# Tourism board gives Riverfest \$10K boost

Craft says marketing national acts properly could fill up city's hotels, campgrounds

FORT MADISON - The Fort Madison Tourism board granted Fort Madison's resurgent summer festival Riverfest \$10,000 to help the organization build on its momentum.

Fort Madison Mayor Brad Randolph told RiverFest co-founder Charles Craft that request was a big ask, but the first two-years of the event has shown organizers are bringing in thousands of people to the event and they are doing the right things to warrant the grant.

"It's a big ask, no question about it," Randolph told Craft. "I do think that people appreciate the ability to be able to come, even locally, to participate in an event, as people always say there's nothing to do. And you stepping up and doing that is huge, and we appreciate that. But we have to weigh the ask and how it's justified to how we award other grants."

Craft updated the board on the progress and planning of the 2018 event including entertainment and issues with parking, accommodations and the group's charitable efforts in conjunction with the event. This is

Craft's third year spearheading the event.

Board member Kim Engle voted, after about a 30-minute discussion, to give Riverfest the \$10,000 they had requested to help aid in the marketing efforts

of the event. Last year Craft requested \$5,000 and was given \$2,500.

# Woman wanted on prostitution charge grabbed in Mason City

FORT MADISON - An Indianola woman charged with prostitution in 2017 after an investigation into the Avenue L Day Spa in Fort Madison is now facing similar charges in Mason City.

Yu Hong, 37, of Indianola, was wanted by Fort Madison police after a November 2016 undercover sting operation revealed sexual services were allegedly being offered at the salon as an extension to massage services.

According to Fort Madison Police Chief Tim Sittig, the business was shuttered in December of 2016.

According to court documents, an undercover officer went into the business to conduct a "sting" on the

# Riverfest expenditures will pass \$120K in 2018

Randolph, who sits on the board, hesitated slightly before voting in favor of the grant from city tourism funds. Board member Mark Lair, who also sits on the Fort Madison City Council meeting, voted against the expenditure.

Prior to voting, Randolph asked Craft how he would justify \$10,000.

"Dollars for dollars we're going to bring people into town," Craft said. "Other than rodeo, there's definitely not another event in Fort Madison that has the capability to bring thousands of people to town and fill up all the hotels. And hopefully have those people descend like a plague of locusts on our local businesses."

The Riverfest committee has a full slate of rock bands from the 70s through contemporary rock, including 80s superband Firehouse, Saving Abel, Hinder, and chart-topping Pop Evil. Local favorites like The Brandon Gibbs Band, and Chaz and the Channelcats, regional favorites Stumptown and the NATU Band are also scheduled. Cover groups X-Crush, Decade of Decadence, Jive Radio, and Headfirst, round out the entertainment. Craft said there will be another group announced later in addition to the winner of the May 27th's Battle of the Bands at Vinnie's Longbranch, which will get to perform on the Main Stage prior to Saving Abel.

The Battle of the Bands will also feature a charitable arm, where those in attendance can vote for their favorite charity out of the following: Puppy Jake Foundation of Urbandale, Fort Madison's Ellliott Test Kitchen or PAW animal shelter. Puppy Jake prepares service dogs for wounded veterans.

"One of the reasons we increased our advertising is our lineup. We want to reach out as far as we can to let people know what we're doing. It takes 3 to 5 years for people to get used to something they do in the summertime."

Board member Wright said he has friends that travel

to Des Moines or the Quad Cities to see a club band.

"For us to have this level of bands from the 80s and 90s you're going to have a lot of people driving into the tri-state area to come to a show like this," Wright

Craft said with the festival growing each year, he's estimated total expenditures to be around \$120,000 this year, compared to roughly \$50,000 in 2017.

He said to date he's only done about \$500 in marketing and that was predominantly on Facebook boosting posts to identified areas that support the type of music the festival committee is bringing in.

"We'll be doing our main advertising push after Steamboat Days," Craft said. "I don't think it's a good idea for us to market locally until that event is over. We've partnered with Pritchard Broadcasting so we're going to do a lot of radio to reach those rock markets."

Craft said the city should be expecting to have all the hotel rooms taken up for the weekend which will benefit the city's hotel/motel tax funds. He said he's also working with city staff to be able to provide reserved camping.

He said his committee has tailored the music the way they did so people would come into town on Thursday and stay through the weekend to take advantage of more of the same type of music they saw on Thursday, all at one price.

Tickets are currently on sale through Ticketfly. A 4-day grounds pass good for all music is \$35, with VIP tickets which grant access to upfront stage seating is \$55 for all four days. Single day tickets are \$25 each.

Craft said one hurdle is people who want to camp in the area for the weekend.

"The biggest hiccup is that they won't pay for the whole weekend if they can't reserve a camping spot. The Rodeo has first right of refusal so we're working on that with the city. I've volunteered to handle that, but if we can get some of these camping sites with



online reservations we can fill those up, too."

Board member Julie Hellman suggested the open fields near the prison or even inside the prison walls, but Randolph said the liability with the Department of Corrections would be too high.

In other action, the board heard from Fort Madison documentarian and historian, Mike Killoren, who has offered to create marketing videos for the city that could be played on hotel or restaurant televisions and monitors, or other locations that have televisions. Killoren said he wasn't looking for any funding, but was willing to put the videos together. He said hotels could play the videos so people staying in the area could see what other attractions and history are available during their stays.

Killoren said the videos could be uploaded to jump drives and installed directly on the television and could be loaded with several different videos that the locations could control and would give people, even in waiting rooms at hospitals, an opportunity to plan to explore the area.

City Tourism director Jean Peiton also informed the board of a new app and website service that she wanted to integrate city tourism with, which would allow visitors or those looking at visiting the area to download and have at their fingertips on their phones. She said the city's site still isn't smartphone compatible and this would give the city a more user-friendly tool to market the area. She said the company called TourBurst out of Nauvoo is charging around \$4,000 per year for the app and website management. They are looking to get 25 more area communities involved to give it a regional impact.

Board members Kim Engle and Julie Hellman questioned the value of the app and what the incentive would be to download the app. Peiton said the cost is about the same as one print ad and website presence in the Chicago area. City Manager David Varley said this is something the city should try and see what value comes from it and if it doesn't deliver or goes belly up, the city can opt out next year. Peiton said ultimately city businesses, who would be included in the first year at no cost to them, would in following years be asked to pay a fee to be included in the app program, to offset the annual costs.


#### LAWRENCE "LARRY" LOWARY

# Fishing activity warming up in southeast Iowa

DES MOINES - The following is the Iowa Department of Natural Resources fishing report for the week ending April, 25, 2018.

#### **Big Hollow Lake**

Water temperature is holding around 44 degrees. Just need some warm days to get it going up to normal. Very little angler activity because of the weather.

#### Lake Belva Deer

Cold, windy weather with a little snow is keeping most anglers away. Largemouth Bass-Slow: A few are getting picked up in the deeper water. Try on the upper end of the lake around the mounds.

#### Lake Darling

Water temperature is holding in the low 40's. Water clarity is pretty good, except when the wind stirs the lake bottom up. Black Crappie - Slow: A few anglers have been catching some crappies out in deeper water over the habitat.

#### **Lost Grove Lake**

A few anglers have been out. Cold, windy weather doesn't make for the best fishing weather. Largemouth Bass - Slow: Most angler trips are pretty short, but they are picking up some bass out around the deeper habitat.

#### **Central Park Lake**

The lake is currently drained as a renovation project is finishing up this spring.

#### Coralville Reservoir

The lake is at normal spring pool of 679.4 feet. Boating above Lake Macbride Park is not recommended at this water level. Channel Catfish - Slow. White Crappie – Slow.

#### **Diamond Lake**

Black Crappie - Fair: Fishing had been slow, but it should pick up as the weather warms. Try small jigs fished around the rock jetties or brush piles. Most fish are 8-9 inches.

#### **Kent Park Lake**

The lake is currently drained for a lake renovation project. It is scheduled to be completed by the spring of 2019.

#### Lake Macbride

Water temperatures are in the mid 40's. All boat docks are in. All motor sizes may be used at no-wake speed (5 mph). Black Crappie - Slow: Try fishing jigs or minnows over deeper brush. There are lots of 10-12 inch crappies. Walleye -

Slow: A few fish are being caught. A shallow water bite should improve as things warm up. Cast jigs or stick baits to windblown banks.

#### **Pleasant Creek Lake**

The lake is still 7-8 inches low from the restoration project. The main ramp is usable, but it is shallow; use caution. There is a boat dock in on the east lane. Be cautious when boating as new structures have started to be submerged.

#### **Prairie Park Fishery**

500 additional trout will be stocked here this Saturday, April 21 at 10:30. There will be a family fishing event held in conjunction with the stocking. 1500 trout had previously been stocked here on March 31. Iowa residents and nonresidents who are required to have a fishing license must pay the Trout Fee to fish for or possess trout. Exception: Anglers under 16 years old may possess or fish for trout without having paid the Trout Fee if they fish with a properly licensed adult who has paid the Trout Fee and together their combined limit is 5. Rainbow Trout - Excellent: Try small jigs, spinners, live bait or arti-

#### Lake Sugema

Try using cut bait for channel catfish. The water temperature is in the low 40's.

#### Lake Wapello

Use cut bait on the windblown shorelines to catch channel catfish this time of year. Catch largemouth bass around brush piles.

Trout were stocked on

March 30th. Try small tube and twister jigs, inline spinners or casting spoons.

#### Rathbun Reservoir

The current lake level is 903.66 msl. Normal operating elevation is 904.0 msl. Lake Rathbun has zebra mussels, so make sure to properly drain, clean, and dry equipment before transporting to another water body. The water temperature is in the low 40's. Channel Catfish -Fair: Use shad sides or cut bait on the windblown shorelines.

#### **Red Haw Lake**

Try cut bait near shorelines with the wind blowing in for channel catfish.

The district includes Mahaska, Lucas, Wayne, Monroe, Appanoose, Wapello, Davis and Van Buren counties. Contact the Rathbun Fish Hatchery at 641-647-2406 with questions about fishing in south central Iowa.

#### Mississippi River Pool 19

Tailwater stage is 6.39 feet at Lock and Dam 19 above Burlington and is rising. River stage is forecasted to reach 8.2 feet over the weekend. Flood stage at Lock and Dam 18 is 10 feet. We have not received any fishing reports for this pool this week.

River stages have been on the rise the past few days. Main channel water temperature dropped to 41 degrees; water clarity has been fair. We have not received much for fishing reports this week. If you have questions on fishing Pools 16-19, contact the Fairport Fish Hatchery at 563-263-5062.

business and paid \$40 for a 30-minute massage in which Hong was alleged to have offered herself up as part of the massage, and attempted to engage in sexual activities with the undercover officer.

Sittig said Friday the officer was not an officer with the Fort Madison Police Department, but was brought in from another area law enforcement agency. The complaint alleges that the undercover officer, after getting evidence outside of the business license, told Hong "No" and to stop, and then left the parlor.

Sittig said the officer could have been in the parlor for the full 30 minutes, but didn't engage in sexual activity with Hong, contrary to other news

"These are stings, and in a situation like this it may take 30 minutes to get the evidence we needed. But when she started to get feely he told her No... to stop, and then he got up and left the parlor. It was raided a short time later and we closed it down." Sittig said.

A warrant for Hong's arrest was put out after the criminal complaint was filed in June.

He said the investigation was done in conjunction with the Iowa Department of Criminal Investigation and investigators were also looking at a possible human trafficking link.

Hong was scheduled for a jury trial in Lee County on April 25, but a continuance has moved that trial to Aug. 1. She is currently out on \$3,000 combined bonds in Lee and Cerro Gordo counties.

to 90.. I'm very pleased. Just picking up our community gives us that sense of pride, that we're doing something good. It's unfortunate that it's only one day."

She said the event is a success every year and is done in conjunction with national Earth Day, but she said if she could improve on the project it would be to add a day.

"I think this has been going very well, but I'd like to see us do two a year - one in the spring and one in the fall just to keep the momentum going. It doesn't take a whole lot to get organized," she said.

A group of about 12 Hy-Vee employees and their families crawled around Dry Creek pulling all kinds of trash from the creek sides and bed. One girl in the group happily reported she had found a shoe. The bags filled up so quickly at that site, one member went over to the Hy-Vee store to get a roll of trash bags to continue the cleaning.

Mayor Brad Randolph pulled solo duty working 20th Street along Business 61. HTC Principal Michael Sheerin led a group of about 10 HTC students and parents at the intersection of 48th Street and Avenue O.
