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Agronomist optimistic about dry fields

Experts say the crops are surviving on what rainfall we've been getting because there is very little moisture in the soil at this point in the planting season.

LEE COUNTY - An Iowa State University Extension agronomist is cautiously optimistic that current weather models will bring precipitation to the area.

With clouds pulling in over Lee County Tuesday afternoon, area farmers are hoping that some rain is unloaded in the area to help bring moisture to some fields that are dry more than five feet down into the soil.

Virgil Schmitt, ISU Extension field agronomist based in Muscatine said he was in Lee County on Tuesday morning.

"Generally, it is dry or at least it has been," Schmitt said. "The crops have basically to this point have been surviving on rainfall since they matured last fall which hasn't been a whole lot. That soil moisture has not been replenished. That means we are going to be relying from there on on regular rainfall. Or else were going to doing some serious damage to the crop."

He said normally June in the wettest month of the year, with May being the second wettest months and crops rely on that moisture to get through the hot months of July and August.

"Normally in July and August we do not get enough rain to sustain the crop, so we rely on June, and to a lesser extent May to fill that soil profile up

Supervisors give sheriff's vehicles new computers

Conlee hopes to have systems in place by September

FORT MADISON - The Lee County Sheriff was given the nod by Lee County Supervisors Tuesday morning to go ahead with plans to equip vehicles with on-board computers that will help streamline deputy processing going forward.

At Tuesday's regular meeting a quick public hearing was held and Supervisor Ron Fedler said he had heard from a few county residents and that was why he suggested the board go out for bids on the computers.

The original resolution passed by the supervisors in March was set not to exceed \$133,934 over five years, but the bidding process and some negotiations on the part of the department resulted in a 3-year deal for \$72,500, which includes hardware, software, mounting, peripheral wiring and maintenance and service, from an upfitting firm called Keltek. After the three-year deal, the county will have the option of purchasing the equipment at fair market value.

Chief Deputy Will Conlee, who's spearheaded the project said he hopes to have all the cars upgraded in August.

"Keltek has held August open for us so I hope to have all the cars done that month," Conlee said. "Then will need to state to come down and get the deputies certified with the National Crime Information Center, a Federal Bureau of Investigation database.

Sheriff Stacy Weber said all the road deputies, and most likely the department's two detectives will have to be trained on using the systems.

The contract calls for 11 systems, one of which will be kept as a spare so that in the event a unit requires service, the spare can be put into duty. In the meantime, Weber said the detectives may have access to the spare unit.

"We will keep one as a spare, but that will probably go into the hands of the detectives and will put

Rain needed in June to offset drier summer

with water so we have some in reserve to get us through summer lean times," he said. "At least to this point it's not done very much to fill up that soil profile and that's a little bit worrisome."

However, he said current forecasts show average summer temperatures with above average precipitation.

"The updated 6-day forecast is for above average temperatures, but above average precipitation which is good," Schmitt said.

He said new updated forecast models will be available tomorrow and could change the outlook, but right now July through August is predicted to be normal temperatures and normal precipitation, which would be hard on the plants because there would be no replenishing of soil moisture, but above average rainfalls through the end of June into July could turn things around.

"If weather turns around there's potential for a great crop. But we are going to be relying on the weather turning."

With weather patterns indicating sporadic rain for the next five days, Schmitt said maybe that's signaling a good turn for farmers.

"Maybe this is a turn of events and we'll get some regular rain fall. Back in 1992 spring was very dry, moreso than this year, and in June of that year, Gov. (Terry) Brandstad had activated the state's drought task force. Then we started getting rain in July and it didn't end for year and a half and we had a great crop. It was wet, but a very good crop."

Schmitt said most soil profiles can hold 2.3" of water per foot of depth and some area farmers have dug 8 to 9 feet without finding moisture in the soil. He said it would take 11 inches of rain to get the right moisture profile. That would have to be somewhat spread out over days because that kind of rain in a tight timeframe would cause run-off and that wouldn't be good either.

The other problem with dry soil is that the roots won't go deep because there is no moisture there and then you have a shallow root system

"If that moisture is not down there then the roots won't go deep either and then you have shallow rooting systems. If they can't get through that makes them more vulnerable to disease. So we don't have a lot of give in the system right now."

He said most fields have been planted but has heard of some fields in the northwest part of the state that haven't been planted. Schmitt said last year was similar in the feast-or-fashion model. He said

he was in Jackson County Monday and farmers up there were hoping forecasted rain would miss them.

"But Southeast Iowa can't but a drop of rain," he said.

"Not much you can do about it, except keep the faith you know. If we're looking at a spring scenario, I'd say forgo the tillage, but we're beyond that at this point."

He said the best advice is to do what you can to promote as much yield as possible with good weed and insect management.

"Plants are like people - the more stress they're under, the less the can take on."

MT. PLEASANT - The Bloodhounds baseball team managed just three hits in two games as Mt. Pleasant pounded FMHS 16-1, 12-0 in a doubleheader Monday night on the road.

Dayne Cordray, Jordan Gerdes and Brandon Reichelt had the lone hits for the Hounds.

The Hounds gave up eight runs in the bottom of the second after Gerdes had held the game at 0-0 through 1 1/2 innings in game 1. The Panther's Colby Potts baffled FMHS hitters in the first game retiring the first seven hitters on either strikeouts or infield ground outs.

The Hounds made a little noise in the third inning after a Caleb Parson grounded out to short, Tony Fortado reached on a walk and Gaven Wiseman singled to short center to move Fortado up. Cordray then singled up the middle again moving Fortado to third and loading the bases.

Parker Denning then grounded to the pitcher who forced Fortado at home for the second out and the bases were still loaded for the Hounds. Gerdes singled to center and plated Wiseman. Reichelt then grounded into short where the Panther's got Gerdes in a force out at second to end the inning.

The Hounds went 1-2-3 in the top of the 4th trailing 16-1 to end the game on a 15-run rule after four innings.

For the Panthers, Chase Lamm singled to start the bottom of the second inning and then Gerdes got Potts on strikes. Clayton Lowery doubled to left field scoring Lamm, and Nick Coble reached on a throwing error at third. Lowery was able to score on the error. Noah Walls grounded out to short for the second out with the Hounds trailing manageably at 3-0.

But the Panthers then capitalized on a single by Jordan Magnani at the top of the lineup and then three

consecutive walks followed by a Lamm single that scored two. Potts drew a walk and then Lowery flied out to end the inning with the Panthers up 8-0.

Fort Madison held the Panther's in the third surrendering only a walk, but then gave up eight more runs in the bottom of the fourth to end the game. Potts hit a single to right center scoring Cooper Huckabone with the game-winning hit.

In the second game, Cordray drew a walk to start the game. Denning grounded to second where Cordray was tagged out between the bases and Denning was thrown out at first. Gerdes reached on a error at third before Reichelt then lined a single into right field, but was thrown out trying to stretch it to a double, stranding Gerdes at third base.

Magnani and Trace White would combine to retire the next 12 Hounds batters in a row.

The Panthers put up five consecutive runs in the top of the first after Cordray got Magnani to ground out to short. Colby Potts lined a triple to right that scored Caleb Potts and Lamm. Potts came around to score on a Bryce Anderson sacrifice fly to left. Zach Beason grounded to third to end the inning.

The Panthers went scoreless in the second and then put up another five-spot in the third, including another two RBI triple by Colby Potts to right field. Mount Pleasant put up two more insurance runs in the bottom of the fourth and retired FMHS in order in the top of the fifth to end the game on the 10-run rule after five innings.

Cordray went one inning and gave up five runs, three earned on four hits. Fortado pitched an 1 1/3 in relief giving up five runs, all earned on five hits and two walks. Barker finished the game going 1 2/3 surrendering two runs both earned on two hits and two walks.

PUBLIC NOTICE CITY OF FORT MADISON SIDEWALK REPLACEMENT PROGRAM RULES

1. The purpose of this program is to furnish an opportunity for residential property owners to re-place existing deteriorated sidewalks and/or to install new sidewalks in front of existing buildings where no sidewalk now exists. This does not include driveway approaches or sidewalks going to the residential unit. It does include sidewalk, which is located within the street right-of-way.

2. The property owner's responsibility will be to remove and dispose of the deteriorated sidewalk or excavate where new sidewalk would go, form the sidewalk to be poured, and place the concrete. This work can be done either by the property owner, renter, or your contractor. The City will not pay for Saturday delivery charges. Work cannot begin before July 1st.

3. The City of Fort Madison will inspect the sidewalk prior to approval of your application, prior to removal and prior to placement of the new sidewalk. The Fort Madison Ready Mixed Concrete Co. will bill the City for the concrete used and the City of Fort Madison will pay for the concrete directly to the supplier. The City will not pay for the additional Saturday delivery charge. If the property owner wishes to have the delivery on Saturday the bill for the delivery will be sent to the property owner. No payments will be made directly to the property owner. The concrete can be ordered by the property owner or your contractor from:

4. The sidewalk shall be constructed according to the sidewalk design specifications which can be acquired at the Fort Madison Public Works Department.

5. Each application will be evaluated based on its condition and how it improves the area for pedestrian traffic. Extra consideration will be given for connection to an existing sidewalk.

6. Applications for this program will be available on

May 1st at 8:00 A.M. and will be accepted through June 22nd at 4:30 P.M. Each proposal will be evaluated and you will be notified by July 2nd. The City will fund projects as funding is available. The replacement work cannot take place before July 1st and must be approved by the City prior to the commencement of the work.

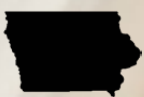
