Bill has potential to leave county with only one courthouse

FORT MADISON - A move to cut \$4.8 million from the Iowa Judicial Branch in fiscal year 2018 could cut potentially cut a courthouse from Lee County.

In a document obtained by the Pen City Current, signed by State Court Administrator Todd Nuccio, Senate Study Bill 3089 calls for a reduction in the state's judicial budget. The state is looking to cut \$50 million in this fiscal year.

Nuccio writes in the letter dated Jan. 25, 2018, 96% of the state's judicial branch budget is made up of personnel costs and options are limited in where the cuts can be made.

"Should the \$4.8 (million) cut come to reality, we are left with no other choice than to close personnel branch-wide," Nuccio wrote. "As such we are projecting the closure of over 30 county courthouses proportionately distributed across our eight judicial districts. The courthouses selected for closure within each judicial district will be determined by caseload volume in each county. The workload of the closed courthouses will then be shifted to other county courthouses in that judicial district. The exact re-distribution will be determined in consultation with court and county officials at the local level. The period of closure will be indefinite."

Nuccio continued to write that a lot could change as the bill makes its way through the legislature and final numbers will determine what steps



FORT MADISON - In a mid-Friday afternoon budget strategy session, Lee County officials settled on a budget that could short the county \$158,000.

However, during preliminary budget discussions, the county was originally looking at a \$1.5 million loss for the next fiscal year which runs July 1, 2018-June 30, 2019. The Lee County Board of Supervisors set Feb. 13 to finalize and approve the budget.

end of this fiscal year.

The 2018-2019 budget includes a \$1.5 million deficit in the Mental Health and

Developmental Disability Fund. The fund, referred to as "Fund 10" is foregoing a levy in the next year to start to abide by a 2017 Iowa law requiring the spend down of reserve funds.

County Budget Director Cindy Renstrom has earmarked \$1,491,788 for that spend down in the budget, but said the fund doesn't have to be fully spent down unFOLLUO

The \$158,000 deficit could be even more if a cash-strapped Iowa legislature

doesn't fulfill a commitment to backfill a portion of property taxes on industrial and commercial property in the state. County Auditor Denise Fraise said that amount is about \$287,000.

Supervisor Gary Folluo said he is optimistic, at least



FMCH launches heart campaign at Birthplace

FORT MADISON - Today Fort Madison **Community Hospital** (FMCH), in conjunction with the American Heart Association, The Children's Heart Foundation, and hospitals across the state, launched the 3rd year of Iowa's Little Hats, Big Hearts initiative. The program outfits newborns with knitted red caps during Heart Month in February to raise awareness of heart disease, the number one killer of Americans, and congenital heart defects, a condition that affects 1 in every 110 babies born in the US. All babies born at participating hospitals during the month of February will receive a hat.

"The FMCH Birthplace is excited to partner with the American Heart Association and the Children's Heart Foundation to raise awareness to the many ways heart disease affects our community. Little Hats, Big Hearts brings attention to congenital heart defects, the most common type of birth defect in Iowa" says Angie Budnik, Community Relations Director, FMCH. "The volunteers who pull this program together, including making the red hats, are to be commended for their dedication to bringing attention to heart disease in Iowa."

The FMCH Birthplace staff perform a noninvasive Congenital Heart Disease screening on all of the newborns they deliver after 24 hours of



Bloodhounds have fun in win over Washington

James-Kokjohn, Cresswell go for 50 to snap two-game skid

FORT MADISON - Whether it's senior Treavor James-Kokjohn hitting setshot 3-balls, Brandon Keester pulling a cross-over that left his defender on the floor and then stroking a 22-footer, or Kaleb Cresswell hitting from everywhere except the bleachers...the Hounds found themselves on the winning side again Friday night.

James-Kokjohn had 29 and Cresswell fired in 21 including five from 3-point land to help the Hounds to a 87-49 coaster over Washington. The win snaps

last week.



The game opened with a flurry of 3-balls on both sides with the Demons' Jacob Van Osdol and Blake Hartzler each hitting for Washington and the Hounds Kaleb Cresswell and Logan Rashid all alternating long shots before either team would miss. The two teams traded buckets for most of the

first period with James-Kokjohn putting up seven for Fort Madison, including a 3-pointer of his own to give Fort Madison a 15-14 lead with :30 remaining in the quarter. But the Demons' Cale Hobscheidt scored on a runner in the middle of the lane to end the period with Washington on top 16-15.

That would be the last time the Demons would hold a lead in the game. The Hounds junior Brandon Keester hit from about 23 feet out to start the 2nd and give the Hounds some momentum as the crowd digs the long ball. The shot would set Fort Madison on a 16-0 tear where five different Bloodhounds would score highlighted by Cresswell's seven points. Washington wouldn't score again until Cade Hennigan would make the back end of two free throws off a Parker Denning foul, when Fort Madison shifted into a full court press.

The Hounds had pulled out to a 31-17 advantage at that point and James-Kokjohn countered with a move inside. Keester converted on the next possession after Fort Madison's defense held. After Washington's Hennigan hit another free throw, Cresswell threw in another three to push Fort Madison to a 38-20 advantage. Washington would get their only field goal of the second quarter when Dalton Myers would hit to cut the lead to 40-22. The Demons did convert 4-of-4 from the free throw line in the final 1:35 and trailed 44-26 at the half.

The Demons outscored the Hounds 15-13 in the third period, but Parker Denning's 3-ball and a score inside by James-Kokjohn in the final seconds of the third had Fort Madison out comfortably 59-41 going into the final period. With about three minutes left in the quarter, Keester executed a nifty head fake and cross over that left his defender on the floor, stepped back and hit a 22-footer to put the Hounds up 54-32.

Fort Madison then played one of their best periods of the year going perfect from the free throw line, shooting 9 of 13 from the field and held Washington to just eight points down the stretch. James-Kokjohn gave the Hounds their biggest lead with a standing 3-pointer from the top of the key to put Fort Madison up 77-44. Fort Madison would stop the Demons on the next trip and James-Kokjohn fired in another 3 from the same spot on the next trip down.

Logan Rashid finished with 13 for Fort Madison and Keester had 12. Denning had five, AJ Nolting had three, and Sheymouhr Redd-Donald, Lorenzo Riles and Jayden Fedler each had a bucket for the Hounds.

After Pleasant Valley comes calling Saturday, the Hounds take their 12-6 mark to Davis County on Tuesday.

Lady Hounds still looking for first win of year

FORT MADISON - A cold first half from the field and a lopsided rebound advantage spelled doom for the Fort Madison girls' basketball team in a 50-19 loss to Washington Friday night.

The girls went a chilly 2-of-13 in the first half with the only buckets coming from senior Taylor Shannon and freshman Maddie Rashid. Rashid also converted a couple of free throws in the opening period at the 2:40 mark for the first points of the game for Fort Madison, which is still looking for its first win of the year.

Sarah Bernhart's two free throws in the second period rounded out the scoring for the Lady Hounds in the first half.

The third quarter didn't get much better with the Hounds only completing 30% of their shots on 3-10 from the field.

Senior Kamryn Bailey hit underneath with about 5:11 to go in the 3rd period to cut the lead to 12 at 10-22, and then Shannon scored and Nadia Boeding scored with a nice assist from Shannon in a 6-0 run that brought the Hounds to within eight at 14-22. Washington had an answer, however, as sophomore Halle Leyden hit a 3-ball and junior Isabel Bailey scored to push the lead to 27-14.

Washington then went into a trap-press that sometimes had three girls on one ball handler and forced the Hounds into 10 turnovers in the fourth period. The pressure resulted in a 13-4 run that the Hounds couldn't recover from.

Shannon, Boeding, and Rashid all had four points to lead Fort Madison. Braxtyn McGhghy had three points, while Bailey and Bernhart each added two to round out the scoring for the Hounds.

In the junior varsity matchup, the Hounds downed the Demons 29-24. Fort Madison was led by Boeding

with seven points. Kylee Cashman had six points and Dalyn Wondra chipped in with five in the win.

The Hounds are off until Tuesday when they play host to (1-18) Davis County before finishing up the regular season on Friday against Southeast Conference front-runner Fairfield (15-3).



Supervisors eyeing current year spending

this year, that the state will pay the backfill.

"Governor (Kim) Reynolds said in her State of the State address that the state was going to pay that money," he said after the meeting.

Renstrom presented a budget Friday with a \$1.77 million shortfall, but when factoring out the spend down of mental health funds, the deficit was \$284,000.

Hunold started asking for ideas to get that whittled down, and again, the board looked at county insurance premiums. The county is currently paying up to \$1,700 per month per employee for insurance but only charging the employee \$20 for an individual and \$95 for a family policy. The board did some quick math on adding \$5 to the employee's contribution which amounted to about a \$10,000 savings to the county.

Renstrom then suggested holding \$75,000 out of the supplemental budget from the Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) board funds cutting the deficit to \$208,000. County Recorder Nancy Booten offered to forego \$50,000 in record book updates for the year to get the board to the \$158,000 mark.

"The books haven't been copied for years, so I think we can't take that out. If we get a lot of money, and at the end of the year we have it, you can give it back to me," she said.

The board removed the \$50,000 from the budget with a nod to Booten, and settled on the budget at that point.

The board suggested reviewing the budget again in October to see how department heads are holding the line.

"We need to stress, just because you got the money don't be spending it just because you have it, because we have to get General Basic back up," Renstrom said.

Supervisor Ron Fedler said departments heads must start sticking to their budgets.

"We had a lot of budget amendments this year," Fedler said. If we consistently amend the budget, we fail because we approve a budget and we expect department heads to stick to that budget."

Supervisor Matt Pflug emphasized the point.

"Let's be clear. Don't be coming to the board with any amendments," Pflug said.

The total budget for the year stands at \$26.1 million in revenue with \$27.9 million in expenditures, with the above changes not included. The county is projecting to carry approximately \$8.62 million in a fund balance at the end of the next fiscal year.

the judicial branch takes. Lee County has two county courthouses and the south courthouse is getting close to finishing an overhaul including a new roof, tuck pointing, and interior and exterior repairs. The price tag to date on the south project is just over \$750,000.

The judicial branch absorbed a \$3 million de-appropriation last year as part of a budget shortfall. The total amount of the proposed reduction to the justice system is \$7.7 million. The \$4.8 would be aimed at the judicial branch.

Other reductions, or de-appropriations, called for in the budget include close to \$19 million combined to University of Iowa, University of Northern Iowa, and Iowa State University and \$5.4 million to the state community colleges, including Southeastern Community College. There is also a call for a \$5.4 million reduction to the Department of Corrections.
