# Randolph, Greenwald step aside

After 14 years both mayor, councilman bow out with nod to city staff

FORT MADISON - It was a short and bitter sweet meeting for former Mayor Brad Randolph and city councilman Chris Greenwald.

The two ended their terms after 14 years as councilmen, mayor protem, and mayor.

The two have run tandem since being elected in 2005, with Randolph being appointed mayor after Steve Ireland's death in 2012. Randolph was re-elected to the post each time, until he decided not to seek the office again in 2019.

Greenwald was first elected to the 2nd ward, but then switched to first ward councilman in the 2011 election after pur-



chasing a home that was annexed into the city in the first ward.

Also at the meeting, newly elected Mayor Matt Mohrfeld was sworn in by Randolph, as were incumbents Kevin Rink and Chad Cangas, and newly elected 1st Ward councilwoman Rebecca Bowker and 3rd Ward councilman

Tyler Miller.

Greenwald took time during the councilmens' comments to thank the entire staff and department heads for their service and said despite banging heads on issues, he leaves with total faith in their abilities to run the city, and started with Police Chief Mark Rohloff.



"First of all it was a matter of public record that when we first hired you, chief, there was folks that felt that there was no police chief that was going to satisfy a couple council members," Greenwald said.

"And I've got a sneaking suspicion that I might have been one of those

being talked about. As you live and breathe, you're proof that that just wasn't true. I thank you and your wife for coming to Fort Madison."

Greenwald said he and Fire Chief Joey Herren had interesting times and he's earned Greenwald's

"It's under investigation but we believe it started with some wiring in the attic," Herren said.

He said the damage was heavy enough that the family wasn't able to return to the home.

"I notified Red Cross and they're helping."

At around 11 a.m., firefighters were called to the 2600 block of Avenue where a garage had caught fire.

Herren said residents were stealing electricity from Alliant energy by running wires from the meter base on the garage to the house and the make-shift junction box caught fire.

Due to the close proximity of the fire station, the building wasn't a total loss. "It had some minor fire and smoke damage and some damage to the rafters, but it was pretty close to the station and we got it down pretty quick," Herren



said.

# Thurmans lead HTC to win over Van Buren

Crusaders hold off 4th quarter rally for 59-49 win over Warriors

VAN BUREN – Jason and Vasin Thurman combined for 27 points to help Holy Trinity Catholic to it's second win of the year, 59-49 over Van Buren Tuesday night.

The Crusaders (2-3) were coming off a last-second loss to then-undefeated Burlington Notre Dame on Friday night. The Nikes were upset by New London Tuesday night 59-57.

Holy Trinity got behind early in a nip-and-tuck first quarter not getting their first bucket until almost three minutes had gone by. Van Buren freshman Jackson Manning hit a 3-ball to get the scoring going out of the tip for the Warriors, who would go up 5-0 before the Crusaders would get on the board.

HTC would battle back and take a lead at 9-7, but another Jonah Heckenberg 3-ball would give Van Buren a 10-9 lead at the end of one. Jason Thurman had five of the Crusaders first nine points on two free throws and 3-pointer from his guard spot.

Van Buren would surrender the lead again at 11-10 with six minutes left in the half and HTC would stretch that lead to five at 17-12 before the Warriors came rushing back on a 11-4 run to take a 23-21 lead with one minute left in the half.

But in the final minute of the half, HTC would tack on six points to Van Buren's two for a 27-25 half time lead.

Out of the locker room, the Crusaders would push their advantage to as much as 12 at 44-32 at the end of three behind senior Quentin Schneider's six points.

Holding a 16-point lead at 48-32 going into the final period, the Crusaders got ice cold with about five minutes left and were held scoreless until less than a minute remained in the game. The Warriors were able to chip away at the lead cutting it to seven with a minute left, but HTC would run away in the final minute on a 5-2 run to put the game out of reach.

Vasin Thurman had 15 points on the night, while Jason Thurman had 12. Schneider finished with 10. Chandler Rung had eight, all in the second half. Crabtree finished with nine, all in the first half and Matt Hellige had seven on the night.

# Fort Madison boys hold on to win at Danville

Bloodhounds looking for first conference win Friday night

FORT MADISON - The Fort Madison boys basketball team will be looking for its first conference win of the year on Friday when they travel to Keokuk.

The Hounds (2-4) are coming off a 57-44 win Monday night on the road at Danville.

Fort Madison Head Coach Ryan Wilson said the Hounds got out to quick start, but the Bears rallied in the first quarter to take a 17-14 lead.

"Danville rallied back with us missing shots and them pushing, and our guys were not getting back in transition," Wilson said.

"In the 2nd quarter we switched to a zone defense and that gave them troubles the rest of the night."

A trait of the Hounds in wins is that they get bal-

anced scoring and that held to form Monday with senior Jayden Fedler and sophomore Dayton Davis each pitching in 16 to lead Fort Madison.

Davis shot just 25% from the field going 4 of 16 and missed on all four of his 3-point attempts, but heated up at the free throw line going 8 of 12.

Fedler was a little hotter working under the basket going 7 of 19 for 37% and was 2-of 3 at the free throw line. Fedler also controlled the glass all night with 15 rebounds. Senior Parker Denning was second with eight boards.

The Hounds held a 29-27 advantage at halftime and pushed the lead to 43-39 at the end of three. Then Fort Madison's defense stepped up and held Danville to just five points in the final period to slip away for the win.

"We played great half court defense and rebounded very well. We're still missing a lot of shots around the rim and have to start converting those soon," Wilson said.

He said Keokuk will press and then slip into a trapping half court defense and the Hounds will have to

take care of the ball to have a shot at getting their first conference win of the year.

The Hounds are 0-2 in the Southeast Conference this vear with losses to Mt. Pleasant and Fairfield already on the books. Keokuk is 2-2 on the year and 1-1 in loop action with a win over Mt. Pleasant and a loss to Burlington.

Senior guard Michael Mosena had a season high 11 points Monday, followed by Denning with eight. Miles Dear had four and Julian Navarro had a bucket to round out the scoring for Fort Madison.

Davis had six steals, six assists and five boards. He leads the conference in steals and is second in assists. Fedler and Davis are 3rd and 4th in scoring at 13.4 and 13.0 points per game respectively.

Fedler is tops in rebounding in the conference, almost doubling the next closest player. He has 48 on the year, 26 of those are offensive boards and the next closest is the Bloodhounds' Denning, Mt. Pleasant's Brody Bender and Brock Sobaski of Washington, all with 25 total rebounds.

respect as a fire chief, as has Sarah Clendineng, the city's librarian. Greenwald then addressed Building Director Doug Krogmeier.

"Doug, your job sucks," Greenwald said to laughter from the crowd. "You do a great job at it. I don't know how you do your job. I try to put myself in your shoes... I don't know how you do it."

He said city finance director Peggy Steffensmeier has handled budgeting well, and said there was questions whether he trusted city staff with budgets.

'If budgets were easy we wouldn't need councils," he said. "Everybody sitting up here is doing what they think is best for Fort Madison, we just have different ways of looking at it."

The other councilman thanked Greenwald and Randolph for their service to the city.

Randolph said he would be meeting with department heads before the end of the year one on one.

"I would like to thank first of all the citizens for their support they've given me in my tenure on council," he said.

"I'd also like to thank the volunteers we appoint year over year that occupy boards and commissions that come in on their own free will and do what they feel is best for the city."

He thanked the employees of the city for providing services and keeping quality of life at its best so the citizens can continue to enjoy the city.

"I would also thank the department heads for their help and support over the years and would echo Chris' comments with the chief of police. I think you fit in extremely well with our community in the short time you've been here. You've been nothing but impressive, and you are matching the tenure of those sitting with you because they do a great job as well," Randolph said.

He thanked the council and said it's been an honor and he's looking forward to watching them take the city to the next level.

He then got emotional thanking Matt Mohrfeld for stepping into the role as Mayor and making his transition easy. And then pointed to his youngest daughter in the audience who came to the meeting, as the rest of his family had to attend another daughter's sporting event out of town.

"I want to thank my daughter....," Randolph said through tears. And then after a brief pause moved the discussion to other councilman.

Mohrfeld then presented Greenwald and Randolph both with plaques for their service.

"I've always been a supporter of these two. Chris has been very good when I came on the council and giving me insight to issues," Mohrfeld said.

"And I could only aspire to to be the quality of mayor Brad is. I think his leadership to the council, to the citizens and southeast Iowa – when you go somewhere with Brad he's well-respected among his peers and he puts a very good face on the city of Fort Madison. I can't say enough about the job you've done, and I'm going to miss you guys."


