Farmers unite after family tragedy

Farmington ag community pulls together after Faulkners killed in motor vehicle accident

DONNELLSON- The goal for every generation and every human being should always be to try to make this world a better place than when they came into it.

That's the exact life lesson Chuck Westfall was trying to instill in his godson, Alex Steffensmeier, when he brought him along to help plant hundreds of acres of farm ground for his recently deceased friends.

"We're training him to pay back, too," Westfall said. An early morning accident Sunday near Donnellson claimed the lives of LaVerne and Michael Faulkner of rural Farmington, after a vehicle driven by Robert LeRoy Boyd was believed to have crossed the center line and struck the GMC Yukon LaVerne and Michael were riding in nearly head on.

The collision took place at just at about 1:15 a.m. Sun-

day morning on Hwy. 2 near the intersection of 140th

Both were later pronounced dead at an area hospital. According to the police report, Boyd was taken to the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics and his condition was unknown Sunday.

A visitation will be held Friday, June 14 at the Schmitz Funeral Home in Donnellson at noon and the family will receive friends from 3:30 to 7 p.m. A graveside service will be held at Hickory Haven Cemetery in rural Farmington at 10:30 a.m. with the processional leaving the funeral home at 10 a.m.

The accident is devastating for both the Faulkner family and the surrounding community. The impact of both LaVerne and Michael could clearly be seen in the events that followed their deaths shortly after.

Taking it upon themselves, Chuck Westfall and community members throughout the Donnellson area teamed up to help the Faulkner family finish planting its corn and bean crops on the Faulkner family farm located on the countryside in Donnellson.

"When I got the phone call from CJ (Laverne's oth-



Lady Hounds win 3 in QC

DAVENPORT - The Fort Madison Lady Hounds tallied three wins in less than six hours on Tuesday as part of a Quad Cities tournament.

The Hounds got the best of Davenport Central in the key matchup of the day when senior Vanessa Golowach wore a pitch with the count full and the bases loaded to move Cassie Powers home with the winning run for a 6-5 win in a five-inning contest.

The Lady Hounds trailed 5-2 going into the home half of the fifth. Olivia Williams and Kylee Cashman each singled to start the rally and then Maycee Featheringill laced a double to deep left center scoring both runners with no outs.

Powers then singled to center moving Alyson Helmick, who was pinch-running for Featheringill to third. Powers moved to second on a throw to third trying to get Helmick advancing. Helmick come around to score on a wild pitch to tie the game at 5. Logan Johnson and Ivy Geerdes would get back-to-back walks to load the bases for Dalyn Wondra.

Wondra would pop into an infield fly rule for the first out, but Golowach would then work the count full in the next at bat before getting plunked for the game winning run.

Williams was 3-for-3 hitting with a couple RBI and a run and pilfered a couple bags to lead the Lady Hounds from her lead-off spot. Featheringill had a couple hits and two RBI.

Powers went the distance giving up five runs, four earned on 11 hits including a home run. She's 4-3 on the year.

In the opener, Fort Madison rolled Tipton 7-2

behind a complete game, six-hit performance from Neeley Rehm. The eighth-grade hurler struck out eight while not surrendering an earned run. She also went 2-of-3 at the plate with an RBI.

Fort Madison led 1-0 through until the bottom of the third when the Lady Hounds brought five over the dish. Jassmine Bass led off with a single in the nine hole. Williams would get plunked and Johnson would fan for the first out. Then Featheringill, Powers and Geerdes put together a string of singles with one out. After Wondra grounded out to short for the second out, Rehm drilled a single straight up the middle scoring two to make it 6-0, but would get caught stealing to end the inning.

Fort Madison would score one more in the fourth inning and Tipton would salvage a run in the fifth and sixth but Rehm would slam to door when she picked off Tipton's Keeli Claussen to end the game

In the final game of the day, the Lady Hounds found themselves against a young Easton Valley with only one senior on the squad.

Fort Madison would jump out to a quick 7-1 lead through three highlighted by Williams 2 RBI double in the bottom half of the third.

Freshman Katie Dennis was in the circle for Fort Madison and threw just 71 pitches allowing one earned run, fanning six and not allowing a walk.

Williams went 3-for-4 at the plate with the 2 RBI. Dennis also had a couple RBI on two hits for the Lady Hounds. Helmick went 2 for 2 with a two runs scored and couple walks.

Fort Madison has won six straight dating back to June 5 and is now 8-6 on the year. Dennis is 3-1 on the year with a meager 2.51 ERA.



Reichelt's 3 RBI double key to Hounds split

FORT MADISON-Coming into Tuesday's contest against Washington, Fort Madison's baseball team was riding high on a three-game win streak. The Bloodhounds were originally set to take on the Demons May 24, but the games were rained out and the doubleheader was moved to Tuesday at Fort Madison High School.

The Hounds were within one run of Washington through three innings in game No. 1, but a big top of the fourth helped the Demons take game one 10-4. Fort Madison flipped the script in game two, walking away with a 9-1 bounce back win behind the arm of Dayne Cordray.

GAME ONE

Washington started game one with back-toback singles before a sacrifice groundout plated the first run of the game for the Demons. The groundout was followed by another single, as Washington took a 2-0 lead in the top of the first.

Fort Madison had plenty of opportunities to snatch the lead in the first two innings, loading the bases on two separate occasions, but couldn't make anything happen.

"Tonight we put together some good at bats and hit balls right at people," Fort Madison Head Coach Ron Walker said. "We're at least getting in the box now and competing in that situation and giving ourselves a chance to drive in some runs."

Singles were the theme for the Demons through the first three innings, as two singles, two walks and a fielder's choice gave Washington a 3-0 advantage heading into the bottom half of the third inning.

Back-to-back walks to Dayne Cordray and Vasin Thurman allowed Brandon Reichelt to collect the first RBI of the game for Fort Madison and trim the lead to 3-1 in the third. Two straight strikeouts were followed by Vasin Thurman coming around to score on some heads up base running and a passed ball at third, as Washington's lead dwindled to 3-2.

The momentum the Bloodhounds were able to build in the bottom of the third was short lived, as Washington came alive at the plate in the top half of the four scoring six to put the game at 9-2.


Things started to come back around for Fort Madison in the bottom of the fifth inning. Codray walked, Reichelt singled and Fehseke also singled to load the bases for Fort Madison with just one out. Another single from Tate Johnson plated both Thurman and Reichelt for the Hounds final runs of the game, getting to within 9-4.

A double coupled with a Fort Madison fielding error gave Washington the final run of the game, as the Demons went on to take game one by the final of 10-4.

"You never feel like you performed well when you know you could have done better," Walker said. "Obviously we know we didn't play our best game. Our energy was down ...



er son) that his dad and brother were gone, I just told my wife I had to take off," Westfall said. "I left on my own and came out here."

Westfall has been farming around the Donnellson area for more than 50 years now. With LaVerne being slightly younger, he and Westfall had farmed around the same area for more than four decades.

"I lived two to three miles down the road," Westfall said. "We've been friends for 50 years probably, LaVerne and I. And I helped raise his sons."

LaVerne and Chuck raised LaVerne's sons on the same down-home roots that were instilled in them. When Westfall's wife recently passed away around two years ago, those roots shown through brighter than ever as Michael was one of the first ones to come and show support to Westfall.

"She passed away two and a half years ago and Michael was one of the first ones there," Westfall said choking back tears. "So it's just payback."

While Westfall was great friends with the Faulkner family and helped to spearhead the efforts, there were many others from around the area who helped to make it all possible.
