Storm dumps 10 inches on city

City puts Snow Emergency Ordinance into effect

FORT MADISON – A winter storm that blew through the area dumped the first heavy snow on Fort Madison since November, sending kids into "snow angel" mode and city crews to the streets.

More than 10 inches of snow was recorded in several areas of Fort Madison and city officials issued an Emergency Snow Ordinance effective 8 p.m. on Saturday night. Cars should be parked on the odd side of the streets on even days, and on the even side of the street on odd-number days until 6 p.m. the following day. Sunday will be the 13th, so cars should be parked on the even-numbered sides of city streets. The ordinance will be in effect until further notice.

Vehicles not in compliance are subject to a citation and possible towing.

It was predicted by the National Weather Service out of the Quad Cities to begin snowing at about 6 p.m. Friday forcing changes to many school activities. However the snow showed up late, and stayed late as it was supposed to taper off at about noon Saturday, but was still coming down lightly at 6 p.m. Saturday afternoon.

City, county, and state crews began preparing streets for the impending snow storm Friday afternoon and then began plowing late Friday evening and early

FORT MADISON – The 2018 Fort Madison High School Bloodhound Hall of Fame was a mixed bag of those who made significant contributions to the school's athletic department.

Inmate sets cell on fire, assaults staff

Staff treated for minor injuries, inmate transported

FORT MADISON – A correctional officer was assaulted by an inmate at the Iowa State Penitentiary at approximately 11:52 a.m. Friday.

Staff were alerted to a fire alarm triggered in a living unit at the prison. As they began evacuating inmates from the building to the yard, they discovered that one inmate had started a fire in his cell, and had used his mattress to barricade himself inside. As a team of staff attempted to remove the inmate from the cell in order to extinguish the fire he had started, the inmate attempted to assault the responding correctional officers with closed-fist strikes. The staff utilized oleoresin capsicum (pepper) spray to subdue the aggressive inmate, and then quickly extinguished the fire.

The staff that were involved with the aggressive inmate were evaluated and treated by institution medical staff for smoke inhalation and minor physical injuries, and were released to finish the remainder of their shifts. The inmate that is suspected to have started the fire has been taken to the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics to be treated for self-inflicted injury.

The institution was placed on restricted movement while the smoke was cleared from the living unit, but has since returned to normal operation.

This incident remains under investigation.

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



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

Skinner ran track for the Bloodhounds from 1970-72 and was on the first FMHS boys cross country team where he was the state champion on the Class 3A mile team race and took 13th place at the two-mile state meet.

"I'm quite honored. I was totally surprised when I got the call saying I was going to be inducted into the Hall of Fame. I'm really excited about it," Skinner said.

Skinner was also named to the 880-yard run All-State squad and made the Iowa High School Athletic Association honor roll with the fifth fastest time for the 1970 track team in the 880-yard run. His time of 1:57.4 at the state meet broke the Fort Madison High School record. He was also the team captain as a senior on the Bloodhound basketball team.

Skinner went on to run at Northeast Missour University and Simpson College, where in 1976 he ran a 4:22 mile, breaking that school's record.

He is currently in Des Moines serving as a caretaker, and a handyman and painter.

Faulkner said getting the induction was really a dream of his and one he thought he wouldn't qualify for.

"It's just a dream. People want to be in the sports Hall of Fame, or All-Americans or whatever. I never thought I would be a Pulitzer Prize winner or anything and I would just work for a smalltown paper. But this actually means more to me to be able to cover these kids," he said.

Faulkner said he didn't think he would be nominated because he thought he had to be a coach or player, and he isn't originally from here.

"I just think it's a cool thing that God gave me the gift of writing and then he showed me that you could actually get paid to watch high school kids play high school sports," Faulkner said with a laugh.

Faulkner is already in the Iowa High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame for basketball media coverage. He's also in the Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Association for his work as a reporter.

Dick Burch was inducted after spend-

ing 26 years in the district coaching baseball, basketball, tennis, football and golf. He graduated from Fort Madison High School in 1970.

"Basically this means a lot to me, because I'm a firm believer that the kids are what we're here for. The 26 years I spent on baseball and other sports... it was to influence the kids in positive ways so they could build character."

Burch earned back-to-back conference titles in baseball in 1977 and 1978 and then won them again in 1981 and 1983. His teams won district championships from 1988-90, 1992 and 2000. During those years 17 players were named First-Team All-State.

"I don't ever get tired of telling this story, but in 2000 when we won the state baseball championships we started with seven wins and six losses and we decided we better have a talk with the kids because we could play 40 games and end up 20 and 20 and nothing happens," Burch said. "So we named names and told the kids they needed to play together as a team and not worry about their individual stats. And if they bought into that, they could have a pretty good season. So from a 7-6 start we finished that

year 33-9 and state champs."

Allen was a four-time conference tennis champion at No. 1 singles. Three times he qualified for the state tennis tournament, while also earning thrid place in doubles in 1982. In 1983 he captured the state Class 2A singles state championship.

He was a multi-sport athlete who was also a two-year starter in basketball and was a member of the student council and National Honor Society. After high school, he enrolled at Gustavus Adolphus College where he was a four-year letter winner, a three-time all-conference selection, a three-time NCAA National Tournament qualifier and was a 1986 and 1987 NCAA Division III All- American. In 1987, he was named the NCAA Division III Player of the Year.

Following graduation he served as a tennis professional at the Flagship Athletic Club in Minneapolis and he also did a stint as the Men's Assistant Tennis Coach at the University of Southern California from 1990-92.



City reminds residents of snow removal guidelines

Saturday morning.

City Building Director Doug Krogmeier is reminding residents that residential sidewalks need to be tended to shortly after accumulation stops.

In addition to city code on removing snow and ice from sidewalks, the city could initiate a notice to abate nuisance if snow removal isn't done in a timely manner

The abatement would require all snow and ice to be removed with 24 hours after snow stops accumulating. Snow and ice must be removed from all public sidewalks with the city limits. The city can at some point, if no action is taken by the property owner, abate the nuisance by clearing the sidewalks themselves and assess the property owner for the costs of the abatement

County and state crews also started

working early Saturday morning to clear highways. Roadways leading to the Hwy. 61 bypass were snow-covered until Saturday afternoon, with slick on and off ramps. The bypass itself was passable in one lane but snow covered in the other, while crews worked around the county.

Several cars were found spun into ditches along the highways, especially in the southern part of the county. The Lee County Sheriff's Department had extra manpower on the county highways to help mitigate dangerous situations.

All area sports events for Saturday were postponed including the annual Cake Auction at the Holy Trinity Catholic basketball games against Fort Madison. The games were postponed until Monday starting at 6 p.m.

Fedler's freebies give Hounds sweep of Keokuk

The junior post player scored 23, including knocking down two free throws with 1.1 seconds on the clock and the Hounds down by one as Fort Madison beat Keokuk 49-48 in dramatic fashion Friday at

The Hounds knocked off Keokuk on the road earlier this year 61-59 when the Chiefs' 7-foot center Alex Wolter missed a couple of free throws with no time remaining to force overtime. Fedler hit an

remaining to force overtime. Fedler hit an 18-foot jump shot with :09 left in overtime for the win back on Nov. 30.

On Friday, the Hounds trailed by one with 11 seconds on the clock. Senior Logan Rashid inbounded in front of the Hounds' student section and then got the ball back at the top of the key. After a cross-over at the top that allowed him room into the paint, Rashid drove the lane and threw up a shot that went off the rim. Fedler was there to clean up the rebound, but was fouled trying to put it back in with just one second remaining.

He calmly stroked two free throws that didn't hit anything but net and put the Bloodhounds up by one 49-48. The Chiefs immediately called a time out to set up a full-court inbounds play. Once FMHS Head Coach Ryan Wilson saw the set, he called a time out to set up a defense.

With Fedler chasing and chirping at Keokuk's Callum Tackes back and forth along the baseline, Keokuk called another time out to prevent a 5-second violation.

Out of the timeout, Keokuk slid Tyjai Mueller down to the baseline while Fedler was chasing the ball to try to draw a charge, Fedler collided with Mueller, but no call was made and the Chiefs couldn't get a good shot off from the inbound pass.

Wilson said they gave Fedler a warning about Keokuk possibly trying to draw a charge on the inbounds out of the first time out, but Keokuk didn't set up that

ball in front of us, nothing deep, nothing over the top, maybe a catch, one dribble and it's got a go," Wilson said.

He said he's confident in Fedler with the ball shooting at the line and in a five-out offense set like he ran Friday with Wolter looming inside.

"Statistically, he's our best free throw shooter. Jayden has a nice touch. He hit a three for us tonight and really hit the game-winner down at their place. He spends some time shooting the jump shots and getting into the gym doing those things and that's what makes him a special player for us," Wilson said.

Fort Madison trailed just once in the first half when Keokuk sophomore Anthony Potratz hit a 3-ball with his mouthguard hanging out to open the scoring. Rashid would counter at the other end to tie it up and the Hounds would stretch the lead to 12-7 when senior Jordyn Gerdes scored on a put-back underneath. Wolter would score before the end of the quarter to cut the lead to three at 12-9. Fedler had five of the Hounds' first 12.

The two squads traded buckets to open the second quarter, but senior Brandon Keester would hit for a three from the left wing in front of the Keokuk bench to push Fort Madison's lead to 19-12. Keokuk's Isaiah Seay would counter at the other end of the floor. Seay would score nine straight to keep the Chiefs within striking distance

Fedler would score on back-to-back buckets with about 1:28 left in the half and Keester hit the back end of a one-and-one to give Fort Madison a 27-21 lead, but Mueller would score twice in transition in the final :40 of the half to cut the lead to

Keokuk girls' pressure too much for Lady Hounds

FORT MADISON – Fort Madison's girls basketball team had eight players score in Friday's 21-56 loss to Keokuk, but the leading scorer had just four points.

The Lady Hounds went scoreless for the first three minutes while Keokuk seemed to score at will rushing out to a 20-5 first quarter lead. Fort Madison shot just 1 of 6 from the field and 2 of 7 from the free throw line in the quarter.

Fort Madison, playing in a match-up zone defense in the first quarter, forced the Chief's into some long, drawn out possessions moving the Bloodhounds around the perimeter, but eventually, Keokuk would find a pass underneath or an open look in the ball rotation gaps.

Senior Eleesha Estrada got the scoring going for the Hounds with a 3-pointer at the 4:27 mark from the left wing, but it would be the only bucket the Hounds would get in the period. Freshman Anna Lynk and sophomore Brandy Walker would each add a free throw for the Hounds' only first quarter points.

"They really play some in-your face, pressure defense," Head Coach Todd McGhghy said. "Our skill deficiencies, with something like that, really get exposed with those types of teams. It just is what it is right now."

He said the team's goal was to break the Keokuk press on the inbounds and he said the team accomplished that, but the Hounds couldn't get going in the half-court set. McGhghy said trying to score out of the half-court offense at this point in the program, just isn't there yet.

The Bloodhounds went ice cold shooting in the second quarter only converting one bucket by senior Jassmine Bass underneath, after she cleaned up a miss by sophomore Maddie Rashid. Braxtyn McGhghy made a couple of free throws

and Estrada added a freebie for the Hounds only points.

Keokuk only made three baskets of their own in the second quarter, but still outscored Fort Madison 14-5, The Hounds kept the Chief's top scorer MacKenzie Northup, who's averaging close to 18 points per outing, to just nine points in the first half.

But the senior would open things up in further in third period scoring five unanswered to push the lead to 41-10. Fort Madison would go scoreless in the third period getting off just three total shots and not getting to the foul line in the quarter. Northup and junior Michenna Davis combined for 13 of the 15 Chiefs points to put the game all but out of reach at 51-10 at the end of three.

Fort Madison would find the rim in the final period with junior Anna Kester scoring twice, Rashid converted the first points of the second half for the Hounds to open the fourth quarter. Sophomore Nadia Boeding also put up a bucket in an 11-5 run by the Hounds. Northup scored all five points for the Hounds in the period.

McGhghy said they tried different defenses to shut down Northup.

"We even went to diamond and one, and they just transitioned so well, it was for us to find her. Keokuk's good now, their going to do well," McGhghy said.

"But we are where we are. It's a never ending battle of – this skill we don't have is killing us right now, or that skill...but the one thing I continue to get is incredible effort. Mental effort, sometimes when the girls look up at the scoreboard and see, well it's over, we have to get through that."

Estrada and Kester led the Hounds with four apiece. McGhghy and Rashid had three each. Walker, Bass and Boeding each scored two points and Anna Link added a point. Sara Bernhardt led Fort Madison with four rebounds and

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

two at 27-25 going into halftime.

Keokuk would score first out of the break with 6:20 left when Mueller scored on a drive off the left wing to tie the game at 27. Fedler would then step out onto the left baseline on the Hounds' next possession and drain a 3-ball.

Freshman Dayton Davis would score on the next trip down to give the Hounds a 5-point cushion at 32-27 before Keokuk ripped off a 9-4 run to pull with one at 37-36 going into the final period.

Wolter would step out of the lane on the Chiefs' first possession and hit a 10-footer to give Keokuk a 38-37 lead and then Tackes would score for a 40-37 Chiefs' lead. Junior Parker Denning would score inside for Fort Madison with a hanging drive that went up and over Wolter's reach, but Tackes would score again on the next trip down following a :30 timeout by Wilson.

Fedler again would convert two free throws to make it a one-point game again and then Davis would get fouled on a drive from the right side and make both of his freebies with 3:27 left.

Wolter would score the next time down for Keokuk and get fouled but missed his free throw to make it 44-43 Keokuk.

The Hounds would miss on their next two possessions, while Keokuk kept feeding Wolter inside. With just 1:24 on the clock and Keokuk up 46-43, Davis stroked a 3-ball in front of the Fort Madison student section to knot the game at 46 and prompting Wilson to call a time out.

The Chiefs were able to get the ball back inside to Wolter who scored easily to put Keokuk up 48-46. Rashid penetrated from the top of the key and was able to draw the foul, but an acrobatic attempt to get the ball over Wolter fell short. Rashid made the front end of two, but missed the second.

Keokuk called a time out to set up the final :45 out of the break and Mueller was fouled and sent to the line, where a lane violation on the front end of the one-andone nullified the first free throw and turned the ball over to Fort Madison, who called a time out setting up the final :26.

Wilson said the Bloodhounds did a much better job controlling the ball in the fourth quarter.

"That's been a problem for us all year. Composure and

taking care of the ball in the fourth quarter. There have been a lot of opportunities we've had but didn't execute it. Tonight our kids played excellent down the stretch," he said.

"We moved the ball and attacked the basket and Jayden got a big offensive rebound there at the end and, for the second time this year, Jayden came through at the end and beat Keokuk for us."

Fort Madison improves to 5-7 on the year, but are 3-2 in conference play and travels across town to Holy Trinity Catholic tonight for a girls/boys doubleheader. Keokuk was led by Wolter with 16 points. They move to 6-6 on the year, but are just 1-4 in conference play.
