# Mishap dumps scrap metal on Rodeo Hill

FORT MADISON - Local police and clean-up crews are on the scene of a truck accident that happened at about 11:20 a.m. Tuesday on 15th Street in Fort Madison.

A truck hauling scrap metal lost fluid and began to roll back down the hill before jack-knifing and dumping the load and trailer across 15th Street about 1/2 way up the hill.

The trailer was being hauled by TB Transportation out of Fort Madison. Another TB truck brought a trailer to the location as police had both the north and southbound entrances blocked as the the metal was being cleaned up. The trailer tipped over blocking the east bound sidewalk and part of the easement, as well as about half of the roadway on the east side.

Local police said the Iowa Department of Transportation had been called to the scene.

# Counties take backfill issue to capitol

# Wednesday marks annual County Day on the hill

DES MOINES - County officials and employees from across the state will travel to Des Moines on Wednesday, March 14, for the 10th Annual County Day at the Capitol hosted by the Iowa State Association of Counties (ISAC). The event will give county officials and employees the opportunity to be involved in the legislative process by promoting legislation that is of importance to counties.

Among other issues, county officials will be ad-

vocating for full funding of the commercial and industrial property tax backfill.

In 2013 state law was changed to reduce the amount of taxes that local governments get from commercial and industrial properties. The backfill is the reimbursement from the state to local governments for this loss. Reducing or eliminating the

backfill would likely force property tax increases, predominately on homes and farms, or reductions in local services that residents rely on. according to ISAC officials. This reimbursement is part of the state's buy in on the property tax reductions they granted, and ISAC and its members are urg-

# Conservation board close to adopting bylaws

MONTROSE - The Lee County Conservation Board took another step toward finalizing its revamped bylaws Tuesday night.

At the board's regular meeting, the board reviewed the bylaws and approved some amendments that were recommended by county officials.

The board debated briefly on when to elect new officers. New board member Liza Alton thought that naming new officers in January would be a more common approach to changing leadership. Board vice chairman Harry Sylvester said the bylaws as written provided some flexibility to set officers either in December or January and also gives some time for the board to consider the positions.

After the conversation, the board decided to leave that language as it was.

Unsworth said the biggest change in the bylaws is probably the language governing expenditures. Any expenses over \$5,000 would now require a bidding process.

"The big change is just simplifying the expenditures," Unsworth said. "After \$5,000 we just follow the bid procedures set forth by the (Lee County Board of) supervisors. It would give the board a bit more buying power than other department heads, but we also have equipment and

some things we need to get so that gives us a bit more flexibility,"

"The bid procedures the supervisors have set follow Iowa code so that takes care of all that language in there as well."

Board member Bill Mullan asked Unsworth how the duck blind committee work is going. Unsworth said some of the new recommendations that have been coming from the meetings were forwarded to



# FMHS band ready for Chicago St. Pat's parade

Bloodhounds will get to see Green Chicago River and play in historical parade

FORT MADISON - Fort Madison's very own Marching Bloodhounds have the privilege of marching in a national parade once again this coming weekend. 90 students will be marching in the 2018 Chicago St. Patrick's Day Parade. Monday night band director Tracy Madsen hosted an informational meeting in the Fort Madison High School band room to inform chaperones, students attending the trip and their parents, of the itinerary, expectations and to ensure students marching in the parade were well prepared for the trip.

The band departs Friday afternoon and will be released for their fifth period class. The parade is Saturday and the Marching Bloodhounds are expected to step off at noon.

The Marching Bloodhounds along with teachers and chaperones are especially excited to attend this historical parade. The Chicago St. Patrick's Day Parade stems from the mid 1800s when there was a large number of Irish citizens living in Chicago, but it wasn't until a century later that the parades started happening. The first official parade was held in 1956, five years later is when they started dyeing the Chicago River green. To dye the river they dump in a chemical which is used to detect leaks and pollu-

tion in the water, the best part is it doesn't harm the water. It just turned out that the chemical dyed the river a perfect green color.

So, in 1962, they poured a hundred pounds of dye into the river and it stayed green for a whole week. After many tests, they dimmed it down to 40 pounds of dye making it last up to five hours.

the personnel at the Iowa Department of Natural Resources, that govern the grant money that was used to purchase property.

"We're still waiting to hear back from them on the recommendations we made. We sent those to them, but haven't heard back from them yet," Unsworth said.

The board also heard from naturalist Clay Steele who said more than 1,000 youth had been through the Heron Bend Conservation facility in March. He said more than 50 class programs were held at the center in just 28 days in March. Steele also updated the board on upcoming events including the Prairie Easter Egg Hunt on March 24. DNR officials will also be dumping 1,000 trout in Wilson Lake at noon on March 23. Those under 16 may fish and possess trout if they are with an adult who is licensed and possesses a trout fee, however the combined limit will be five trout. If those under 16 purchase their own trout fee, they can then possess their own five trout limit.

ing the Iowa Legislature to keep that promise and back the backfill.

"There are currently House and Senate proposals that make rapid reductions to the backfill. Neither proposal is acceptable to our members because they both start reductions in FY 2019. Counties have already had to certify their budgets and have no ability to adjust their revenue sources after certification. Their only option will be to reduce services or in some cases, use reserves set aside for other projects. We strongly

suggest that the backfill be fully funded in FY 2019 and a plan established in conjunction with county officials for any future phaseout of funding." said Bill Peterson, ISAC Executive Director.

"Our members will be explaining to their legislators the cuts that would be made to local services and the expected future hikes in property taxes if the backfill is not fully funded."


