Hull named next county engineer

Danville grad will look to replenish staff out of the gate

MONTROSE - It was an expected transition as current Assistant Lee County Engineer Ben Hull was tapped to take over the county engineer's position starting Dec. 29.

At Tuesday's regular meeting of the Lee County Board of Supervisors, Hull was approved to replace Ernie Steffensmeier, a 42-year veteran of the county engineering department.

The Danville High School graduate came back to the



southeast corner of Iowa in 2009 when he was hired on with the Lee County Engineer's office

Hull graduated from the University of Iowa in 2003 with a bachelor's degree in civil engineering, bu has been involved in county road work since his high school days.

"I graduated from Danville in 1998 and went to work with Des Moines County that summer and during college breaks on road crews. Then they moved onto their survey crew while I was still in college," Hull said.

After a couple of years, Hull took a job in Iowa City while he was finishing his degree work and did construction and surveying work. After graduation, he took a job in Cedar Rapids designing residential and commercial

developments and then served for four years as the Cedar County Asst. County Engineer. He also did a oneyear stint with Polk County as it's construction manager.

In 2009 he saw an opening for a position with the Lee County Engineers office and applied for that in hopes that he would be able to move closer to where he grew

Hull has served as Steffensmeier's assistant since he arrived in 2009. Steffensmeier had been appointed County Engineer after Dennis Osipowicz stepped away from the

He said he doesn't foresee any big changes coming in the department as things are going pretty well compared to other counties state wide.



Project helps shelter dogs re-engage

Fullenkamp said she researched the impact of reading to dogs and realized that at shelters in particular, the dogs get more socialization and the children's voices can be calming to them. It also has the added benefit of helping the students with reading skills.

She said the students have planned the program from the ground up and enjoy coming out to the shelter for part of the day.

Since it was December and a month of giving, the students also took the opportunity to collect supplies for the shelter and presented those to PAW Director Sandy Brown.

Brown said the dogs, who were a bit rambunctious for the first part of the readings with all the extra added attention from media and kids, have reacted very well to the reading and seem to enjoy the interaction.

"They seem a bit more agitated today, last time they settled in pretty quick and then it was really cool to listed to the kids read and see the dogs sitting there," Brown said.

"It's good socialization for the animals and helps them become more adoptable, and it's good because it helps the kids with reading."

Fullenkamp said there is a cost associated with the program because they have to pay for the school bus to transport them to the shelter. She said Connection Bank gave them \$100 donation for the project. To have the students come out once a month during the school year will cost about \$140 more and she said she's looking for donations to help offset that cost.

"It surprised me a little that some people said "No", but I think that's because they really didn't understand what was happening. This is the first time something like this has taken place around here" Fullenkamp said.

According to the program, the students have to practice reading the books they will take to the shelter with their parents at home and the parents have to sign off that the student is reading the book well enough to be able to read on their own to the animals.

Fullenkamp that helps make the student more comfortable with the book and leads to better experience for the student...and the dog.

"Dogs aren't judgmental when you're reading to them in a kennel. They sit and actually listen and that makes the stress on the students less because there is no feedback. Just listening. Reading in front of peers can be very stressful on students. We just think this is a win for the students and the animals."

HTC girls falter in OT to Falcons

Loss is third straight to WB after Crusaders led in 4th quarter

FORT MADISON - The West Burlington Lady Falcons have a curse on the Holy Trinity girls basketball team.

In the past two years, the Crusaders have held leads in the fourth quarter in each game the two teams have faced each other and somehow, the Falcons find a way to get a win. Tuesday night was no different as HTC held a 49-47 lead with :35 left on the clock in regulation.

A Holy Trinity turnover with :23 seconds left in regulation set the Falcons up with the ball and Head Coach John Vandenberg called a time out to set up a final play where they worked the ball into Alexis Davis, who got a step on the HTC defense outside the lane and slid in for short jumper to tie it at 49 and force overtime.

After each team committed a turnover in the opening seconds of the four-minute extra session, Eryn Anderson was fouled by sophomore Leah Collier. Anderson made the front end but missed the bonus to give HTC a one-point lead.

In the next possession for the Falcons after West Burlington set up in the half-court, the ball rotated over to sophomore Natalie Vandenberg, who laced a 3-ball from the left wing as HTC's Ashlynn Haas flew over to try and get hand in her face. The bucket would give the Falcons a lead they wouldn't give up.

After Vandenberg's score, HTC would commit three turnovers in a row trying to get the ball past the West Burlington trapping press, but the Falcons couldn't get a bucket in transition off the turnovers or in the set offense. With 1:15 left after

a tie-up that gave the ball back to West Burlington, Mya Lawlor fouled West Burlington's Iliyah Moore. Moore, and the Falcons, struggled at the free throw line in Friday's home loss to Danville, shooting just 11 of 24. Moore was just 2 of 7 Friday, but would connect on 3-of-4 on back-to-back possessions to give West Burlington a 55-50 lead.

Vandenberg would then commit a foul on Haas as she was bringing the ball through the press and Haas sank both with :31 second remaining. Senior Lexy Davis would score from the left side when she leaked behind Holy Trinity's 1/2 court press and took a long inbounds pass in for a bucket to put the lead back at five. HTC senior Emily Box, who finished with a game high 22 points,

scored underneath on the next trip down for the Crusaders to cut the lead back to three 54-57.

HTC's Haas would foul Moore again to stop the clock with about six second remaining. Moore missed the first off the right side and the second off the left. The Falcons picked up the rebound off the second free throw, but Haas came up with a timely steal and raced down the floor kicking the ball off to Taylor Boeding who threw up a shot from about 21 feet that missed off the right side of the glass as time expired.

Head Coach Tony Johnson said turnovers were the key to the game.

"You can't commit 40-45 turnovers in a game and expect to win," he said afterwards. "But we've got another game on Friday and then we get a couple weeks to get in and clean some of this stuff up."

Box was able to score almost at will in the first half converting six from inside the paint as she pretty much always had a step on the West Burlington's defense for inside points. Vandenberg made some adjustments and held Box to just three in the third quarter as the two teams stayed within three points of each other the whole second half, with the exception of the overtime period.

"When you run that 1-3-1, in theory you should always be able to get the ball inside. That was working early on, but then it seemed like nothing we were doing worked. We've got a lot of work to do."

Box led all scorers with 22 points followed by Haas with 11, Boeding had 10 and Anderson had nine. Lawlor had two points to round out the scoring for the Crusaders.

The 5-4 Crusaders travel to Cardinal of Eldon in a Friday night boys/girls double header to wrap up the first half of the season heading into the holiday break.

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

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

Gov. Reynolds gets Rural Iowa task force initiatives

(DES MOINES) – Gov. Kim Reynolds this month received initial recommendations from three task forces charged with identifying needed legislative, regulatory and policy changes as part of the Governor's Empower Rural Iowa Initiative. The governor established the initiative by executive order in July. It is co-chaired by Lt. Gov. Adam Gregg and Iowa Rural Development Council (IRDC) Chair Sandy Ehrig.

"I'd like to thank our dedicated task force members for bringing forth excellent recommendations to meet the needs of rural Iowa - access to quality housing, leadership in our small communities and sustainable broadband connectivity," Gov. Reynolds said. "For Iowa to truly be successful, we have to see growth in every corner of our state. We've seen positive things happening in our rural communities, but there's still a lot to do.

These recommendations are just the beginning, and I can't wait to see how we will continue to empower rural Iowa in the future."

The Investing in Rural Iowa Task Force, the Growing Rural Iowa Task Force and the Connecting Rural Iowa Task Force held Ideas Summits in six rural locations around Iowa – Earlham, Holstein, Maguoketa, Mount Pleasant, Pella and Stanton. They considered ideas submitted by task force members and the public.

Several common themes were identified in the initial recommendations. One was to create an Office of Rural Affairs to assist with rural policy development and provide a permanent rural perspective. Another was to create a database for rural communities to share available programs, best practices and development strategies.

Specific task force recommendations include:

Investing in Rural Iowa Task Force

- · Assist rural Iowa communities in obtaining housing needs assessments
- · Reform the workforce housing tax credit to make it more competitive and dedicate additional resources to the rural set-aside

Growing Rural Iowa Task Force

- · Create an Empowered Rural Communities recognition program
- · Create leadership pathways for recognized empowered rural communities

Connecting Rural Iowa Task Force

- · Optimize the existing broadband grant program to ensure state funding stretches as far as possible
- · Identify a consistent source of funding for the broadband grant program

Hull says project funding ebbs and flows

"I don't see this as a departure from what we've been doing," Hull said. "Tech is always evolving, with things like robotic total stations and GPS that now runs off our cellphones. We can now literally just jump out of a truck and start working. From a management level these tech improvements allow us to have a better big picture of the county. But they also help us keep records and have our fingers on the pulse of everything a bit better than in the past."

He said funding is moving target from the state and federal government and things in that area are constantly changing.

"There's an ebb and flow to funding and where it comes form. I've always

heard from the older guys that if you stick around long enough things will go one way and then cycle back and I think that's kind of what's going on now."

Federal money is now, what Hull called "swappable" for state dollars to allow closer control and development of county projects.

"Right now were swapping federal money and that's basically us trading federal dollars for state dollars. This allows us to develop our projects much more quickly. Right now on federal projects you best case scenario is usually a year to develop. But with these swap funds, I think we can cut some of these project timelines in half," Hull said.

Steffensmeier and Hull

both have indicated the county is in pretty good shape when it comes to its roads and bridges.

"While we do have more needs than we have funds. I think we should consider ourselves fortunate compared to other counties because our bridges and roads are in pretty good shape in the system as a whole. We're positioned pretty well compared to others."

Communication with the public, and funding, are two of the constant hurdles in the office.

"The hurdles are the same as always. Open discussions with the public and try to be responsive to them and to look ahead. It's hard because you can't predict how a road will perform over 10 years. You won't know where funding will be and you don't always know where to apply your limited funding," he said.

One of his first tasks will be to replace himself. Asst. County Engineers require licensing, which can come after four years working full time in the field. He will also have another staff position to fill, with the department dropping to three full-time employees on the 29th when Steffensmeier retires officially. A reception for Steffensmeier is set for Dec. 28th from 2 to 4:30 p.m. at the North Lee County Office building.

"When Ernie retires we will be down one and we are already currently down one tech. We are looking to fill both those spots," he said.
