

Lee County EMS staring down cuts

Medicaid reimbursement rates at heart of county ambulance financial crunch

LEE COUNTY – Reimbursement deficiencies are forcing some logistical cuts, at a minimum, from services provided by Lee County Emergency Medical Services.

Bill Young, executive director of Lee County EMS, told the Lee County Board of Supervisors at it's regu-

lar Tuesday meeting, in the next couple weeks the ambulance service will have to stop rotating units when more than two ambulances are needed in the same proximity.

Currently, an EMS ambulance is stationed in Fort Madison, one in Keokuk

and one in Donnellson with a standby at the junction of Hwy. 218 and 61 near the middle of the county. When an ambulance leaves the city or a second ambulance is required in a city, the EMS dispatches another ambulance to the junction on standby.

Young said in coming weeks, that replacement unit will no longer be sent, which could increase service times to parts of the county during heavier call times. "Every time one of the city units goes out we send an ambulance to standby if there is another call," he said.

"That adds about 500 in extra mileage per week which was just over \$100 in fuel for that move, or about \$5,400 per year."

According to a spreadsheet Young presented to the board, Lee County EMS charges \$13 per mile and is reimbursed through Medicare at a rate of \$6.09, which is 80% of the Medicare's allowed charge of \$7.62. On a straight Medicaid bill, in Iowa the managed care provider reimburses the \$13/mile rate at \$2.61/mile.

The mileage to replace the standby is absorbed by the company.

Southeast lowa has large offerings for day-trip dining

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you. Martini's Grille, overlooking the Mississippi River Bridge, is probably SE Iowa's finest restaurant for special occasions, or just dropping by.

Over in Ft. Madison, much to Ginnie's chagrin. I head for the Fort Diner, home of the Wally Burger. Sit on a stool at the counter and watch the short-order cook work his magic for down home good cook'n. Between Ft. Madison and Keokuk, at Montrose, there's a remote place along the River Road called Fat Jimmy's Smokehouse and Spirits. Check it out. They even have entertainment on some weekends. In Keokuk, it's the Hawkeye Restaurant, and across the river in Hamilton, Illinois, there's a little diner called the Hamilton Family Cafe, where vou won't go away hungry. In Nauvoo, Grandpa John's Nauvoo Cafe has a loaded buffet full of

the best fried chicken. Too much food? Head for the Nauvoo Mill and Bakery a block away for soup and sandwich.

At Farmington, it's the Bridge Cafe, in Bonaparte, the Bonaparte Retreat, and in Keosauqua, the Riverbend Pizza & Steakhouse will treat you right.

Fairfield has Revelations Cafe—a quiet spot for lunch, meditation, and books. The Riverside Family Restaurant III is always good, as is Torino Pizza and Steak House.

In Ottumwa, I met and proposed to Ginnie at the Riverside Family Restaurant, and bribed the waitresses into singing "Going to the Chapel." So, I have special affinity for the Riverside, there are three of them— Ottumwa, Fairfield and Osky. Eating in Ottumwa isn't complete without a stop at the Canteen Lunch in the Alley. They were voted the Number

1 Loose Meat Sandwich in Iowa. There's even a World Championship Canteen Sandwich Eating Contest in the spring. Burp. Discover what a "wet" Canteen means. In Oskaloosa, Smokie Row on the square has great food and atmosphere. Try their cheeseburger soup. Attached to Smokie Row is the Book Vault. Find a book, bring it into Smokie Row for a bookand-burger. The Wood Iron Grille at Oskaloosa Public Golf has super gourmet burgers, and fine art.

In Washington, Cafe Dodici is where we go for Italian done to perfection in a semi-formal setting. Blue jeans and a seed corn cap are still welcome. Next door is Art Domestique, for Italian food and art.

In Mt. Pleasant, the Jefferson Street Grill has been drawing a crowd for good reason—great food and service. Little Mexico Restaurant is the place for good Hispanic food, and Breadeaux Pizza has the best crust. For Oriental it's Mei's China Palace, and for Asian, it's Pad Thai Restaurant. Try their fresh spring rolls. Butch's River Rock Cafe has the best tenderloin by a Dam Site.

Branching out from Mt. Pleasant, Mama's Back Porch in Rome is very good, the Four Corner's Restaurant in rural Lockridge is outrageous, and the Dairy Barn in Morning Sun is thee place. Try the Short Stop in New London for their tenderloin or another version of the loose meat sandwich.

On your way to Des Moines, stop at Goldie's Ice Cream Shoppe in Prairie City. Not only do they have good ice cream, but a great tenderloin, as voted number one in 2009. On I-80 at Brooklyn, The Classic Deli and Ice Cream Shoppe is fun. Try their



Haas goes for 22 in Crusaders' win

FORT MADISON – Senior Ashlynn Haas exploded for 17 points in the second half, including a crucial three-point play with two minutes left to help seal a 50-45 win over Danville Tuesday night in girls high school basketball action.

Haas took over for the Lady Crusaders in the final two minutes of the come-from-behind win with seven of HTC's final 19 points.

With HTC down by 9 with just under four minutes left, Haas converted in transition and then scored after a Danville turnover to cut the lead to five points.

Holy Trinity would get another stop on the defensive side and then in the half-court junior Bailey Hellweg would get loose from the right wing



and bury a 3-pointer with 2:23 left to cut the lead to one.

The Crusaders were in the middle of a 12-2 run capped by a running layup from Haas who drew contact on the drive and converted the 3-point play giving HTC a 44-43 lead, its first lead since the 5:53 mark of the 3rd period.

Danville would retake the lead when Cassidy Yalpa scored with 1:47 left in the game. On their next possession, Haas would find freshman Brooke Mueller underneath with a nice look and Mueller would finish the play to give HTC a 46-45 lead.

HTC would then go into Haas mode with the senior guard being chased around and fouled. Haas would convert 4-of-4 free throws down the stretch to seal the win.

Head coach Tony Johnson said Haas took the team on her shoulders in the second half.

"Right now that's her natural spot. She's my primary ball handler and she's taking it all on herself," Johnson said.

"Sometimes she tries to do too much and that's understandable as you're trying to bring along younger guards."

Johnson worked 10 players into the game trying to find which formula works best. The Crusaders have had just two weeks to practice and didn't have a full squad until this week.

"I'm still trying to figure out what combination works. At the end, I finished with a freshHTC's Raquel Schneider (2), and Kassi Randolph try to stop Danville's Bella Smith in Tuesday's 50-45 HTC win at home.



Thurman's buzzer beater rims out in HTC loss

Schneider tip-in at end of regulation sends game into OT

FORT MADISON - A 35-second dribble delay strategy almost backfired on Danville head coach Matt Morris as his Bears held a 1-point lead with just a minute to go in overtime Tuesday at Shottenkirk Gym.

With the Crusaders chasing the ball all over the floor, Danville's Cam Edle was fouled by Holy Trinity Catholic's Quentin Schneider before sinking two free throws with :19 left for a 55-52 Danville win.

Holy Trinity brought the ball up against mild pressure from Danville and was able to work the ball over to Jason Thurman for a 3-point attempt from the left baseline that was literally in the hoop before spinning out with less than a second left.

The Crusaders wiped out a seven point deficit with about five minutes left in the game down 35-42.

Senior Blake Crabtree would score on a breakaway layup to start a 7-0 run. Schneider would score on the next possession and get fouled on the play to cut the lead to 2. After a defensive stop, senior Matt Hellige would

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

County may chip in more to ambulance service

Young said in just about every county in southeast Iowa, counties are dealing with ambulance services and how they are provided.

He said Washington County is moving to a county-provided service. Henry County is now looking at how that county's service will be provided because the Henry County Health Center is moving away from providing the service. Young said Jefferson County is using a private provider out of Des Moines.

"One of the biggest in the Quad Cities is now trying to become a government entity. It's the reality that there is a crisis in EMS reimbursement right now. We're not being reimbursed at the cost of the services we provide on a daily basis," Young said.

He said Medicaid is the biggest problem and when the state moved to managed care providers two years ago, they eliminated billing for secondary insurance and eliminated payments if Medicaid is the secondary provider.

For example for a call for service to someone who has Medicare and Medicaid as a secondary insurer, EMS will be reimbursed at the federal Medicare rate, which represents about 59% of submitted charges and 80% of allowable charges. However, with Medicaid as the secondary insurance, EMS doesn't get the remaining 20% co-insurance from Medicaid, and Young said they aren't allowed by law to bill for that 20% either.

"So we're out that 20%," he said. "And this area of the state is a very high Medicaid area."

Kelsey Young, who's the business manager for Lee County EMS, deals with billing and said in just one week's time in November, she wrote off \$2,200 the company would have recovered three years ago.

"Before they changed the rule Medicaid used to pay the co-insuracne and copays that Medicare would leave,



and then they changed the rules when they switched to managed care and they no longer pay those so we have to write them off."

Supervisor Ron Fedler said this was a result of the state switching to privatization and those companies denying claims.

"That's how they were saving the money – by basically not taking care of the people that used to be taken care of," Fedler said.

Under the current contract between Lee County EMS and the county, taxpayers are contributing \$429,000 per year to help subsidize costs of providing the service via the county's general fund. Young said that number may have to increase as part of the new contract.

Supervisor Matt Pflug asked Young what the bottom line was.

"Bill, what's the solution? You need more money? It looks like the trend is not just Lee County, it's everywhere."

"Obviously, that's something we're going to have to talk about," Young replied.

He told the board that ambulance services in Iowa are not categorized as essential services, which means that if he decided, in theory, to leave the area and not provide service, the county has no legal requirement to provide that service by state law.

He said that, along with reimbursement rates, are the two big issues that need fixed legislatively. Because it's not an essential service as defined by the state, the county can't levy a tax specifically to provide that service.

Supervisor Chairman Gary Folluo said Young has agreed to renegotiate his contract and continue services in the county, but some changes will need to be included in the next contract.

"We're not leaving and we're not going anywhere on the 30th," Young said. "But we may need help to do that."

He said the company is also working on some dramatic internal changes as well, including dispatch services, to help offset costs.

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
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
