## Fraise named one of top 50 developers on continent

FORT MADISON – Lee County Economic Development Group's President Dennis Fraise has been named one of the top 50 Economic Developers on the continent.

Consultant Connect, a consulting agency that is bridging the gap between economic developers and site consultants, announced this week that Fraise has earned the honor.

Fraise said Monday that he feels fortunate to be honored, but said the honor really is an indicator of what is happening in Lee County

"It's a partnership between Dana (Millard, LCEDG project director), the board and the stakeholders. It

takes a good team and we're fortunate to be honored, but I think it's a real reflection of what's happening here in Lee County," Fraise said.

LCEDG has received national and international recognition for it's Grow Lee and Grow Lee 2.0 efforts The group also has a mark in the Guinness Book

of World Records for the most people simultaneously planting tulips. Fraise is also a sought after speaker at economic development events in and outside the United States.

He also is a co-host on a podcast with former Greater Burlington Partnership director Jeff Hutcheson, that was downloaded more than 60,000 in it's first year.

Fraise said the Grow Lee efforts, the podcast and the

attention LCEDG has received statewide, nationally and internationally all contributed to the recognition.

"I think it was a couple of things. We got some recognition for our Grow Lee programs that caught the attention of the International Economic Development County, which is the largest economic development group in the world," Fraise said.

"I've also been asked to present at conferences in the past two years including Toronto and Atlanta, and we've done some academic peer reviews and that got us some attention as well."

The podcast, called 'Develop This!' is the No. 1 economic development podcast on ITunes with listeners in all 50 states. Fraise said that's where he's learning

# Directors chat about student reps on school board

FORT MADISON – A very brief discussion that sifted out from a myriad of policy reviews, has left a door open to possible student representation on the Fort Madison School board.

At Monday's regular meeting of the Fort Madison Community School District Board of Directors, the usual review of school board policies that may need aligning with the Iowa Association of School Boards was underway, when Superintendent Dr. Erin Slater brought up a discussion of IASB policy 202.5.

The optional IASB policy encourages school boards to seek out student opinions regarding the district's educational programs. The district currently does not have student representation on the board.

District business manager Sandy Elmore said the district used have student representation many years ago, but she said the time commitments of students made attendance difficult.

'It's a big time commitment. They have activities... homework. They actually sit at the table and have to report back to their peers," Elmore said.

Director Carol Ross asked if the board should look into whether there was interest from students.

Slater said if the board looks for interest at the school,

## Fishing to starting to pop again in southeast Iowa lakes and ponds

#### **Big Hollow Lake**

Water temperature is in the mid-70's. Bluegill - Fair: Anglers are picking up nice bluegills in 6 to 8 feet of water in the flooded timber. Largemouth Bass - Fair: Work the flooded timber with soft plastics in 6 to 8 feet of water or around the big brush piles near the upper end of the lake.

#### Iowa River (Columbus Junction to Mississippi River)

The heavy rains in the upper watershed are forecast to make the water level at this end jump up a couple of feet by the middle of next week. Channel Catfish - Good: The rains should flush more food into the river; don't pass up any mouth of the feeder creeks.

#### Lake Belva Deer

Water temperature is 75 degrees. The lake is still a little green. Largemouth Bass - Fair: Anglers are starting to pick up more bass in the shallow water with the cool weather. Bluegill - Good: Anglers are picking up more bluegills, but they remain in the deeper 10 to 12 feet of water. Channel Catfish - Fair: Most catfish have moved into deeper water; start along the old creek channel.

#### **Lake Darling**

The recent rains knocked the green color of the water back a little, but it's still green. Water temperature is 75 degrees. Largemouth Bass - Fair: Anglers are still picking up some bass in shallow, but the catch rates have dropped a little. Bluegill - Fair: The bigger bluegills are still mostly in the deeper water (8-10 feet) around the rock piles and brush piles. A few smaller ones are in shallow. Channel Catfish - Slow: If we get some rain this Sunday, they might perk back up. Black Crappie - Good: Catch rate is picking up a little. Work the deeper habitat as they haven't made that transition to shallow water just yet.

#### **Lost Grove Lake**

Largemouth Bass - Good: Bass fishing has picked back up. The bigger ones are in deeper water, but the smaller ones have moved in shallow. Black Crappie - Fair: Anglers continue to pick up crappies out around edges of the flooded timber in 8 to 10 feet of water. Some anglers are finding them all the way down to 20 to 25 feet deep. Try vertical jigging or using a slip bobber and minnow. Bluegill - Fair: The nicer bluegills remain out in deeper water; smaller ones are in shallow.

## Wagoner wins September sprint event Saturday

DONNELLSON – After three weeks since the 2019 regular season points ended, the Pepsi Lee County Speedway in Donnellson, Iowa returned to action on a rare Saturday in September. As HAPPS CNC Performance Engines, Mohrfeld Electric, and Henniges Automotive helped to bring the action in the Iowa Sprint League Non Wing Sprints, 305 Sprint Cars, Budweiser IMCA Modifieds, Roberts Tire Center SportMods, and Illinois Midget Racing Association – IMRA Midgets.

After all the qualifying events were completed, the 20-lap Roberts Tire Center SportMods were the first feature to take to the track. With Tony Olson and Brayton Carter drawing the front row for the event. Carter took advantage of his draw to jump out front on lap 1 over Olson and Jarrett Franzen.


While Carter paced the field out front, Franzen, Sean Wyett, who started 7th, Olson, and Austen Becerra battled two and three wide for the second thru fifth spots. Becerra, who was working the top of the track, was able to work himself into the runner up spot on lap 8, and then went to work on Carter for the top spot.

On lap 10 Carter started working into lapped traffic, which helped Becerra to close in on him. Just as it looked like the feature would go green to checkered without a caution, Draython Schanfish spun in turn 2 on lap 15 to bring out the yellow. On the restart Jim Powell and Barry Taft spun into the guardrail in turn 1 to bring the yellow light back on. The following restart saw Carter jumped back out front, with Wyett and Franzen close behind. Carter, who worked the bottom of the track, and Wyett, who was working the top, ran the final four laps side-by-side, with Wyett grabbing the

lead coming to the white flag. Going into turn 3 Wyett had a lapped car in his groove, that forced him to move down a lane. This would allow Carter to get up next to him coming off turn 4. Wyett would edge out the win by a nose to claim the \$800 top prize. Carter settled for a close 2nd, Olson was 3rd, Dylan VanWyk started 10th and finished 4th, with Franzen coming home in 5th.

Up next was the 20-lap Illinois Midget Racing Association – IMRA Midget feature, with Brent Burrows and Andy Baugh leading the field to green. But just as the green flag waved the yellow light would come on, as Will Armatage spun in turn 1 to bring out the yellow. On the original restart Baugh grabbed the lead on lap 1 over Burrows and Tyler Roth. While Baugh set the pace out front, Burrows, Roth and Mark McMahill were battling for the runner up spot. The action up front was brought to a halt on lap 11, as Tracy Hull, who was running 5th, got upside down in turn 2 to bring out the red. He would climb from his car okay. Baugh would jump back out front on the restart, with Roth and Mc-Mahill close behind. Baugh then held on over the final laps to score his second win in the two appearances of the season at the Pepsi Lee County Speedway. Roth was 2nd, McMahill was 3rd, Burrows was 4th, with Jeff Sparks rounding out the top 5.

Riley Kreisel and Wyatt Burks led the field to the drop of the green flag in the 25 lap Iowa Sprint League Non Wing Sprint Car feature, with Kreisel jumping out front on lap 1 over Burks and Chris Parkinson. The pace was slowed on lap 3, as Glen Saville spun in turn 2 to bring out the yellow. On the restart Kreisel moved back out front, with Burks and Parkinson following. Just after the lap was scored complete, Chuck Alexander spun in turn 4 to bring out the yellow. Kreisel once again grabbed the lead on the restart, with Burks and Parkinson still following. Then just after that lap was scored complete, another caution came out. This time Katlynn Leer slowed in turn 1 to bring out the yellow. Once again Kreisel grabbed the lead on the restart, with Burks and Terry Babb, who started 10th and over took Parkinson for third, close behind. Disaster would strike Kreisel on lap 7, as he slowed off turn 4 with mechanical troubles to bring out the yellow. This would give Burks the lead on the restart, with Babb and Parkinson following. Without another caution to slow the pace, Burks would pull away to an easy win and claim the \$1,000 top prize to go with it. Babb was 2nd, Parkinson was 3rd, Colton Fisher was 4th, with Dan Keltner finishing 5th after starting in 21st.

# Directors want more input allowing student reps on school board

directors would have to be on board with moving in that direction.

"I would hate to put this out there and bring it back and say, 'Hey there was interest' and then have the board say, "Well...we'd like to wait a year or two. So I think before we garner interest, the board needs to be on the same page. That would be my recommendation," Slater said.

Board President Tim Wondra said it was difficult enough to get students to the board meetings for the regular student rep reports.

But Director Dianne Hope said she would like to see the board leave the option on the table.

"There's positives here. Lots of positives. The fall back is that they may not attend all the time because of commitments and different things.," Hope said.

"I'd like us to think about this. I'm not sure we want to think about it in a meeting like this, but maybe through the SIAC group, there's students on there and maybe they could provide some input."

Slater agreed with Elmore that the time commitment is a consideration.

"If it's done right, it's a huge time commitment for students," Slater said.

She said she served in a district that did have student reps brought on and it was a very large time commitment, but she said for the right person it helps their



resume and engagement. The student had to apply and a board subcommittee was convened to interview candidates.

"It's not just time on the students side, it's time outside the regular board meeting to create an application, interview and provide feedback. This was a very large district with lots of student interest, but it's an extra time commitment for the board as well," Slater said.

Director Lois DiPrima said she favored included the policy on the books, but Wondra said if it's included, the board would be obligated to pursue it.

Slater, at the board's direction, said she would not bring the policy back for action, but said it could be revisited at any time.

In other action, the board:

- approved trips for the FFA group to Indianapolis and the annual junior high science trip to the Florida Keys.
- got an update on the district Creative Learning Center statistics from instructor Deb Hentzel and Fort Madison High School Principal Greg Smith.





the most because he gets to interview the top economic development officials and leaders in the world.

"It's kind of for fun, but it gives me a chance to interview movers and shakers in economic development and broadened my horizons. That's really kind of cool for a couple guys from Iowa," he said.

Fraise said Ron Kitchens is the managing partner of Consultant Connect as part of the Southwest Michigan First economic development arm in Michigan.

Kitchens wrote in the announcement that the distinction is aimed at acknowledging those who are creating a buzz around economic development.

"This annual list recognizing North America's Top 50 Economic Developers is designed to acknowledge the hard work of the top leaders in this field and elevate the conversation around economic development and job creation," Kitchen wrote.

"Each of the leaders represented on this year's list are beyond deserving of this recognition for their efforts in building our communities."

Fraise said it reflects the innovation of LCEDGs work

"I think its a reflection that we're doing some good, innovative work. And what I'm most proud of is the partnerships that exist here between educators, business, industries and economic development," Fraise said.

"Every time I see them sitting down at a table together I know we were a catalyst for that.

"I think were doing the kind of work that's important for the long term of the county and region and that gets noticed. We're doing the work that people think magically happens."

He said economic development has changed dramatically over the years.

"Economic Development is changing so rapidly and gone is the day of chasing smokestacks. It's workforce and being able to respond quickly to requests. You have to be on top of your game and things are moving incredibly fast," Fraise said.

"I think that's good when organizations or companies are looking for us and see this type of news."

Fraise said the most important thing for communities and developers to focus on is understanding the need to blur traditional lines and boundaries by working together in substantive ways for the greater good of the community.

"Economic developers will need to take a more proactive approach to help communities understand and address workforce issues."
