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PAW helps rescue 77 Shih Tzu

FORT MADISON - The local PAW animal shelter is 37 dogs heavier after helping rescue 77 Shih Tzus from a home in Burlington today.

Sandy Brown, director of the Fort Madison PAW shelter said she was notified before Christmas that a lady in Burlington had a number of pure breed Shih Tzu dogs that needed to be re-homed. At that time the number was 30.

"Well, the gentleman that's been caring for them called us last week and said there were 60. When we got to the home there were 77."

Brown said the local PAW facility wouldn't be able to handle all 77, so she contacted AHeinze57 out of DeSoto, Iowa to assist in the rescue, which took place on Friday and Monday.

"They specialize in special needs animals, so they took the very young

and the old and we took the ones in the middle." Brown said.

"We just gave them a Yorkie that needed to have two knees replaced and they've just been wonderful."

Brown said it was her understanding that the woman was a breeder

who's husband had died last year and then she had taken ill and things got out of hand. She said that even though it was a "hording" case, the animals were in relatively good care.

"This has to have been going on for a couple of years," Brown said. "We

were contacted by the family and we didn't ask too many questions. We just wanted to get in and help."

HTC girls knock off SEISC leader Central Lee, 55-44

DONNELLSON - If the Holy Trinity girls team had a player named Stella, we could say they're in a groove.

The Lady Cruaders knocked off Southeast Iowa Superconference South leader Central Lee 55-45 on Tuesday night on the road. The Lady Hawks were 13-2 coming into the game against HTC at 8-8.

"The girls played great team offense and defense," said head coach Tony Johnson.

"Brett did a great job getting us in our offenses all night and Ashlyn Haas and Taylor Boeding hit big shots."

Haas, just a freshman led the Crusaders with 16 points including two 3-pointers, while Boeding had three from long distance en route to 13 points. Senior Ali Randolph added a dozen.

The Crusaders' defense held the Lady Hawks, who are averaging 57 points per outing, to just 14 first half points on their way to a 23-14 lead going into the locker-room.

The second half started slowly for the Crusaders and Central Lee found themselves back in the game at the end of the third period with the teams tied 31-31, but the Lady Crusaders came flying back in the final period putting up 22 points to Central Lee's 14 to seal the win.

Johnson said it was a complete win with everyone playing their respective roles.

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Group wants to "regroup" on county minimum wage

MONTROSE - An effort to push the minimum wage in Lee County came back in front of supervisors on Tuesday.

At the regular Lee County Board of Supervisors meeting, Lee County resident Robert Cale asked the board to assist him in contacting representatives to sit on the committee to review the possibility of the county setting a minimum wage.

Cale said movement on the issue had slowed with all the other focuses of the county such as the courthouse referendum, budgets etc., but he wanted to get a meeting time set for the committee to discuss a recommendation to the board.

Cale said each supervisor was asked to come up with two representatives to serve on a commit-

tee to look into the possibility of increasing the wage.

"If each supervisor could get a hold of their reps that we had and set up a time. We're not going to be able to get everyone together at one time, but we're planning on having more than one meeting," Cale said. "We need to get something going. A lot of the workers in Lee County have been waiting a long time for this decision. A lot of workers have been working for years without a raise." Cale said.

Supervisor Matt Pflug said it would be in the committee's best interest to keep the group relatively small.

"I think the goal when we're looking at doing this was 9 to 10 folks. The problem you have in getting too big is that getting a

consensus can be problematic," Pflug said. "But our commitment was that we were going to get together and we're going to follow through with that. We will get moving on it."

Supervisor Don Hunold

suggested at next week's meeting pulling the contact list for people to sit on the board together that way Cale and the board would have a complete list of numbers and contact emails for people to sit on the committee.

Folluo said he would be happy to set up communication with the group if he had the names and numbers of everyone.

Cale asked what the board was looking for from the committee and Pflug said that was what the committee was being put together for, to make a recommendation.

"I think the group needs to have that dialogue," he said. "When you move around like down in Keokuk where I'm from, there's not a lot of people paying \$7.25. I can name a few, but obviously, as we've talked about,

that's not a livable wage. Let's get the group together first and then the group could come back and report to the board."

Board chairman Rick Larkin recommended the group make sure they bring city officials in Lee County along with the discussion because in some Iowa counties where a minimum wage increase was passed, cities voted to go in different directions.

"They passed this in Wapello County, but the cities all voted against it so it's just the unincorporated areas that are doing it," Larkin said. "It looks bad when we pass it and all the cities opt out of it. I just think we should bring

the cities along with the discussion."

"If the cities of Wapello County turn their backs on the people and opt out, and that's something you can't just opt out of, it's something that has been voted on and passed three times... then they have to answer to those voters," Cale said.

In addition to Wapello County, Johnson, Linn and Polk also bumped minimum wages in 2016. However some cities in each county have gone different directions. In

Johnson County, Solon, Shueyville, Oxford and Swisher declined to follow the county and Tiffin capped their minimum wage at \$9/hour.

The four counties used "home rule authority" as authorization to raise the wage at the county level, but state officials may question the legality of that. However direction from the current legislature is more toward creating a single statewide minimum and preempting any local moves to increase the wage.

Gov. Terry Branstad has indicated he would consider a minimum wage increase but only if it's a statewide wage.

Get it tarped or get a ticket

MONTROSE - County officials are getting fed up with the litter problem on 15th Street along the route to the landfill.

At Tuesday's meeting of the Lee County Board of Supervisors, Supervisor Don Hunold said he's had complaints from the amount of litter blowing into private property. Lee County Sheriff Stacy Weber said his deputies are being instructed to ticket violators of tarping rules.

"I've spoken with one gentleman who's been cleaning up that road for over 10 years and he's pulled 49 full bags of litter off 15th Street. 49 bags," Hunold said. "Folks, there

are tickets coming. I'm just warning you now," Hunold said.

"I did get a call from a person over by rodeo

park disturbed by the litter. I've talked with Stacy and he's hooked up with the Fort Madison police department. Heads up folks, tarp your loads or you're going to get a ticket and if you don't like it you can come clean up the road. Just tarp it. Head's up, I'm just telling you now... it's coming."

There are signs on 15th Street on the way to the Great River Regional Waste Authority landfill

that indicate all loads are to be tarped to prevent litter from blowing out of vehicles hauling to the landfill.

Weber said he's spoken directly with GRWWA staff and told them to remind people coming to the landfill that if the loads aren't tarped, tickets are going to be handed out.

"They're going to remind people coming and going that citations are going to be citations issued," Weber said.

A question was raised as to whether it was city, county or state jurisdiction and Weber quickly cleared up the confusion.

"Either way, they're gettin' a ticket," he said.

care of them did a very nice job considering he had 77." Brown said she believed that Burlington city code allows for four animals per resident and residents with a breeding license can keep up to 20 in well-maintained facilities.

This is the second case of animal hording PAW has helped with in the past several months. In November PAW got 28 dogs from another home in Burlington where there were 45 dogs. Brown said the last three of the dogs are going home tomorrow.

She said several area groomers have offered to groom the animals but that will take some time and to get all the dogs healthy and ready for adoption it's going to cost the shelter about \$300 per dog.

Anyone wanting to adopt the any of the dogs should go to www.pawfortmadison.com and fill out an application. Brown also said donations will be important now and those can be made online or at the PAW Facebook page through Paypal.

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Lady Hounds end 10-game skid

Trimble goes perfect from field, leads Hounds with 17 points

FORT MADISON - The FMHS varsity girls basketball team played one of their better first halves of the year and it was enough to end a 10-game losing streak.

The Lady Hounds downed visiting Danville in a non-conference match up 44-29 on Tuesday to move to 4-12 on the season behind 17 points from Mercedes Trimble.

The Bloodhound senior went 6 for 6 from the field including 4 3-pointers. Her only miss was the front end of two foul shots in the final seconds of the game.

"Honestly we've been after her to shoot the ball. She shoots 45 to 50% from the field," said Head Coach Charlie Knipe.

FMHS raced out to an 11-2 first quarter lead on the Trimble-Dilsaver show. Junior Amber Dilsaver opened the game with three straight buckets before Trimble added a layup and then connected on a 3-pointer on the next possession. The

Bears didn't get on the board until two minutes were left in the quarter.

The second quarter was more evenly matched as the Hounds added a point to the lead by outscoring Danville 10-9 in that period. Trimble had 11 of her points in the first half and Dilsaver had eight from the low post to lead the Hounds to a 27-13 in the first half advantage.

The Hounds looked as though they would let another 3rd quarter be their undoing as has been the modus operandi many times this year as the Bears nipped away at the 14-point deficit cutting it to 11. During the stretch the Hounds looked tentative from the field and were reluctant to take shots as they moved the ball around in the set offense. Danville went cold in the final period only

putting up seven points, while FMHS put up 11 to put the game away.

Knipe said it his team was focused on ending the skid Tuesday.

"It feels good. The girls have worked hard the past couple of weeks and they're starting to understand and that's what we're really excited about," he said. "They are starting to realize that...Hey I can give up a shot for a better shot. And we have to shoot from the inside to open up the outside and we have to shoot from the outside to open up the inside."

"That was really good to see, because Danville is not a bad team, they're young, but they're not too bad."

Knipe said the Hounds probably had one of their better all-around performances in the win.

"We had a really good effort on the boards and we had a nice team effort. We shot 61% from the field for the game and that's 2 and 3s so I'll take that any day," he said.

Rounding out the scoring for the Hounds was Dilsaver with 14, Emily Mitchell and Mariah Trimble each had 4, Taylor Shannan added three and Brittney Harris had 2.

Fort Madison travels to Mt. Pleasant on Friday to face the 7-7 Lady Panthers who beat the Hounds 53-41 on Jan. 10

Hound wrestlers just miss sweeping Kirksville duals

KIRKSVILLE, Mo. - The Fort Madison Bloodhound varsity wrestling team missed a clean sweep of a three-team dual meet Tuesday night in Kirksville, and you could hear it in head coach Ryan Smith's voice.

Fort Madison easily handled Kirksville and Macon across the border winning 50-27 over Kirksville and 57-17 over Macon, but lost in the final match to Centerville by one point in a win.

"I guess I'm a little disappointed, we just didn't do enough top to bottom," Smith said. "There were lots of times we coasted where we got a major decision and we could have had a tech. fall, that kind of thing."

"We left too many points on the board and we knew it was going to be a tough dual. We just didn't put forth the effort."

Centerville was up 36-10 with five matches left on the board and the Hounds went to work. Danen Settles won in a forfeit, then Sam Hayes who is wrestling in only his second meet after sitting for four weeks with an injury got a pin over Payton Russell at 220 for six points. Junior Heath Hoenig then scored a pin over Trenton Bogle at 5:15 at the 285 lb. match and Elton Kruse scored a 9-0 major decision at 106 to set the stage for the final match with the Hounds down 32-36.

Ryan Steffensmeier went up against Lee Genobana at 113 and scored a major decision 14-9, but that only awards 3 points to the team and the Hounds fell by just one.

"Hopefully this will be a good learning experience for us," Smith said as the Hounds wind down the season and start prepping for districts.

They have the Southern Classic on Saturday and that's the team's last tourney. They also have a dual meet in Burlington a week from Thursday.

"I thought Sam Hayes did a good job with a solid opponent in that first match. He's coming back from that injury and he looked pretty good. And Hoenig did a good job of getting in a pin there at the end. Those two were critical in keeping us close. I just wish we could have gotten some more effort like that."

Highlighting the action for the Hounds, 3rd ranked junior Harlan Steffensmeier, at 138 lbs., led the way for
