DES MOINES - With personal records falling all over the place and medals being thrown around people's necks, it's been a pretty darned good day for Fort Madison at the Iowa State Track and Field meet Friday at Drake University.

Senior Elijah Barnes took 4th in the Class 3A boys shotput with a throw of 53'-7.75", a new personal best for him, while Brett Schneider was just edged by an arm in the second heat of the 400-meter hurdles at 1:06.22 good enough for 6th place overall....and about a half second ahead of her mom Carrie's state time in the same event.

"It's going to be good at home now," Schneider said as she watched the last heat of the event come in. "No. I'm sure she's really happy for me." Schneider led most of the way around the blue oval, at times with about a sixfoot lead coming around turn three.

Scotts gets grant from IEDA for expansion

FORT MADISON - It was announced Friday that the Iowa Economic Development Authority has awarded Scotts Miracle Gro \$91,612 in direct financial assistance and tax benefits for the company's upcoming \$2.6 million capital investment and the addition of 41 new jobs.

According to a release from the IEDA the company plans to add a 4,400 square foot building to relocate and expand operations.

"Scott's Miracle-Gro Company (SMG) manufactures,

markets and sells branded products for lawn and garden care and indoor and hydroponic gardening. SMG plans to add a new 4,400 square foot building to relocate and expand existing Fort Madison operations. The board awarded SMG \$91,612 in direct financial assistance and tax benefits from High Quality Jobs for this \$2.6 million capital investment. The project is expected to create 41 jobs, of which 18 are incentivized at a qualifying hourly wage of \$16.92.

According to Lee County Economic Development Marketing and Communications Manager Dana Millard, Lee County EDG is excited about the expansion and

addition of new jobs to our area. The Fort Madison facility is the company's 2nd largest production facility in the U.S. producing more than 200 unique packages each season from 93 formulated liquids, averaging 8 million cases (37.5 million gallons of product).

Lee County has seen several local companies invest and expand in their facilities in 2018, Scotts being the most recent. Huffman Welding and Machine also invested in a \$1.3 million expansion and Frank Millard Company announced a \$2.6 million investment adding 50 new jobs to SE Iowa.

Johnson medals in first year with shot

DES MOINES - Fort Madison senior Leigh Johnson's wearing a medal around the grounds at Drake Stadium with a big smile on her face.

With a 37' throw, which bested her previous best by almost six inches, Johnson said the happiness kicked in when she qualified for the final round with the 8th best throw at state.

She had toyed around with 34 and 35 foot throws during warmups and threw a 34'-4" toss in the first round of the first flight. But she settled in with her second of three throws for a 37 flat, the

longest throw of the day in that flight. That throw was long enough to bump four girls from the second top flight of the event and land Johnson in the finals.

Johnson scratched on the first throw landing over the board and then had two throws of nearly 35 feet on the second and third rounds. Throwers get to take their top throw of the day for the final distance.

Johnson, a stalwart on the Fort Madison High School volleyball team in a setter position, said she exceeded her expectations on the season.

"I didn't expect to get into the finals," she said. "I was just overjoyed at that point. For volleyball I really wanted to get my

All-State picture up (in the high school MPR room). I made academic all-state, but now I'm just happy I'm going to get my picture up."

Throwing coach Andrew Troxel said Johnson had the drive to throw the medaling distance the whole season.

"Leigh's had this potential in her from the very beginning of the season," he said. "I think we just set the short-term goals and they fell into place one after another and then she just capitalized on everything, the confidence came, and before you know it, she just relaxed and began to unleash with her throws. I'm just so freaking proud of her."

Head coach Brian Mendez said Johnson texted him at the beginning of the season and wanted to come back out and throw.

"It was a no-brainer," Mendez said. "All the credit goes to Troxel and Leigh. They would go over to the throwing field and work techniques and they worked hard. I know I could speak here on (Boys Head Coach Erin) Benner's behalf but we just can't thank him enough. It's always got to be about fun and he has fun with them and works from the heart."

Johnson got wrapped up in a slough of photos after the awards presentation with family, coach-

was coming up to the hurdle. That's what I did and it worked."

She said that was her best time of the year by about a full second.

"I just saw an open track. I was in lane 5 and I just said 'I got a good lane and I should win this race."

Schneider had the lead in her heat until just after the last hurdle when Aricka Lambson of Carlisle pulled ahead two steps from the line at 1:05.99. Lambson took 3rd overall. Katie Nimrod of Decorah won the event running away with a 1:03.14 time, a full 2.6 seconds ahead of the pack.

Barnes, who struggled at least year's state meet after getting his shot disqualified for a dent and managed a 44'-9" throw with a borrowed shotput, made amends this year.

Going into the event seeded sixth, Barnes quickly got to work with a 53'-7.75" throw in the first round of the second flight. A throw that would hold up as the fourth best of the day.

Barnes scratched on his first two throws in the final and had a sub 50' throw on his last attempt. He stood in third place going into the finals, but Vinton-Shellburg's Cole Overton threw a 53'-10.75" on his first round throw to bump Barnes to 4th.

Barnes said getting that first good throw helped take the pressure off the rest of the rounds.

"That took a lot of pressure off," he said. "Obviously things didn't pan out the way we wanted as I scratched a lot of throws after that, but it took a lot of pressure away and I was able to just unleash."

Throwing coach Andrew Troxel, whose home state is Wisconsin, promised to put on an Iowa Hawkeye shirt if Barnes threw over 53". Good to his word, Troxel bought a shirt and put it on for pictures afterward. He bocked at wearing it during the medal ceremony, despite prodding from Barnes.

Troxel said Barnes has been a good student of the sport.

"He's exceptional. I've never met anyone so determined to take a perfomance to the next level," Troxel said. "He'll come in and work on his own on the little things until they're mastered."

Troxel said helping convert Barnes from a glider thrower to a rotational thrower was the key to this

Schneider, Gehle wrap up state with medals

DES MOINES - It was a banner day for seniors on the Fort Madison track and field team as two seniors wrapped up the day with five events and five medals.

HTC senior Brett Schneider took 7th in the 800-meter run and FMHS senior Caleb Gehle brought home four medals in the wheelchair events.

Schneider posted a 2:19.03 in the half-mile running in the fastest heat in Class 3A.

She started in lane 4 on the inside back starting line. Off the gun she got tangled with about five runners looking for wiggle room, but quickly jumped to the outside just after the first turn and slid up into the middle of the pack where she stayed until a final sprint off turn four of the second lap.

"We went out really fast," Schneider said. "I was trying not to get boxed in and I don't think I did so that was nice. Then I just tried to stay with the pack and then sprint at the 200-mark. I caught one, but everyone

Schneider said she saw the boxing happen and jumped out to lane two where she had some room.

Her best time in the 800-meter run was her sophomore year, but just didn't quite get there.

"My overall PR was a 2:17 when I was a sophomore and I was trying to get that," she said. "2:19 - I was happy with tha. It was almost a 2:18. It's been great running here, but I'm sad that it's over. I wish I would have placed a little higher."

Head Coach Brian Mendez said he's excited to see what Schneider will do at the University of Northern Iowa as a runner on that track and field team.

'She's got room to grow," he said. "If they want to mess with hurdles she could be competitive with that, but I think she'll run that half-mile and be very competitive - but that's just my opinion.

Schneider placed 6th in the 400-meter hurdles in Friday's competition.

"There's some people here running at UNI next year so I will remember them when I'm up there. I'll probably come back here and run, but it was great high school memories and I loved it," she said.

"She has been a complete treat to coach, and I'm just so happy for her to get two medals on her way out. It's just awesome," Mendez said.

Ellie Friesen of Crestwood had the top time in the 800-mile run at 2:13.63. Schneider was the only runner from Southeast Iowa in the event.

Caleb Gehle, who battles cerebral palsy, took fifth in the wheelchair shot put Saturday morning with a throw of 15'-5.75". That was the distance of his first official throw of the day which got him into the finals. His first throw in the finals came up short at just over 11' when his leg strap came loose, but the throw was official. His second two throws were 15'-1" and 15'-3". Gehle's top throw in 2017 was 14'-5" so he beat that mark by more than a foot.

"The distances weren't what I was looking for, but I

did better than last year so I'm happy with that, he said.

He had a busy day with three wheelchair races in the afternoon. He finished 6th in the 100-meter wheelchair dash with a time of 24.39, and 6th in the 200-meter wheelchair run with a time of 54.48. He said he had a little trouble with the some new gripping and sliding at the start of the race on the wet conditions.

"We had some different adhesive on my gloves and that caused me some problems, and the track was really wet so I had some trouble getting going," Gehle said about the 200-meter run.

He also took 6th in the 400-meter race, which he didn't compete in in 2017.
