FORT MADISON - Funds continue to be secured to help build a recreational trail on the west end of Fort Madison.

P.O.R.T. of Fort Madison received a \$1,500 grant from the Alliant Energy Foundation on Monday. The grant request was made for Phase III of the P.O.R.T. trails project

Hounds relying on defense this season

FORT MADISON - Coming off a year where the Fort Madison girls varsity basketball squad won just one game, first year Head Coach Todd McGhghy said it's back to the basics with everyone.

The girls got their first look at the team this year Friday with a well-fought 51-44 loss to Centerville, in a game where the Hounds held a 23-20 lead with some tenacious full-court defense.

McGhghy said defense will be the focus of the Hounds this year but he's not set on any one scheme and will have to play different defenses depending on what the other team is doing offensively.

A pattern of having a lopsided quarter, which was what has plagued Fort Madison heavily the past two years, reared its head again out of the break. Centerville Sophomore Claire Mathews heated up and led the Redettes to a 16-4 third quarter advantage wiping out the Hounds lead.

Mathews went for 25 points on the night including four 3-pointers in a 15-point second half.

The Lady Hounds outscored Centerville 17-15 in the final quarter but couldn't overcome the third quarter let down. FMHS also jumped out to a 14-9 first quarter lead with Maddie Rashid firing in nine points in the first half and 14 for the game to lead FMHS.

On Saturday night, the girls ran into a pressure-heavy West Burlington team in the Hall of Pride scrimmage. The game was unofficial as it didn't count on either teams' record.

Fort Madison hung around with the Lady Falcons in the first half trailing 28-17 at the end of the first two periods.

West Burlington applied heavy pressure throughout the game in full and half-court trap zones causing some confusion for the Lady Hounds.

The Lady Falcons sophomore Annaka Harris led all scorers with 22 points. Senior Lexy Davis and another sophomore, Sydney Marlow, each were in double figures for West Burlington with 16 and 14 points each.

Rashid led the Hounds again with nine points. Senior Jassmine Bass had seven points for Fort Madison.

Junior point guard Anna Kester is one of the few



returning players from last year's squad. Kester, who was held scoreless against West Burlington, but had seven against Centerville in the opener, said the team is playing better than last year's 1-21 season.

"We really developed a better defense this year and we've been playing better as a team. Overall, our offense is better. I think we're just hoping to play even ball this year, honestly," Kester said.

Senior Braxtyn McGhghy said the Hounds are focusing on defense, but there's a more even approach to the offense and who'll step up to the lead on the offensive end.

"This year we're focusing more on defense and were sprinting to the ball and focusing on getting there faster," she said. "Actually, I think we've all worked pretty hard on ball handling this summer. It's good that we have a lot of good athletic girls. We all can play that no. 1 spot or no 2 spot. It's not just one set person. If someone needs to fill in we can fill in."

McGhghy makes no bones about defense being the key to turning the program around.

"I am a defensive coach and we focus on defense a lot... lot...lot. We focus on getting better at it every day. We run break down drill after drill after drill. With our personnel that's what we have to do. If our personnel dictated a 2-3 zone that's what we would do. I'm not married to a scheme or system. We just try to look at what we have and what we do well," he said.

Dallas Hodges, a graduate of the Cedar Rapids Washington and Wayne State basketball programs, and Carrie Burken will be on the sidelines this year with McGhghy. He said those two bring a different approach to the game.

"Dallas and Carrie bring a great balance to me. But not from a rescue or enabling standpoint, they are both an asset to me with the kids. When they think I'm really, really ticked at them, there is someone they can go to."

Striking a balance between the structure of the game and allowing skills to shine is at the forefront of McGhghy's approach to the season. With several new faces, including some seniors like Josie Pumphrey, Dezire Kline, and Bass, will bring some experienced athletes to the program, although raw on basketball skills. Junior volleyball standout Jillian Wiseman is also suited up this year.

"I'm guessing that's probably everybody's challenge.

How much structure vs. freedom. I was telling the girls the other day when I coached with Dave Hall in Keokuk and we got second and third in the state back-to-back years, we literally had two or three offensive sets, everything else was just motion and we let them play," McGhghy said. "That's the challenge in my opinion. As coach if they find that secret and balance quick you'll have that success."

Offensively he said the girls have shown improvement in those skill sets over the summer, but he isn't sure how that will translate into productivity on the court.

He pointed to Kester's experience and Rashid's ability to score.

"Anna has experience offensively in terms of handling the point guard and bringing the ball up the floor. There's a good three to four people who I wouldn't mind if they had to do it. With her and Rashid and Boeding, there's quite a few that can bring the ball up the floor."

Kester and Rashid each averaged under five points per outing last year, but combined for more than 50 assists on the year. Sarah Bernhardt averaged just under six points and four rebounds per contest last year.

He said Keokuk and Mt. Pleasant will be strong in the conference this year and Fairfield is always athletic and reload year after year, despite losing some productive

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2018-19 Boys Basketball Preview

Bloodhound boys looking to surprise in Southeast

FORT MADISON - Despite the loss of two first-team all-conference picks last year, the Fort Madison Bloodhounds boys basketball team may be in a better position to compete for a conference title this year.

The Bloodhounds lost Kaleb Cresswell and Treavor James-Kokjohn to graduation, but are looking to play in a Southeast Conference that is more balanced with Mt. Pleasant graduating a good portion of the team that went 21-4 last year and lost at the state tournament to Waverly Shell-Rock.

The Hounds unofficially opened the season Saturday and came back from a three-point halftime deficit in the Hall of Pride scrimmage against West Burlington to win 61-56.

Senior Logan Rashid and junior Jayden Fedler led FMHS with 15 and 14 points, respectively, but seven other players got into the scoring for the Hounds.

Rashid averaged just under 10 points a game as a junior last year and was chilly from the floor in the first half Saturday night. He rebounded with eight points in the second half to lead the Hounds with 15 on the night.

Rashid said team chemistry is something that will help the Hounds counter the loss of Cresswell and James-Kokjohn. But he said FMHS will try to work the offense inside and out, but will still need to rely on perimeter shooting.

"I think the chemistry and gelling of the team will be a lot better, which will really help us," Rashid said.

"I think we can have success with Jayden inside, but for the last couple years we've been that better shooting team in the conference, so we'll use that outside range when we can."

Fedler kept Fort Madison close in the WILSON

first half against the Falcons with some good ball work inside and said his role will be to try and pick up the inside game for the Bloodhounds.

"I expect to carry his

(James-Kokjohn's) load, not entirely because we're a different team this year. But I want to do my best to score and maybe hit some outside shots. We're a little younger and less experience with some new faces around here. I think we'll get the hang of it."

Head Coach Ryan Wilson said the Hounds will have to be able to mixup their offense to keep teams from focusing solely on the Hounds' outside abilities.

"For us to be successful, we have to get the ball inside. We've got players that can play inside and that's not just our big guys. We have guards that can go inside and play," Wilson said.

"We want to spread it around and get the ball into our posts that will open everything else up. We're long and athletic so hopefully we can attack the basket and do some different things."

With Fort Madison trailing by three at halftime, sporting several runs after the Falcons had stretched leads to as much as seven, the Bloodhounds raced to an 18-7 third quarter advantage and led 46-40 going into the final period.

West Burlington would tie the game at 53 with about 4 minutes left, but Fort Madison would pull away in a clean second half that only saw a combined two

free throws attempted.

Senior Brandon Keester, who averaged just over seven points per outing last year and fired in five on Saturday including one from long range, said he thinks the Hounds will surprise some in the conference.

"I know we're projected to go second in the conference, but I think we're going to prove a lot of people wrong and win the conference this year," Keester said during a warm-up Saturday morning.

"Our team is really athletic and we have some good shooters. We're not as big, but we can make up for it with our athleticism."

Wilson said the success will come down to executing each game's plan.

"We've got quite a few shooters and ultimately it will come down to our plan each night. We've put a huge emphasis on our defense and our intensity. This is our first week in practice and we've got to be better defensively," he said.

Fairfield seems to be the favorite to win the conference this year with a lot of seniors returning from a squad that took two from Fort Madison last year.

"Fairfield has to be the favorite to win the conference, but don't sleep on Mt. Pleasant. They're a great program and, just because Coach (Paul) Rundquist is gone, doesn't mean they won't compete. Their jayvee and freshman programs were successful last year," Wilson said.

"But hopefully, we'll do the right things and compete for a conference championship." The Bloodhounds have 35 students in the program this year. Others that will likely see playing time include Holy Trinity transfer Jake Eaves, who's one of the taller kids on the team and can shoot from outside. Dayton Davis handled the ball very well for the Hounds Saturday night and, at times, ran the offense. He had five points against the Falcons.

Jace Burgher had six points for Fort Madison, Parker Denning had five, Mike Mosena chipped in with four and is another person Wilson can count on to handle the ball. Eaves had three points and Jordyn Gerdes added a bucket.

"It's nice to see new kids in the program no matter where they come from. Thirty-five kids is the biggest we've had numbers-wise for quite some time," Wilson said.

Thursday and we definitely need pies, bars, or other desserts that we can package up."

Collier said the dinner takes a lot of man hours to produce, but the event is starting to take on a life of its own, making planning easier each year.

"This is a very community-minded event from the preparation and planning to the meal. We work very closely with Fareway and Hy-Vee to get stuff ordered in a timely fashion. Hy-Vee also delivers so we don't have to worry about transporting it from the store."

She said this year many of the dry goods were ordered through the school so the committee could do some bulk purchasing and then take advantage of delivery of those products, as well.

"It's getting smoother and smoother and we learn from previous years and figure out what works and what doesn't."

The number of meals served and delivered continues to climb each year. Last year more than 900 meals were served with just about half being delivered. The other half was a mix of residents dining in and carrying out meals.

This year the Iowa State Penitentiary, in addition to providing cookies for desserts, will also be cooking the vegetables for the stuffing, which will save kitchen prep time on Wednesday.

Collier said the number of high school students volunteering to help with the event has increased yearly, as well.

"We did see an influx of students helping us this year. With the new graduation requirements at the high school, we had more students on the volunteer list, which is pretty cool." She said volunteers will be packaging up leftovers and saving the remaining meat and bones from the turkey to be used for a community soup supper that is being planned for January, but the details on that are still in the works.

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
