Kahoka man charged in Faulkner deaths

LEE COUNTY – A Kahoka man is in Lee County Jail on two counts of vehicular homicide in connection with a June 9 accident that claimed the lives of a Farmington father and son.

Clark County. Mo. sheriff's deputies arrested Robert LeRoy Boyd, 28, of Kahoka over the weekend on Lee County and Iowa State Patrol warrants and Boyd was transferred to Lee County Jail on Monday where he is being held on a \$100,500 cash only bond.

Boyd is charged with two counts of vehicular homi-



cide – operating while intoxicated, one count of OWI, and one count of failure to maintain control.

"They arrested him on our warrants over the weekend and held him," Weber said. "He waived extradition and we went down and picked him up."

According to Iowa State Patrol reports, at about 1:17 a.m. on the morning of June 9, a 2000 Ford pickup driven by the 28-year-old failed to negotiate a curve in the road on Highway 2 at 140th Avenue.

Investigators believe that Boyd overcorrected, crossed the center line and struck a 2005 GMC Yukon driven by Laverne Mark Faulkner, 63 of Farmington nearly head-on.

Faulkner, and a passenger in the vehicle, Michael Paul Faulkner, 39, also of Farmington, were transported to area hospitals by Lee County EMS where they were pronounced dead. Boyd was taken to University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics by Lee County EMS.

An OWI-related vehicular homicide offense in Iowa is a class B felony. Each conviction carries up to 25 years in prison and a six-year license revocation. Convicted motorists must also complete a drinking-and-driving course and may have to complete a substance abuse treatment program.

Man breaks into FM City Hall, sets fire

Police apprehend suspect fleeing the scene BY PCC STAFF

FORT MADISON – A Burlington man is in custody and undergoing treatment at a local hospital after allegedly breaking into the Fort Madison City Hall and setting a small fire in the bathroom.

According to a release from Fort Madison Police Chief Mark Rohloff this morning, at approximately 6:20 a.m. this morning, officers took Anthony C. Zurmuehlen, 34 of Burlington into custody on initial charges of burglary and arson, after an incident at City Hall.

He was apprehended in the vicinity after neighbors reported hearing breaking glass and witnessing him fleeing the building.

Surveillance cameras observed Zurmuehlen in the building and moving about the public areas for approximately an hour before starting a small fire of paper in a bathroom, resulting in only minor damage and smoke. The only other known damage consisted of a broken window to facilitate his escape.

Murder suspect wants statements surpressed

Defense attorney says McCain didn't waive his rights to remain silent voluntarily

FORT MADISON - A Fort Madison man charged with murder in the death of Keokuk woman earlier this year, wants statements made to police on the night of his arrest stricken as evidence.

Adam Golden McCain, 25, of Fort Madison is charged in the slaving of CaLove Sackman on Feb. 5, 2019 in the parking lot of the River City Mall in Keokuk. Sackman was 27 at the time of her death.

If convicted, McCain is facing life in prison without the possibility of parole. Lee County Attorney Ross Braden, along with 1st Asst. Jonathan Stensvaag, will be prosecuting the case for the state. Fort Madison public defender Kendra Abfalter and Burlington public defender James Beres have been appointed to represent McCain.

Beres filed a motion on behalf of McCain in June to suppress statements McCain made to law enforcement officers on the night of his arrest. A hearing on that motion is set for Sept. 12 at the South Lee County Courthouse in Keokuk.

McCain pleaded not guilty to the charge in March. According to court documents, McCain's most current address was listed in the 5200 block of River Valley Road in

Fort Madison.

On February 5th, 2019 at approximately 10:27 pm, Keokuk Police Department officers responded to the 300 block of Main Street in the River City Mall parking lot for a female who had been stabbed.

Sackman was discovered at the scene and transported by ambulance to Unity Point Hospital in Keokuk, where she died as a result of multiple stab wounds to her torso.

McCain was later stopped by a Lee County Sheriff's deputy as a possible suspect in a hit-and-run in Keokuk sometime after the stabbing occurred. A LeeComm dispatcher realized from the deputy's stop that McCain was sought in connection with the stabbing, and he was taken into custody and delivered to the Keokuk Police Department.

In Beres' motion, he alleges McCain was Mirandized by investigators before questioning and invoked his right to remain silent, but questioning continued by investigators when incriminating statements were made in response to the interrogation.

Beres also writes in the motion, "Defendant acknowledged, at that later time, he waived those rights. But his waiver of rights was not voluntary".

Beres said because his waiver was not voluntary, the interrogation violated his 5th, 6th and 14th Amendment rights and asked that all the incriminating statements be suppressed in future proceedings.

According to documents, Sackman allegedly told a witness at the scene that Mc-Cain was the man who stabbed her.

According to the criminal complaint, McCain and Sackman, had been in a longterm relationship and were arguing when Sackman jumped from McCain's vehicle in the mall parking lot in the 300 block of Main Street.

After being taken into custody, McCain allegedly told authorities that he was driving Sackman around in his vehicle and became upset with her and then she jumped from the vehicle.

McCain then allegedly told officers he got out of the vehicle and stabbed Sackman once and she was able to get away from him. But then he got back into his vehicle drove over to her and stabbed her repeatedly before leaving the scene.

McCain is currently being held in the Lee County Jail on a \$1 million cash-only bond.

Officials getting good comments from planned excursions

Wednesday as passengers milled about downtown and near the Historical Museum.

Passengers could be seen Wednesday afternoon crossing the pedestrian foot bridge over the railroad tracks with packages.

Derr said she's heard from several passengers that Fort Madison has been the best stop on the cruise.

"They, by far, are saying Fort Madison is the best place or site so far," she said. "One guy came off and went out to one of the farms and is from Australia and just loved it."

The farm tour is part of the agritours that were set



up as part of excursions planned for passengers in conjunction with their trip. Fort Madison Chamber Coordinator Savanna Collier said that tour was one that really sold the cruise line on keeping the passengers in north Lee County.

"We were on a conference call with them and they wanted to take them to Burlington on a city excursion and I said "No Please! and asked them to keep the passengers in Lee County. That's when we suggested the agritour and they just loved that idea," Collier said.

As has been reported, the cruise dockings are for 6 and 8.5 hour layovers, or excursions.

The six-hour excursions, which is an 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. stop, offer riders either a history tour or the agritour, or a shuttle that runs in the downtown district. The history tour takes passengers to the Old Fort and to the Historic Prison and then on a riding tour of the Park-to-Park Historical district featuring the city's district on the National Historic Register.

"We want to thank the Department of Corrections for allowing us to set up tours there," Collier said. "We've been working very hard for that and it's not an easy thing to just go and do. They've been very generous."

The agritours takes passengers to Julie, Adam and Kathy Hohl's Harvestville Farm on Hwy. 2 and to the Hinterland Dairy Farm on Franklin Road.

Collier leads that tour herself and said people are having a great time seeing the livestock and hearing about the farms. Some of the passengers grew up on





farms and relate well to the operations.

"I love it too. I get out and cows are sucking on my fingers and that's been a really cool experience," she said. "Julie, Adam and Kathy at Harvestville have been great and very welcoming, too"

The 8-hour excursions provide alternating tours with the first being from 9 a.m. to noon and the second from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. Passengers on those days can actually take both tours or take extra time to move around downtown with the shuttle.

Collier said it's important for people in town to know what's happening with the passengers and what programming is in place so commerce can take hold.

"We've worked diligently with the cruise line to create these excursions based on what they felt their needs were and their timelines," Collier said.

Passengers select what excursions they are interested in prior to the ships docking at the city's pier. Collier said the numbers are split pretty evenly with anywhere from 100 to 125 passengers taking one of the two or both excursions.

"We've had a pretty even split on most excursions and we get from just under 40 to 60 on each one," Collier said.

"The third option is take a shuttle from the pier to the Old Fort and then stop at the depot museum where they can tour the museum. Then they go up the street and get dropped off at 9th Street so they can get out and walk around downtown and then the shuttle picks them up again."

That's when Derr starts seeing and talking with the passengers. The ice cream parlor that's part of Megan's Old Fashioned Ice Cream Parlor and lunch counter has been a big hit.

"Some of them will get a cone, but they love the atmosphere and they will take pictures of the kids working behind the counter."

She said the haven't had lunch because they pay for meals on the boat.

"There aren't eating. They are on a 5-star floating hotel and they're telling me the food is awesome on the boat. But they are buying the occassional ice cream. Just a lot of lookers," she said.

And that's not a bad thing in her opinion.

"I think it's going to get our name out there. With them traveling, they don't want to carry anything

back with them on the boat for the most part so shipping is a good option."

Derr said she spoke with someone who works for the boat and does some writing and is trying to put together a news letter to let people getting off the boats at different sites know what's going on.

Derr questioned the tours at first because she thought it took away form downtown, but she said she's since changed her mind.

"I think the purpose is to get them in our area and see what we have to offer and then I think every year it just builds," she said.

"If our community sees there's actually people coming in, maybe they would want to take one of these store fronts."

Collier said the only complaints she's heard were from the cruise line when they docked on Sunday and a lot of businesses were closed.

"I think it's been an absolutely positive experience for our downtown merchants, but the need to be open and available," she said.

"We heard a few people were open, but got a couple complaints from the cruise ship that not enough places were open. It's gonna take a season for us to get this all down."

Collier said she's encouraged business owners to just talk with the visitors and see what their interests are.

She said the visitors only have three hours on the bus and the average age of the passengers is 68 so adding too much to the tours makes things more difficult.

"For what we had to work with and the amount of time we had I'm very proud of what the city has done," she said.

"In just a few weeks we were able to put this together and were in connection with the cruise line the whole time. There were a lot of questions. We were able to meet in the middle and put it together."

She said money is also starting to circulate as a result of the tours. The Cruise line pays per passenger on the tours so the Old Fort and the prison are making money off the tours. The agritours are also paid for with some of the money going back to the farms.

"There are funds circulating through the community which is awesome because ultimately that's what the goal is," she said.

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

"Everyone is excited to get on the water," she said. "Be patient, and when it's your turn be ready to launch. Courtesy on the water goes a long way in avoiding problems."



boat operators to avoid alcohol while operating the craft.

"We want boaters to have fun on the water, but we don't want that fun to end in a boating tragedy. Boaters need to keep safety in mind while on the water," Stocker said.

Preparing for a safe day on the water begins in the driveway. Make sure to have a properly fitting life jacket for each person on board and that all of the safety equipment, including a properly working fire extinguisher, is on board.

"Remember, life jackets only work when worn," Stocker said. "Life jackets float, you don't."

Boating safety tips

• Alcohol and boating don't mix. Wind, sun, glare and heat can enhance the effects of alcohol hindering the operator's ability to make decisions.

• Before leaving the house, check the trailer lights, wheel bearings and the hitch.

 Make sure there is a current fire extinguisher and horn/whistle, a wearable life jacket for everyone and a USCG approved throwable device onboard.

• File a float plan with a friend, including your destination, expected time of return and type of boat.

• Wear your lifejacket - it floats, you don't.

• Inflatable lifejackets are light weight, comfortable and USCG approved. Wear it.

• Take a boater education course. It has valuable information and many insurance companies will offer a discount on boat insurance.

 Top two safety violations in Iowa are having inadequate life jackets and operating too fast and too close to other vessels.



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
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
