# **Teens injured in Friday ATV mishap** *Fareway*

DENMARK - Two teenage girls are in stable condition today after they were both seriously injured late Friday night in a single ATV accident in northern Lee County. The accident occurred in a heavily wooded area off Old Quarry Road northeast of Denmark and northwest of Wever.

The two girls, who have not been identified

as of Saturday morning, were both airlifted to two different hospitals and are in stable condition this morning, according to Lee County Sheriff Stacy Weber. One of the girls suffered head injuries and the other is hospitalized with back injuries.

LeeComm notified Lee County Sheriff's deputies and Denmark Fire and Rescue of the accident just a few minutes before midnight Friday.

Initially an AirEvac helicopter was dispatched to the scene and then a second helicopter was requested. Due to the location, the helicopters had trouble finding a safe landing place and the victims had to be transported by ambulance to the closest landing area.

ISP, Kensington double team dementia

PCC STAFF FORT MADISON - A local partnership is helping address dementia in offenders at the Iowa State Penitentiary

Dementia gets diagnosed every 68 seconds in America. An estimated 5.4 million Americans have one of the seven forms of dementia. One in nine people over the age of 65 have dementia.

According to ISP Executive Officer Rebecca Bowker, being an individual who is incarcerated does not preclude anyone from joining these statistics. At Iowa State Penitentiary, 25% of the population is 51 years or older, 11% is 65 years or older.

"Dementia is a very real thing inside our secure perimeter," Bowker said. "So when Rachel Benda, Director at the Kensington, contacted the prison about training on dementia, it just made sense"

To help address the issue, the prison created a partnership with the staff at Kensington, RN Mandi Garcia and Certified Dementia Practitioner, Cindy Greer, all whom were excited to work with the staff and offenders at ISP.

Benda said the Kensington was excited about the opportunity to offer their knowledge and skill set to help those suffering inside the prison.

"We love what we do! The Kensington has the most educated and caring staff around. We've been specializing in dementia care since 2004." Benda said. "We put a lot of time

and energy into training our staff and equipping them with the tools they need to be able to give the

# Varley: Downtown upper story work to start in July

FORT MADISON - There has been a lot of activity going on in Fort Madison this summer. The Hesse 7th Street Marketplace is up and running, downtown business owners are meeting to discuss the future of Avenue G, and work should begin shortly on the upper apartment renovations that have been in the works for the past several years.

Barker Financial Group of Iowa City has

stepped to the plate to finish the work on the Cattermole Library and the old Lee County Bank building. The Sears building was also in the original plans, but what improvements will be made to that building are still undecided.

That work was originally set to begin the first week in June, but Friday, Fort Madison City Manager David Varley said the work has been pushed back to the beginning of July.

"Most of what they do they self-fund," Varley said. "But since this project involves Community Development Block Grants they're still

working through that documentation and process."

"This a low-to-middle income housing to qualify for those grants so that's a little different for them, but we should see them beginning in July." he said.

The city will function as the funding passthrough for the project, but the Southeast Iowa Regional Planning Commission will administer the work for the city.

# FMHS trapshooters head to nationals in July

MONTROSE - A group of local students from a wide range of age groups will be traveling to Sparta, Illinois this summer to compete in a national trap shooting contest.

The Clay Crushers, a Fort Madison High School sport shooting club, continues to grow in numbers and success culminating in the July 31 trapshooting tournament at the World Shooting Recreational Complex in Sparta. The club is a shared program so all students in the area are eligible to join the club.

Head Coach Rob Faeth said more and more students are joining the local club and nationally the sport is outpacing a lot of traditional high school ball sports. The current team has a roster that exceeds 20 student-athletes.

According to the WSRC website, trapshooting is a specific form of shotgun clay target shooting and is a game of movement, action and split-second timing. It requires the accuracy and skill to repeatedly aim, fire and break the 108 mm discs which are hurled through the air at a speed of 42mph, simulating the flight path of a bird fleeing a hunter. The shooter is required to shoot at a target after he calls "pull."

It doesn't matter in scoring if the shooter hits only a small piece of the target or whether he shatters the target. The target is considered a "dead" or "lost" bird. Shooters stand a minimum of 16 yards and a maximum of 27 yards from the trap houses.

"In 2015 there were 13,000 high school kids shooting trap in the country. In 2017 that number has climbed to 17,000 and it's projected by 2020 that number will be more than 20,000," Faeth said.

Faeth's son, William is a nationally recognized shooter at Midland University in Fremont, Neb. helping lead that school to a national championship and was named an All-American. He received a scholarship his junior year in high school to attend Midland.

"He's probably one of the top collegiate shooters in the country," his father said.

Sheldon Edwards has been with Clay Crushers for two years and he said he found it looking for something different to do.

"I was looking for a new sport. The first year I came out just to test it out and I really liked it so I came out for a second year," he said. "I didn't get my 25 yet but I've been close."

A 25 is when the shooter hits all 25 birds in a round without missing.

Feath said he took the team to a state meet in late spring where the students shot better than they ever had, just missing bringing home some hardware.

"That's pretty intensive shooting," Faeth said. "But I'm very proud of the way the kids performed. Most of them shot better than they ever had before. We had some that hit over 170 out of 200 pulled."

Faeth said Ed Schroeder, a junior high student, has medaled this year at one of the state meets and other student athletes have come close to medaling.

The Fort Madison School Board recently gave permission for the club to travel to Sparta for the national competition.

Board member Lois DiPrima urged the board to let the club make the trip.

"They did very well at state and we have some really good shooters on that team. I think they have a chance to do something special out there," she said.







# Graffiti could lead to terrorism charge

to the Fort Madison Police Department. We believe in this community and the local law enforcement who protect it."

Pen City Current will also contribute to the reward for information leading to an arrest.

During the overnight hours of June 29-30 2017 a person or persons vandalized the new Fareway Grocery building at 1820 Ave. H in Fort Madison.

The nature of the vandalism is a spray painted message on the east side of the building. The message is "SHOOT COPS NOT DOPE".

Earlier this year the Police Department investigated a number of incidences of spray paint graffiti. It is unknown at this time whether this incident is related or not.

In a statement Friday, Police Chief Tim Sittig said the crime is a simple misdemeanor, but if the message has legitimacy the perpetrator's could be charged with terrorism, a felony which could result in up to a \$7,500 fine and five years in prison.

Shea Dinwiddie who has played other sports as well, including football, has been in the club for the past four years and said he's trying to get better each year and looks forward to the national meet.

"I'm just trying to improve each year. I did hit a 25 this year and the competition at these types of events is much harder."

Faeth said state and national competitions make the shooters work not just on the physical part of shooting, but the mental aspect as well.

"Sometimes at these events you can have a half mile of shooters lineup and shooting. That's a lot of distraction and requires some real focus. It challenges them mentally," Faeth said. "It's just a whole lot of fun for these kids and their parents, who have also provided great support."

Dinwiddie said the program used to cost \$900 per year per family, but that has been reduced to \$300 thanks in large part to sponsorships.

Feath said the club has many, many sponsors that help pay for the equipment and supplies for the students and that helps offset the costs to the parents. The Tri-State Gun Club also offers the practicing facility near Montrose.

The club will participate in another state shoot on July 22 prior to the national competition.

# Staff training key to offender care

staffing schedules. The first day was primarily classroom discussion surrounding symptoms of the disease, reactions and the various types of dementia. The important lesson being driven home, was people with dementia do not process sensory information in the same capacity as other people do.

The second day the Kensington staff brought items that would allow both staff and offenders to get small taste of what a person who has dementia feels like. Gloves that reduce sensation in your hands, shoe inserts that make it uncomfortable to walk, glasses to reduce your ability to see and headphones that simulates audio overstimulation.

The trainees were then given tasks to try to complete while wearing the gear. None were able to complete the tasks successfully.

"I think the exercise was very beneficial" said Bowker. "It provided the care givers a very different perspective on those they care for."


