State finds crack in city's sidewalk plan

FORT MADISON - A \$1.5 million project to redo the sidewalks along the Main Street District on Avenue G took a stumble recently when the state officials said the south side of the avenue didn't qualify for the project.

The project is being made possible because of the city's waste water treatment plant overhaul. The city is allowed to used 10% of the cost of the project capped at \$1.5 million, for another sponsored project aimed at

further waste and storm water treatment.

The plan as originally presented would have put what are called "permeable pavers" from the curbs on Avenue G in the Main Street District six feet into the sidewalks. The other six feet to the buildings on the street would be concrete. Storm water would be absorbed into underground tanks and as those tanks filled another pipe would let the water stream out into the underground where it would be absorbed and move through the natural filtering of the soil toward the river.

City Manager David Varley said state officials said the south side of the street didn't qualify for the project.

"They're saying the north side treats x percent of water, but the south side treats a much smaller amount, because it's hooked up to lines that run to the river," Varley said Friday.

"So we came up with a plan B and have resubmitted it. We haven't heard back yet, but our goal is make the changes needed to make this happen. We included a couple inlets on the south side to pick up a higher

The reporter I was talking with mentioned the disassembling of Chapter 20 last year, and how animosity runs at an all-time high in some districts right now. Chapter 20 stripped bargaining

## FM youth charged with trying to rob home with knife

FORT MADISON - Detectives from the Lee County Sheriff's office have arrested a 15-year-old male juvenile from Fort Madison in connection with a Friday morning break-in in St. Paul.

According to Lee County Sheriff Stacy Weber, the juvenile is being charged with burglary and assault and is currently in the Southeast Iowa Juvenile Detention Center awaiting a hearing.

Detectives Chad Donaldson and Clint Wray made the arrest and had the juvenile in custody shortly after 3 p.m. today.

Weber said the initial charges are forcible felonies, but declined to release the juvenile's name. He said the juvenile has a Fort Madison address, but lives out in the

The youth allegedly broke into the home in the 1400 block of 210th Avenue at about 1:42 a.m. and confronted the residents with a knife demanding money. A release from the sheriff's department says a struggle ensued where the homeowner was able to defend himself the home and disarm the intruder until he fled on foot to a truck that was waiting in the driveway.

"These guys picked the wrong house. The homeowners defended themselves rigorously," Lee County Sheriff Stacy Weber said Friday.

Witnesses to the incident reported the vehicle could possibly be a single cab pickup with a decal in the rear window. The intruder was described as being approximately 5'10" to 6' tall and wearing a dark hoodie.

According to the report, the vehicle drove away immediately as though someone was waiting for the suspect in the getaway vehicle.

No medical attention was needed at the home. Law enforcement released information on the incident and were looking for help in securing the perpetrator and anyone in connection with the escape.





Barnes' throw was almost two full feet ahead West Burlington's Landon Greer at 48.03.5. Heath Hoenig took 47th place with a 37-foot throw and Alec Craft tossed the shot 34' for 64th place.





# City officials still hope to get project done in 2018

percent of storm water to get it to the tanks for the slow release, and get the whole project qualified."

Varley said the city and HR Green Associates of Cedar Rapids, who's helping the city get approval for the project, think the numbers are high enough now.

"Everyone else says we're good to go, but if it's still not enough to qualify the project, we'll find a way around it. I think they'll get back with us soon. Our plan is to get started and we should be able to get it completed this year."

Varley said the \$1.5 million is grant money and comes from the interest paid on the waste treatment plant. However, there may be a slight increase in the cost. Preliminary estimates on the original plan were \$1.8 million.

"The cost might be slightly higher, because of the cost of concrete or curbing, but we're trying to keep it under that amount," he said.

The project comes as the city is set to begin redoing U.S. Hwy 61 or Avenue H, from 2nd to 6th streets this spring and summer. Incremental phases will take place in the following two years to eventually redo the entire thoroughfare through 20th Street. The city also has plans to redo Avenue G downtown and separate the storm and waste water lines under timelines from the Environmental Protection Agency.

## District improving in spite of Chapter 20

answered that question jam-packed with confidence, and a barely noticeable hint of emotion.

"It's a huge honor and I have so much respect for everyone in this district. Everyone that puts our kids first... everyone," she said.

"We have a made a distinct effort to sit around the table and collaborate. That comes from everybody. We want to promote that we work together and that it's just for the betterment of our students. So we have a common goal. Chapter 20 did not change the collaborative spirit of this district."

Board member Gayla Young, who's a teacher in the Danville district, said Fort Madison is kind of charting its own path in the wake of the sweeping changes of the law.

"With all the changes with Chapter 20, I know of so many districts where the administration and the board and the teachers are at odds. Erin was able to take Chapter 20 and guide us through it."

"They don't feel this mentality of 'us against them' and they know she's got everyone's best interest at heart. She wants to do what's best for kids, but also what's best for the staff. I think one of the great things right now is her transpar-



ency. There's no hidden agenda here. We're putting it out there, and probably to me, that's one of the biggest things we have going right now."

Sitting through many hours of school board meetings, I see the status quo is not good enough...not even close. For certain, everything's not perfect. But we're in a growth mode here. If not in enrollment, most assuredly in our approach to students and their daily needs in and out of school. There's a majority sense of fostering improvement, and dare I say, friendships with the employees of the district. Slater is extremely visible and engaged in the community. And the nomination forms of teachers in the district speak volumes to the future they

She's trying to get a state-ofthe-art preK-3 elementary school built to impact students first and foremost, and the community as a whole. She's steering a ship that was launched before her time...on some pretty rocky seas. With the help of a great crew of advocates, the district almost landed that ship last year. It really is in the best interest to bring that ship home this year.

"What sets her apart is that we were behind in best practices that weren't researched or implemented as a district," said Dravis, reading from the nomination forms that secured the state selection for Slater.

"She came in when our educational community seemed to be falling behind in many ways. Our district is now working towards where highly effective districts already are. We are proud of where we are headed and looking forward to the changes to enhance the learning environments of all."

"This is an honor. Gosh... I'm speechless," Slater said. "Everybody here is a team and nobody does it alone. I feel very lucky to have landed here. We picked a great place... it's a great match, and I can't imagine not working with each and every one of you," Slater told the room.
