and Jenna Jones had three.

Fort Madison moved to 4-10 overall, 1-2 in the Southeast Conference. "We've played against a lot of teams that made us look exceedingly short," Bailey quipped about the Bloodhounds' early schedule. "Tonight was a good win for us."

Crusaders stave off Notre Dame in four games

HTC girls find heart after dropping first game to win in 4

FORT MADISON - "These girls are better than they think they are," said Holy Trinity Catholic girls volleyball coach Melissa Freesmeier Tuesday night.

Freesmeier was all kinds of fired up after her Crusaders erased a loss in the first game of their match with Burlington Notre Dame and came back to win 3-1.

The normally docile Freesmeier, entering her 27th year as a head coach, was as animated on the sidelines



as she's ever been motivating an HTC squad that lost to New London Thursday in four games.

"You know I've told myself I'm going to be calm. These kids need me to be calm... these kids need me to be calm,

but I'm not going to be calm anymore. These kids can handle it," Freesmeier said.

"These are some kids with some heart and are some that are competitive but it's deep down inside them. We're gonna bring it out and we're gonna play some volleyball."

The first game was loaded with errors for the Crusaders but they managed to come from three and four points down on several occasions and had tied the

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score at 20, but the Nikes went on a 3-0 run to be two points away. HTC battled back to 22, but Notre Dame would get the next two points for the win.

In the second game, HTC found themselves down 14-11 and then senior Maille Sheerin came to the service line. With Freesmeier calling spots from behind her clipboard, Sheerin began methodically dissecting the Nike front and back defense moving the ball around and five points later HTC was back in front 16-14.

"She did great," Freesmeier said of Sheerin's timely service points.

"She was hitting her spots and was on point. We were mixing things up and trying to get them in a daze. We went deep and then short and they weren't sure where she was going to go, and Maille has such a great serve."

In the third game, the two squads battled through about six ties with HTC pulling away down the stretch on some Nike errors. It seemed the Nikes lost of a bit of their mojo in the fourth game after starting up 2-0.

HTC went on a run and was up 7-2 before Notre Dame could regain their footing, but the Crusaders sensed the win coming and pulled away for a 25-13 win.

Freesmeier said she was happy with the way the girls battled back, not only from the first game loss, but the loss at New London last week.

"Look at game one – errors... errors....errors. But then look at the heart out there. Our kids were on the floor diving for stuff, they weren't letting anything hit the floor. I got to give our kids credit they came out and did a great job tonight, she said."

"Notre Dame's gonna win a lot of volleyball games this year and we're going to have to play them a couple more times so we just gotta be on our game all the time. But that's fun though, that's volleyball."

On the night, Sheerin was 25 of 25 with five aces and 16 digs to lead Holy Trinity. Claire Pothitakis was 24 of 33 attacking with 17 kills including a fourth game where she went 12 of 14 with four kills as the Crusaders pulled away.


Kassi Randolph and Bailey Hellweg combined for 36 sets in the four games.

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
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


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

Mental health officials says state has to come up with funds

stated, "will be the boots on the ground for children's mental health services".

It was a mandate that came without additional funding from the state.

"We were identifying with just the expanded services on the adult side, the financing of the regions would have to be addressed legislatively because there wasn't enough money," Wood said.

"Then we inherited the children's behavioral mental health system. So we know absolutely with these timelines and mandates that we need additional resources to be able to fund sufficiently."

Wood said several ideas are floating around including increasing the property tax levy, but she said that idea doesn't have a lot of support. Other funding options include a lump sum appropriation, or a targeted sales tax contribution that would create funding that could be divided among all the regions of the state.

"There's no doubt there was a need for a children's behavioral health system because as it stands right now, there was nobody administrating this system and that's

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why legislators chose to appoint the regions to do that," she said.

"Essentially we're the boots on the ground, and the only boots on the ground, locally throughout the entirety of the state."

The regions will begin assuming responsibility of administration July 1, 2021. The region will also have the expanded complex needs adult services on their plate beginning that date.

Supervisor chairman Gary Folluo asked what benefit there was to the county in approving the new agreement. Wood said there wasn't any benefit, but eventually the region would have to come in line with the new law.

"There's lots of conversation that this is an unfunded mandate by not expanding our capacity to levy or contributing any additional revenues to assume this responsibility," Wood said.

"But our community services affiliates and supervisors affiliates will be advocating that this needs to be attended to in some shape or fashion if we have to assume these additional responsibilities." She said if all eight member counties in the region didn't approve the amended agreement by resolution it would fail and the old agreement would remain intact. Currently the levy cap in each county for mental health services, funds the regional board.

Larkin told the board tongue-in-cheek to hang on because the next legislature will have a bunch more changes to the new law and the regions will probably end up amending the agreement again.

"We've done this before," he said.

The board eventually approved the new agreement unanimously.

In other action, the board:

• approved a waiver of taxes that came to Wood on property the county owns in the 300 block of Avenue G in Fort Madison. County property is exempt from county tax liability. The property was sold to the county from a subsidiary of Fort Madison Community Hospital, but the building sale wasn't recorded until 2018 and FMCH had been paying the tax bill for eight years after the sale.

• approved a native wine permit for Appleberry Orchard in Donnellson.
